WILLIAMS SAYS NOT GUILTY TO MURDER

JURY SELECTION OCCUPIES ALL FIRST SESSION

Judge Declines Defence Application for a Postponement CHALLENGE MANY Only Two Out of First Twelve Called Accepted For Jury Service

By Times-Star Special Correspondent. FREDERICTON, Jan. 21.—Harry D. Williams, charged with the murder of his two half-nieces, Cynthia and Neeta Foster, pleaded "not guilty" when the charge was read to him this morning.

His reply to the clerk's question was uttered in such a low tone that it could hardly be heard. His Honor had to ask him to speak louder. His tone was a bit shaky when he replied, "not guilty."

Adjournment Refused. When court opened, F. H. Peters, counsel for the defence, asked for a further adjournment of one day, so that he might interview Rev. Dean Neales and better prepare his case.

At the opening of this morning's session, F. H. Peters who was yesterday assigned to the defence of Williams, made an application to Mr. Justice LeBlanc for a further adjournment of one day on the grounds that one person who had been in constant attendance of the prisoner since his incarceration had been unable to interview him.

Effort Made To Increase Rates On Steamers

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—Not only is it established by information in the hands of federal officials that Charles Schamburg, of New York City, has effected a "corner" in cattle space on the various steamship lines sailing from the ports of Halifax and St. John during the present winter, but it is becoming increasingly evident, according to the same information that the three principal lines handling Canadian cattle—the Dominion, the White Star Dominion and the Canadian Government lines—are making a more or less concerted effort to increase the price for cattle space.

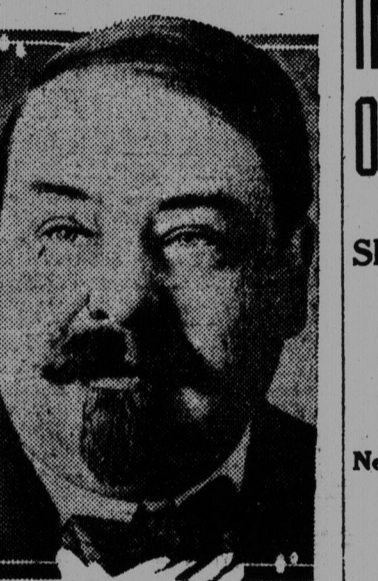
Survivors of Missing Mexican Steamer Mentally Unbalanced as Result of Suffering.

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OUR FRIEND MR. HOEY.

When a large number of the Progressive members of Parliament visited the ports of Halifax and St. John, their number included Mr. R. A. Hoey, M. Our friend Mr. Hoey, who on that occasion expressed no slight sympathy with and understanding of the problems confronting the Maritime Provinces, has just now become somewhat of a steam centre by a speech which he made to the United Farmers of Manitoba, in the course of which he said, in effect, that unless the West could secure through pressure at Ottawa certain definite concessions which he considers vital to western advancement and prosperity, he could see no other course than that the West and the East must separate.

UNCOLLECTED TAXES.

St. John, which every year has altogether too great a percentage of uncollected civic taxes, should be interested in an inquiry now being general in Ontario concerning this troublesome issue. A great many Ontario cities, and not a few in Quebec, have been holding inquests concerning tax arrears, and seeking remedies. In Hamilton, for example, where the accumulation of unpaid taxes is heavy, two "remedies" have been suggested, both of which might help, but neither of which could be described as really promising a cure. One is to add two mills to the general tax rate, and to deduct this extra impost as a reward for prompt payment. The other is to impose a penalty of two per cent. a month to the end of each year, after the date set for the payment of civic taxes.



ASSESSMENT OF COUNTY \$6,400 MORE THAN 1924

Lancaster and Simonds Specials Also Are Higher 2 SESSIONS HELD Resolution Passed Favoring Allowing City to Sell Hydro Current in County

The general assessment, passed yesterday by the municipal council, totalled \$622,347.93, the Lancaster specials amounted to \$22,292.22 and the Simonds specials to \$4,071. The increase in the general assessment, of which the city pays 57 per cent, is \$6,401.22; the increase in the Lancaster specials is \$25,062.32 and in the Simonds specials \$1,451.

A number of bills were ordered sent to the Legislature and the council passed a resolution consenting to allow the Civic Power Commission to contract for the sale of current in the parishes of Lancaster and Simonds. This resolution was strongly opposed by the Lancaster councillors.

The assessment, as passed by the finance committee and published previously, was adopted. Bills for Legislature. Councillor O'Brien, chairman of the Bills and By-laws committee presented three bills, which were ordered sent to the Legislature.

The first was in connection with a fire alarm system and gave the parishes of Lancaster and Simonds power to build such systems and place their poles and wires on public or private property. The provision for going on private property was objected to by Councillor Bullock and Councillor Potts.

The second bill gave the parishes of Lancaster and Simonds the power to guarantee 10 per cent of the cost of extension of the water system of the city in the parish and the power to assess to make up the difference between the amount collected by the city and the 10 per cent guaranteed.

The third bill gave the Lancaster Highway Board power to appoint a chairman of the Board of Assessors, who should have special care of the assessing and collecting for highway purposes and gave that officer power to make his own valuation. It also provided that for highway purposes valuations or special appraisals might be set aside by the assessor. The bill provides for an appeal from the finding of the assessor to the Highway Board and from that body to the County Court Judge.

Hydro Resolution. Councillor Harding moved, seconded by Councillor Potts, the following resolution: "Resolved that the Municipal Council of the County of the City and County of Saint John hereby consents to allow the City of Saint John acting through the Power Commission of the said City of Saint John to contract with any person or corporation within the Parishes of Lancaster and Simonds in the County of the City and County of Saint John for the supply of electrical power or energy to such person or corporation and the distribution of electrical power or energy in said Parishes." This carried.

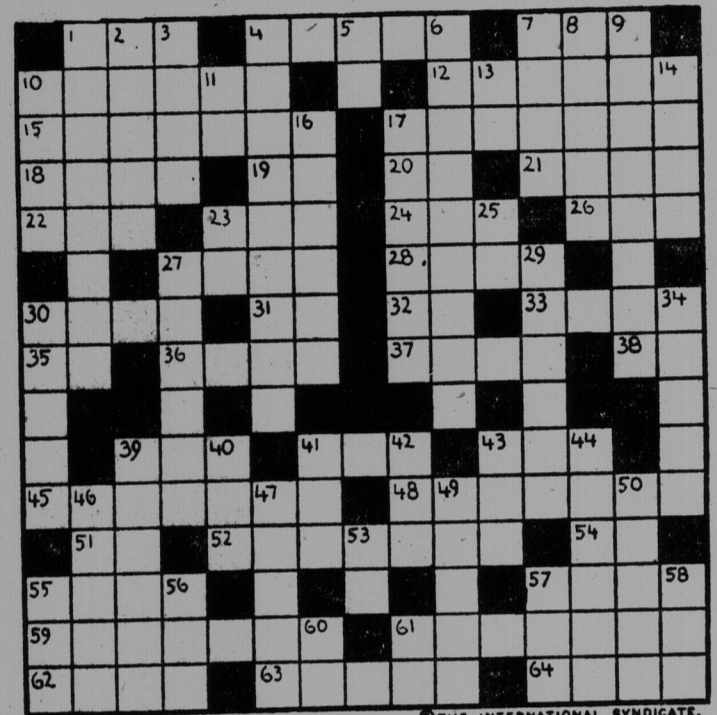

CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

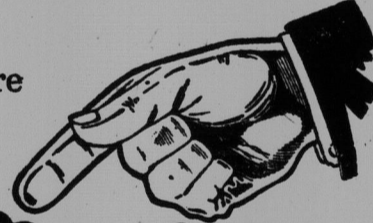

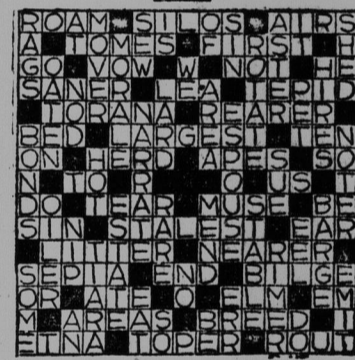
