CONSTITUTION.

I.

THE Society shall be called THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-law, Rule or Regulation, of the Society be repealed, annulled, or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary, within six months of the said meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment shall be proposed except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same a member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Meeting of the General Committee be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

Executive Committee.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz:

The officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay-Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound: to be annually elected at the Meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum,

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting; on the first Wednesday in March; on the first Wednesday in June; and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October; or on such day in the week of, or in the week following the aforementioned days, as may be approved by the President, or in his absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society.

4. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at St. John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate, and property whatsoever, which may now or may

hereafter be used in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in Session, and shall further be authorised to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

VIII.

Board of Home Missions.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following Members, viz:

1. The President, Treasurer, and Secretary, or Secretaries of the Society, *ex officio*.

2. Five Clerical and seven Lay-Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Rescution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five Members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX

Objects.

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz:

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards making a provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving money or Securities as Special Trusts.

11. The creation of a Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy.

X

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII

Local Committees.

1. The members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to elect two Lay Delegates and two Substitutes at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have the right to elect two Lay Delegates annually. The meeting for the election of the

said delegates to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct; and the said delegates upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as members of the General Committee

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special Meeting of the General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIV.

The General Committee.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish, and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate, of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The Members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society, and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly.—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly.—Secretary's report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly.—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly.—Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meeting for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held, provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment, and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

XV.

1. The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

2. The Clergy are further requested to take up, annually, in their respective Churches, a collection for the special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided for, be equally divided between—(1.) The Widows' and Orphans' Fund. (2.) The Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund. (3.) The Children of the Clergy Education Fund. (4.) The Divinity Scholarship Fund. Provided that any such Special collection may at the option of the Congregation from which the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the Special Funds or purposes of the Society, in such proportions as they may direct, and provided also that the yearly collection required by the rules of the W. and O. Fund, in the case of clergymen joining such fund, shall, in such cases, be considered as the Special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries; therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these Resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in Session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a). The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church, in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b). Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c). Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary through the Society, shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed

for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled, in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d). Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e). The amount required from the Mission may be paid either in money or produce, and shall be so paid by equal quarterly instalments at least one month before the last day of each quarter; if paid in money, the same to be remitted direct to the Treasurer, and if paid in produce, such produce to be furnished to and received by the Missionary, and his receipt, in lieu of money, forwarded to the Treasurer within the time aforesaid. Provided that, if necessary, the Mission may have one month's grace to complete the payment.

(f). Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g). Should neither the money nor receipts for produce, to the full amount required for the quarter, be received by the Treasurer by the last day of the second month of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send to the Missionary and to each of the persons who shall have signed the engagement, the notice "C"; and should neither such money nor receipts have been so received by the last day of the quarter, the grant of the Society shall thenceforth cease, and it shall be the Treasurer's duty at once and in like manner to send the notice "D."

If, however, the arrears be subsequently paid, the Board shall have power to renew the grant on application from the Mission.

(h). In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i). It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(k). The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such farther bye-laws, rules, and regulations as may in their opinion be re-

That in every case of a Clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, he shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, a yearly return, on or before the first day of December in each year, shewing—

- (1). The general limits of his Mission.
- (2). The extent thereof in square miles.
- (3). The estimated number of the members of the Church of England living therein.
- (4). The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively, within the Mission.
- (5). Whether or not there is therein a parsonage house, belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
- (6). The extent of the Church and Glebe Land connected therewith.
- (7). The income from such Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 1st April last.
- (8). The amount contributed therein towards the support of the Missionary, from sources other than the grant through this Society.
- (9). The number of public services on Sunday and in the week respectively.
- (10). The average Congregation in each place of worship.
- (11). The number of Communicants.
- (12). The number of Baptisms.
 - A. Infants.
 - B. Adults.
 - C. Total.
- (13). The number of Communicants.
 - A. Added.
 - B. Removed.
 - C. Deceased.
 - D. Present number.
- (14). The number confirmed.
- (15). Marriages.
- (16). Burials.
- (17). Names of Church Wardens.
- (18). Names of Lay Delegates to Diocesan Church Society and Synod.
- (19). The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday School.

Which returns shall be laid before the Board of Home Missions forthwith, and before the General Committee, on the first day of their meeting; and no grant shall from henceforth be payable to any Missionary, in default of rendering any such statement or return, so long as such default shall continue.

6. That the Board of Home Missions shall, as soon as may be, after the first day of December in each year, make up from such returns, the printed returns and statement required annually by the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, and forward the same, reporting specially to the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, any Missionary who may be in default.

7. That those of the Clergy within the Diocese, not receiving stipends through this Society, be requested to forward to the Secretary in like manner, on or before the first day of June in each year, the

returns numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in order that a complete return of the Diocese in these particulars, may each year be published with the Society's Report. as hath been heretofore in part only accustomed.

8. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop; shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary Meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering however, with the usual semi-annual collections and annual canvas of the Mission on behalf of the Society); and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to inquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these Resolutions to the Venerable SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. The Board of Home Missions, shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow, in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the first of July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant not exceeding \$100, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the Capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year, the interest on the Capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be of a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions, as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of Divinity Scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of The Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund for the assistance of Clergymen who are incapacitated by age or infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$3,000, being the amount now specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to the relief of disabled Clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton.

2. The Treasurer of The Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund and add the same to the Capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of The Diocesan Church Society.

4. Any Clergyman duly appointed as Rector, Missionary, or Assistant Curate, in the Diocese of Fredericton, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office, through mental or bodily infirmity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund, shall make application in writing to the Executive Committee, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such amount of yearly pension, not exceeding \$400, as they shall see fit. The applicant shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension or income of which he may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit; and in all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Executive Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of any application being favourably considered, a pension shall be granted, only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure, with all its emoluments.

7. If at any time there should be more demands upon the Fund than its income will meet, the Executive Committee may revise the whole of the pensions according to their judgment.

8. If any pensioner shall be so far relieved from his disability as to resume any clerical duty for which he receives any settled stipend, the pension shall cease as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund, unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his identity and continued disability shall accompany each draft for his pension.

11. The pensions shall be paid half yearly in advance, on the first day of January and the first day of July in each year; and shall commence on the first of those days which shall happen after the pension is granted, and terminate on the first of those days which shall happen after the death of the pensioner, or any other event by which such pension is to cease.

12. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of The Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund, to be called "THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND," which shall consist of the present Capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities) of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises, and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these Rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these Rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL; wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund, shall within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund, for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman, being a member of this Fund, shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates, serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days; and all congregational collections must be sent in before the first day of May. If this Rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrear.

5. Upon compliance with the above Rules, THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," a yearly pension, of Two Hundred Dollars, to the Widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during the widowhood.

6. If the widow die, or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age, the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the Will of a Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application for the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these Rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the Rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the amount of the average annual collection from the Parish or Mission, being a sum not exceeding Forty Dollars in all.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the Capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments, and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of The Diocesan Church Society.

14. The pension shall be payable half-yearly, on January 1, and July 1, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener if required by him.

16. None of the above Rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of Children of Clergymen duly licensed in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of Children of those who may have died, or retired with the Bishop's approval, on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of The Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the Capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of The Diocesan Church Society, who, if they shall think fit, may vest such management in a sub-committee at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the Capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the Capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant, to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension or income of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee may, in any case, require further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, shall determine in each case, the amount of the grant, which shall be made for a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith as the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee may direct.

9. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

APPLICATION FOR GRANTS.

That in future, no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

ABSENCE OF MISSIONARY.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion, to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

YEARLY GRANTS.

That all grants by this Committee, for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it.

VOUCHERS.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

LISTS OF SUBSCRIBERS.

That for the future, the Clergy and other collectors of the funds of The Diocesan Church Society, be required, in their lists of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report, to insert in such lists the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed.

CONDITIONS OF GRANTS.

Whereas, The grants made by The Diocesan Church Society from its annual income (exclusive of the grants received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), are made in aid of local contributions for the support of the several Missions.

Therefore Resolved, That in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own Clergymen—the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

BEQUESTS TO BE FUNDED.

That all bequests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and

the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

RETURNS FROM PARISHES AND MISSIONS.

Whereas, In consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes, and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized.

Therefore Resolved, 1. That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission, receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, church lands, and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and, if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

CONTRIBUTIONS—HOW CHARGEABLE.

That the Secretary of The Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions, reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds; that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission, in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid, be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.

SECRETARIES OF LOCAL COMMITTEES.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually, to the Treasurer of The Diocesan Church Society, the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

That the certificates of the lay delegates be sent to the Secretary, at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

PRINTING OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in the Annual Report.

RESOLUTION OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

GLEBE LAND COMMITTEE.

A Committee shall be appointed, to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease, at public auction or by private agreement, for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale, and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions, and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any, the lands, tenements and hereditaments vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 34th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purposes, to advertise in any manner the said lands or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause all or any leases, conveyances or deeds to be prepared, and to cause and direct the Seal of the Society to be affixed to the same, also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made: all things to be done under this Resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisos and stipulations of Chapter 59, 37th Victoria; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of land leased under this Resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by the Treasurer of this Society for the time being, to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned act.

1881.

A year ago the members of the Church in this Diocese were called upon to make a special effort to supply a large deficiency in its funds, and to provide, as far as possible, for increased Missionary outlay. It was a time of much commercial and monetary depression. The appeal, made through a pastoral letter from the Lord Bishop, was, in many instances, generously responded to. In a financial point of view the close of this fiscal year compares favorably with that of the past. More than one half of the deficiency of 1880 has been made up, and the Treasurer has promptly paid all claims for Missionary and other expenditure during the past year. In several of the Parishes, arrangements have been made for self-support, or contributions are made equal to, or more than, the amount granted by the Society; while the instances are few in which, during the past year, increased local contributions have not been made for the Clergyman's support. Requirements of this character, though absolutely necessary, are often met by objections. It should be always remembered that the Society, as represented by the Board of Home Missions, most earnestly desires to do what is just and right with the means at its disposal. It is one special object, on the part of the Committee, to relieve the Clergyman from anxiety with reference to the payment of his stipend. He has too much of that—when all payments are punctually made—with means too limited, and the cares incident to his holy calling. The present Regulations of the Board of Home Missions may, in some cases, be changed and improved; but, until the Lay representatives in the several Parishes and Missions are ready to act up to their responsibilities, promptly and generously, it will be impossible to carry out *any* system for the support of the Clergy with advantage.

A considerable portion of the contributions for the past year was

limited to the Deficiency Fund. It is most important to pay that deficiency. But to carry on efficiently the great work of this Society, even with the greatest possible increase from local contributions in the Parishes, the regular annual income must be largely increased. Nothing short of this will meet the continued withdrawal of the grant from the Society in England, provide and secure the present very limited Missionary stipends, and enable the Society to take up even a portion of the new work, which, in many points, is very pressing, or afford aid which is often so urgently required in large Parishes, the duties of which are wholly beyond the reach of one Clergyman.

Beyond these considerations, is it not time for the members of the Church to inquire how far it is possible to maintain even the present staff of Missionaries, and provide for filling vacancies when they occur, at the present scale of stipends? The average amount must be known to be wholly insufficient for the expenses incident to the work of the Missionary, with the strictest economy and the most rigid self-denial.

Among the objects of the Society none appeals with more force to the best feelings of the members of the Church than that by which a provision is made for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy. It is pleasing to know that this fund is now in a satisfactory condition, and by the punctual compliance with its rules on the part of those most deeply interested, there is every reason to rely on its stability.

A few years ago a Loan of \$800 was made by the General Committee in aid of a Book Depository in connection with the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. Special attention should be given to the report of the Book Depository Committee for the present year. It will be observed that the action of the General Committee has been of the greatest benefit to the Diocese. Thanks are justly due to the Committee referred to. They have brought about a large circulation of Bibles and Books of Common Prayer, works of use and instruction in Sunday Schools, besides other valuable publications of the Society. The arrangement proposed by the Committee, for a more extended sale throughout the Province, is well worthy of approval and support.

The following is an abstract of the Reports of the Missionaries, and Local Committees, for the current year :

ABERDEEN.—REV. L. A. HOYT.

“I have very little to report from Aberdeen. I have held services in the Mission whenever I was able. I delivered Lenten Lectures at East Florenceville, and other services have been conducted there during the year. I have conducted services and performed baptisms and marriages at North Glassville, Beaufort and Esdraelon.

The people are very anxious for the services of the Church. Something clearly ought to be done as soon as possible to procure a Clergyman for this Mission.”

ALBERT.—REV. GEORGE LOVE.

No Report has been received from this Mission.

ANDOVER.—REV. L. A. HOYT.

“A decade has passed since I made my first report from this Mission to your Society.

The date of my being placed in charge of this Mission is coincident with that of the beginning of the present system, by which a guaranteed amount is required towards the salary of the Missionary. Upon my arrival here, a very little investigation showed me the amount demanded could not be collected. Closing the Mission meant destroying the Church in the whole territory lying along the St. John River, north of Woodstock. As I felt there was a great future for the Church in this district, if it could be kept in existence, I was not willing to assume the responsibility of being a party to its destruction. Under these circumstances I resolved to wait and work, if necessary, ten years, receiving from the Mission what could be collected, and paying the balance of the guarantee myself. By reducing my personal expenses to a minimum, I was able to carry out this resolve, and the results far exceeded my most sanguine anticipations.

The territory upon which, in 1871, there could not be collected \$200, has paid in 1881, \$760, besides \$600, which would in all probability have been paid, if Clergymen could have been procured for Aberdeen, Grand Falls and Edmundston. While engaged in the work of establishing Missions, I paid little heed to the raising of the guarantee by Andover proper, feeling that at the expiration of the limit which I had made, if Andover failed in paying the required amount, I could allow it to be closed with less loss to the Church.

At the beginning of the year just now past, I announced to the Mission, that a failure on their part of payment of the salary would be followed by the immediate closing of the Mission. However doubtful the result of this announcement might have been, the demand for an additional \$40 made by the General Committee last July seemed to me to lead to but one result.

Greatly to my surprise and gratification, the Mission rose to the occasion, and subscribed the whole increased amount. The first three quarters have been paid with tolerable promptness, and the Wardens seem to have no fear for the current quarter.

But, in consideration of the increased amounts paid by the whole Mission, I must ask the General Committee to give Andover a breathing spell from further increase for a few years; provided that the funds of the Society continue to be disbursed by the present scheme, of which, if I may be allowed to say so, ten years practical working have convinced me more and more of its exceeding unwisdom."

Contributions towards General Purposes D. C. S. about \$60.

BATHURST.—REV. W. H. STREET.

"While subject to trials that are common to the 'brethren,' my work during the year past has not been altogether devoid of those visible results that are in themselves cheering, and a cause for thankfulness to the giver of all.

There is the envelope system, which, under the energetic and skilful management of the collector, Swayne DesBrisay, Esq., has proved successful in not only meeting the quarterly payments from Bathurst, but also in overcoming the arrears that had accumulated in the past through the Mission.

Good work is so progressing on the new Church as to give us every hope of being able to complete the building before the coming winter. The plan, by one of the leading architects of the Province, is being faithfully followed, and though the progress of the work, from various causes, has been tedious, we shall only appreciate the more a happy change from the present dilapidated structure to one which will be, I trust, in every way suited to the worship of our Divine Master.

In connection with this undertaking, I hope the lady workers of the Parish will pardon my bearing witness to their unwearied zeal, to which we are indebted, in a great measure, for the means which have so far pushed on the work.

My subscription list is not as yet complete, I trust there will be no decrease from that of the past year."

BAY DU VIN.—REV. E. P. FLEWELLING.

"Since last Annual Meeting the work of the Mission has been continued, but not without much interruption from the severe storms of the past winter.

Prayers have been said 187 times, and sermons and addresses to the number of 137 have been delivered. Twelve infants have been baptized. Five deaths have occurred within our little fold. One of my people has married and removed from the Mission, and one has been added to our list of communicants.

We find it very hard to make up the amount of assessment that the Board has levied upon us. Our numbers are but few, and a large proportion of the Parishioners are very poor. It is only within a few weeks that we have been enabled to settle our accounts with the D. C. S. for the past year.

We hope to be able to forward, as our special contribution this year, not less than \$25, and even this small amount it will be very difficult to raise, owing to scarcity of money attending the failure, or rather partial failure, of the salmon fishing. Two years together of returns from fishing, far below the average, has interfered materially with our ability to do for the work of the Church what is required or expected of us.

The foundation for a Rectory is approaching completion, and we hope to put up the frame and enclose the building before the winter. For want of funds we cannot complete it. We hope, however, that funds will be procured sufficient to enable us to make a portion of it suitable for occupation in the winter."

BURTON.—REV. WILLIAM GREER.

"I beg leave to report to the Society that the sum of \$106.44 has been collected this year for General Purposes.

It will be gratifying to the Society to know that during the past year the house and land belonging to the former Rector of the Parish, the Rev. Richard Simonds, has been bought by the Parishioners for a Rectory and Glebe, for the sum of \$1,400.

Thirteen hundred dollars are now on hand, several hundred dollars having lately been subscribed by the Parishioners themselves, \$100 given by the kindness of Mrs. Wm. Black, of Halifax, and \$100 bequeathed by the late Miss Wilson of this Parish. We are in hope, therefore, that the Society will grant us \$100 to complete the purchase.

At a Missionary service held in St. John's Church, Oromocto, in April, the offertory amounted to \$8.12, which was devoted to the S. P. G.

His Lordship the Metropolitan of Canada held a confirmation

in St. John's Church, on June 14th, when seventeen candidates received that holy rite.

During the past year two devoted members of the Church in this Parish have been called to their rest—Miss Wilson and Mrs. Hazen. The former bequeathed \$100 to the Rectory fund. We miss them much at the services they loved so well."

CAMPOBELLO.—REV. CECIL P. WILSON.

"The voluntary offerings of the people will be larger in amount than those of former years. I fear this is only transient and exceptional, but earnestly hope it may prove otherwise.

The Most Reverend the Metropolitan visited us in August last, when nine candidates received the sacred rite of imposition of Apostolic hands.

The Sewing Circles, of which there are two, are doing good work; the former presented the Church with two beautiful and chaste Chandeliers of four lights each; the latter have defrayed the expenses of repairing the foundations of the Church, have made a road through the new burial ground, have paid off the balance, till then due, on the new fence, and intend this summer (D. V.) to put the Churchyard in order and beautify it with trees, walks, etc.

It is a subject for congratulation that the sum raised for all Church purposes is greater in amount than in any former year of my incumbency.

We still enjoy the privilege of early Celebrations. The other services go on as usual, with the exception of those on Wednesday evenings, which, during this, the busy season of the year, are discontinued.

St. Saviour's Sunday School, established last year, has proved a success under Mr. Farmer's superintendence, and we may hope for good results, in the not far distant future, from its operations.

It is with deep regret I have to record the fact that Mrs. Robinson-Owen and family have severed their connection with this island, which for so many years enjoyed great benefits, especially in a religious point of view, from their presence, example and helpfulness. With regard to their helpfulness a glance at the subscription list will show that we have still reason to be grateful."

CARLETON AND FAIRVILLE.—REV. T. E. DOWLING.

The amount of the contributions from St. George's Church and Fairville will probably be the same as last year, viz. : about \$100 for General Purposes, and about \$50 from the Children's Home Mission Boxes.

CHATHAM.—REV. D. FORSYTH.

"I have very much pleasure in reporting to the General Committee of The Diocesan Church Society that satisfactory progress in the work of the Church has been made in the Parish of Chatham since my last annual Report. The usual routine of Parochial work has been carried on, I trust, with that quietness and confidence to which enduring strength is divinely promised, and there has been much to lead to the conclusion that the principles of true religion are being more and more manifested among the members of the Church. Although, in some instances, I have observed that a more becoming appreciation of Divine services and ordinances might be manifested by greater regularity of attendance upon them, yet I am glad to report some increase in the voluntary offerings on Sundays for the administration of these services and ordinances, the latter fact betokening, I trust, some better recognition of the obligations of professing Christians and Churchmen, for their inestimable privileges.

I regret to record the loss of a valued friend and faithful and consistent Churchman, who for many years was a contributor to the funds of this Society, and who took a laudable interest in its work. I refer to the late M. Searle, Esq., who for 29 years was Church Warden of this Parish. Having left behind him an honorable name, a character distinguished for its integrity, and a faithfulness to the Church which was most exemplary, it seems appropriate that his name should be mentioned in the Report of a Society in whose work he manifested a deep interest.

Since my last Report further improvements have been made in St. Mary's Chapel. The celebration of the last Easter Festival was rendered peculiarly interesting and happy by the fact that several needful articles of furniture had been presented by members of the congregation, and others, as Easter offerings for the improvement of the House of God. Among these were a handsome and valuable Pulpit, a Credence Bracket, Pulpit Banners, and a Kneeling Cushion for the altar rail. At the same time a very desirable improvement was made in the arrangement of the chancel steps, &c. Other gifts have since been offered by the members of the congregation, all, I trust, manifesting, as before remarked,

the deepening of the religious life, and the development of that 'faith which worketh by love.'

I am most happy to report also that the work of re-seating St. Mary's Chapel is now in progress. The contract has been let for \$400, of which sum a considerable part is in hand and subscribed, and the whole expense will probably be almost provided for, when the work is done in August next. I am looking forward with great pleasure to that time at which we shall, I trust, enjoy the happiness of a visit from the venerable Metropolitan of Canada, who will (D. V.) then hold a confirmation. For his Lordship's generous assistance and kindly interest in the promotion of this important work, both myself and my people must ever be most deeply thankful, and I anticipate with feelings of thankful pleasure the early enjoyment of a House of God which can properly be called 'the house of prayer for all people,' and into which all who desire may freely enter with the free-will offerings of an holy worship.

In regard to the result of the annual collections for the D. C. S. it may be expected that there will be a slight decrease in the amount raised at this time last year. I am, however, glad to say that the responsibility which the Parish assumed last year of providing for its local wants, independently of the Society, has been discharged, and a respectable sum will also be given to the General Mission Fund. The contributions have been made, as they were last year, through the offertory, and I have the greatest satisfaction in reporting the faithfulness with which even the poorest of contributors have brought their offerings to the proper place—the House of God. The whole amount of these offerings would no doubt have been somewhat larger, had not our local demands been increased, for the improvements already made or in anticipation during the present year.

As a further evidence that the interest of this Parish in the Home Mission work of the Society is still as deep and laudable as hitherto, I have pleasure in embodying in my Report the following unanimous Resolutions passed at the late meeting of the Local Committee of the D. C. S. in this Parish :

Resolved, That the Local Committee of the D. C. S. in this Parish desires to express its great thankfulness that the interest which this Committee has heretofore manifested in the Home Mission work of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, has enabled this Parish not only to assume the responsibility of maintaining the services of the Church, within its own bounds, but also to contribute to the General Mission work of the Church in this Diocese.

Resolved, That this Committee earnestly desires that the same interest and liberality which have heretofore been exhibited in the laudable support, by this Committee, of Home Missions, including the Parish of Chatham, may

GAGETOWN.—REV. JAMES NEALES.

"In my last Report I informed the Society that things were progressing favorably in this Parish, and that our new Church was going on rapidly towards completion. On the tenth of Nov., 1880, we had the satisfaction of holding our first service in it, our venerable Bishop consecrating it the forenoon of that day. Ever since I succeeded the Rev. N. A. Coster in 1858, my constant and anxious thoughts had been directed towards the necessary work of erecting a new and more suitable place of worship, in lieu of the old building, which even then was going to decay. Effort after effort was made for twenty years, but always something arose to

defeat the pious intention, till last year, ' by the good hand of our God upon us,' we were able to carry it into effect, and now we rejoice in one of the prettiest country Churches in the Diocese. Laus Deo! The seats are all free, open, and unappropriated, and the congregation has largely increased.

Agreeably to the suggestion of our dear Bishop on the day of consecration, a weekly communion has been established, with an increase of the number of communicants.

In the month of February last a Mission was held in this Parish, by the Rev. Canon Partridge, and, by the Divine blessing, to the stirring and deepening of our spiritual life, the effects of which I am still privileged to witness and to feel.

We are now engaged in building a Guild Hall and Sunday School, and though the difficulty of raising the means is very great, we are going on in the work of faith and patience of hope, and trust before many months to have it completed."

GREENWICH.—REV. D. W. PICKETT.

"I am unable to say what amount may be collected for the Society during the present year, but I hope not much less than heretofore—it will be safe to say \$40. For in addition to the usual claims upon us, we have undertaken to build a Church for the accommodation of the lower end of the Parish. Half a century ago, in Greenwich, as in Westfield and other Parishes, it was deemed advisable to build the Church in the centre, but now each end needs a Church, and the largest congregation is found about six miles below Oak Point. Mr. James Nutter has generously given the land for the Church and a Burial Ground. For the last two years our services at this place have been held in a Hall, to which the Church people largely contributed with the express condition that they should have the use of it for Public Worship, Sunday Schools, and other Church gatherings. This arrangement, as in many similar instances, has not proved satisfactory, and they prefer to do now, what they should have done two years ago, to build a Church, where not only the 'pure Word of God' may be preached, but also the Sacraments may 'be duly ministered ac-

ording to Christ's ordinance.' It is hoped that the building may be so far completed by the autumn, that some use may then be made of it.

Since last summer another Station has been opened in a back settlement on the borders of Queen's County with good results. The average attendance is forty. They have promised some contributions to the Society.

Three Sunday Schools are in operation in the Parish during the summer months, which are attended by nearly 100 scholars. I have not been able to distribute as many Missionary Boxes as in last year, partly because the plan has lost somewhat of its novelty, and partly because of local claims which are pressed upon the children as well as their parents, but I hope that the Leaflet for Children, No. 3, will create an increased interest in the work.

A Society has been organized by the Ladies to assist in raising money for Church objects, and the members of the Choir have associated themselves for a similar purpose. Thanks are due from the Parishioners generally to both these Societies for material assistance in repairing the Church and the Parsonage."

HAMPTON.—REV. CANON WALKER.

"On coming to the Mission, last November, I found a number of outstanding claims aggregating considerably over \$100. But notwithstanding this, and the work and repairs executed upon the interior of the Rectory and grounds adjoining, there will, I trust, be no diminution in the amount usually contributed by this Parish to the Society's Funds.

Colonel Maunsell and family having left us, I have no longer the assistance in Lay Reading on Sunday evenings in the Parish Church, which he kindly undertook, up to the time of his departure, and during the incumbency of my predecessor and the late Rev. Mr. Carr.

The whole duty consequently devolves upon myself now, which, up to the present, I have been able to carry on alone without, I am thankful to say, having to deprive any portion of the Mission of any of its Sunday services."

KINGSTON.—REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT.

“With great exertions, and no little sacrifice on the part of the *few* in this Parish, who are the willing ones, old Trinity, last year, was thoroughly repaired, as to the Tower, and painted on the outside a good wearing stone color, and the walls and ceiling washed and tinted, and the pews repainted, varnished, &c., and a memorial pane has been inserted in the East window in affectionate memory of the late Rector. The whole cost of improvements, between \$300 and \$400, has, I am happy to report, been met, and no debt incurred. There yet remains to be put in good repair, I may say rebuilt, the fence around the Church-yard.

Visiting brethren and others at the gathering of the Choral Union of the Deanery, last January, expressed themselves well pleased at the improvements that had been made. Both St. Paul's and St. James' Churches stand in sore need of alteration as to their interiors, but there is one thing that puts possibility of such work being done in the dim and distant future—want of funds. This is what cripples all active and growing work in this Parish. As I have more than once affirmed, and now again reiterate, there are but very few, all honor to them, who, out of their little, are always found readily and gladly to give of that little. Whilst a great number, living miles and miles from the Churches and Stations, very seldom attend public worship, either through inability or inattention and unconcern, and consequently, though they may to the ‘census enumerator’ call themselves Church people, are really of little or no value, financially, to the Church, and it is very disheartening and up-hill work to the Church Wardens, and other collectors, to go to some of these, through the length and breadth of the Parish, and hear, as they so frequently do, ‘I haven't a cent by me at present.’ ‘When I get some money I will pay,’ &c. All this means another and perhaps another days journey, at some future period. Our sources of income being so slender and so uncertain, I fear we have been quite a bill of expense to the B. H. M. in the way of notices of quarter salary ‘due,’ ‘overdue,’ ‘withheld,’ as has been the case this past year, fully, I imagine, justifying my remarks at the last meeting of D. C. S. that ‘Kingston was not in the position to bear any additional assessment,’ I might fairly add, and at the same time meet her quarterly engagements punctually.”

MADAWASKA.

MAUGERVILLE.—REV. G. H. STERLING.

MONCTON.—REV. EDWYN S. W. PENTREATH.

"I am able to report several encouraging features in my work during the past year. First I might mention an increase through the offertory, in monthly pledges and collections, for the year ending at Easter of \$152.13. I also record that \$242.16 were raised, by subscription last Fall, to pay off the floating indebtedness incurred in building the Church, leaving a balance of only \$65 now due on a building which has cost us over \$5,000. Encouraged by this the congregation have this summer raised \$500 for the purpose of completing the tower and spire, and the contractor has agreed to finish the work by the 15th day of August. Of this amount \$240 have been contributed by the faithful women of the congregation, and \$50 by the Sewing Society of 'Willing Workers.' Besides these amounts, the ladies have paid \$50 for the painting of the Rectory, making a total contribution of \$340, for which they deserve from me grateful and honorable mention. The Chancel has been improved by the addition of ash choir seats and fronts, of an excellent pattern, at a cost of \$55. The floor of the choir has been handsomely painted, and a Reredos erected in ash and walnut, with illuminated zinc panels. I note here that the 'Church Extension Association,' of London, has a second time placed me under a deep obligation by a gift of £12 sterling worth of frontals, pulpit banners and other fittings.

Another important undertaking on hand is the erection of a School House 50x20, which is now in frame, and which I hope to finish this Fall. The S. S. is increasing, and I am ably assisted by Mr. Geo. P. Bliss, who was appointed Superintendent last Fall.

As an evidence of kindly feeling on the part of the Parishioners I may mention that last January a number of them 'surprised' the Rectory one evening and brought with them a donation of \$43 in provisions and money.

I have now under instruction a class for confirmation, as the Bishop has kindly consented to come to us again this year, on his return from Sackville.

In these few notes I have presented some of the encouraging features in our temporal progress during the past year. I feel that with so much to cheer me, I ought to be silent about trifling discouragements, which belong to the lot of every pastor. The Society, however, will please notice that this small congregation,

averaging at the outside 150 persons at each Sunday service, has its hands full for necessary local objects. We have no endowment to fall back upon, and every year, for the past seven years, I have had to raise money for buildings: No one desires more than myself to be able to raise more for outside purposes, and I gladly look forward to another year when I hope to see Church and School House fully completed. The Parishioners have instructed me to guarantee the sum of at least \$50 for the D. C. S. The smallness of the amount is owing to the large contribution required for the Tower and School House."

NEW DENMARK.—REV. N. M. HANSEN.

"Since my last report the Church here has passed through a severe trial.

A Presbyterian minister, aided by a leading business man in the neighborhood, a nominal Churchman I am sorry to say, made an attempt to divide the people on Church matters. Two or three of our colony, fortunately of not very much influence, attended the Presbyterian service, held a short distance from the settlement, at Salmon River Mills. All sorts of means were used to destroy the unity of the Church. All eloquence was used to persuade the people that Presbyterians and Lutherans are the same, and that Lutherans have nothing in common, as we had hitherto believed, with the Church of England, of which we feel proud to be members. No effort has been spared. All sorts of tempting invitations have been offered to the people individually, but, the Lord be praised, all in vain. Now the storm is over, and one of the most prominent of the malcontents, tired of the war, and yielding to public opinion, is travelling in the United States looking after another home.

Again the Lord has brought good out of evil. The people have been awakened by the struggle. I find a better spirit, more

Church going, and a better will to offer for Church purposes than before.

One incident, among many, will show the kind of tactics used to our great annoyance. During the taking of the census I accidentally learned that all the people were being put down as Lutherans. Upon making inquiries I found that nobody had been asked, but that advantage had been taken of an imperfect knowledge of the language to fill in the 'denomination' column without an understanding of its intent. When the people understood the question, a great excitement ensued. A meeting was called, the census enumerator and his interpreter were requested to attend, but failed to put in an appearance. A Committee was appointed by the meeting to wait upon the enumerator, and if necessary upon the Commissioner, and demand that this matter be rectified. The Committee attended to this duty, and a correction of the list was promised. Had it not been for a mere accident I should have appeared in the census list as a Lutheran minister.

So long as the Colony is ministered to by one able to speak the language of the people I have no fear of a division to any appreciable extent. But, should the Church clergyman be removed, and no one able to speak the language fill his place, I very much fear the Church here would be ruined. As, indeed, I fear it will be in my neighboring Parish, Grand Falls, if a resident priest be not soon appointed there.

It is therefore a great satisfaction to me, that by the aid of some Church people, I have been able to send my son to St. John to prepare for Holy Orders, in order to continue my work in case of my decease. Among his benefactors I desire to mention His Lordship the Metropolitan, who, every year, gives him a considerable amount; Mr. Jas. A. Hoyt, of St. John, who gives him his board while going to school; Mr. Cowie, Divinity student, who supplies him with books; H. P. Petersen, Esq., New Denmark; the Rev. Messrs. Leo. A. Hoyt, T. E. Dowling, Canon Brigstocke; Mrs. Tippet, of Fredericton, and a number of other benefactors and friends whose names I do not know. The Lord bless them all for their good deeds, and may He so bless the undertaking that my young boy may be an able minister in the Church of Christ.

The people have done much work on our Church this Spring, and it is now ready for plastering, and will in a short time be ready for consecration, that is, as soon as the necessary small amount will be raised.

'Ebenezer.' Hitherto the Lord hath helped us."

NEW MARYLAND.—REV. FINLOW ALEXANDER.

“The Sunday and occasional services have been regularly maintained during the past year, and the congregations continue as good as I can expect.

All dues from the Mission have been punctually paid, but this has been, and I fear will continue to be, attended with difficulty, under the present rate of assessment, not that more is asked from the Mission than might be reasonably looked for, but because the main burden of its support falls, as I suppose is the case with other Missions also, upon *a few*.

The house to house collection for D. C. S. has not yet been taken up. I hope it will not fall short of seventy dollars.

Mr. Montgomery, one of our excellent Divinity students, who kindly undertook the superintendence of the Sunday School, on Mr. Cowie's much regretted resignation of his charge last year, has proved himself his worthy successor, having won, by his ability and goodness, the respect and affection of teachers and scholars alike, and in his care the school continues to prosper. As lay reader he has given me also much kind and valuable help.”

tion of my labors in this part of the Mission, in the form of a donation of some \$50.

Since my last report several members of the congregation have left the Parish, and annual contributions to the minister's stipend to the amount of \$60 have thus been lost. Four of those who have thus left were communicants. Notwithstanding this loss, the subscription list is equal to that of last year.

Some weeks ago we received from the Ladies of the Church Extension Association, in England, a very much needed Chalice and Paten, which was accompanied with some altar linen and books, &c. From the printed Report of this Society, I find that the value of the gift is estimated at £7. We are very thankful for their kindness. In the way of donations we have also received from a Churchman of a neighboring Parish two handsome walnut alms-dishes.

It is with feelings of regret, at the loss which the congregation has sustained, that we record the death of two earnest workers and communicants—Mrs. C. W. Smith and Mrs. W. J. M. Huntington—both of whom have been suddenly called away from a life of active usefulness in the midst of their days. Surely 'His ways are past finding out.'

The above are but a few of the leading events of the year. The general work of the Church in each Parish is so much alike that any account of details would be tiresome."

PRINCE WILLIAM.—REV. LEB. W. FOWLER.

"Since the 1st of July last, fourteen communicants have been added, of whom nine received their first communion; three of the remaining five have again left the Parish, being only transient inhabitants. One communicant has entered into rest. There have been fourteen baptisms, one marriage and eight burials.

During the year the Willing Workers of Saint John's Church have been busy in their endeavours to procure funds for the purchase of an organ.

In September last the Rev. Henry H. Neales very kindly came and held an eight days' Parochial Mission in All Saints' Church, which, I trust, has been beneficial to many. In that Church we have placed a small Mason & Hamlin Organ, and have received a very liberal grant of £3 worth of Hymns, ancient and modern.

Last year this Parish contributed to the General Purposes Fund of the D. C. S. \$75.25, to the Deficiency Fund \$5.75, and to the

Widows' and Orphans' Fund \$4. This year our contribution is \$76.82 to General Purposes, and \$4 to W. and O. Fund.

The Parish has also done what it could for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, and for the Shingwauk Home in Algoma."

RESTIGOUCHIE. - REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

"By far the most important event of the past year has been the consecration of our new church in Campbellton. This took place on September the fifth of last year, when the Metropolitan, being at the time on his way to the Provincial Synod, was accompanied by several of the Clergy of the Diocese who took part in the services of the day. The occasion will long be remembered by the people, many of whom had never before witnessed the solemn service of Consecration. Two services were held on the day in question, the Metropolitan and Canon Medley being the preachers. I may mention here, that I have been able to give them two services regularly every fortnight, and still manage as formerly, to reach Dalhousie, a distance of 16 miles, in time for the evening service. This second service in Campbellton, which I hold at 2.30 o'clock, affords an opportunity of attendance to those employes on the railroad, whose work makes it almost impossible for them to attend the earlier service. I have reason to believe that this is very generally appreciated. The Church is consecrated under the name of '*Christ Church*,' and may the doctrine of the blessed head of the Church never cease to be preached within its walls 'till the Lord come.' The Building is, necessarily, perhaps, rather bare at present, but this we hope will be remedied before very long; we have, however, to thank some kind friends for one or two gifts. On the day of consecration a set of Communion Plate was laid upon the Holy Table, being the gift of the Bishop. Two kneeling mats for the Chancel, as well as a fair linen cloth for the Communion Table, have also been given to the Church through Mrs. Medley. I have also to thank one of the Missionary Students in the College of Burgh-Le-Marsh, Lincolnshire, through whose instrumentality one of the many Sisterhoods of England worked for us a complete and very handsome set of Altar Linen; the gentleman referred to became interested in the Mission through seeing one of the Sunday School Leaflets on the Restigouche Mission. Christ Church is thus well supplied with Altar Linen. We greatly need, however, an Altar Cloth, a Chancel Carpet, Markers for the Books, and, most decidedly before all, a *Font*; this I had reason to hope would have been supplied before now, but unfortunately we have still to perform the Holy Rite of Baptism in anything but an edifying way; we have also no organ, which is a great drawback to the proper conduct of the service, although for special occasions we sometimes get one lent by kind friends. The Society will thus see that it is still a day of small things with us here, but yet we have much for which to thank God, and to incite us to renewed effort in the future. Comparing the state of Church affairs

in this portion of my Mission at the present time with what they were four years ago, I have indeed, every reason to be thankful. A debt, however, is still on the building, but this has been reduced during the year by a grant from the S. P. C. K., and also by a donation through the Bishop, of \$50. We hope soon to apply to the liquidation of the debt, the proceeds of the sale of the Addington Glebe, which we have hitherto been unable to claim, through the want of a Church Corporation in Addington, in which Parish Campbellton is situated; this, I am happy to report, was duly constituted at Easter last; thus we have not only a Church, but a Church Corporation at a place where a few years ago the beautiful words of our inimitable Liturgy were seldom heard.

In my last Report I expressed a hope that a Sunday School would soon be in regular working order in this portion of my Mission; our efforts to accomplish this have hitherto not been successful; the difficulty seems to be about the hour, as I am forced to hold the afternoon service here at the time which seems most convenient for the Sunday School; however, I hope soon to arrive at some suitable arrangement. A Church without its Sunday School is most certainly an anomaly in these days.

In Dalhousie the services have been carried on as usual, and the people, though few in number, have been bravely holding together and doing what they could to keep the Church open. That they find this at times no easy task, I feel bound to report, and had not the Mission Board reduced their assessment during the year, I do not know what they would have done. We have lost from our immediate midst our Lay-Reader, Mr. H. A. Johnson, who, with his family have moved some seventeen miles away from us; he still continues, however, his disinterested work for the Church, and very seldom fails to put in an appearance when his services are required at Church.

The Parsonage is, as described in my last report, in want of the necessary painting. The debt upon it has however been greatly reduced, chiefly owing to the repeated and generous gifts of the Bishop, and of others through him. When the debt is finally settled, the people will, I trust, immediately proceed to what yet remains to be done.

Of the Balmoral Settlement, where I still, as a rule, hold service once a month, I have not much to say; the people are, however, constantly moving away and being replaced by French Catholics. They have suffered much during the very stormy winter through which we have passed, but this suffering would have been incalculably greater had it not been for the many kind and willing hands of the Sunday School children of Fredericton, who, with their teachers, and under the guidance of Mrs. Medley, made five barrels full of nice warm winter clothing for distribution among them. I cannot in this report speak of the comfort these things have been to the people, some of whom I believe would have come well nigh perishing from the cold had it not been for them. I must briefly, however, on behalf of these people thank the willing workers for their self-denying labors. They may certainly feel that they have not labored in vain.

I must not forget also to thank the many Sunday Schools, as well as private individuals, who, in response to the appeal in the 'Leaflet' sent me so many nice books for our School Libraries, and many Prayer Books for distribution among the Balmoral people. They have been fully made use of, and have helped me in my work to a very great extent.

I may also report that I have every reason to believe that another Mission Station may be opened in the County at Jacquet River, where a large spool factory has just been started, the head and foremen of which, with their families, belong to the Church. I visited the place a few days ago, and have been earnestly requested to give them a service there now and again. Arrangements for a regular service there will, I hope, shortly be made.

I have nothing more to add which it is necessary to incorporate in this Report. The annual subscriptions will, I think, nearly double those of last year.

My Register for the year marks, *Baptisms*, 28. *Marriages*, 2. *Burials*, 6.

RICHIBUCTO.—REV. F. H. ALMON.

"As I only took charge of this Parish in January, I have little to report of Church work.

In the Parish Church, I have held on each Lord's day two services, and in the School-room, one week day service with sermon each week. For some months I also had a Bible class for men. At Kingston, about three miles distant, once a fortnight I hold afternoon service on Sunday. The attendance at these services has been encouraging, especially on the week days. I have thrice officiated at Kouchibouguac, twelve miles from Richibucto, where I believe a Church of England service was never held. There are a few who belong to our Church in this part of the Parish, and I hope once a month to hold service there, having been much encouraged by the attendance, both of our own people and of others. The Sunday School at Richibucto is progressing, and last Sunday I opened one in Kingston.

As money was raised last year for the purpose of erecting a small Church at Kingston, I held a meeting with my congregation there this week, to see if we can go forward and commence the work of building the Church this year.

We hold, on Dominion Day, a Bazaar in order to raise funds for defraying a debt incurred on the new Chancel, and also to repair the roof of the Church.

I have thought it better to delay the collection of our subscriptions for The Diocesan Church Society, till after the Bazaar.

I shall remit them to the Treasurer as early in July as possible, and I hope we shall be able to increase them, as I am well aware how great the necessity is for increased exertions on the part of all the members of the Church."

RICHMOND.—REV. H. H. NEALES.

"Since my last report the work of the Church has been going steadily on. More frequently than upon any previous year have her members been brought to derive consolation and edification from the use of the office for the burial of the dead, at the grave side of departed friends.

We have lost, for the present, the generous and steadfast support of Mr. Robert Currie, as well as the help of several other active laymen, who have gone for a time to the Western States.

We now have a Sunday service each week at the Parish Church, and once a fortnight at St. Paul's, Bellville and Watson Settlement. There is a celebration of the Holy Communion somewhere in the Mission almost every Sunday morning, as well as upon the greater festivals.

We had special services during Lent at the Parish Church, St. Paul's and Bellville, which were as a rule well attended. At the Parish Church we had services twice a day during Holy Week, and notwithstanding some very inclement weather they were well attended—better than ever before. Since Easter there has been a service every Friday evening, at the Parish Church, with an attendance of from fifteen to forty. In addition to the Sunday School at the Parish Church, and that at Bellville, I have opened a School for religious instruction at Watson Settlement, on Saturday afternoons.

Thanks to the exertions of the 'Willing Workers Branch' of the Guild, we have been able to send \$60 to England to purchase a new S. S. Library, Maps, &c.

The people at South Richmond hope to be able to paint their Church during the summer months.

I have to record a great deal of help, in doing the Church's work, on the part of the people, and very much personal kindness.

The people have been most generous to me, besides giving me nearly a hundred dollars in addition to my income, they gave me, at Christmas, a valuable sleigh robe, and a few weeks ago, a new and convenient light carriage.

Our subscriptions this year will amount to more than \$200."

ROTHESAY.—REV. CANON PARTRIDGE.

Contributions towards General Purposes of D. C. S. about \$50.00.

SACKVILLE.—REV. CECIL F. WIGGINS.

"I beg to report collections for D. C. S. to the amount of \$52.10. We regret very much that it is not larger, but the heavy burdens brought upon the people in the past year have tended to lessen the sum. The debt of \$250 resting on the School House has been removed, and a new Rectory built during the year. The old Rectory occupied by the former incumbent was sold, and the \$900 realized invested in a new building. The total cost of the new house and outbuildings has been \$2700; \$1000 of this still remains unpaid, but with the assistance of a Mite Society and a Monthly Guarantee Fund, we hope to shortly pay it off without having recourse to tea-meetings or bazaars. The Church, as distinguished from the sects, is apparently gaining ground in this Parish, and the good will and hearty co-operation of the people have, under God, resulted in bringing harmony out of sad confusion.

We are looking forward with much interest and pleasure to the promised visit of our beloved Bishop. I hope to be able to present a goodly number of candidates to receive the sacred seal of confirmation. Regular services have been held every Sunday in St. Ann's, Westcock, and St. Paul's, Sackville, with monthly services at St. Stephen's, Second Westcock.

The services during the week have been, Wednesday and Friday evening Prayers, with fortnightly lectures up to Lent, when we had daily prayers and weekly lectures in Sunday School. All Saints days have been regularly observed, by the duly appointed services.

The Sunday Schools in Sackville and Westcock have been in active operation, and although during the winter there was a slight falling off, yet there is now the full number again, and they are being worked efficiently and well. Children's services are held every two months, in which the children take their part responsive to the clergyman, and are thus being trained for public worship. They are also catechized on the work they have gone over between the services.

The condition of the Glebes has been much improved during the year, and we hope that in a few years they will enable us to be self-supporting; but as their improvement necessitates some considerable outlay we must beg the Society to extend to us, a little longer, their accustomed munificence.

In conclusion I must say a few words concerning our new Rectory. It is in every way a credit to the Parish and to the architect. It was built from plans furnished by R. C. Boxall, Esq., C. E., and is in perfect harmony with the Church and School House. No expense has been spared to make it comfortable and convenient, and the ecclesiastical design has been carried out in all its surroundings, so that, inside and out, it preserves its distinctive character. It is pronounced by many to be the prettiest Rectory in the Diocese, and is one of which the people may feel justly proud.

P. S.—I forgot to say that the \$800 paid on the new Rectory has been raised in the Parish, with the exception of subscriptions outside amounting to \$50; this makes a total of \$1000 raised in the Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, exclusive of Church expenses, D. C. S. collections, and clergyman's salary."

SHEDIAC.

REV. GEO. S. JARVIS, D. D., late Rector of this Parish, died on 26th March, 1881, aged 75 years.

SIMONDS.—REV. G. SCHOFIELD.

"During the year ending June 1st, I have been able to prosecute my work without being interrupted by ill health. I have had thirty baptisms, six funerals, and one marriage.

The stoppage of the Mills at Coldbrook has dispersed the congregation there; but as a small number remain in the neighbourhood, I have continued the service in hope of better days. And there is some reason to think that better days are coming.

We are repairing and beautifying the Church at Black River, and have recently put up a new fence round the Churchyard, the materials being generously given by John McLeod, Esq.

I have three services every Sunday, viz : at Loch Lomond, Black River and Garnett's, on one Sunday; and at the Upper and Lower Golden Grove and Coldbrook on the alternate Sunday.

I am preparing candidates for confirmation both in Golden Grove and at Black River, and hope for the pleasure of presenting them to our new Bishop in or about the month of August, when he will receive a most kindly welcome.

The contributions from this Mission towards the Clergyman's salary, and the General Purposes of the Society, have been collected together this year, as heretofore; and I am, therefore, unable to furnish the Society with a separate list of the contributors' names, such as is now required, for publication in the Annual Report.

The total amount collected this year is \$233.13, of which \$220.00 is towards the Clergyman's salary, and \$13.13 for the General Purposes of the Society."

SPRINGFIELD.—REV. J. H. TALBOT.

Contributions towards General Purposes of D. C. S. about \$92.29.

No further Report has been received from this Mission.

STANLEY.—REV. W. O. RAYMOND.

"I beg leave to report that with some few exceptions, the progress of the Church in this Mission has been quite satisfactory during the year past. The new Church having been completed and paid for, the Parishioners have directed their attention to the erection of a Parsonage, which was commenced in May of last year, and occupied by the Missionary in November following. It may well be supposed that such an undertaking, following so closely upon the erection of the Church, has severely taxed the energies of our people. A sum amounting to about \$500 is still due upon the Parsonage, for the

payment of which the Missionary is to a certain extent responsible; but there is a prospect that this will be considerably lessened shortly, and we trust entirely paid, before my next report is handed in.

The Mission has been fairly prompt in paying its portion of the clergyman's stipend, which, under the circumstances, is a gratifying fact.

Since making the last report, I am happy to say a good substantial picket fence has been erected around the Grave-yard, at a cost of about \$100, and in this way, what was for some time past a standing reproach to the Church in this place has been remedied. With regard to Parish work, I may say that services have been held regularly at St. Thomas' Church, Stanley, and St. James' Church, Tay Creek, and also at five stations.

During the winter several visits were made to lumber camps, and, in each instance, the service was most interesting. I could write quite a lengthy report upon this branch of Mission work which I fear our Church has to some extent neglected, but for the present, shall rest content with saying that the number of men employed within the 500 square miles of my Mission last winter could not have been less than 2000, including three-fourths of the adult male population of the Mission itself. These men are for four or five months almost entirely cut off from civilization; for the most part they are unable to go to Church, consequently the Church must go to them.

Under stress of the present financial circumstances the D. C. S. cannot support a Missionary for this special work, but the Society might do much good by passing a small grant, to be expended in providing a certain amount of good reading for such lumber camps as it is possible for a neighbouring clergyman to visit. This reading might consist of tracts, together with religious papers etc., for gratuitous distribution by the clergyman, during his various excursions amongst these camps. I merely call the attention of the Society to this branch of Missionary work, feeling it to be a very *important* one, as well as one that has been too much neglected. I do not think myself speaking too strongly when I say that the greatest practical difficulty the Church has to contend with, as far as the *young men* in this Mission are concerned, is the pernicious influence of these 'lumber camps.'

In conclusion, I may say that I have again to acknowledge the greatest kindness of the people to myself personally."

SUSSEX.—REV. CANON MEDLEY.

"I have nothing of special interest to report from this Mission, further than to say we are trying to carry on the work of the Church faithfully and diligently. The prospect of the Military Camp, which is now in full blast almost within stone's throw of the Church, has so completely taken possession of the minds of the populace for many weeks, that I have thought it better to defer my D. C. S. collection until after the excitement has passed. I trust the amount will not be less

than \$200. I am thankful to be able to report the formation of a Guild at Studholm, which has held weekly meetings since the middle of Lent, and already the fruits of its labors are manifest. Before another year has passed I trust we shall have the like in Sussex also. We have been content hitherto with having service on Sundays and Holy-days, but since Easter last, daily Evensong has been said, and although the attendance is never very large, we have not as yet been left without the two or three. The average attendance at the Sunday service is, I find, increasing both in Sussex and Studholm, although the Methodists have their place of worship open at the same hours as we have, and thus draw off indifferent souls who like a short walk instead of a long one. We have every reason to thank God and take courage."

ST. ANDREWS.—REV. CANON KETCHUM.

Mr. George D. Street reports contributions as follows:—St. Andrews \$216.42; Chamcook, \$62.91; Mission Boxes \$19.88; Total \$299.21. Offerings in aid of the S. P. G. Missions, limited to those in the Diocese of Algoma, \$52.74.

ST. DAVID.—REV. J. W. MILLIDGE.

"In making my Report to your Society this year, I am happy to be able to state that Church matters in this Mission are in what I think may, without exaggeration, be termed a flourishing condition. The increased assessment placed upon the Mission at your last annual meeting has been cheerfully paid, and the only feeling towards you is one of thankfulness, so far as I have been able to learn, for your great liberality to the Church in this Mission in the past. I find everywhere an intention to support the Society, and to contribute steadily to its funds.

I have obtained possession of the Rectory attached to St. David's Church, after waiting for it more than two years, it having been leased while the Parish was vacant. I found it necessary to place large repairs upon the house, in order to make it tolerably comfortable. These I feel obliged to pay for myself, as the Parishioners find it difficult to raise money for all the demands made upon them. In November last a meeting of the Deanery of St. Andrews was held at St. Patrick, with very gratifying results. I feel greatly encouraged at the activity displayed in Church work in that part of the Mission."

ST. GEORGE.—REV. R. E. SMITH.

"The work in the Parish of St. George has been much the same as usual. A great many people have left the place during the past year, and among them many belonging to the Church.

Christ Church, Pennfield, progresses. A large congregation, a goodly number of communicants, and a large Sunday School, having nearly sixty names on its register, and the people generally take a lively interest in their Church.

I have lately handed over one of my Stations to the Rev. Mr. Millidge, as it is in his Parish, though far from his home, and he gives them a Sunday Service monthly, whereas I could only give them one on a week day. In lieu of this, I have opened, for the summer months, two new Stations in St. George Parish, and have held services in two distant parts of Pennfield Parish, baptizing seventeen children. Since last July the baptisms in the whole Mission number forty-three.

During the past year we lost by death one who promised to be a valuable member of the Church, the Hon. Francis Hibbard, M. L. C. He had lately returned to our communion, and went to his rest, full of hope.

I trust that our contributions will amount to \$120."

ST. JAMES, ST. JOHN.—REV. WM. ARMSTRONG.

been greatly improved by a new window, the gift of his Lordship the Bishop, in memory of the late Mrs. Catharine Walker, as well as by a new carpet, the gift of Miss Ward, and a six branched light, which was procured by the efforts of Mrs. W. Ingraham. The debt on the Parsonage has been extinguished; and in this connection, the generous remitting of one hundred dollars of the amount due to the Messrs. Rourke ought to be recorded. We are also able to report, after several years of persistent effort, that a burial ground for the use of members of the Church has been bought, paid for, and consecrated. Since my last report, the Rite of Confirmation has been twice administered, once in July last, after the Synod, when twenty-two were confirmed; and again on Ascension Day, when eighteen were presented. It was on the latter occasion, that his Lordship consecrated the Burial ground above referred to.

Whilst speaking of that ground, it is my duty to record the death of Mrs. A. Charlton, a consistent and useful member of the Church, whose clear and decided views were more to be admired than they are easy to be found.

I cannot close this report without recording my most sincere regret that Samuel Schofield, Esq., has seen fit to resign his position as Treasurer of the Society, for I feel certain that had he continued, after the large and varied experience of the past year, he would have proved a singularly valuable officer."

UPHAM.—REV. S. JONES HANFORD.

"From Upham I beg to report that not having yet got through with the collecting for the Society, I am unable to state the total amount for the year, but hope that we shall not be, at least, behind that of last year. I know that much more is wanted by the Society, if even its present work is to be carried on; but what is to be done as the S. P. G. grants are gradually withdrawn I know not, but fear that the more immediate effect must, in some of the country Parishes, be the removal of the clergyman. It may be sad to have to confess it, but there is no doubt that in some of the older Parishes the position of the Church is not as good as it was years ago. In the newer and better farming districts it may be otherwise, and there is growth, but it is not the case everywhere in the Diocese.

And when it comes, that the D. C. S. must demand larger payments from the people, to make up for what it will not itself be able to supply towards the stipends, I only hope the call may be duly responded to: we cannot, however, but have our doubts in the matter.

No one can blame the Society for pressing upon us all, the absolute necessity of increased and continued exertions; but it is hard to get the people to see and feel their duty and act up to it; and, it may be, there are peculiar circumstances of the country which should be fairly considered in the matter."

VICTORIA, (ST. JUDE.)—REV. D. B. PARNTER.

WATERFORD.—REV. J. LOCKWARD.

Rev. Mr. Lockward alludes to the serious loss he sustained, by the burning of his barn, on the night of 13th December last, and adds:

"Although the barn was heavily insured, I had no insurance on anything which I had in the barn, and the fire left me minus everything but a horse. I lost a wagon, harness, robe, rug, and nearly a year's allowance of hay and oats, with some few other articles. This loss will readily be believed not to be altogether inconsiderable to a Missionary of your Society without a Parsonage, and like many more, without a private fortune. My loss was estimated for me as being at least not less than \$200.00. It is my grateful pleasure, however, to report that this loss has been well made up to me. His Lordship the Bishop, with his well known kindness and liberality, sent me at once a letter of sympathy with an enclosure to assist in replacing what I had lost. The Parishioners of Waterford also subscribed largely to a list which one of the Church Wardens took around. I might mention that on the list I find not only the names of most of the Church people of the Parish, but also the names of Roman Catholics, Presbyterians, Methodists and Baptists.

On the fourth day after the fire, I removed back again to Sussex, to the only house then vacant here. It no doubt might be better for the Missionary to live in Waterford Parish, but the great objection to that is, that there is no vacant house in the Parish which he might rent.

During the past year, with the consent of the Bishop, the Mission of Waterford has been a little reduced in extent. The Mechanics' Settlement, after two years trial, fell so far behind in its assessment, that it really endangered the existence of the whole Mission; it was necessary, therefore, to amputate that diseased—financially diseased—limb, to give a chance for life to the main body. To do this

with any degree of hope for the future, I besought the Board of Home Missions to allow me to lose the amount of the assessment then due from the Mission, and to allow the amount required for the year to be assessed on the remaining parts of the Mission. This was considerably allowed, and the Mission of Waterford has raised its quarterly amounts since, fully and in time. This change enabled me to have service at Waterford Parish Church *every* Sunday, instead of every alternate Sunday as before. Under the former arrangement, with alternate Sunday services, this Parish raised only \$80.00 of the assessment, but, this year, with services every Sunday, they have raised \$150.00 of the required \$220.00.

My registers and memorandum notes show the following statistics for the past year: Waterford Parish Church 48 Sunday services, with an average attendance of 38; and 11 week day services with an average attendance of 29; also 16 week day services in School Houses, with an average attendance of 38. At the Church at Portage, Parish of Cardwell, 17 Sunday services with an average attendance of 27. At the Station on the New Line of Road 23 Sunday services, with an average attendance of 18; and 4 week day services, with an average attendance of 24. During the year, I have had 17 Baptisms, of which 3 were adults; 4 funerals and 2 marriages. The collections for the D. C. S. during the year are as follows:—Subscriptions and Collections, \$20.56; Missionary Boxes, \$22 53; total, \$43.09."

WELDFORD.—REV. W. B. ARMSTRONG.

"The principal event which has occurred during the year was the Bazaar, which was held last year, for the the restoration of the Parish Church, and which realized the amount of seven hundred and seventy-seven dollars, (\$777). We must not, however, take to ourselves altogether the credit of obtaining this large sum, for if it had not been for the presence in large numbers of all denominations, the sum total would not have been so great. It was also the first affair of the kind that had ever been held here for Church purposes. We have now about \$920 deposited in the Savings Bank of Richibucto, towards the Church building fund.

The services during the past year have been regularly maintained, except during a few Sundays in the early spring, when exposure brought on a rheumatic attack.

The Parishioners of Weldford have at length woke up to the necessity of building a Parsonage, and after having secured a certain amount of subscriptions in money, material and labor, have determined to commence the work at once. They have decided to let out the different portions of the work by separate contracts. This has been a sore want in the Parish for some time, and in fact it can never really progress without it.

The congregations at Weldford Station, Intercolonial Railway, are always good. I have commenced a fortnightly service on Friday evenings, in addition to the Sunday services. The Station is gradual-

ly increasing, and in case of a Bark Factory being established here, which is now highly probable, there will be a still larger population in the place."

Contributions—towards General Purposes of D. C. S., \$40.00 ; Mission of Algoma, \$4.00.

WESTFIELD.—REV. A. V. WIGGINS.

"The work of the Mission during the past year has been most encouraging.

The Register records 53 baptisms, 7 being adults, 3 marriages, 22 admitted to the Holy Communion, (making a total of 70 communicants), and 11 burials. There is now weekly communion in the Parish; men, women and children are all heartily united in the work of the Church, and for a poor people have accomplished much. 'Church Work' has been localized and found of great assistance in Parish work. The Rectory is now enclosed and the work goes bravely on.

The following amounts, in money and money's worth, have been raised by the Parish during the year:—Gift of land \$450; fencing Burial Ground \$125; repairs on exterior of St. James Church \$71; lamps for Trinity School Chapel \$9; contributions of furniture &c., \$100; Rectory, so far, \$600; Missionary Stipend \$200; current expenses \$60; Children's Mission boxes \$60; Church Literature \$50; Foreign Missions \$12;—making a total raised for all Church purposes of \$1,737, which does not include the ordinary contributions to the D. C. S., as the collections are not yet completed; but from the very large amount that has been raised for other purposes, it is hardly to be expected that they will be as large as usual, but the total contribution to the D. C. S. will be at least \$100. After the completion of the Rectory we hope to do more for the Society."

WESTMORLAND.—REV. D. M. BLISS.

"We have our new Church ready for plastering, and hope to have it finished before the Fall. No doubt you are well aware it is quite an undertaking to build a Church in a country Parish, without the aid of grants, and friendly donations, but so far we have found sufficient means in our own Parish. When our own wants are provided for, I hope the claims of the Church Society may be realized by the Parishioners. We hope to have the services of a lay-reader at Bay Verte during the summer months, and I am glad to see that the Board of Home Missions still holds out the prospect of a grant to this part of the Parish at some future day."

WICKLOW.—REV. J. E. FLEWELLING.

"My report this year can be made very short. The services have been regularly held, the attendance has been good, and the interest

CONCLUSION.

From the foregoing Reports, the members of the Society may learn something of the character of the work, done through its means, for Christ and for His Church. The greater portion of all that is done, and that often the most important, has no note taken of it in the reports, nor can it be embraced by figures and statistics. One thing is plainly evident, that in almost every portion of the Diocese there is abundant room for all the varied blessings through the ministrations of the Church, far beyond what the Society can at present supply.

By a resolution of the Synod, applicable to all the clergy in the Diocese, and by a regulation of the General Committee of this Society, binding on all the Missionaries supported through its means, a statistical report is required at the close of each year. If, in every case, these returns were carefully prepared and punctually made, a great deal of reliable and most valuable information would be obtained. For the past year these reports are, as yet, incomplete. They justly invite the attention of every member of the Church. It is most important and interesting to know the number of those who, as infants or adults, have been admitted into the Church of Christ. What matter of deeper interest than to learn the number of those who, during the year, have been added to the roll of communicants, and the number of the young who are receiving instruction in the Sunday Schools?

This Society is now approaching its fiftieth anniversary. Few are left among the clergy or the laity who took part in its formation, or who, at that period, were actively engaged in the maintenance and extension of the Church in this Province. During the past year another link has been severed—separating the present from the past. The name of the Rev. George S. Jarvis, D. D., late Rector of Shediac, will be found, from a very early period, in the Annual Reports of this Society. He was always present at its Annual Meetings. For the sake of his sound learning, his gentle courtesy, his firm, warm attachment to the Church, the memory of Dr. Jarvis may well be cherished by this Society.

On motion of the Rev. L. A. Hoyt it was resolved that in the event of the appointment of a Clergyman to the Mission of Aberdeen, the grant and guarantee contained in the Missionary Schedule of last year be renewed.

The Committee adjourned to meet to-morrow (Wednesday) evening, at 8 o'clock.

The Committee met agreeably to adjournment, on Wednesday, the 6th July, at 8 p. m.

Mr. Frith made a statement with reference to the deficiency in the funds, amounting to \$2,108.57, and submitted a subscription paper with the object of securing contributions sufficient to pay the amount, and, on his motion, it was resolved that the said paper, after lying on the table for signature this evening, be referred to the Executive Committee to take such steps as they deem best to carry out the proposal.

Mr. Jarvis submitted certain proposed alterations in the Rules of the Board of Home Missions, and, on his motion, it was resolved that the alterations referred to, be read and considered Section by Section.

On Mr. Jarvis proceeding to move the adoption of Section *f* in the said Rules, it was moved in amendment by the Rev. Thomas Neales as follows :

Resolved, That Sections *d, e, f, g, h, i, k*, of Rule 4, be struck out, and the following take their place :

d. When such engagements are entered into, the Secretary of the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary that he is entitled to draw upon the Treasurer of the Society quarterly during the year ending the 1st day of July ensuing, for the amount of the grant.

e. The amount required from the Mission shall be remitted by the Wardens, or persons signing the guarantee, to the Treasurer of the Society, quarterly, and may consist of money, or of the Missionary's receipt for money, or for produce furnished him at market rates.

f. At the expiration of each quarter, the Treasurer shall remit to the Missionary the amount of money paid by the Mission during the quarter, together with a memorandum of receipts, if any, which have been sent him.

g. Should neither the money nor receipts to the full amount required for the quarter be received by the Treasurer, by the end of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send notice C to each person signing the guarantee.

h. Should the Mission at any time become six months in arrears, the Board may appoint a deputation to inquire into the cause of such default; and should the Mission, at the end of the year, be six months in arrears, the Board shall report the same to the General Committee, and, except for special reason, for so doing, the Board shall not recommend such Mission to the General Committee for a grant for the following year.

i. In case of the Mission where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the S. P. G. Grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE,
For the Year ending July, 1881.

*To the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop, and the General Committee
of the Diocesan Church Society :*

The Executive Committee submit the following Report :

The Committee met at St. John, on Friday, 2nd July, 1880. An abstract of the proceedings of the meeting will be found in the 45th Report, p. 83-85.

The Committee met at Fredericton, on Wednesday, 6th October, 1880.

An account of G. W. Day, for printing the last Annual Report, amounting to \$198.35, was ordered to be paid, and also the charges for forwarding the same.

A Statement of the Treasurer's Accounts, made up to 1st October, was submitted, and also a verbal Report from the Board of Home Missions.

The Committee met at St. John on Thursday, 13th January, 1881.

A Statement of the Treasurer's Accounts was submitted, and also a Return, showing the balances due from Subscriptions and Collections for the current year.

It was resolved that the Treasurer be directed to request each Missionary to remit the balance due from his Mission before 1st March next.

The Treasurer also made a statement with reference to the Parish of Cambridge, regarding the bequest of the late S. Scovil. It was resolved to refer the whole subject to the Finance Committee, with power to act, and obtain a legal opinion if necessary ; and that a report be made at the next meeting of this Committee.

Permission was granted to the Rev. W. S. Neales to continue his connection with the Widows and Orphans Fund, on the usual conditions.

A Report from the Board of Home Missions was received.

The Committee met at Fredericton, on Wednesday, 2nd March, 1881.

A Report from the Finance Committee was presented, stating that a settlement of the legal proceedings concerning the Will of the late Miss D. B. Hazen, had been made. The Report also stated the position of the legal proceedings in the case of Miss Bailey's Bequest; and further stated that an arrangement had been made with the Rev. B. Shaw, in reference to the bequest of the late S. Scovil. The Committee also submitted a statement concerning the General Investments of the Society.

The Treasurer reported certain balances still due on account of Subscriptions, and the Lord Bishop was requested to write to all the Missionaries, in charge of Parishes in arrears, and ask them to remit the same before 1st April next.

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his Accounts up to 1st March.

A letter was read from the Rev. B. Shaw, with reference to collections in Mission Boxes, in the Parish of Cambridge, but the Committee did not agree with Mr. Shaw, as to the propriety of appropriating the funds so raised, towards making up the amount promised by that Parish, though, as there had been a misapprehension in this case, such an arrangement may be permitted for the current year only.

A Committee, consisting of Messrs. I. Allen Jack, G. A. Schofield, and G. Sidney Smith, was appointed to enquire into the reported sale to Charles Stratton, of a lot of land containing 110 acres in the Parish of Perth, and to complete the said sale if the terms are approved by them.

A bill of Messrs. J. & A. McMillan was ordered to be paid.

The Committee met at St. John on Wednesday, 1st June, 1881.

The Secretary presented a Report of the proceedings of this Committee for the past year, and was requested to add thereto an abstract of the Minutes of this meeting, and submit the same to the General Committee.

The following Committee was appointed to make arrangements for the meetings of the Society at Fredericton in July next, viz.: Rev. G. G. Roberts, Rev. F. Alexander, G. E. Fenety Esq., and G. R. Parkin, Esq.

A letter was read from Mr. F. B. Hazen, with reference to costs paid by him in establishing the Will of the late Miss D. B. Hazen. The letter was referred to the Finance Committee, with instructions to report to the General Committee at its next meeting.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented a Report, which was ordered to be laid before the General Committee. A like order was made with reference to a Report from the Book Depository Committee, and a Statement of the Treasurer regarding balances due from certain Missions on the contributions reported for the past year.

Mr. G. A. Schofield, Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, presented a Report, which was received. He also presented a Report from the Committee on Occasional Papers, and read a draft of Paper No. 3, which the Committee was authorized to have printed and circulated.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS. For the Year ending July, 1881.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Board of Home Missions submit the following Report :

During the past year, the following alterations have been made in the Schedule adopted by the General Committee last July :

These alterations were made upon special application in each case, and for reasons which, after full consideration, the Board deemed sufficient to justify the change.

DEPUTATION VISITS.

Deputations appointed by the Board have visited the following Missions during the year: Norton, Albert, Prince William, Bright, and Queensbury.

In the case of Norton, the Deputation reported that after meeting a large number of the Parishioners and discussing with them the position and resources of the Mission, and considering the length of time the Mission had been aided by the Society, they could not recommend any alteration in the terms of the grant. The engagement has since been completed, and the assessment paid.

In the case of Albert, the Deputation reported that after visiting several parts of the Mission and consulting the people, they were convinced that if the work was to be maintained, the grant from the Society must be increased for a time and a reduction made in the assessment. The Mission has been vacant some months, and, in view of the present state of the Society's funds, the Board cannot recommend any change in the grant for next year.

In the case of Prince William, the Deputation recommended that the amount required from the Mission be reduced \$50. This has since been done; the engagement has been made and the assessment paid.

In the case of Bright and Queensbury, the Deputation recommended that the two Missions should be served by the present by the Missionary at Bright, the people in the two Missions to contribute \$280, and the grant from the Society to be \$520. This has been done for some months, and the Board recommend that the

arrangement be continued next year, provided a satisfactory arrangement can be made to supply Douglas with services.

PARSONAGE HOUSES.

Grants of \$100 each have been made upon the usual conditions to Stanley, Westfield, and Burton. The Board desire the General Committee to give direction as to the payment of these grants, which are made conditional upon the existence of available funds (see Rule 13, page 16, D. C. S. Report, 1880).

DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

A grant of \$60 from the income of this Fund has been paid to Mr. JAMES COWIE, subject to the Rules which govern the Fund.

NEW GRANTS.

A grant of \$40 has been made for the services of the Reverend B. SHAW, in the Mission of Johnston, during the past year.

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL

The Board have sent to this Society, as requested, a full statement of the work at present maintained in the Diocese.

The grant made to this Diocese for 1881 was £1,900 for Missionary purposes, and £120 for Divinity Scholarships; this was £100 less than the grant for 1880. The grant for 1882 is £1,500 for Missionary purposes and £100 for Divinity Scholarships—being a reduction of £400, or about \$2,000.

In the letter announcing this large reduction, the Secretary says that "they had before them the duty of reducing the existing grants to the extent of £7,949, and there object has been to do this with the least possible hardship to individuals, and the least hindrance to the work of the Church."

For several years past the Board have pointed out in every report the danger of a large reduction in this grant, so that no person can say that it is now made without due warning. Even now, six months' notice has been given. During that time every effort must be made to make up the amount. In view of the rule adopted thirteen years ago by the venerable Society—that nine years should be the time during which it might contribute towards the support of a Clergyman in a Colonial Mission—it must surely be acknowledged that there is an especial duty upon Missions which have been assisted for thirty or forty years, to become self supporting within a short time. Surely all will unite in the effort that must be made to prevent Churches being closed and Missions abandoned. There are many who avail themselves of all the services of the Church, and yet give little or nothing to the Diocesan Church Society, without whose grant those services could not be maintained. Let there be a Committee appointed at once in each Mission throughout the Diocese to call upon every person attending the services of the Church and urge them to contribute according to their ability to the maintenance of those services.

this grant that one of the conditions upon which it is made is, that they send a contribution to the Foreign Missions of the Society. According to the Report for 1880. there were no contributions from Andover, Bright, Burton, Cambridge, Grand Manan, Moncton, New Maryland, Newcastle, Petersville, Richibucto, Richmond, Restigouche, Sackville, St. George, St. David's, Springfield, Waterford.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD.

In order to facilitate the working of the financial arrangements between the Society and the Missions receiving aid therefrom, the Board made, during the past year, such alterations in the rules as were necessary to allow the Missions the full quarter to make up the assessment, instead of requiring payment in advance with an allowance of two months' grace. The Board also adopted a form of Produce Receipt, to be used where payment was made in produce instead of cash. Copies of this receipt and the regulations referred to were submitted to the Executive Committee and sent to every Mission.

The Board also issued a Circular to the Missionary and Church Wardens or Lay Delegates of each Mission aided by the Society, asking for an opinion upon certain alterations that had been suggested in the regulations that govern the grants. These Circulars were sent to forty-three Missions, and replies were received from thirty-nine.

Question 1.—"In reference to that portion of the stipend contributed by the Mission in money, would it be better to permit payment to be made to the Missionary *direct*, or to continue the present system, which requires the money to be sent to the Treasurer?" A large majority of the answers received to this question are in favor of permitting payment to be made direct to the Missionary. The Board, without recommending this, submit with this Report such alterations as will be necessary in the present rules if the change is made.

Questions 2 and 3.—"Would it suit your Mission better to make its payments half-yearly instead of quarterly?" Thirty of the replies to this question were against the change. The Board recommend that no change be made in the present system.

Question 4.—"Should the payment required from the Mission not be made when due, would it be better that the Mission should be suspended *ipso facto* as now; or, that suspension should only take place by order of the Board, in each case, after consideration thereof?" Thirty-one are in favor of the suggested change. The Board recommend the General Committee to make this alteration, and they submit the changes that will be necessary in the present rules.

Question 5.—"Do you consider July the best time for holding the annual meeting?" Thirty-three answered in the affirmative. The Board therefore recommend that no change be made in this respect.

Question 6.—"Would it not be better to add the voluntary subscription expected from your Mission to the amount required therefrom?" Thirty-one answers are in favor of the present system.

The Board therefore recommend that no change be made in this respect.

ESTIMATE OF INCOME AND EXPENDITURE FOR NEXT YEAR.

It will be seen upon reference to this estimate that \$7,000 must be received from voluntary contributions, if the present work is to be maintained. Last year the deficiency was about \$6,000, and the special effort that was made resulted in the payment of half that sum. The balance is still unprovided for. Two Thousand Dollars additional will be required for 1882 in consequence of the reduction of the S. P. G. grant.

The contributions for the past four years have been as follows:

1877—\$6,125; 1878—\$6,694; 1879—\$5,695; 1880—\$9,468, including special offerings to the deficiency.

The Schedule of Grants recommended for next year, the Estimate of Income and Expenditure for the same, and the Returns, Correspondence, and minutes of business transacted by the Board during the past year accompany this report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO INTEREST SUNDAY SCHOOLS IN THE WORK OF HOME MISSIONS.

For the Year ending July, 1881.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop, and the General Committee of The Diocesan Church Society.

The Committee on interesting Sunday Schools in the work of Home Missions, beg to report that they have met together a great many times during the year, in furtherance of the object for which they were appointed. Soon after the last meeting of the Church Society the Mission Boxes which had been distributed four months before, were called in, and the sum of \$314.28 was remitted to the Treasurer as the proceeds of 317 boxes opened at that time. The boxes were again called in on the 1st of January, 1881, and the further sum of \$425.00 was remitted to the Treasurer as the proceeds of 513 boxes, making in all an income to the Society from this source, of \$739 28. The expenses of the Committee (herewith appended in detail) have been \$64.42, leaving a balance of \$674.86, an amount sufficient to pay two of the average grants made by the Society to Missions. During the year 52 additional boxes were issued, making 750 in all, and the Committee have now on hand 250 boxes of a better make and more attractive pattern, which they hope, will be taken by the Clergy for their schools at this time.

The Committee have also issued 3 Leaflets, copies of which are herewith presented, containing information which, it was hoped, would interest the children of the Diocese, and call forth a practical token of their sympathy with the work of the Church in their midst. These Leaflets were written for the committee by the Rev. J. H. S. Sweet, the Rev. W. O. Raymond, and the Rev. T. E. Dowling.

Your Committee are confident that if their plan, both to interest the children of the Diocese in the work of Home Missions, and to secure their contributions to the funds of the Church Society, is heartily carried out by the Clergy, it will decide in a large measure the future attitude of these children towards the Church, and will be the means, under God's blessing, of assisting this Society in prosecuting its work without the help of extraneous resources, now being so largely withdrawn; they would, therefore, urge upon all the Clergy, and the Superintendents of Sunday Schools, the advisability of procuring, without delay, Mission Boxes from the Committee, for distribution among the children, and would beg of them also, to see that the Leaflets are disposed of in the same way, and that the remittances of money are made promptly in January and July.

In closing their report they would recommend that the number

of Members on the Committee be increased to seven, in order that a more general interest in its work may be felt in the Diocese.

The Committee, to whom was entrusted the arrangement of the Depository of the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge, beg to submit their Annual Report and Accounts.

The Committee have kept up throughout the year the stock of cheap copies of the Book of Common Prayer, although the demand has been larger than usual.

The Commentary on the Bible, with Maps and Plans, is now complete in seven volumes, including the Apocryphal Books. It forms in itself a valuable library to the Bible Student. The price of the set is \$8.40, less ten per cent. to members.

"The Dawn of Day," an illustrated Monthly Magazine for Sunday School and Parish use, having been enlarged to twelve pages, and otherwise improved, the Committee hope to be able to supply Sunday Schools with copies in advance, at the rate of one cent each copy. This cost will not include postage from the Depository in St. John.

The Committee being anxious to introduce the Society's publications into every Parish of the Diocese, are prepared to engage a Colporteur, and will be glad to hear of a suitable person who can fill this post.

With the limited funds at their disposal, the Committee do not feel justified in investing any portion of the Diocesan Church Society's loan in *branch* depositories.

The Stock on the shelves of the Depository at Messrs. McMillan's has been replenished four times in the course of the year, is in excellent condition, and meets all ordinary demands.

The Treasurer's Account accompanies this Report.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER.

For the Year ending July, 1881.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop, and the General Committee of The Diocesan Church Society:

The Treasurer begs to submit herewith his Accounts for the past year, all of which, with the Vouchers, were duly handed to the Auditors of the Society for their examination.

It does not appear to have been customary, in past years, for the Treasurer to make any Annual Report to the Society, other than his Accounts. These are, however, two voluminous to be read at the meeting of the General Committee. In order therefore to bring before Your Lordship, and the Committee, the most important facts contained in the Accounts, as well as some recommendations in regard to the same, the Treasurer begs to submit herewith the following Report, which he hopes may be of some service to the Society.

GENERAL PURPOSES ACCOUNT.

The Account annexed hereto exhibits the total Receipts and Payments during the past year, on account of the General Purposes of the Society, classed under their different headings.

The following statement shews the position of the Account now, as compared with the corresponding period last year:

The difference between the *apparent* and *real* Indebtedness is explained by there being certain Accounts unsettled at the end of each year, which alter the total amounts as above. The present Indebtedness of \$2,108 57 is due to Invested Capital Funds of the Society, which it was found necessary to use, at various times during previous years, for General Purposes.

There is no provision at present for the re-payment of this sum, but as the amount is not large now, it is to be hoped that Churchmen will come forward at the Annual Meeting this year and subscribe their names to the extent required, and thus restore to the Capital Funds of the Society, what it has been found necessary to borrow temporarily from them, for General Purposes.

MISSIONARY GRANTS.

On 1st May 1880 there was in all \$671.00, of the previous year's Grants, remaining unpaid by the Society, to eight Missionaries, for various reasons. During the past year, the causes for non-payment of this balance have been removed by the Missions, and the entire amount has been paid to the Missionaries concerned.

The total amount of Grants made to the Missionaries for the past year, under the various orders of the General Committee and Board of Home Missions, was \$19,358.36. Of this amount, \$19,123.36 has become due, and been paid, leaving a balance unpaid of \$235 00 only, which will be due to two Missionaries as soon as certain Regulations of the Board are complied with in their cases.

The Society's Grant to Rev. Joseph Smith, of Petersville, for two months ending 1st June instant, has also been paid, by order of the Board of Home Missions, as Mr. Smith was about leaving the Diocese. Otherwise, it would not have been payable until quarter-day, 1st July, and thus have gone into next year's Accounts.

RETIRED MISSIONARIES PENSIONS.

The only payment during the past year on this account, out of General Purposes Fund, was \$125 00, granted by the General Committee to Rev. Thomas Hartin, of Canterbury. This sum, with \$275.00 granted to Mr. Hartin out of the Incapacitated and Aged Clergy Fund, made up the total amount of his pension of \$400.00 for the year.

As the Incapacitated and Aged Clergy Fund will be sufficient next year to pay the whole amount of \$400.00 to Mr. Hartin, there need not be any Grant made to him out of General Purposes Fund for that period.

S. P. G. PENSIONS.

During the past year, the sum of \$976 00 has been paid on this account, in quarterly instalments of \$61.00 to each of the following persons, viz.:

This amount is \$122.64 more than was estimated and granted by the General Committee at the last Annual Meeting, but only \$60.75 more than what was spent on the same account during the previous year. The expenditure is attributable to the greatly increased business of the Society, and its various Committees, and is of course unavoidable. There were some expenses during the past year which will not be incurred again next year; but as the total amount that will be required is not likely to be less than \$400.00, the Treasurer recommends the General Committee to grant that amount for the ensuing year, and thus avoid the irregularity which has nearly always been practised, of paying out during the year, more than was granted by the General Committee at the previous Annual Meeting.

DOUGLAS PROPERTY, St. John.

This Freehold Property, fronting on Prince William and Water Streets, St. John, and which now belongs to the Society, is at present unrented, and the sum of \$48.19 was paid out on account of it, during the past year, for taxes and advertising. The depression in Real Estate at John prevents the possibility of selling or leasing this land at present, except at a great sacrifice.

The dimensions of the lot are about as follows :

Frontage on Prince William Street, about 11 feet, extending back same width about 30 feet.

Frontage on Water Street, about 25 feet, extending back same width about 70 feet.

Total depth from Prince William to Water Street, 100 feet.

DEFICIENCY FUND.

The total amount of Subscriptions promised towards this Fund was \$2,109.19, of which \$202.00 was paid to the Treasurer just previous to the closing of the Accounts for the year 1879-1880. During the past year, the sum of \$1,894 19 has been received, leaving a balance of \$13 00 still unpaid, which is due from the "Church Guardian" Fund.*

CHILDREN'S MISSION BOXES.

The total Receipts during the past year amounted to \$739.28, or an average of about 93 cents per box, all through. The cost of boxes, leaflets, expressage, etc, paid out during the year, amounted to \$62.17, leaving a net balance on hand of \$677.11, which has been credited to General Purposes Account for the year.

The results of this effort to aid the Funds of the Society appear most satisfactory, especially when it is remembered that the above large amount has been collected during the first year that the boxes have been in use in the Diocese.

The Report of the Special Committee on this subject should shew the names of Missions from which Returns have not yet been received, up to 1st January last.

Of the amount collected during the past year (\$1,612.75), the sum of \$338.17 was paid out for taxes, interest on legacies, legal expenses, and cost of collection, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,274.58, which has been transferred to General Purposes Account.

Of the arrears now owing (\$962.00), the sum of \$661.50 is due from five tenants, whose yearly rents together only amount to \$151.00, shewing them to be about 4½ years in arrears, on an average. These arrears accumulated during the time that the validity of Miss Hazen's Will was in dispute; the tenants being then unwilling to pay rent to any one until the dispute was settled. They are now, however, endeavouring to pay up the amounts they owe, but will of course require some further time to do so. The collections during the past year include \$212.50 from these five tenants. The

Interest on the entire balance should of course be charged each year to the Income Account, in order to shew correctly the real net revenue derived by the Society, from the Property.

SCOVIL TRUST.

The rent of the Brick Building on North Market Wharf, belonging to this Trust, has been arranged by the Finance Committee with V. S. White, Esq., the present tenant, at \$750.00 per annum, for three years commencing 1st May, 1880; and that amount has been received from him for the past year.

\$150.00 per annum may at present be estimated as the probable net amount available from this Trust, for the General Purposes of the Society.

EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

The uninvested balance on hand 1st May, 1880, was \$9.79, to which there has been added one year's interest on the Capital, viz:—\$1,500.00 @ 6 per cent., \$90.00, making the total amount \$99.79.

There have not been any further receipts or payments on this account during the past year.

The Capital amount of the Fund remains at \$1,500 00, the yearly interest on which @ 6 per cent. is \$90.00.

DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

The uninvested balance on hand 1st May, 1880, was \$63.84, to which there has been added one year's interest on the Capital, viz: \$1,200.00 @ 6 per cent., \$72 00, making the total amount \$135.84.

Out of this sum a Grant of \$60.00 has been paid during the past year to Mr. J. R. deW. Cowie, a Divinity Student at King's College, Windsor; leaving an uninvested balance on hand of \$75.84.

The Capital amount of the Fund remains at \$1,200.00, the yearly interest on which @ 6 per cent is \$72.00.

In the mean time, any Interest that is received on same may be applied under the Glebe Lands Act, to the General Purposes of the Society. The balance of Interest at present on hand, \$110.25, has been so applied.

The Rules and Regulations of the Board of Home Missions, in regard to the Missionaries' Salaries, have been strictly enforced by the Treasurer, in all cases, during the past year, and it is gratifying to be able to record, that the results have been most satisfactory to the Society, and it is hoped, to the Missions and Clergymen also.

The following list of Missions, suspended for being in arrears, on the different Quarterly dates, during the past year, shows a steady improvement; the number suspended on the last Quarter-day, being only about half what it was on the first Quarter day:

It should also be noted that, although the Assessments put upon the different Missions, during the past year, were *greater* than ever before, the balances of same remaining unpaid at the end of the year, are considerably *less* than they have ever been; and only about one

quarter of the amount that was in arrears at the corresponding date last year.

And this result is even more satisfactory, when it is remembered, that the amount of Voluntary Contributions received from the different Missions, during the past year, was also greater than ever before, being \$3,358.57 greater than during the year previous, and \$2,882.31 greater than the average contributions during the three preceding years.

This balance, which has been temporarily borrowed from the Investments, and used for General Purposes, should be re-paid and invested again, as soon as ever the finances of the Society will permit.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH (Derby) TRUST.

There has not been any change made in the Investments of this Fund during the past year.

The Capital amount of \$600.00 is invested in St. John Sewerage and Water Debentures, bearing 6 per cent. Interest, payable half-yearly, on 1st May and 1st November.

The Interest collected on same, during the past year, has been paid to Rev. Augustus F. Hiltz, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Derby. The next payment of Interest (\$18.00) will be due on 1st November.

WHETEN (Richibucto) TRUST.

Some changes have been made in the Investments of this Fund during the past year, by order of the Finance Committee, in order that the Interest on the Debentures might all be payable at the same semi-annual dates, instead of at several different dates, as heretofore.

The Capital amount of \$2,000.00 is now all invested in Fredericton School Debentures, bearing 6 per cent. interest, payable half-yearly, on 1st January and 1st July.

The interest collected on same during the past year, up to 1st

January, has been paid to Rev. Messrs. Jones and Almon for the periods during which they were respectively Rectors of the Parish.

The next payment of interest, \$60.00, will be due on 1st July.

ASSETS AND INCOME THEREFROM.

The Statement annexed hereto exhibits a summary of the various Assets held by the Society, amounting to \$106,195.95, with the present Net yearly Income therefrom, amounting to \$5,740 81, and also an account of the different Funds or Trusts to which the Assets belong, or the objects to which the Income therefrom is applicable.

It will be seen from the statement referred to, that, besides there being a considerable part of the Hazen Trust Property at present idle, there is also a total sum of \$9,615 95 of other Assets belonging to General Purposes Fund, either unavailable, or not yielding any revenue to the Society at present.

ANNUAL INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

The Statement annexed hereto exhibits a summary of the estimated Income and Expenditure of the Society, on General Purposes Account, for the ensuing year.

It will be seen thereby, that in addition to all other probable Income, Subscriptions to the extent of \$7,012.19 will be necessary, to enable the Society to pay the Missionary Grants recommended by the Board of Home Missions for the year.

Besides this requirement, there is also the present Indebtedness of the Society, amounting to \$2,108.57, which is not provided for in the above estimate. The Treasurer recommends that some renewed effort be made *at once*, to pay off this balance, and thus place the Society in the financial position which it should always occupy, *i. e.*, "out of debt."

CONCLUSION.

Mr. Schofield having resigned the office of Treasurer, and the Executive Committee having appointed Mr. Geo. E. Fairweather in his place; the Books, Accounts, Cash in Bank, Debentures and other Securities, etc., belonging to the Society, have all been handed over to Mr. Fairweather, who assumed charge of the Treasurership on 6th June.

Having retired from the office of Treasurer, Mr Schofield desires to take this opportunity of thanking your Lordship and the members of the various Committees, with whom he has been associated in the work of the Society during the past year, for the kind and valuable support and assistance which has been rendered to him in his discharge of the onerous and often difficult duties of the office. And knowing, as he does, how essential such co-operation is to the Treasurer, Mr. Schofield hopes, in the interest of the Society, that the same consideration will be extended to his successor.

In conclusion, Mr. Schofield desires respectfully to urge upon every member of the Society, the importance of continuing the efforts, which have been firmly carried on during the past year, to maintain a strict enforcement of the Rules and Regulations of the Society in every branch of its extensive and rapidly increasing business.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Year ending July. 1881.

The following is an Abstract of the Reports of the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee, submitted during the year 1880-81 :

MARCH 1881.

1. THE WILL OF THE LATE MISS D. B. HAZEN.—The litigation respecting the validity of this Will has, with the advice of Counsel, in order to save the expense of appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada, been finally settled, by paying the Executrix of the Will of the late Charles Hazen, deceased, \$400.00 in full of all claims ; the Society receiving a due release from her. This settlement having been made, the Committee paid the following legacies charged on the real estate bequeathed to the Society, viz :

Miss Dunham, with interest to date of payment, \$842 67
The Administratrix of the late Maria DeWolfe, in full, 180 00

2. MISS BAILEY BEQUEST.—All efforts to settle this matter having failed, the Executor of Ann Emerson, deceased, had filed a Bill in Equity against all parties interested, to get the direction of the Court as to the disposal of the Estate ; and Dr. F. E. Barker had been retained for the Society.

3. THE WILL OF THE LATE SAMUEL SCOVIL, CAMBRIDGE.—Deceased bequeathed the North Market Wharf property to the Society for the General Purposes thereof, subject to payment of £100 of the annual rents and profits of the property "towards the support of a resident Clergyman near St. James Church in Cambridge." This amount had all along been paid to the Rev. B. Shaw, Rector of St. James'. Committee recommended that in future an order should be made annually by the General Committee as to whom this amount is to be paid.

4. The Committee reported sundry changes made in the General Investments of the Society since the last Annual Meeting.

JUNE, 1881.

1. Notice had been received from the Treasurer of the Municipality of the City and County of St. John, that Reformatory Debenture No. 1, for \$500, would be paid off six months from March 18th, or sooner if desired, in accordance with the terms stated in the Debenture.

2. Certain necessary repairs had been ordered to the S. Scovil Trust property, North Market Wharf.

3. The Treasurer's account of monies invested and held for investment was submitted.

JUNE 30, 1881.

1. Mr. S. Schofield having resigned the office of Treasurer, and Mr. G. E. Fairweather been appointed thereto, it had been referred to this Committee to approve of the Bond required from the new Treasurer; and Mr. Fairweather had furnished a Bond from himself in \$4,000, and four sureties in \$1,000 each, which had been approved by the Committee, and lodged with Mr. Jarvis, as Chairman.

2. As to the application of Mr. Francis B. Hazen, referred to the Committee, to be re-imbursed a portion of the costs paid by him in the contest of Miss D. B. Hazen's Will, the Committee reported as follows :—That Miss Hazen had left all her personal estate to Mr. Hazen—That the real estate devised to the Society, might, after deducting all charges on it, be valued at about... \$15,000 00
and the real estate devised to St. James Church, at... 6,250 00
Mr. Hazen stated that the personal estate realized..... 8,750 00

Total valuation,.....\$30,000 00

A greater part of the costs had been ordered to be paid out of the personal estate, although Mr. Hazen had not been a party to the proceedings against the Will. The Society, though not strictly liable in law, was bound in common justice and fairness to bear a proportion of the costs of maintaining the Will; and, according to above valuation, that proportion would be one-half :—

The Report recommended that Mr. Hazen should be offered so much of Miss Hazen's real estate as might be deemed by the Executive Committee value for above amount, or, if Mr. Hazen should prefer being paid a smaller amount in money or securities, that the Executive Committee should be empowered to settle the same with him, and, if necessary, apply to the Legislature for authority and power to carry out any arrangement made with him, without further reference to the General Committee.

APPENDIX.

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

As one means of increasing the Contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board of Home Missions recommends that Weekly Offerings be substituted for Yearly Subscriptions, wherever practicable.

The Weekly Offerings, upon the Envelope System, have been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried.

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish, is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation, what sum they are willing to contribute at the Weekly Offertory; and this being done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishioners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards, to be given in an envelope, at the Service on each Sunday.

2. A package of envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering.

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for this purpose.

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishioners will be held quarterly; at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year, will also present all the last year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan, the following objects are sought to be accomplished:

1. That not only heads of families, but *all in the Parish*, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute, *according to their ability*, to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible at the appointed time, *bring their pledged weekly offerings to Church*, instead of paying them at the call of the Collector.

[NOTE.—The principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute ONCE A FORTNIGHT, or at any other stated period within the Quarter.]

3. That the Parish revenue may not fall into arrears and Debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be *materially increased*, so that, mainly from this source, sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their efforts, by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan has been adopted, with some variations, in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses, and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in this Diocese, and that it may be more generally adopted.
