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

THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Industrial Refuge, and Seventh of the Aged
Woman's Home.

As the time for the Annual Meeting comes round, we feel inclined to wish some other one was Secretary, and therefore, perforce, had the burden laid on her, of writing the Annual Report, for it can easily be understood that after one has written twenty-five of such reports, she feels it somewhat of a task to find anything to say that is fresh and interesting; and yet your Secretary would be the last one to say that the work in these Homes did not afford to the earnest, faithful worker much that not only interests, but much that stimulates to a deep feeling of heartfelt gratitude to the Giver of all good, who has permitted the Managers to see some fruit of their labors and enabled them, through the liberality of the public, to maintain the Industrial Refuge in efficiency for the last 37 years, and also made it possible for them to continue the more recent branch of the work, viz.: the Aged Woman's Home.

This is the first time in the history of the Industrial Refuge that Mrs. Dunlop's name is absent from the report. It will be remembered that she passed away the morning of the last annual meeting. Mrs. John Baldwin, Miss Rankine, Mrs. Thos. Dick, Mrs. McCutcheon, Mrs. Mulholland, Mrs. Hagarty, Mrs. Burns, and now Mrs. Dunlop have all gone from us. These ladies took a very prominent part in the organization of this charity. Mrs. Dunlop continuing, to the very last, not only to take the deepest interest in it, but to collect for it. These

names will always be held in the highest esteem and veneration by every one who has taken part in the successful working out of its provisions for the reclaiming of the erring.

These two institutions (the former for many years known as the Magdalen Asylum and Industrial Refuge), are at present under one roof, and under one Board of Management; but otherwise, completely separate, and carried on under different rules, and under different matrons. The one, the Industrial Refuge, as is well known, for the care and reformation of the *fallen*. The other, to provide a comfortable home for respectable aged and infirm women, who have no near relative who can afford them the protection and comfort they so much require.

The Industrial Refuge does not by any means belie its name, but year after year proves its right to be called *Industrial*, for the inmates, though few in number in comparison with some other charities of a like nature, accomplished work for which \$1,754.73 has been received this last year,—this being nearly \$200 in excess of the previous one—and this result is owing solely to the faithfulness of the workers, several of them in this way shewing their interest in, and willingness to help to provide the necessary funds for the maintenance of the Refuge, and at the same time strengthen in themselves an earnest desire, after a far more healthy moral as well as physical nature. The average number of inmates during the year was 23. The material requisite for the laundry and workroom is not included in the above sum, but forms a separate item in the expenses.

During the year, 39 were admitted, which, with the 16 remaining on the 30th September, 1889, makes a total of 55; 9 of them went to service, 2 joined their husbands again, 1 died, 1 is now in General Hospital, 24 remain, and the rest left of their own accord, leaving before the twelve months' probation was out.

Only one of the whole number sought re-admittance more than once. We except the three weak-minded ones, who,

being one day seized with a desire to visit the district where they had once lived, left suddenly and secretly, but were quickly followed, and after three days were found, and very gladly returned. Mrs. G., who died, had been more or less under our care for several years. She had from time to time suffered severely, though in the intervals able to go out and earn something for herself, but at last returned to what most of these poor women call their "Home," and passed away, not without strong hope that a blessed salvation was hers.

To enter into details, as to other inmates, would only be to repeat what has so often been said in these reports, about their great waywardness, the strong hold a love of stimulants has over them, their oft determination to lead a better life, and their frequent fall, and therefore of the many discouragements incident to such a work as this, we shall not speak. Those who have *not* worked among this class could not realize them, and those who *have*, know the character of them too well. Notwithstanding all this, our hearts rise in much thankfulness to the ever Omnipresent Father, who has, from time to time, permitted us to see much that is satisfactory in our labors, and has at all times cheered and encouraged us to persevere, by bringing to our minds, through the influence of His Holy Spirit, many precious promises given in His Word, to all earnest, faithful workers in this and every other part of His vineyard; and the real happiness He sends into each heart that can, on lying down at night, look back on some fellow-creature helped or comforted by her means. These are among the many hundreds of God-given opportunities offered to each one of us every day, and we are responsible to our Creator for the improvement or misimprovement, the use or abuse of them; and are real tests, as a writer remarks, of character as to the spiritual life in us. It is often said that we are living in a critical period of our world's history. Surely it well becomes His professed followers to be up and doing, and to prayerfully ask, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

We are happy in still retaining the services of Mrs. Spence as matron, assisted by her daughter, and we gladly bear witness to the very faithful manner in which they discharge their duties, very unpleasant as they so frequently are.

This year, like other past ones, we have to thank the many clergymen and laymen who have so willingly given much time and attention to the religious services on the Sabbath as well as at other times, services which have been much valued.

The usual social entertainment during the Christmas holidays, so kindly given by the teachers in the Bible classes, gave very great satisfaction.

Also to Dr. Britton and Dr. Moore, grateful thanks are given for the medical care bestowed on the inmates, free of all charge. And we would remember most kindly Mr. Alcorn; also Mr. James Brown, who for many years has acted as superintendent as well as teacher in the Bible classes. The City Missionary also, has given much time and taken a deep interest in the welfare of all connected with the Refuge, as have many others, both ladies and gentlemen. These and all who so willingly give themselves to work for the Master among the poor and outcast, will most surely have their reward.

We have also again to thank Messrs. Dudley & Burns for printing the Report at greatly reduced prices.

THE AGED WOMAN'S HOME.

The manifold advantages and usefulness of this Home, decidedly increases as the years roll on.

In the Sixth Annual Report we alluded to the great improvement the addition made to the Home had been, "in preventing, as it did, undue crowding, and enabling us to remove anyone seriously ill, from too close proximity to the others." But now there is as much need of additional accommodation as ever. At this moment there are nine applications for admission, but we have no room. Those

interested in the Home will recollect, that when we began this branch of our work, six years ago, we utilized some spare rooms we had in the Industrial Refuge, and by shutting off communication with that part of the building, adding a separate entrance, and altering the unused space, we made a comfortable home for several respectable aged women; but, after a time, finding that they were too crowded, built the addition spoken of. The accommodation even then, was never what we would like a home for the aged to be, as unavoidably there were many stairs, and a deficiency in the number of separate apartments.

Now the case is much worse, as we can find no way of adding to the present building what would be of any permanent advantage. It has therefore been suggested to build a suitable Home on the adjoining ground. We have some available funds already towards such a building, and, with some help from outside, think we could manage it. We hesitate a little to make an appeal for funds, as so many of the other charities are putting up expensive buildings, the money for which must come from the same source. We only, however, contemplate a plain, unpretentious building, as far as the outside is concerned, and only simple, but real, comfort inside, so the expense would not be great, and these aged women would, in their last days, be cared for, both temporarily and spiritually. At present there are 20 inmates (not including the matron and helpers); two others will be admitted this week. Six of these are above 80 years of age, five above 75, eight above 70, the rest over 60. To make these comfortable we must have additional room; and, as we said above, we cannot add to the present building advantageously. We think we could put up a suitable Home if we had about \$6,000 or \$8,000 added to what we already have.

Only one of the inmates died during the year; she had been for many years a highly-valued servant in Mr. Paton's family, and when they removed to Winnipeg, she was placed in the Home, and every attention and kindness continued to be shown her, by that family. A more truly

grateful, unselfish and patient woman could not be found. She suffered very much during the last few months, and latterly a special nurse had to be engaged to attend on her; her age was 81. Another, of the same class of servant, is now peacefully, and without any apparent suffering, ebbing out her last days; she is 86. These cases, and such as these, we are sure, will excite your kindest sympathies, and you will help us to build a new and more suitable Home?

Last November we found it necessary to change the matron, and fortunately succeeded in securing the services of Mrs. Featherstonhaugh with whose supervision the inmates are much satisfied. Her position is no sinecure, as anyone can easily understand, but she has a real interest in those under her care, and consequently is valued.

In May we lost our kind medical attendant, Dr. Clapp, who, it will be remembered, died from the effects of overwork during the la grippe epidemic. At once Dr. Wm. Cavan kindly took charge of the inmates, and to him we are indebted for most faithful medical attendance, and (like that of the doctors who attend to the needs of the inmates in the Refuge), given gratuitously.

For this Home also we offer to those clergymen, laymen, and the students of Wycliffe and Knox Colleges, and also to many ladies, very hearty thanks for their kind services to those aged women, not only on the Sabbath but at other times, visiting, singing and reading to them, and even giving them little entertainments. One lady, Miss Crooks, taking four of them for a trip to the Island and giving them their tea there. Our list of donations will also show how much we are indebted to many of these ladies, and also to the "Flower Mission."

To Dr. Geikie we are under very considerable obligation, he having, with the assistance of some friends, succeeded in procuring and presenting to the Home a harmonium, hymn book and music; and also to Mr. Milburn, for his generous donations of quinine wine, beef, iron and wine, and other tonics.
