METHODISTS URGED TO VOTE TEMPERANCE. Central District Churches Pass a Strong Resolution How Congregations Are Faring.

A strong temperance resolution was adopted by the Central District Methodist Association at the annual meeting yesterday as follows: "That whereas a great wave of moral reform manifests itself in universal Christendom, notably in the proposed legislation in the British house of commons against the national vice of intemperance, and the tidal wave of local opinion sweeping all over the United States of America, and that in the marked discontent of this province with the three-fifths handicap on the temperance electorate and utter dissatisfaction with the evils arising from the bar with its discredited treating system, therefore resolved:

(1) That all Methodist electors be urged to take a lively and patriotic interest in selecting and electing from time to time methods, and morally qualified men to exit and bless this young nation; (2) That a conscientious and firm resolve be recorded against the un-British three-fifths legislation; (3) That in their opinion, legislation to remove the bar and the treating system would be deservedly popular with the mass of Ontario electors."

Reports from the various churches showed a satisfactory condition. The total membership of the centre district is \$830, an advance of \$32, although \$13,078 was raised for missions, an increase of \$769, for connexional funds, \$19,739 was raised, an increase of \$1167, and for circuit purposes \$21,104 was subscribed, an increase of \$3022 over last year.

Rev. A. P. Bruce, D.D., of Richmond Hill, was elected to represent the district on the stationing committee to act with the chairman, Rev. T. E. Bartley, at the conference. The officers for the district will be elected at the conference and Queen-street Methodist Church was chosen for the next meeting place.

Some criticism fell to the lot of Mr. Merino for having given up his superintendency of the Italian mission without due warning to become police court interpreter. A recommendation will be carried to the conference that impoverished country charges be not urged too much for increased contributions to the connexional fund, because in many cases it results in the stinting of pastors' salaries to a disgracefully low figure.

President Rev. T. C. Bartley presented a pleasing report from his church on Elm-street, where the financial ratings had increased from \$9000 a year ago to \$13,000 this year. Ninety per cent. of his people, he said, were from boarding houses and they averaged \$12 each.

Rev. C. O. Johnston's Queen-street church didn't report so well, and the pastor explained that the district was losing its most liberal members. Men who were wont to put \$2 on the plate every Sunday were moving northward.

LOOKS LIKE A THIRD VOTE ON THE POWER CONTRACT. Aldermen Seem Prepared to Put City to the Expense of Another Ratification.

HAMILTON, May 28.—(Special.)—Hamilton will sign a contract to take hydro-electric power. In the face of the temper of the ratifiers the very most that the contract ratifiers can do is to vote for another reference of the question to the ratifiers. It appears probable that a majority will go that length to-morrow evening when a special session of council will be held to settle the question.

There is some chance that the friends of the hydro-electric power will be able to-morrow evening to carry a motion in the council to make a contract with the commission at once. Mayor Stewart has not given any hope of bringing this about. He has promised that if a contract with the commission is formed the ratifiers will be cut down to one-quarter of what they are now. This means that it would be within the reach of practically every citizen of Hamilton. If the people want this boon, his worship says that it is up to them to get after their representatives who are now trucking to the contract.

Frank Pense, an Italian, had his ankle broken at the steel plant this afternoon. The new pastor of Knox Church, Rev. A. E. Mitchell, Ottawa, was inducted this evening by Rev. Dr. Fletcher. Rev. Thos. McLachlan, preached. Rev. John Young addressed the pastor, and Rev. H. Grey, Dundas, the people.

The Ontario Medical Association this afternoon passed a resolution expressing its hearty approval of the Ontario Government's proposal to establish a psychiatric clinic in connection with the hospitals for the insane and to appoint a lunacy commission or board of alienists who alone could give expert testimony in courts in cases of insanity and also requesting that reform in civil service be instituted so that no one shall be appointed a medical superintendent of an asylum without experience. Some 85 new members were added to the roll of the association.

Sudden Death. Mrs. George Clelland, Carlisle, fell from a chair in the store of the G. W. Robinson Co. this morning and expired almost immediately of heart disease. Rev. Dr. Wilbur Chapman, the New York evangelist, has declined to visit Hamilton, because he thinks the people and the ministers of the city are a little too critical. OBITUARY. Robert Burns of Toronto leaves today for New York to attend the funeral of the late Mr. David Graham. Mr. Burns goes as representative of the Canadian Orangemen.

The late Mr. Graham was a past imperial grand master of the Imperial Orange Council of the World and was probably the most enthusiastic Orangeman in the United States. Before leaving Toronto Bro. Burns sent a telegram to the Supreme Grand Lodge of British Columbia, now in session at Midland, conveying information of Bro. Graham's death. The funeral will be held on Sunday next from his home in Weehawken, N. J., U. S. He had an interesting career as an Orange general and was present at the riot which occurred on Eighth-avenue, New York City, July 12, 1871, and he has held the important offices in the Orange order, terminating in the highest office in the gift of the order, namely, the imperial grand master of the Zriemli Council. The late Bro. Graham was well known to the Orangemen of Toronto, having resided in this city on numerous occasions, and there is general regret at his demise.

At Sandwich East—Mrs. Agiala Langlois, aged 92. Joseph Collard, a member of the fire department since Jan. 13, 1876, died from apoplexy at Portland-street station early yesterday. He had been complaining of illness. For the last six years he had been caretaker of the station. On active duty, he served with Portland, Dundas and Upper sections. A son, also a fireman, was killed at a fire, McIntosh fire in 1903. Deceased was 71 years old. In the '60s he went to the western States and fought at the outbreak of the civil war with the Colorado Volunteer Cavalry. He belonged to Knowlton Post, G.A.R.

A chance to appoint the chief justice does not come often to a United States President. In point of fact, since the foundation of the government there have been less than the dozen chief justices, and since 1801 there have been but five altogether. The list of chief justices of the supreme court is as follows: John Jay, New York, Sept. 23, 1789. John Rutledge, South Carolina, July 1, 1795. Oliver Ellsworth, Connecticut, March 4, 1796. John Marshall, Virginia, Jan. 31, 1801. Roger B. Taney, Maryland, March 5, 1836. Salmon P. Chase, Ohio, Dec. 6, 1864. Morrison R. Waite, Ohio, Jan. 21, 1874. Melville W. Fuller, Illinois, July 20, 1888.

From this list it will be seen that Chief Justice Fuller is exceeded in length of his term only by the famous John Marshall, who did so much to make our supreme court great, and who lived at the age of 37 years and has been ten years on the bench is eligible to retirement on full pay. Chief Justice Fuller celebrated his 77th birthday last February, writes Raymond in The Chicago Tribune. He took the oath of office Oct. 5, 1888, so that he has been on the bench for 17 years for many a year upon the bench so far as appearances go, but after a score of years in such a place, concluding lives in the vicinity of Manhattan, it is natural to suppose that the white-haired chief justice is about ready to take a rest. Democrat, and people who remember him in the old days in Chicago are aware that he was an ardent supporter of the gold standard. Cleveland during his first term, and it is well known he still retains a vast amount of admiration for the gold standard. It was natural, therefore, that Chief Justice Fuller should be closely identified with the gold Democratic wing of the party.

A HINT TO THE DOG CATCHER. It is a Staten Islander who sends this to The New York World, but maybe elsewhere than in the State of New York, and the vicinity of Manhattan; if the dog-catcher spent more time in catching stray curs and less time in abducting pet dogs which the owners are so anxious to catch, and which would be fewer cases of hydrophobia in New York and less occasion for popular hysteria. In cities especially the chief need is to get rid of this "stray cur," and the need becomes greater in the probability that certain recent events will revive the mad dog nervousness. In Connecticut, the law provides that a dog which is not licensed and which is not kept in a pound, shall be liable to be killed as a stray cur, and the dog-catcher is authorized to kill such dogs. It seems difficult to get dog wardens who will take seriously enough the duties of their office. It will be well if the dog wardens of this State show do not wholly warrant that conclusion.

Congress and the President. San Francisco Chronicle (Ind.): One cannot help wondering whether after all a President McKinley, of politics and tact, can not come nearer having his way than an exceedingly strenuous president. There is no doubt that congress resents the earnest and repeated messages of the president on topics in which he feels a deep interest. It is within the president's constitutional right to send them, and there is no question of his sincerity in believing them proper and necessary. By contrast, however, consider them as addresses not to them, but to the American people, and intended to coerce congress to be as expert as they are in creating. And, whether rightly or wrongly, they are resented by the body which they are ostensibly intended to influence.

HEARST STILL GAINS

Serious Discrepancies Are Found in Official Return Sheets.

NEW YORK, May 28.—When to-day's session of the McClellan-Hearst recount trial was concluded a total of 41 votes had been added to William R. Hearst's vote in the 1926 mayoralty election.

The contents of six boxes were overhauled in the presence of the court and several discrepancies in the official count brought to light.

In one case, while the tally sheet and the official canvass figures, produced at the demand of the judge, were identical, the count of the ballots disclosed 23 more votes for Hearst than had been returned.

Arrangements are being made by the Canadian minister of agriculture to largely extend the work of the bureau of census and statistics by including a uniform system of gathering crop statistics from all over the Dominion. Hitherto the federal department of agriculture, in gathering statistics of this kind, has been obliged to rely principally on information furnished by the provincial authorities. It is claimed that in some instances it has been found that the provincial returns have not been very reliable, and have not coincided with the information furnished by the department by federal officials. New Pavements.

The works department recommends the laying of an asphalt pavement on Dundas-street from Ossington-avenue to Lansdowne-avenue, at an estimated cost of \$42,142, and a vitrified brick pavement from Lansdowne-avenue to the bridge, at a cost of \$6194; total, \$48,336.

No Cars Over the Bridge.

Manager Fleming of the street railway has informed the mayor that the company will not consent to run over York-street bridge and along Lake-street, owing to the city's entanglement with the C.P.R.

The Suburban Train is on the Way.

The management of the Canadian Pacific is to be congratulated on its enterprise, and still more on its respect for public opinion, in deciding to make an experiment with a motor-car suburban service on its line from Toronto west to Brampton, a distance of 22 miles. The World trusts that the people of Toronto and of the towns along this suburban route will appreciate this action of the railway, and do what they can from their side of the proposition to make it a success. What a service of that kind requires is to be put on its feet and then it takes care of itself; but to get it on its feet, as we pointed out before, it is essential that the people be assured of the reliability and certainty of its operation.

The World especially trusts that the people of Brampton will get busy in upholding this service, for if they do they will find that Brampton will grow in population, in business and in attractions. The people of Weston also have a fine opportunity of assisting in this work, and so have those who reside in the intervening towns and villages.

The World has not yet heard from Mr. Hays of the Grand Trunk as to what he intends to do on the line of a suburban service, say, between Oakville and Whitby, but we have no doubt that he is at present studying the proposition, or has someone else studying it for him, and that he, too, will be persuaded to try and serve the public just as the C.P.R. is trying to serve the public.

One of the holdbacks of the Grand Trunk has always been, thru misunderstanding or otherwise, an idea that they do not wish to accommodate the people, or to put it in another way, that the C.P.R. were more anxious than the G.T.R. to accommodate the people. Now, Mr. Hays ought to try and remove that prejudice, because he has a great railway, he has a fine double track, he was first in the field, he touches all towns at the front end, and is in the best position to make good. We, therefore, look to him to move toward a suburban service for Toronto, and to come up and see Toronto often, and to avoid any kind of friction in having to be dragged before the Railway Commission to do a duty that seems to be a part of the great franchise which he controls.

THE FIGHT RESUMED.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's treatment of the election bill introduced by his minister of justice will not add to his reputation for strength and statesmanship. Against his own evident inclination he has yielded to the pressure exercised by the leaders of the party in Manitoba whose insistence on the bill, the whole bill and nothing but the bill, shows only too well what it is expected to accomplish. Recently the Liberal program for the province took the premier roundly to task for his weakness in consenting to an amicable adjustment of the disputed clauses of the bill, but he has showed greater weakness in succumbing to the malevolent influences that are determined to control the Dominion electoral lists and the elections of Manitoba.

The country knows now that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was prepared to recognize the propriety of the objections made by the federal opposition to the Liberal program for the province. It is also clear that the bill as introduced did not secure that impartial preparation of the electoral lists which, from the highly moral favor of the ministerial protestations, the country had a right to expect. Equally obnoxious to democratic principles and to fair dealing is the extraordinary proposal to allow improperly marked ballot papers to be counted and as a corollary to be identified. The Dominion Government must be nervously concerned with the drift of public sentiment when these last pieces of the political gambler are brought into operation.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has always been regarded as personally responsive to high ideals of public duty. It is an infinite pity that, in a matter so vital as the protection of the right of the people to a free and pure election, he has sacrificed them to the demands of none too scrupulous partisans.

THE CHAMPLAIN SOCIETY.

Election of Officers of Organization Doing a Useful Work.

At the annual meeting of the Champlain Society Byron E. Walker was elected president, Sir Mortimer Clark, Sir Louis G. Jette, Quebec; Sir D. H. Macmillan, Manitoba, and the lieutenant-governors of New Brunswick and British Columbia, Prof. W. R. and Prof. W. A. Colby (McGill) were elected secretaries, and the treasurer, which had been held by the late Dr. E. B. was left vacant. The council was re-elected.

The society, since its formation three years ago, has been printing original material dealing with early Canadian history or reprinting valuable books relating to this subject and now out of print. The first volume of Lescaurot, a 17th century writer, has been issued, and Dehny's work on the natural history of Acadia, edited by Prof. Ganong, has been magnificently reproduced. Menor's work on feudalism and seigniorial tenure in Canada will be published in the fall. In this some part of the original French has been regrettably lost or untranslated, tho the expert knowledge of Europe might have been utilized to render the ancient legal phrasing.

Twenty other volumes are under consideration and all the leading libraries are members of the society. Two volumes a year being supplied for the subscription. E. E. Burpee's translation of the journal of the Vesputry, father and son, early explorers of the west, will be issued soon as a tribute to western interest.

Besides those mentioned there were present T. Langton, K.C., H. H. Langson, librarian, university; G. W. Alker, librarian, Osgoode Hall; Alex. Fraser, provincial archivist; Prof. Langland Bain, Victoria, and W. H. Sheppard, Stratford.

"Ring Rule" in Presbyterian Assembly.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 28.—That the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America shall not intend that a few men shall dominate the executive power of the church, was shown to-day when the body, after 35 minutes of lively debate, adopted a resolution providing that no paid agents of the church boards of the general assembly shall be members of the executive committee which will direct the administration of church affairs.

BLAKE WRITES A LETTER

Continued From Page 1.

Mr. Blake. "One can now approach this department with perfect confidence that what is right will be done. The statutes governing the working of the department, its rules and regulations, are observed. They have been simplified and made plain. The lands, the pulpwood regions, the mines and minerals, now go without grant to the persons entitled, and the province receives as large a share as is compatible with due regard for the rights of the explorer, the purchaser and the miner."

Referring to educational matters, the letter says:

"If you had not done anything for us but what you have accomplished in respect to the Toronto University we should all give you our deepest thanks. When you took office it was in an almost moribund condition. The funds absolutely necessary for progress and expansion were withheld. Like a true statesman you surveyed the whole situation and then inaugurated a period of progress which is simply marvelous to those who knew the university as it was and as it now exists. Now the least pleasing feature of this splendid undertaking to which we look to you as our leader is the fact that it is not the rich man's university, but that, owing to the bounty of the province, no young man need be excluded from entering into and receiving the benefit of the splendid opportunities that are here presented."

The Power Issue.
The power question is lengthily dealt with and Hon. Adam Beck and his commissioners congratulated. Then Mr. Blake says:

"I do not think it would be too strong language to say that you have been unfairly and wickedly pursued by a band of men whose one object was to compel you to abandon what was in the interests of the province in order to fill their pockets. A band of men induced a newspaper to make daily attacks upon you in order to endeavor to force you to be false to the province in order to enrich themselves. But let us calmly look at the position in which you were placed:

"(a) When you took office you found that your government was bound by this clause:

"It being agreed that the commissioners will not themselves engage in making use of the water to generate electric or pneumatic power except for the purposes of the park."

"Therefore, the power the government nor the commission had the right which it was said you should have utilized. You were debarred from this. It was on this explicit undertaking that the three companies entered into the agreements which they had made and undertaken to pay, and have paid, the rent therefor. If any bargain had been attempted to be made by the commission or the government with any of the companies, the court, by injunction, at the request of either of the other companies, would

build the transmission lines to answer the demands not merely to Toronto, but to other portions of the province; (b) to build an electric railway along the transmission line to repay the outlay on the land you would have been forced to acquire; (c) to manage the whole of this varied concern with its many ramifications and complications, which would soon be called by those now insisting that you should have pursued this course as the great Whitney power folly.

"How ludicrous the remarks must appear that were made as to some knowledge that you alone possessed about the Electric Development Company desiring to arrange for sale. It would be difficult to name a financial man in the city who did not know that this company was prepared to deal with any person, government, or corporation, who would enter into a bargain with it. At a later date Mayor St. Aubin's position was well known. There was no secret in the matter. The purchase was no snap. The prospect would not have been purchased except by those already interested in the undertaking, and who to save an investment already made and to feed another undertaking in which they were interested, thought fit to close an offer which no other person could, would, or should, have taken up."

C. N. R. Guarantee Proper.
Mr. Blake is glad that as to the pulpwood limits, from the time that you were able to wrest back for the benefit of the province a portion of its estate which had been diverted to the workers of industry that had sought to rob the province.

"It also seems to me that you were perfectly justified in not preventing the legislature from voting to the Canadian Northern Railway Company a guarantee which turned a doubtful security into a good one for the province and at the same time insured the completion of the work needed by the public. The position of the province was thereby bettered and the chance of loss reduced to a minimum.

have restrained such act. There was, therefore, to begin with, this absolute prohibition against your doing that which these gentlemen averred, you should have done, and find fault with you for not doing.

"(b) The Electric Development Company was not, and took good care that it should not be, in default under their contract, and there was therefore, no power or right to forfeit. Whatever else might happen to the company, the bondholders, directors, and shareholders would be sure to prevent such default, as, thereupon, all the property of the company would be lost. This was the last thing which they would permit to happen and took good care that it did not occur."

Contract Was Best.
"(c) But, apart from the above reasons (a and b), on the 12th of August, 1907, the hydro-electric power commission, after vainly endeavoring to procure an agreement with the Electric Development Company, entered into a contract for the supply of all the power it needed up to 100,000 h.p., the terms of which contract absolutely precluded the commission from purchasing out the Electric Development Company. The hydro-electric commission had then a valuable and binding contract for the supply of power on better terms than they could then have obtained had they been free, and had they the power to buy out water rights to the Falls.

"(d) It would have been dishonorable on the part of the commission or the government even to have sought to break the binding contract entered into in good faith and which formed the basis for carrying out the mandate of the people and afforded on most advantageous terms the needed supply of power.

"(e) For these reasons it was absolutely impossible for the commission or the government to have expropriated, purchased, or procured by forfeiture or otherwise, the property of the Electric Development Company. There was no right or power to enable them to do so. But, even if that were not the case, it would have been an act of folly and of treachery to have been led into the abandonment of a valid and binding contract, entered into in good faith, and which gave, after negotiations which had lasted for a year, a supply of power for forty years on terms that enabled the commission and the government to comply with the undertaking given to the people, and which is satisfactory to the municipalities, that are gladly accepting the boon thus given to them;

"(f) What a case your enemies would have made against you if you had been foolish enough to seek to abandon this first-class business bargain and replace it with a white elephant, which would have (1) occasioned an enormous outlay of capital, amounting, probably, to twenty millions of dollars; (2) given you power beyond the needs of the province and compelled you to seek to peddle the balance in the United States; (3) compelled you to rearrange the works at the Falls at a large expenditure; (4) to re-

"It is rumored on excellent authority that Premier Murray will resign to contest North Cape Breton and Victoria in the Liberal contest, and will enter the Dominion cabinet as either minister of marine or minister of militia. Can this little inefficient band of infants now claim to be able to occupy the position of ministers of a government that are properly to represent this province?' The country is not prepared to hand over its government to persons who are proclaimed as so absolutely fraudulent.

Make Majority a Big One.
"No one doubts that your government will be returned to power," writes Mr. Blake, in conclusion. "This is not enough. Each supporter should determine that you are to go back with such a majority as will show convincingly that the people of this province want to be governed by honest, progressive and able men, and, having found these qualities in you and your ministers, are determined to testify to their perfect satisfaction by no meagre vote, but by an overwhelming majority to give the government the testimonial in its favor which it deserves.

This above all—to think one self the true!

And it must follow, as the night the day.

That must not then be false to any man: Farewell; my blessing season this in thee!
