He was then kicked, and one of the as-sassins fired four reunds with a revolver into his body, killing him. The younger Huddy's head was then dashed against a heap of stones, and he was afterwards shot in the presence of a crowd of villagers. The corpses were placed in sacks and taken to Lough Mask.
