ADJUSTMENTS ASKED IN SALES AND STAMP TAXES

Secretary W. H. Maxwell, of the Bridgetown Board of Trade, is in receipt of letters from the Montreal Chamber of Commerce, enclosing resolutions passed as follows:

The Initiative Committee has the honor to recommend to the Council of la Chambre de Commerce to respectfully ask the Minister of Finance of Canada to amend the law so that the manufacturers and wholesalers be allowed to submit to the Government a quarterly statement of the amounts lost through failures and that the Government be authorized to remit the sales tax on said amounts.

Whereas according to the Act 12-73, Secy V. chap. 47 a stamp must be affixed to a bill of exchange when it is delivered to a bank for acceptance.

Whereas when a Bill of Exchange is returned unaccepted and when another means of settlement is arrived at, the tax is paid twice or more on the same transaction.

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WOMEN'S INSTITUTE OF NOVA SCOTIA

"For Home and Country,"—Scope of Institute Work—Its National-wide Usefulness

The motto of the Women's Institute is "For Home and Country," but this does not mean that their work stops at the Provincial or at the National border.

The home takes first place, and rightly so, for it is a truism to say that "the home is the foundation of the State." Every phase of home-making is studied and an effort is made to uplift and improve home conditions: Nutrition, sanitation, home nursing and the study of proper clothing all receive attention.

The community, too, feels the Institute influence. The school is a special object of interest. Sanitary conditions in the community, beautifying of the community, providing playgrounds for children and older boys and girls, community halls, community singing and entertainments, the care of the sick, the poor and the needy, building sidewalks, caring for the cemeteries and many kindred activities make the Institute a live force in the community.

From the community the influence radiates out through the country and the Province. The Institutes are working for the comfort of those who are in the hospitals and the county homes. The Infants' Home, in Halifax, has rather a special place in the hearts of the Institute members and many are the garments, the barrels of apples and vegetables, jars of jam and other gifts which are sent from the Institutes to this institution. An interest is also taken in the Institute for the blind and the orders which are sent for brooms help the blind who are learning to help themselves.

During the war, most of the Institutes turned their attention to the most pressing need of the hour, and the record of Red Cross work done during those dark days, is a tale of faithful service unselfishly rendered.

The war is over but the cruel aftermath has not yet passed and the Institutes are not forgetful of the fact that they may also have a hand in the healing of wounds left by the war. "Collecting for starving children of Europe," "Collecting for destitute Armenians," "Collecting for Russian Famine Funds," "Sending contributions to Vimy Ridge Memorial Church," and many other such items appear in the Institute reports.

The selling of poppies on the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice was a service rendered by many of the branches. The Institutes work first for home, then for country, and after that they welcome any avenue of true service anywhere in the whole wide world. Mrs. H. S. Cunningham, Publicity Secretary.

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Crime In Canada For the Year Ending Sept. 30th, 1921

(Dr. J. G. Shearer.) Statistics of crime are always of widespread public interest. They are of special interest at the present time in Canada by reason of their bearing on the question of the effects of prohibition and of Government sale of liquor. Extremists on both sides are liable to quote what suits them, and reject the others. A representative of "Social Welfare" has had access to the statistical abstract now on file at the Judicial Branch of the Bureau of Statistics. The full Blue Book will not be off the press for some time. Canada's returns for 1921 show an increase in both indictable and non-indictable offenses. There is an increase of 953 or 5.2% in indictable offenses over 1920. In non-indictable offenses the increase is 13,439 or 9.3%. The increase is due in considerable measure to new laws, creating new offenses. It is well therefore to look at the figures in more detail.

The whole group of indictable offenses against the person, i.e. serious crimes such as murder, manslaughter, rape, assault, bigamy, robbery for immoral purposes, etc., show a decided decrease in occurrence, though an increase in convictions was also secured—a healthy condition. Of certain crimes in this whole group, charges for non-support of family show a decrease of practically 20%, while murder, rape and manslaughter, particularly murder and rape show a considerable increase. Burglary, hand-carried mail, and like crimes, also robbery and like offenses, also show a considerable increase in volume. This no doubt is due in considerable measure to the extensive and business depression.

A similar increase is shown in crimes without violence against property such as theft, embezzlement, false pretenses, doubtless due to the causes above cited, but malicious offenses against property are marked by a slight decrease. There is a slight increase in forgery and offenses against the currency. Illicit stills show a decrease though comparatively small, both in offenses charged and in convictions, so that the people who speak of wholesale prevalence of moonshine in Canada must face the disquieting figure of only 2.7 illicit stills for every 100,000 of population in 1921.

Convictions for drunkenness decreased 5,407 or approximately 14%—the total convictions for drunkenness for the year being 34,352 or 4 per 1,000 of population, as compared with 1911 when there were 41,379 or a rate of 6 per 1,000 population. Offenses against liquor, prohibition and temperance acts show an increase of 213 in a total of 10,490, which total is 1.5 per 1,000 of population. Charges of general outwary, disrespect for laws and waves of crime cannot survive beside the columns of Canada's official records of offenses against her laws. As has been seen, the offenses against liquor laws have shown a slight increase. Those against her Vehicles Acts and her Income Tax regulations show a considerable increase due to new laws having come into operation. The whole volume of offenses in 1921 arising from drunkenness, violation of liquor laws, etc., amounts to 5 per 1,000 of population, the rate for 1911 being 6.4 per 1,000. The entire volume of crimes for all offenses for the year was 182,647 or roughly 2.1 per 1,000 of population, and as we have seen, of these 5 per 1,000 were for offenses relating to drunkenness and non-observance of liquor laws.

This, impartial readers will admit, is not abnormal. The corresponding figures for 1911 are 17.5 per 1,000 and 6.4 respectively. The increase from 1901-1911 was 7%. That for 1911-1921, 3 1/2%. Offenses against motor regulations total 32,641, or 3.8 per 1,000 of population, as compared with 24,362 breaches of liquor laws. These statistics show also that the claim that the going into effect of prohibition as compared with license or government sale results in the people taking to the use of drugs, is not well founded. Offenses against the drug laws after decisive strengthening of the laws themselves, and more vigorous enforcement thereof, more vigorous enforcement of only 13 totalled 1443, an increase of only 13 or less than 1%. These offenses represent roughly 16 per 100,000 of population. British Columbia always heads the list in this column which is in considerable measure doubtless due to her large proportionate Oriental population. The figures supplied by the Federal Department of Health for the year ending September 30th, 1921, by Provinces, are as follows: Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 29; Quebec, 252; Ontario, 312; Manitoba, 86; Saskatchewan, 170; Alberta, 162; British Columbia, 501.

Oriental population can hardly explain Quebec's record as contrasted with Ontario with over half a million more of population. In any case, the opponents of prohibition in the face of the official figures cannot defend the statement that the prohibition of liquor results in increase of the use of drugs. Offenses against the law regarding the keeping and patronizing of houses of ill fame total 4,138, or 47 per 100,000 which shows a decrease from the year 1911 with a rate of 108 per 100,000, when very high figures in this group were reached. One gratifying fact of the returns is a decrease of 1.6% in the volume of offenders under sixteen years of age, which suggests that the allegation of a "wave of juvenile delinquency" has been exaggerated. We may have a further report to make when the full returns are received and studied.

A POSTAL IMPROVEMENT

The Dominion Post Office Department is considering the adoption of a "postage meter machine," an ingenious device which, it is claimed, will greatly expedite the preparation and despatch of mail matters and eliminate to a great extent the necessity for the purchase of large quantities of stamps by business firms, the postage being paid in cash for a certain amount of mail, and the machine automatically recording the quantity of letters thus paid for. The machine, which is driven by a small electric motor, prints an impression on each postage stamp, that, say, 3 cents postage has been paid, also showing the date and hour at which the letter was prepared for mailing. It desired it also seals the letter in the one operation.

RAILWAY FARES AND FREIGHT RATES DOWN IN UNITED

London.—The eagerly awaited announcement of the lowering of railway fares, which were raised 75 per cent during the war, was made last night. The railway companies of Great Britain have agreed to bring their increase down to fifty per cent. Rates for perishable traffic on passenger trains are now subject to the same reduction. Henceforth the practice of some companies of charging less than double fare for the return journey will be generally terminated. Third class fare under the new decision will work out at three half-pence per mile. Tourist and excursion fares are to be reduced proportionately to ordinary fares, but sea-side tickets will not be affected, as they are now only 50 per cent above the pre-war rate. Workmen's fares are also unaffected.

PARISHOID SCHOONER ABGOUND; CREW SAVED

New Bedford, Mass.—The three-masted British schooner Seaman A. D., bound from Jersey City for Parrsboro, Nova Scotia, with hard coal, rounded on Saw and Pig's reef early last Wednesday. She made water safely and was expected to prove a total loss. Captain Murray and her crew of seven were taken off by the Citybank consular.

(A Parrsboro despatch to The Herald says that the Seaman is owned by A. D. Seaman, of Parrsboro, St. John's, and other parties in Cumberland County. There is a small amount of insurance on the hull.—Marine Editor.)
