

A special meeting of York Township Council was held on Monday afternoon, April 13th, at 7 o'clock. The meeting was unable to be present, and his place was occupied by Councillor George Sykes. This evening's discussion was the Glen-road bridge, an ever recurring topic and one that has been prominently under discussion since the bridge was originally constructed by the Scottish and Ontario Land Co. some 20 years ago. While some action must be taken Council yesterday moved to still further defer the matter. The report of the auditors was submitted, it was voluminous and showed the finances of the township to be in a flourishing condition.
