On the 6th of April, 1851, was effected the ransfer of the post office in Canada from the control of the Imperial to the local govern ent. Immediately after the transfer, Hon. J. Morriss entered into a contract with Rawdon, Wright, Hatch and Edson, banknote engravers of New York, for the preparation of postal stamps. They were issued June 1, 1851, and the values were as fol-

lows,-three-pence, with beaver, color vernillion; sixpence, purple, portrait of Prince Albert; twelve-pence, black, portrait of Vicoria. These stamps are now very scarce, the twelve-pence being worth \$50. In June 1852 three additional values were issued, viz. one-penny, rose, portrait of Victoria; six pence, seven and a half-pence currency, green portrait of Victoria; ten-pence, blue portrait of Cartier. 


