Every bylaw shall receive three several readings and on different days previous to its being passed, except in urgent and extraordinary occasions, and upon a vote of two-thirds of the members present, when it may be read twice or thrice, or advanced two or more stages in one day.

The Amendments to the Crooks Act.

the Crooks act is a very peculiar one. me of the most stringent provisions of the McCarthy act have been appropriated bodily, and the framer of the bill has frankly intimated the source from which he obtained by indicating it in the bill

The most important change introduced is compelling the commissioners to evidence for or against applications for license. The date of their meeting and a list of the applicants are to be published the latter containing also a description of the place for which in each case a license is asked. This provision will enable those who are opposed to the granting of any particular license to take steps to prevent it, and to submit such evidence as they think likely to weigh with the commis-

Closely connected with the above provi sion is the recognition, to a limited extent of the principle of local option, while the ratepayers in the same polling sub-division to the number of ten, have a right to petition against any proposed license, to state the grounds of their objection, and to furnish evidence, it is permitted to a majority of the parliamentary electors of the subdivision to absolutely prevent the issue of the license by signing a petition for that purpose. This will be found to be one of the most useful provisions of the measure for the restriction of the traffic in towns and

The bill proposes to make the separation general between the grocery trade and the liquor traffic. This will take away from municipalities a responsibility which they have found very irksome, and do away with whatever injustice the present system inflicts on unlicensed grocers.

The penalties for breaches of the license law are made more severe, and the license inspector is required to prosecute for a second or subsequent offence when the offender has really been convicted of former offences. In addition to allother penalties the very formidable and appropriate one of forfeiture of license is introluced—the forfeiture to be for at least two years for a third offence.



In England, where it appeared in 1348, it left but one out of every ten inhabitants; and here is what I wish to impress: Volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, tidal waves, meteorological phenomena, were followed by periods when, Lampardius tells us, "the heavens seemed on fire." Great rains and floods succeeded these. In England, immediately preceding the plague, it rained (with scarce twenty-four hours intermission) from Christmas to midsummer.

We have had all these phenomena, following in about the same order. Would they not lead one to inquire if there was not some connection?

PUBLIC NOTICE

Is hereby given that the City of Toronto has applied to the Ontario Legislature for an Act, entitled "An Act to empower and authorize the City of Toronto to institute an issue of Corporation Stock for Drainage Works."

The Bill proposes amongst other things:

1. To provide for the issue of \$1,500,000 (if so required) of Irredeemable City Stock for Drainage Works only: the rate of interest not to exceed five per cent, and be fixed by the bylaw authorizing the issue.

2. To limit the taxing power of the City Council to one and a half cents in the dollar on the assessed rateable property of the city for general purposes, instead of two cents, as at present authorized.

3. To limit the borrowing powers of the city to four per cent on the assessed value of all rateable property over \$50,000,000, instead of eight per cent, as authorized by the Consolidation Act of 1879.

4. The Act not to come into effect unless and until sanctioned by the vote of the electors taken as on a bylaw creating a debt.

The above Bill will be considered by the Committee on Private Bills in about ten days.
