Had Sold Everything to Seek Fortunes in New World

**DUPED BY AGENTS** 

108 Men and Steamer Will be Held Until Officials Give Decision

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 13.—A party of 102 Italians from the Island of Sicily, rounded up morning by immigration authorities and officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, after they had landed yesterday afternoon from the Italian steamer Dori at Mill Cove, on St. Margaret's Bay were brought to Halifax this morning by train and lodged in the immigration premises at Pier Two, there to remain under guard pending instructions from Ottawa. Shortly before the arrival of the train at the immigation shed, six other Italians who had been picked up on the St. Margaret's Bay road, while en route to the city, were brought to Pier Two by police officers, making a total of 108. When messages reached here, telling of the mysterious "invasion" customs officials, immigration authorities and officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police proceeded to the scene and early this morning had succeeded in recording up the majority of the rounding up the majority of the foreigners, only a few of whom could speak English.

HAD PAID FOR PASSAGE

The story told by the bewildered men, was to the effect that they had paid between 2,000 and 10,000 lire apiece for passage from Marseilles to New York, and that when the steamer cast another anchor in St Margaret's Bay, the captain told them to "dress up cleanly," as they were only 3 miles from Halifax, which they understood was a United States city. One of the Italians told the interpreter that he Italians told the interpreter that he and his comrades had left their homes Sicily to seek their fortunes in the United States. They had, he declared, sold pratically all their belongings to raise sufficient money for their pas-sage and had departed leaving their families "with nothing at all."

Their decision to emigrate to the United States, the spokesman said, was due to the glowing tales of a was the to the glowing tales of a steamship agent who had visited the island of Sicily early in the summer, and painted pictures of the fortunes that were to be had in the land across

ON OCEAN A MONTH.

"Late in July," the man went on, "we boarded motor boats at Sicily and went to Marseilles, where we met the steamer Zette (the Dori)." We sailed on August 1, thinking we were going to New York. We were on the ocean for over a month, and think the cap-tain tried to land us once before as we were near shore about a week ago. Early yesterday morning we again saw land, and the captain told us this was the best place. He said we were about about three miles from Halifax. 
