



MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

METHODIST CHURCH IN NAPANEE,

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Organization of Conference, May 25th, A.D. 1881.

THE EIGHTH SESSION of the Montreal Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada was opened in the Methodist Church in Napanee, Province of Ontario, on Wednesday, the 25th day of May, 1881, at 10 a.m., the President, the Rev. William Hansford, being in the chair.

The President announced the 753rd hymn, after which the Rev. T. G. Williams, Secretary, read the 10th chapter of Luke, and the Revs. G. H. Davis and L. N. Beaudry led in prayer.

The Secretary called the Conference Roll, and ninety-four responded to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election by ballot of a President, whereupon the Rev. Henry F. Bland was chosen.

The President briefly addressed the Conference, and directed them to proceed to the election of a Secretary.

The ballot resulted in the election of the Rev. J. Tall-Man Pitcher.

The Secretary nominated the Revs. M. L. Pearson and James Allen, M.A., Assistant Secretaries; and the Rev. William Jackson as Journal Secretary.

These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

1.—John Thompson.

Bro. John Thompson was born in Lachute. Feeling himself called to preach the Gospel, he presented himself to the Perth District Meeting, May 1879, was examined as a candidate for the ministry, preached a trial sermon, and was recommended to the Conference to be received on trial. His health at the time of his reception was not good. He had strong hopes that it would improve, and that he might be spared to labour many years in the Master's vineyard, but He who seeth, not as man seeth, willed otherwise.

Our brother died at Lachute, September 29th, 1880, full of resignation and triumph. Bro. Thompson gave evidence of deep conscientiousness, love for souls, and for the Church of his choice. He desired to be a useful man. He had fought a good fight, finished his course, and kept the faith.

2.—CHIEF JOSEPH ONESAKENRAT.

Joseph Onesakenrat [the Swan] was born near the Village of Oka, in 1845. His early manifestation of an intelligent and active mind attracted the attention of the priests of that place, who, in order to prepare him for their service, gave him a superior education. After a course of training in their college at Montreal, they employed him as their secretary at Oka, at which time he was elected by his Indian brethren as their first chief. While holding this two-fold position he became deeply impressed by the cruel and unjust conduct of the Seminary towards the Indians, and soon showed which side had his sympathy in the conflicts which were then being waged. This, of course, led to his severance from the service of the Seminary, nor did he ever enter it again. He was one of those who took a leading part in breaking the connection between the Indians of the Lake lands and the Church of Rome; hoping thus to free himself and his brethren from the presence of the priest in their midst. For this he, with

four others, was thrown into prison; the immediate consequence of which was a complete separation between the great majority of the band and the Church of the Pope. Then it was, (in 1868,) that our Mission was commenced at Oka, and when Joseph, and the greater portion of his people, joined our Church. For several years he acted as our interpreter, to which he soon added the services of a local preacher. In 1876, he was received as a candidate for our ministry, and, at the last Conference, he was received into full connexion and ordained. Three years of his ministry he spent in the Caughnawaga Mission, which, with that village, embraced St. Regis and the Cornwall Island. He was fluent and forcible in his own language, and, even in that of the English, which he was learning to read and write, he could deliver himself with considerable readiness and effect.

His great work was the translation of the Gospels into the Iroquois language. This he commenced several years ago while in prison, whither he had been thrust by the agents of the Seminary, whose power is so great in the Province of Quebec. While engaged in this work, as he since has said, he never was happier in his life. He then translated two of the Gospels, only; but since then he translated the other two, the whole of which have been published by the Bible Society, and are being distributed among the Indians of the Iroquois tribe. A number of the Moody and Sankey hymns were also translated by our brother, and are being printed for the use of these Indians.

Joseph's character was marked by strength and decision. To a more than ordinary power of intellect was added great courage, persistency, and physical energy; fearful proofs of which would more than once have been given the ruthless persecutors of himself and people, but for the restraining influence of the grace of God. This was especially noticeable when, with others, he was obliged to stand by and witness the destruction of their little church by the Seminary's people. At one moment he seemed resolved to fall on the miscreants in their unlawful deed, but the missionary's voice was, through grace, effective in holding him

back, and, therefore, the despoilers were permitted to complete their work. The death of our brother was sudden; he was taken away in the midst of his years and usefulness, on the 9th of February last. But it was the Lord who did it, and who shall say unto him,—"What doest Thou?"

3.—THOMAS OGDEN.

The Rev. Thomas Ogden was a native of England. He was converted to God in early life, and was for some time a very zealous local preacher. His zeal for God and the salvation of souls attracted the attention of a gentleman who employed him, for some years in Hanley, as a town missionary. From there he went to Ireland as a missionary to the Methodist New Connexion Church.

In 1842 he came to Canada, and laboured for twenty years in the active work of the ministry. Mr. Ogden was very earnest in his work, and many were brought to God through his instrumentality. His last illness was painful and protracted. He died of cancer, but he bore all with Christian patience, till death released him from his sufferings, and we trust he entered into rest. He died at Frankville, on the 25th of July, 1880, in the eighty-first year of his age, and thirty-ninth of his ministry in Canada.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee is grateful to be able to report considerable progress in this important department of our work. Though the number of preaching places reported is less than last year, there is an increase of 18 in the number of schools. It is also gratifying to learn that there have been 649 conversions during the year, and increased number meeting in class.

The reports from the different Districts show a growing liberality in supplying the schools with books and papers and other requisites for their efficient working. This is seen in the fact that there was collected for Sunday-school purposes \$6540—an increase of \$87. There is also an increase in the amount collected by the children for Missions.

Your Committee would earnestly urge the duty of a much more general circulation of our own Sunday-school publications, as being best adapted to meet the wants of our Canadian youth. We are satisfied that a greater attention to the study of our Catechisms, would effect much good in the more thorough training of the children in our distinctive doctrines, and, therefore, earnestly recommend their more general use.

To secure correctness in our Sabbath-school reports, your Committee recommend the issuing of new schedules, with a column for each of our Sunday-school publications, and would suggest that the Missionary money reported, should include all collected by the children of our congregations, though, from distance or other causes, not immediately connected with any school. Your Committee would further urge on all our ministers and members of the Church, the importance of organizing a Sabbath-school when at all possible, at each preaching appointment, and making it, to the fullest extent, what Sabbath-schools are designed to be—the nursery of the Church.

Your Committee recommends that the Rev. Wm. Hall, M.A., be re-appointed Treasurer of the General S. S. Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Committee reported as follows, which report was adopted by the Conference :—

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

Huntingdon.—The Trustees of the Methodist Church, Huntingdon, ask permission to sell the old Church and apply proceeds towards liquidating the debt on the new Church. Your Committe recommend that the request be granted.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

The Trustees of Dundula Church ask permission of the Conference to sell the old Church and lot, proceeds to be applied in the building of the new Church now in course of erection. Your Committee recommend that the request be granted.

PERTH DISTRICT.

LOMBARDY Mission.—The Trustees of the Parsonage request permission to sell said Parsonage to the mortgagee in liquidation of his claims against it. Your Committee recommend that this request be granted.

STANSTEAD DISTRICT.

Having patiently considered the perplexing circumstances of the Dixville Church, this District Meeting asks the Conference to grant the Trustees permission to sell the said Church. Proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt. Your Committee recommend that the request be granted.

WATERLOO DISTRICT.

Knowlton.—The Trustees of Brill's congregation request the Conference to consent to the sale of one-half an acre of the said Church lot. Proceeds to be applied to purchase a more suitable site on which to build a Church. Your Committee recommend that this request be granted.

DUNHAM CIRCUIT.—The Trustees of the Parsonage request the Conference to consent to the sale of the said Parsonage. Proceeds to be applied to purchase a Parsonage in a more suitable location.

Cowansville.—The Trustees of the Parsonage request the Conference to consent to the sale of said Parsonage. Proceeds to be applied to liquidate the debt on said Parsonage, and balance to be applied to purchase a new site. Your Committee deem it inexpedient to recommend that their request be granted.

St. Armand Circuit.—The Trustees of Philipsburg Church request the Conference to consent to the sale of a narrow strip of land fifteen frontage, gore shape, being two feet at rear of the said Church lot. Proceeds to be applied for the building of a shed in connection with the said Church. Your Committee recommend that this request be granted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee gratefully report an increase of 375 in the membership of the Church, and also that the Connexional Funds are in advance of last year, especially the Missionary Fund. The reports brought in from the several districts show that an average of about one-half of the members of the Church continue to use the class-meeting as a means of grace, and that over 400 children, under the age of 12 years, are in Connexion with the Church. The testimony given by brethren representing the chief centres of information shows, that while there is no marked decline in the piety and spirituality of the people, that yet there is a felt want of more spiritual power and true devotion to God and His work, in order to secure the salvation of a greater number of souls. The influence of the evil customs of the day is felt to be a powerful hindrance to the work of God amongst us. tendance upon the theatre, dancing parties, circuses, and all such gatherings, is believed to be most demoralizing to the Church and the piety of the people; and your Committee earnestly request this Conference to pass a resolution, expressing its strong disapproval of such practices on the part of Church members, and that each superintendent, or his colleague be directed to read the same from the pulpit to the congregation under his care. We also recommend, that the members of this Conference will use the utmost caution in providing entertainment at socials, tea-meetings, and all such meetings. It is thought by not a few, that in such meetings more regard is often paid to the mere tastes and desires of the ungodly, than to the character of the Church and the benefit of the people.

It is also suggested that greater fidelity to the class-meeting is required at this time, if we would increase our spirituality. Something more should be done to make this means of grace more attractive to its members. Such as the general use of the Bible in class and the introduction of religious testimony into the weekly prayer-meeting. If religious

testimony were more common outside the class-room, there would, doubtless, be a stronger desire to enjoy this blessed privilege in the class. It is further suggested that greater attention should be given to the conversion, religious life, and moral training of children. Let us never forget that the children are chiefly what their parents and the Church make them. If we save the children we shall soon save the world. A child saved will be double gain. It is not only a soul saved from death, but a life employed in the service of God.

Your Committee would call attention to a standing resolution in the minutes of Conference respecting Systematic Beneficence, viz., "This Conference earnestly recommends each of its ministers to bring the subject of Systematic Beneficence before his congregation, at least once a year." The spirit of worldliness, which, at this time, threatens the very life of the Church, cannot be counteracted without due regard to this part of man's duty. The great antidote against loving the world is to be found in an honest and liberal recognition of the gifts of Providence.

Your Committee feel deeply moved while considering the nature and magnitude of the work committed to our care as a branch of the Christian Church. We are entrusted with interests which cannot be measured by time or comprehended by the human intellect. We must strenuously vindicate the honour of God, faithfully proclaim salvation through Jesus to a lost world, and vigorously grapple with the principles of evil and the powers of darkness, if we would stand acquitted and approved before God and the holy angels.

True, our enemies are many and powerful, and in our own strength we cannot hope to escape defeat. But there are more with us than with them. The Lord is on our side. "Therefore be of good courage and let us behave ourselves valiantly for our people, and for the cities of our God, and let the Lord do that which is good in his sight."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee, regarding intemperance as one of the most fruitful causes of vice, poverty, and crime, rejoice that increased efforts are being made to free our beloved Dominion from the terrible calamities resulting from the use of intoxi-We are thankful that, during the past year, attempts made in Ontario to lesson the beneficial effect of the Scott Act, have been defeated. While in the Province of Quebec, the Legislature have been petitioned to amend the license law, so as to confer upon the people the power to decrease the sale of health, wealth, life, and soul-destroying liquors; we respectfully recommend that the custom of our ministers preaching upon this most important subject, in the month of December, be not only continued, but that it be dwelt upon more frequently in our pulpits. Your Committee earnestly hope that, in all our Sunday-schools, steps will be taken to induce the scholars to become pledged total abstainers, and thus erect a barrier between the unpolluted lip and the intoxicating cup, and save the rising race from the frightful curse of intemperance.

We feel assured that this Conference reiterates its oft-expressed judgment, in reference to the manufacture, sale, and use of intoxicating drinks, and the law, relating thereto, and that the principle of total abstinence from all intoxicants is again avowed and earnestly recommended. We most respectfully urge all our preachers and people to assist in every lawful way the adoption of the Temperance Act of 1878, the operation of which will, we believe, lead to the complete suppression of the liquor traffic by appropriate legislation, which shall also provide for the enforcement of prohibition by the Government, not leaving that to the voluntary action of the people, or any of the existing organizations.

In presenting their Annual Report, your Trustees desire to express their gratitude to God for the measure of liberality which has been bestowed upon the Institution during the past year in payment of subscriptions towards liquidating the debt.

You will be glad to learn that the health and deportment of the students have been good, that the teachers have been faithful and efficient, and that the scholastic and moral interests of the College have been well maintained.

In reference to the boarding department it can be said that general satisfaction has been given. The diet has been wholesome, the rooms comfortable, and the restraints not

annoying but judicious.

The report of the Secretary-Treasurer shows that though he has devoted considerable time to the Endowment Movement, he has collected for the Debt Fund since June 14, 1880, the sum of \$8535.85, and has obtained enough new subscriptions to reach a total of \$42252.82 for the debt.

The preceding statements show:—

(1) That the "Debt Fund" has a margin of \$4746 88 to provide for interest, cost of collection, and shrinkage on the subscription list.

(2) That the diminution of Government Aid and annual deficit during the past three years have resulted in the formation of additional indebtedness to the amount of nearly \$3000 for the payment of which no provision has been made.

Of this indebtedness, over \$1700 has been incurred during the past year. While your Trustees deeply regret the largeness of this deficit, yet they are encouraged by the consideration that certain changes have been determined upon which they believe will effect a saving next year of about \$800.

On the matter of Endowment your Trustees beg leave to submit the following:—

Whereas the Montreal Conference at its Session, June, 1880, was pleased to approve of the principle of the Endowment of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, as recorded in the Minutes of Conference, page 59.

Whereas, a generous friend, whose name we are not at liberty to give has without solicitation offered for himself and family a contribution of \$6500 upon condition of subscriptions to the Endowment Fund to the amount of \$25000 (including his own subscription) be obtained on or before June 1st, 1882.

Whereas, the same generous friend, has, of his own accord, subsequently offered a further subscription of \$2000 upon condition of \$25000 being subscribed (both his own subscriptions being included) on or before January 1st, 1882.

Whereas, in consequence of the munificent offer above mentioned generous subscriptions have been made, so that there is now subscribed nearly \$15000 towards an Endowment for the Stanstead Wesleyan College upon the basis of the terms specified on page 59 of the Minutes of Conference for last year.

Whereas, a large part of the aforesaid subscription will become invalid unless the balance shall be subscribed before January 1st, 1882.

Your Trustee Board most respectfully submits to the Conference the consideration of the question of endowment and begs to be instructed as to what course should be pursued.

We are sure that you most heartily sympathize with us in our efforts to secure a revenue for the Institution. Your

Trustees entertain a hope that the College, will some day, be a help and not a burden to the Church. It is desirable since the other Protestant denominations have their endowed Institutions in the Province of Quebec, that we endeavour to give financial strength to our Educational undertakings that we may attain a higher educational status and may retain our influence upon the young people of our Congregations and thus do our part in shaping and directing the intellectual activities of the country.

We most sincerely thank you for your patient attention and your bountiful liberality. But, above all, we thank the Great Head of the Church that He so graciously guided and sustained us in this work, and we trust that by the Divine blessing upon your wise counsels the balance of about \$10,000 which is now required to make up the endowment of

\$25000 may be provided.

We ask your prayers and trust that the Conference may be so guided as to promote in the highest degree the Educational and moral interests of the Province of Quebec.

Special Resolutions.

The venerable Dr. Ryerson was introduced to the Conference as desiring to address the brethren for promotion of the complete and permanent union of the Methodist Church.

After Dr. Ryerson had explained the reasons and motives of his visit he submitted the following resolutions for the consideration of the Conference, viz.:—

PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTION ON THE UNITY OF METHODISM, BY THE REV. E. RYERSON, LL.D.

Whereas,— The oneness of Methodism in all the world has been declared from the last days of Mr. Wesley, and was expressly avowed by the unanimous votes of both the British and American Conferences in 1820. In Mr. Wesley's last letter to the preachers in America, addressed to the Rev. Ezekiel Cooper, twenty-nine days before his translation he gave this admonition: "Lose no opportunity of declaring to all men, that the Methodists are one people in all the world, and that it is their full determination to remain so,"

"Though mountains rise and oceans roll
To sever us in vain."

In 1820, the American General Conference avowed the same principle in the words of Mr. Wesley; and the English Conference responded in the words of the following Resolution, signed, "Jabez Bunting, President," and "George Marsden, Secretary," "The Conference embraces this opportunity of recognizing that great principle—which, it is hoped, will be permanently maintained,—that the Wesleyan Methodists are one Body in every part of the world;" and,

Whereas,—Differences occurred between the English and Canadian Conferences which suspended their brotherly unity and co-operation from 1837 to 1847, on account of questions which then agitated Upper Canada, in regard to a State Church Establishment,—the appropriation of moneys

by the Crown out of a Canadian Revenue for religious purposes, and the British Constitutional and equal civil rights to all classes of the inhabitants of Upper Canada; and,

Whereas,—These questions, which long agitated Upper Canada, and led to differences between the English and Canadian Conferences, never did affect the essential doctrines or polity of Methodism, and were so settled by the Canadian Legislature, with the approval of the Imperial Government, that peace and contentment respecting them have prevailed among all classes of Canadian inhabitants for more than a quarter of a century, and that great progress, civil, educational, and religious, has marked their history; and, during that period, there have been perfect unity and co-operation between the English and Canadian Conferences;

Therefore,—In view of these circumstances and facts, it is not only becoming, but eminently desirable that the Resolutions and Addresses adopted by the English and Canadian Conferences between the years 1837 and 1847, which contain any thing unfriendly in regard, either to the English and Canadian Conferences, or any members thereof, be cancelled, and they are hereby cancelled, and they are to be regarded as never having been written or adopted;—

Therefore,—Also the English and Canadian Conferences, adhering to the advice of Mr. Wesley in his last letter to the American preachers; reiterate the resolutions unanimously adopted by the English Conference, and the General Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church in America; "that the Methodists are one people in all the world, and that it is their full determination to continue so."

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Elliott, seconded by the Rev. Wm. Scott, and

Resolved,—That this Conference having heard, with the highest gratification, the pacific proposition of the venerable Dr. Ryerson, and giving thanks to God that he has been moved by the Spirit to this end, and having heard the resolutions relating to the publication of historic facts, do hereby adopt the resolutions, and we shall be gratified to learn that

similar resolutions have been adopted by the approaching Western Conferences.

Moved by the Rev. D. V. Lucas, M.A., seconded by the Rev. Wm. Hansford, and unanimously

Resolved,—That the members of this Conference embrace the opportunity, which their annual gathering affords them, of expressing their great sorrow for the loss sustained by the widely-extended Methodist Church, and by the more widely-extended Christian world, in the death of the Rev. W. Morley Punshon, LL.D.

They desire, hereby, to express their gratitude to the great Head of the Church that it was their privilege, for several years, to witness the bright example of Dr. Punshon's devotion to the highest of all service—the service of God; to share in the benefits of his wise counsels, and to feel the affectionate and forcible eloquence of his public ministrations.

They desire, also, to record their high appreciation of the untiring zeal which he always manifested for the welfare and growth of the Methodist Church of Canada, not only throughout the vast territory which God has so largely committed to her spiritual oversight, but also to the extension of her missions to foreign lands, and they devoutly pray that upon their minds and hearts may be indelibly written those lessons which his life and death are calculated to convey, for in his noble life it was seen that great intellectual gifts and towering genius may be led by the silken cords of meekness and humility, and in his triumphant death Christians are again assured that "Jesus is a living reality."

The Conference, deeply sympathizing with the family deprived, by his decease, of a loving husband and kind father, beg to tender their condolence, humbly praying that grace, which can comfort and sustain, may be, by our gracious Lord, abundantly bestowed.

Upon request of the Quarterly Board of the Lennoxville Mission, permission was granted to solicit subscriptions, in behalf of their church debt, throughout the Montreal Conference.

Ministers Changing Circuits.

Resolved,—That this Conference requires that every minister changing Circuits be responsible for the pulpit work on the Circuit which he is leaving until after the second Sabbath after the close of the Conference.

Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Financial Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference; it was

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairman to the above resolution.

(3) That this Conference direct the Financial Secretaries to settle with the Treasurers of the several Funds on the basis of the Returns in the District Financial Schedule, and the Treasurer of each fund to affix his signature underneath the total sum, in attestation of its agreement with his account; and that the Statistic Committee compile the returns for the printed minutes from these attested Schedules only.

Treasurer and Financial Secretaries

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the

receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock p.m., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Probationers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Probationers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend college, their reception into full Connextion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

The Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make inquiries into the case of widows residing within their

respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Systematic Beneficence.

Resolved,—That this Conference earnestly recommends each of its Ministers to bring the subject of Systematic Beneficence before the Congregation under his charge at least once a year.

Youth of the Church.

Resolved,—That whereas provision is made in the Discipline for the spiritual culture and welfare of the children of our Congregations; and, whereas, notwithstanding, in too many instances they are permitted to wander away from the fold to which they legitimately belong, and are either lost in the world or become absorbed in other churches, the claims of the children, as provided for in the Discipline, should be wisely and conscientiously responded to.

French Missions.

Resolved,—That our French Missionaries be required, before taking up or continuing any English work, to obtain the expressed sanction of their own Chairman and the English Superintendent within the bounds of whose Circuit or Mission the proposed work is situated, as well as that of the Chairman of the English District.

Registration in the Province of Quebec.

Resolved,—That the attention of ministers stationed in the Province of Quebec, be respectfully drawn to the observance of all legal requirements, in the Registration of Births, Marriages, and Burials, as shown in the Report of Prof. Shaw, M.A., and J. J. McLaren, Esq., Q.C., of Montreal. The said report being kept for sale at the Methodist Book-room, in Toronto and Montreal.

Model Deed.

Resolved,—That the attention of Superintendents and Trustees be respectfully drawn to the Report of the Committee on the Model Deed, as found in the Minutes of this Conference, for the year 1874, and that we recommend that Church Property, in the Province of Quebec, be brought under the tenure of the Model Deed for uniformity and correctness of administration of trusts.

The meeting was closed at 10 o'clock, the President pronouncing the Benediction.

SESSION FOR THE RECEPTION OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

The Session of the Conference for the reception into full Connexion with the Conference of the Candidates for the Ministry who had completed their probation and passed through the prescribed Course of Study was held in the Methodist Church, Napanee, on Friday evening, May 27th, 1881, beginning at 7.30.

COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary.—English Branches: English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History (Schmitz'), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Eiblical History: New Testament History (Smith's). Theology: Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers, shall not be lower than fifty per cent., of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Pt. i.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chaps. i. v.)

Second Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation, Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii. Chaps. i. to xvii.)

Third Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Roman's); Rhetoric (Whately's); Church History

(Fisher's History of the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., Chap. xviii. to the end); Pearson on the Creed.

Fourth Year.—Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts iii. and iv.) Apologetics (Hopkins' Evidence of Christianity; Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Logic (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS.

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study:

Preliminary.—Theology (Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Part i.); Theology (Fletcher's Checks i. to v.)

Second Year.—Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament); Theology (Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.—Exegesis (Gospel of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chaps. i. to xvii. inclusive, and Parts iii. and iv.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis (Epistles to the Romans in Greek; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chap. xviii. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study:

First Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetoric and the English Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; The Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

First Year.—Jacoby's Compends of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justifica-

tion; Kurtz' Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Saucer's Church History; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic; Luthard's Apologetics; Harless' Christian Ethics; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE FRENCH WORK.

All Candidates before being recommended to be received on trial for the French work, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Preliminary — French Grammar and Composition; Arithmetic and Geography; Ancient and Modern History (Lenormant); Methodist Catechism, No. ii.; Sermon on the Mount (Wesley).

After admission on trial they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year; and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be

sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and, further, no certificate shall be issued unless the Candidate has reached the passing point of thirty-five per cent. in each subject, and an average of fifty per cent. in all subjects, except in cases where the papers have failed to come to hand.

STANDING REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the

District to which they belong.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

MINISTERS OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER THEIR CARE.

"Grace be to you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers: remembering without ceasing your work of faith and labour of love, and patience of hope, in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father; knowing, brethren beloved, your election of God.

"For our gospel came not unto you, in word only; but also in power and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance, as ye know what manner of men we were among you for your sakes."

We feel constrained as a primary obligation, to give thanks to the God of all mercies and comfort for His providential goodness, and for the riches of His grace vouchsafed to you and to us during the past year.

With a full recognition of the hand of God in all the affairs of earthly life, you will rejoice with us in the measure of prosperity which has been restored to commercial circles. Still more abundantly would we thank and praise the God of peace, and the Saviour of men for tranquillity in all our borders; and for the power of the eternal Spirit which has accompanied all the labours of the church.

The returns from the circuits and missions show a net

increase during the past year of 375 members.

The profound solicitude which we cherish for your highest well-being prompts us to affectionately speak to you words of comfort, and warning, and exhortation: "Ye are in our hearts to die and live with you." We "watch for your souls as they that must give account, that we may do it with joy and not with grief, for that is unprofitable for you." "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ye in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at His coming? For ye are our glory and joy."

It is with a deep sense of our obligation to you that we most earnestly urge upon your attention the paramount importance of seeking and cultivating a rich experience in

divine things.

Methodism was raised up in the providence of God to bear witness to the power of spiritual truth. We verily believe that God intended this branch of His Church to be

the depository and defence of evangelical piety.

The formalism of frigid orthodoxy, or of loud and empty profession, is as much to be deprecated as the formalism of ritualistic observances. Should the time ever come when holiness shall cease to be the central idea in our theology, and the distinguishing characteristic of our ministry and membership then "Ichabod" will be written on the face of our denomination. "Now we live, if ye stand fast in the Lord."

While you walk in the enjoyment of God's favour, and maintain the virtues of the inward Christian life, you will be prepared to observe exemplary circumspection of conduct. Let your whole deportment be the exact counterpart and expression of a pure heart. Be patterns in the several relations of human society, which you may be called to sustain.

Faithfully attend to all the affairs of domestic piety, and in all your intercourse with others; in things minute and more important, guard the claims of unimpeachable integrity. "Furthermore, then, we beseech you, brethern,

and exhort you by the Lord Jesus, that as ye have received of us how ye ought to walk and to please God, so ye would abound more and more." Nor would we neglect to "stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance" in regard to the indispensable means of grace, through which you may attain to the highest moral excellence. Make the word of God your daily companion; assiduously study its sacred pages.

The knowledge of the Holy Scriptures is absolutely essential to ripe religious experience, and a mature Christian character. Select portions of them for your daily Prize the exposition and application of them, whether from the pulpit, or in the course of more private instruction. Seize opportunities of conversing upon them in seasons of friendly intercourse. "I have more understanding" says the Psalmist, "than all my teachers; for thy testimonies are my meditation. I understand more than the ancients, because I keep Thy precepts." Mix faith with all you read and hear, and promptly reduce to practice every truth you learn. Frequently compare your heart and life with the divine standard. The Christian life has three aspects, viz., private, social, and public.

For the cultivation and development of each of these suitable means of grace are furnished. Hold communica

with God at the mercy seat in the closet.

Let no cloud linger between Christ and your soul. fervent and faithful in family worship.

Never suffer the holy fire to become extinguished on the domestic altar.

Keep up constant fellowship with your brethren in the Lord at prayer meetings and class meetings.

Neglect of these means of grace excludes you from that knowledge of the spiritual state and circumstances of your fellow Christians which is indispensable to true sympathy and love. Spiritual declension invariably follows the wilful neglect of these privileges.

Wait upon the Lord punctually and reverently in the public services of His house. There all the best feelings

of the heart are refined and enlarged. While you are mainly intent upon offering "spiritual sacrifices," do not overlook, or withold appropriate bodily service.

"Stand up and bless the glorious name of the Lord your God," when you sing His praises. "Bow down and kneel before the Lord your Maker," in solemn prayer; and when it is ended let all the people say, "Amen."

By thus taking your proper part in the prescribed order of divine worship, you not only strengthen the hands of the minister, but also greatly benefit your fellow-worshippers, and reap the full advantage of the public ordinances. While you rejoice in the conscious possession of the power of godliness, do not neglect the form.

Seek to understand all that is implied in Baptism and the Lord's Supper; and never treat with indifference these divinely-instituted sacraments. We would be recreant to duty if we did not earnestly and affectionately warn you against the evil influences so prevalent in society, which war against the prosperity of your souls. We kindly admonish you especially the younger members of the Church, to beware of the insidious intrusion of pernicious literature. Select books as you would companions; reject all of questionable character.

We would call your prayerful attention to the encroachments of worldliness amongst us, which are seen in the disposition to conform to the world in its enjoyments and amusements. We do not mean that the Church should frown upon pleasant and suitable recreation, but we feel the time has come to speak unmistakably upon such questionable pleasures as the modern dance. The evils arising from dancing parties are so great and apparent that we feel it imperitive upon us to urge you as followers of Christ to avoid a thing the tendencies of which are only evil and that continually. This is true also in the matter of theatre-going. We have no faith that these things can be so reconstructed as to make them suitable for Christian people, and would lead you rather to seek enjoyments, the character of which is beyond all question. We feel that in

many instances the young people of our Church have been greatly injured and retarded in their Christian life by the love of such amusements. Many a life that gave fair promise of usefulness has been blighted and destroyed by their baneful influence.

Sacredly observe the sanctity of the Sabbath. See that your sons, and your daughters, your man-servants, and your maid-servants, and the stranger within your gates, "remember" to keep the day holy. Endeavour to close your business affairs, and to complete your domestic arrangements in such time that Saturday evening may be a

season of hallowed preparation.

When violations of the Sabbath prevail the blessings of God cannot rest, and where this is withheld there is no security for personal, domestic, or national prosperity. Carefully guard against a suspicious and censorious spirit. Avoid whisperers, who under the guise of friendship, and perhaps of great candour, scatter insinuations to the disadvantage of others, and secretly diffuse a poison which will not soon be removed. Never entertain the spirit of retaliation. Yield not to enmity. Be prompt and glad to make allowance for the infirmities of others, and to maintain the "charity," which "shall cover the multitude of sins."

Suffer us further to admonish you that you exert yourselves affectionately and zealously for the salvation of souls. In all your labours honour the Holy Spirit; depend upon Him for success. Do not expect the Church to prosper, however faithful the ministry, without your co-operation.

The importance of the Sabbath School, as an auxiliary to parental effort, cannot be over-estimated. The schools within the bounds of our Conference are making encouraging progress; and now number 313, with an attendance of 18,385 scholars.

From the beginning, our Church has taken strong and unequivocial ground on the question of Total Abstinence.

No temperance organization has ever been more rigid in exacting total abstinence from its members.

Let no man rob you of this glorying. Ever stand in the front ranks of the great temperance reform.

We commend to your sympathy, confidence, and hearty support all the Connexional Funds of the Church.

The liberality of many in liquidating the debt on the Missionary Society is worthy of the highest praise.

Yet we must remind you that the field is large, the openings are many, and the demand for an increase of labourers is most urgent. "How shall they preach except they be sent?"

Our Educational work gives evidence of a deeper and more intelligent interest on the part of our people. we regard as among the most hopeful signs of the time. The light of the present day is searching and strong, and ignorance, whether in pulpit or pew, no longer finds congenial concealment. The growing intelligence of our young country and the best interests of our Church demand both an educated ministry and an educated people. would not, indeed, have the pulpit become a mere arena for theological or scientific controversy. Neither would we have the spiritual and soul-thrilling experiences of the classroom superseded by mere displays of literary or rhetorical attainment. Nevertheless the fact remains that in pulpit and class-room and in every sphere and department of Church work there is imperative need, not only of renewed hearts and earnest lives, but of enlightened and carefully cultivated minds.

A false science is standing forth, and with proud assumption of profound learning; and accurate knowledge is advancing theories which strike at the very foundations of our faith in God and in his written Word. Not simply, therefore, for wealth and freshness of illustration, but chiefly that he may read accurately, and interpret authoritatively what the hand of God has written upon rock, and tree, and flower, upon the starry heavens and in the depths of the sea, does the preacher need to be familiar with the various branches of scientific knowledge and research. Then, and only then, can the minister of the Gospel be, in

the fullest sense, a guide and teacher when, to a personal acquaintance with those truths which are spiritual, he unites also a knowledge of whatever is best in science, purest in philosophy, and most beautiful in literature and art, and when this knowledge in all its fullness and variety is made subservient to the one great work of preaching the

life-giving word.

So likewise with our people. If, dear brethren, you would promote in the very highest degree your own welfare and the welfare of our Church, if you would have Methodism retain an honourable and an honoured position in the earth and do her full share in the final accomplishment of our Lord's redeeming work, you will yourselves follow diligently in the path of knowledge, and will do your utmost to open up before your children the way to the attainment of a rich and varied education. But remember, we charge you, that while knowledge is power, it is a power for good or evil according as it is itself good or evil. Here, therefore, we would urge it upon you to support, both by your liberality and your patronage, those educational institutions of our own Church in which candidates for our ministry, and your own children as well, may receive an education under the fostering care of religion. Alike for your children's welfare and the welfare of our Church, we hope to see an increased and constantly increasing attendance of students in our various educational ir stitutions.

The Superannuation Fund has the highest claims on your consideration. For years the worthy claimants on the fund have received only about two-thirds of the Disciplinary

allowance.

You will rejoice with us that the Book Room in Toronto, and the branch in Montreal have been much more prosperous during the past year than any previous year in their Let them have your increased patronage.

The Christian Guardian and Magazine are replete with healthy religious literature, and ought to be in every Methodist family. The new Hymn Book is already in use in many of our churches. We commend it to all our

congregations as one of the best Hymnals that has ever been published.

We have to make the mournful record that three of our preachers have departed. We review their life with solemn but not joyless interest.

We rejoice, while we mark the death or decay of our tried and valued coadjutors, that others are raised up who inherit the same views, and breathe the same spirit; and we trust that it will please the great "Shepherd and Bishop of souls," to continue among us a succession of faithful men who shall be "able to teach others also."

Our present Conference has been an eminently happy one. The Lord has been in the midst of us, and His Holy Spirit has come down upon our assemblies. The word has been preached with power; and we have no doubt that our beloved people in Napanee, whose kindness is above all praise, will long remember their first Conference as a season of spiritual refreshing to them and their families. As we depart to our several spheres of duty, we cast ourselves upon Omnipotent grace and upon your affectionate prayers.

"Finally, brethern, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report, if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."
