Au Electoral System on Trial.

The American system of electing presigest grave doubts whether it is really the best that might be devised. At present the question of who is to be president hinges upon the vote of one state-that of New York. Now, observe how the pres-

ent system works. In that state the votes cast for Blaine and Cleveland together foot up to some 1,100,000, more or less,

about 1240. It is evident that New York was very evenly divided on the choice, and that neither side has much of a majority to boast of, taking the state all over. But according to law the 36 electoral votes of the state have to be cast all for one candidate or all for the other. And this is the kind of talk that is now going on. If, say the republicans, it can be proved that Cleveland has but one majority, in the whole state, we submit and resign at once. If, say the democrats, it is proved that Blaine has just one majority, we submit and resign, ditto,

ditto. That is-the law abiding portions of both parties respectively say so; though there are some who talk of guns, and cannons, and a resort to arms.

The difficulty now presented is not a new one; it was foreseen and considered a hundred years ago by the fathers of the republic. At that time the arguments in favor of making each state vote as a unit seemed conclusive to them. Do they appear to have the same force now, in the light of recent experience? Doubtful. There seems to be at least a good case for reconsideration.

After that deplorable event congress authorized the expenditure of \$300,000 on its renovation. It was re-opened Jan. 1, 1818. Large sums have been expended on the building and its fur-nishing since that date. It was partially refurnished when John Quincy Adams be came occupant, and wholly with the be-ginning of President Grant's administra-tion. As it now costs the government \$89,000 to maintain the White house, ex-clusive of what the occupant pays out of his salary of \$50,000 for personal servants, the difference between expenditures in the infancy of the republic and in these days is shown in a striking light. shown in a striking light.

### WHAT THE JUNGE SAID TO HIM. THE TELEPHONE PATENTS. How Gilbert W. Hazietine Received His

Sentencé at Baltimore. From the Baltimore Herald, Nov. 8. The adjourned argument in the applica-At 11 o'clock yesterday morning Gilbert W. Hazletine was placed in the dock of the criminal court to receive his sentence for killing Mamie Thorpe. He appeared perfectly indifferent to his fate, betrayed no evidence of emotion, and when asked by Judge Phelps if he had any reason to assign why sentence should not be passed upon him, he said "No" in a careless manner. Judge Phelps then said :

"You have been convicted of the c unlawfully and feloniously killing a being. The life you took was that of a being. The life you took was that of a woman and an a ject woman. No attempt has been made to extenuate the barbarity of the deed. On the contrary, its unprovoled ornelty has been made the central figure in the theory of your defence. Pressed by able and dis-tinguished connsel, with extraordinary skill and eloquence, the defence of insanity has yet been rejected by the jury who tried you, and now they turn you over to the court as re-sponsible for your act. And it i, fortunate for you that the jury found themselves able to take a view of the law which reduced the grade of your crime to manislaughter. "The limit of punishment prescribed by law for this grade of homi side is imprisonment in the penitentiary for ten years. A very large discretion is confided to the court to mitigate

discretion is confided to the court to mitigate the severity of this punishment. That discre-tion is to be exercised in view of all the cir-cumstances of the case and of the demands of public justice. It is not to be exercised upon mere motives of pity for the prisoner or sym-pathy for his distressed family. Clemency, as such, is not the prerogative of the judiciary. "Setting aside the defense excluded by the verdict, where are the mitigating circum-stances that would justify the court in shor-tening the period of imprisonment? That you have had advantages of education, social position and respectable connections is rather an aggravation than othewise. Nor does it commend your act to favorable consideration than it was the not unnatural offspring of a reckless and frenzied debauch. "Regarded as a case of manshaughter, yours is also great care to be taken that as a stranger in the community whese law you have tran-pied upon and whose decency you have out-roged, no discrimination is made against you.
