MARKET FAVORS BUYERS.

CANADIAN PACIFIC A SHADE BETTER IN LONDON.

LARGE SALES OF HEAT AND LIGHT BONDS.

WAR EAGLE EASIER.

There was no feature to the local market th s morning. Prices seemed to be, on the whole, in favor of buyers. A varied business was done but nothing of moment occurred, except in the sale of Heat & Light Bonds.
