The reason ad-vanced for this change is that the peo-ple of the United States have no ex-clusive right to the title of Americans and that it would be awkward to call them United Statesians. Al-though there is no warrant for it in the federal constitution, the world at large insists on calling the people of this coun-try Americans, and the name is pretty certain to stick in spite of any attempt to change it. Nor is there any reason why it should be changed. Nobody thinks of speaking of Canadians or Mexicans or Brazillans as Americans. They are such in one sense, just as the Irish and Scotch are British, but in a distinctive sense the term Americans is applied only to the people of the Unit ed States. Furthermore, it may be only a question of time when the United States will include other and perhaps all territory on this continent. This is a possibility to be kept in mind. At any rate, the name of the United States will not be changed right away, and if it ever is changed some title other than a menningless one like "Usona" is likely to be adopted.
