RESOLUTIONS OF CONGRESS TO BE SIGNED

Also An Ultimatum to Spain Regarding Her Sovereignty in Cuba - War is Fully Expected and Troops Are On the Way South - New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Kansas and Other States Send Out Their Soldiers.

President McKinley will, it is asserted, sign the Cuban resolutions and the ultimatum to-day. The presentation of the ultimatum to the Spanish Government is tantamount to a declaration of war. It requires that Spain surrender her sovereignty over Cuba, or the United States will make an armed intervention and assist the insurgents to throw off the Spanish yoke.

The Navy Department yesterday purchased seven yachts for the auxiliary navy. They have now secured every vessel available, and are busy manning and equipping them for active service.

The torpedo boat Ericsson collided with the pilot boat Hero off Key West yesterday morning. The Ericsson was considerably damaged.

Speaker Reed and Vice-President Hobart signed the resolutions yesterday, and the same were sent to the White House. The President, however, held them over.

ULTIMATUM NOT READY YET. President McKinley Wants to Give Spain Three Days to Decide Whether to Back Down or Fight.

Washington, April 19.—The Cabinet adjourned a few moments after 5 o'clock. It was stated that the ultimatum to Spain has not yet been ready for signature.

Testing a Pneumatic Gun Boat. Newport, R. I., April 19.—The pneumatic gunboat Vesuvius successfully fired a load of dynamite shell from her guns in Newport Bay to-day.

BROADWAY TABERNACLE DILEMMA. Laid away in the Basilica.

No Arrangement Made—Funds Not forthcoming—How Will It End? The Trust Board of the Broadway Tabernacle some time ago appointed Miles Vokes, H. Sherris, Frank Denton and H. C. Salmon a committee and delegated to them the duty of raising the money for the purchase of a site for the church.

Mr. Vokes, secretary of the committee, was seen by a World reporter last night regarding the present status of the relations between the church and the company. The committee, he said, had had one conference with Mr. Hobson and one with the insurance company's Canadian Advisory Board, Senator Cox, Rev. Dr. Briggs and Rev. Dr. Sutherland, but nothing had as yet been arranged.

THE SPANIARDS TALK OF NOTHING BUT WAR. They Believe Hostilities Inevitable and Brace Themselves.

VIGOROUS SPEECH BY PREMIER SAGASTA. Spain Will Not Relinquish Her Territory—The Limit of Concession Has Been Reached—The Premier Calls on the People to Unite in the Face of an Odius Attempt Against Spanish Integrity.

The speech which the Queen Regent will deliver at the opening of the Spanish Cortes to-day will, it is said, prove satisfactory to the national sentiments of the Spaniards. Perfect unanimity prevails throughout the country, war is preferred rather than yield to the demands of the United States.

From British and German official sources comes the opinion that war is inevitable, and that further negotiations to secure peace are useless.

It has become evident that Japan will attempt to acquire the Philippine Islands if Spain is weakened by the war with America.

The first-class Spanish cruisers Vizcaya and Almirante Oquendo have arrived at the Cape Verde Islands to reinforce the Spanish fleet.

WAR THE ONLY TOPIC. Spaniards Think Hostilities Are Inevitable—People Called Upon to Face the Dangers Menacing Spain.

Madrid, April 19.—(7.15 p.m.)—The one absorbing topic is the prospect of war. El Heraldo de Madrid says that war is inevitable, and even imminent. Even the forthcoming meeting of Parliament is unheeded. El Heraldo compares the "indifference of the mass of people" to "Muslim fanaticism," considering it highly dangerous and fearing a terrible reaction. The paper says a serious task lies before Parliament, which it hopes will prove equal to "facing the dark dangers now gathering around Spain."

This evening the parties constituting the Cortes held their preliminary meetings. Senator Silveira presided over the meeting of the Conservative minority. In the course of his remarks he advised all Conservatives to support the Government. The Republican party has sent a message to Senator Emilio Castelar, appealing to his patriotism in the face of the present situation.

The communication points out that "during the present situation it is the duty of Republicans to maintain an expectant attitude towards the monarchy, but at the same time to stand ready to make the sacrifices demanded by patriotism in the face of a powerful enemy for the defence of Spanish sovereignty, the integrity of the territory, and the rights of the people."

Sagasta Addressed Them. The supporters of the Government in both Houses of Parliament met in the Senate Chamber at 5 o'clock this afternoon. Senator Sagasta, the Premier, addressed them as follows:

"The times are so grave and the circumstances so exceptional that acts and not words are necessary to face the present situation. Attempts are being made to divide the glorious history of Spain by an infamous calumny. The different Spanish Governments have done their utmost to avert the war which we are being proposed."

"We have now reached the limits of concessions compatible with honor and territorial integrity. We capitulated to the instance of the United States, but now we are being asked to make concessions which would be tantamount to a surrender of our territory. The insult offered us to-day is the most infamous that has ever been offered."

"This is not the moment to trace a parliamentary program, but the moment to unite ourselves, as our fathers have done in the face of a similar situation. The integrity of our territory. The insult offered us to-day is the most infamous that has ever been offered."

"Continuing Senator Sagasta counselled the rapid constitution of the Chambers in order to accord to the Government the means necessary to defend the country. He said: 'I do not wish to see a parcel of territory to be taken from her with impunity; nor will she be a party to any trafficking for her possessions.'"

"The Ministers met to-day to modify the speech from the throne, in conformity with the situation. Senator Silveira, leader of the dissenting Conservatives, when addressing his party, declared it 'inopportune to formulate a political program.' He invoked the memory of the late Senator Canovas del Castillo, and declared that he and his party would aid the Government by voting as for the national defence without any responsibility, although making note of the responsibility incurred in order to investigate it, if need be, at a more opportune time. He declared also that the dissenting Conservatives would respect whatever the national Congress might decide, but would enter into no matter of security 'later on peace with honor.'"

NO CHANCE OF PEACE. London Papers Believe the Signing of the Resolutions by the President Means War. London, April 19.—The afternoon papers to-day unanimously express the opinion that when the demands of the United States are transmitted to Spain the latter will regard them as an act of war, without waiting for a formal declaration.

THE INTEREST RATE

Was the Principal Topic Yesterday in the House.

A communication was received from Berlin regarding differences between the local Board of Health and the town council, arising out of the board's demand for efficient sanitary inspection. The board will be instructed to have its work properly done and charge the account to the council.

ESSENTIAL ARRANGEMENTS.

After luncheon a report was read from G. P. Benson, president of the Edwarzburg Strach Company, Montreal, concerning sanitary precautions during the coming summer in the village of Cardiac, where the company's factory is situated, because of the great numbers of laborers employed in the village on the excavations for the new canal behind the village. The writer suggested measures to house the men and they were now crowded together, as many as 20 in an ordinary small house and sleeping eight in a room. Measles and diphtheria were reported to have been introduced by the men.
