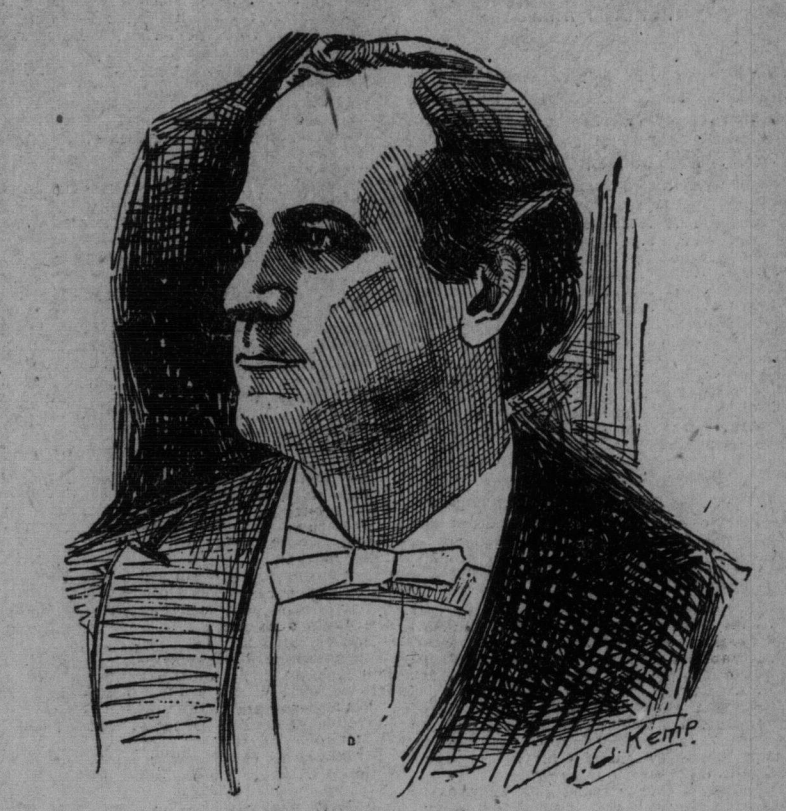

PRESS ALMOST RULER. London, July 10.—George Meredith, the father of contemporary English letters, has been giving vigorous expression to his opinions on current affairs. Regarding journalism, he says: "It is most likely that practical journalists, like practical politicians, will have to go largely on opportunistic lines. The most of my work has been imaginative. I have done a certain amount of journalism and I recognize its difficulties. But it has extraordinary power, and great opportunity for fine influence. It almost has taken the place of government."

It is true that the editorials in nearly all the newspapers have fallen off very much, only quite recently, in power and character. I don't know what the reason for that is, but still newspapers have very great influence. The power and functions of government are undoubtedly diminishing. I don't know whether we shall reach that time when there will be no government at all, as some people hope, or certainly that is the tendency. Tyranny, which is the complete form of government, has been tried and proved to be impossible. We shall never have that again unless democracy betrays itself.

DUCHESS OF ABERCORN 93. London, July 10.—The Dowager Duchess of Abercorn, grandmother of the Duke of Marlborough, and great grandmother of the future Dukes of Devonshire and Leeds, yesterday entered her 93rd year.

Going to an indisposition there was no birthday party this year, such as was held last year at the Duke of Buccleuch's town mansion at Whitehall.

Restaurant on Liner. London, July 9.—A restaurant where passengers who may not care for "the usual table d'hôte may lunch or dine in a carte is to be a feature on the larger of two steamers which are to be built for the Hamburg-American Line at Stettin. This experiment has naturally created some interest among the managers and directors of other lines, but none, according to opinions which have been obtained from various quarters, seems to believe that a ship restaurant is a carte will be successful.
