TRIUMPH'S ARMOR PIERCED BY SHELL

Projectile Luckily Exploded Before It Penetrated Battleship's Plate.

FOE LACK MUNITIONS

Turks Reserve Fire for Warships and Ignore Destroyers.

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, March 13.—2.30 a.m.—The officers of the British battleship Triumph, formerly the Chilean battleship Libertad, which has been 17 times in action in the Dardanelles, gave an account of the fighting in the tortuous waterway, to The Daily Telegraph's correspondent at Mitylene, where the Triumph is coaling.

"Trial trips were made into the entrance of the Dardanelles on Feb. 18, by torpedo boat destroyers, which got within 1000 yards of the forts," said one of the officers. "The destroyers were not fired upon, as the Turks, probably thru a shortage of ammunition, reserved their shells for the larger ships. The Triumph was ordered to hombard fort 1, and destroy battery No. 50, both on the European side of the straits but we could find no trace

Spectacular Combat.

"Along the shore we perceived trenches and barbed wire entanglements which had been erected to prevent landings. Some troops also were seen entrenched on the hills. On the morning of Feb. 19, all the allied ships proceeded against the outer forts,

seen entrenened on the fills. On the morning of Feb. 19, all the allied ships proceeded against the outer forts, opening fire at 7500 yards.

"They received no reply. The Triumph reconnoitred Cape Helles' defences and opened fire on them during the afternoon with her 7-inch guns, causing very heavy damage.

"When we rejoined the fleet in the evening a spectacular scene was witnessed. The French ships were firing furously from the south, while two British ships steamed up and down, firing salvos. Bad weather interrupted the operations, which were resumed the 25th, and the Triumph succeeded in locating battery No. 50. The same day three trips into the entrance were made by various British ships, the Triumph getting to within 2000 yards of fort 3 and making direct hits on the enemy's guns.

"That night the Turks burned the lighthouses. The next day mine sweepers passed thru the entrance under the protection of the Triumph.

Shell Pierced Armor.

"On March 1 the Triumph was ordered against Fort Dardanus, where she was hit thrice, one shell going thru her armor, killing one man. This would have been a serious affair, but the shell exploded before it penetrated. Another shell went clean thru the captain's cabin.

"The same evening the Triumph covered a landing party which blew up some of the important works on the Asiatic side. The explosions sent fragments of wreckage hundreds of feet into the air and three-quarters of the distance across the straits.



"My decision to refuse to sell whiskey and other hard liquors over the bar, and to restrict my bar sales to beers and soft drinks, was not reached without a good deal of thought. I have been in the hotel business over 21 years and my experience has shown me that nearly all the harm done by the hotels comes from dispensing the strong drinks. The difference around the hotel since the change is marvelous and I would go out of the business altogether rather than return to the conditions under the old bar business. When I tell you that my sales of whiskey ran as high as 75 cases a month you can see that I have made some sacrifice, but I decided to make it and am willing to stand by the consequences. The satisfaction of having a quiet hotel is a good compensation and the absence of drunks on the street is pleasing to myself and the people of the village. I still keep a little whiskey in the house, but this is not sold except to travelers in their rooms or locality on a doctor's certificate. 


President Poincare Would Not Take Any Even When Dining With King George. Special Cable to The Torento World.







BRITISH REPULSED **GERMAN ATTACKS**

Attempts to Recapture Neuve Vegetables of All Kinds and British Government Issues Chapelle Cost Enemy Dearly.

LA PINETTE TAKEN

British Gain Further Successe -Indian Corps Did Fine Work.

LONDON, March 12.—A report of the recent activities of the British army in the field from the headwarters of Field Marshal Sir John ications recently arranged for day by the official information bureau.

It is dated March 11. and describes the fighting which led to the capure of Neuve Chapelle, announced

"Since my last communication, the ituation on our front, between Arsituation on our front, between Armentieres and La Bassee, has been materially altered by a successful initiative on the part of the troops engaged. Shortly after 8 a.m., on the 16th of March, these troops assaulted and carried German trenches in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapeile.

"The co-operation between the tillery of all branches and the in-"The co-operation between the artillery of all branches and the infantry was very good, with the results that the losses incurred were not steat in proporation to the results achieved. The mutual support which individual battalions afforded each other during the operations was a marked feature of the attack.

Artillery Deadly,

"Our heavy artillery was very effective. Apart from the observed results, prisoners statements confirm the accuracy of our fire and the damage caused by it.

"Before noon we captured the whole village of Neuve Chapelle. Our infantry at once proceeded to confirm and extend the local advantage gained. "By dusk the whole labvrinth of timenches on a front of 4000 yards was in our hands. We had established ourselves about 1200 yards beyond the enemy's advanced trenches.

"The number of German prisoners captured and brought into head-quarters during the day was 750. There are probably more to come in.

Counter-Attacks Failed.

"During the 11th. the enemy made repeated efforts to recover the ground lost All his counter-attacks were repulsed with heavy loss.

"We continue to make steady progress, and hard fighting continues."

TORONTO BOARD OF TRADE.

Advices from Detroit, says a Dow, Jones despatch today, are to the effect that there appears to be quite a difference of opinion between the street railway commissioners of the city and the directors of the Detroit United as to what the word "assume" means in the proposition of the street railway commission to take over the city street railway lines and to assume the Detroit United Railway funded debt of \$24,900.000.

In its acceptance of the proposition the railway board qualified its acceptance with "stipulating that this transaction shall be concluded within a reasonable time limit and, of course, with the understanding that a workable and legal plan for assumption of the mortgage debt shall be formulated and carried into effect."

Street railway commissioners have declared that in using the word "assume" they did not intend to say that the city should accept responsibility for the debt, but that their purpose was to have the city take the lines on an understanding which would permit the city to carry and retire the mortgage debts out of the earnings of the system.

A great deal of attention also was given to reckoning that the danger line would be touched by exports at the rate of more than 2,000,000 bushels a week from now until July 1.
