

General Post Office

Rates of Commission on Money Orders. The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland in the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada, and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows: For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts. Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 cts. Over \$20 but not exceeding \$50 - 15 cts. Over \$50 but not exceeding \$100 - 20 cts. Over \$100 but not exceeding \$500 - 25 cts. Over \$500 but not exceeding \$1000 - 30 cts. Over \$1000 but not exceeding \$5000 - 35 cts. Over \$5000 but not exceeding \$10000 - 40 cts. Over \$10000 but not exceeding \$50000 - 45 cts. Over \$50000 but not exceeding \$100000 - 50 cts. Maximum amount of a single Order in any of the above countries and offices in Newfoundland, \$1000, but a larger amount may be obtained as the result of special requirements.

Actors Best Officers

They Impress Soldiers with Personality. Says Drill Sergeant.

Actors always make the best army officers, according to a British drill sergeant who has had experience in an officer's training corps.

The drill sergeant, quoted in the London Daily Mail, made the statement positively.

'First of all,' he said, 'they know how to give the word of command, a very important consideration. They are never shy or self-conscious, and they impress the men with their personality. Give me an educated actor and I will promise you a good officer.'

'Schoolmasters make the best non-commissioned officers. Business men I have found rather difficult. They are intelligent enough, but they are not what you may call adaptable.'

A staff officer, speaking on the same subject, said:

'Professions calling for the exercise of imagination and conversation, generally speaking, provide first class officers. Two officers on trench service constantly distinguished themselves by keen observations. They were invariably the first to notice any change in the enemy's dispositions, and both were Fleet Street journalists.'

'Natural resource rather than trained intelligence counts on active service, and while this quality may be possessed by men in all professions, it is more often found among journalists, barristers and, of course, engineers, whom I place in a class apart.'

Warfare of the Huns

Germans Use Non-Combatants as Fire Screen

'A terrible day of wrath awaits Germany when the nations of the earth have time to reflect upon the methods of German warfare, and when they are not afraid of being dragged into it as participants of its horrors.'

Thus writes a Dutch statesman in a powerful comment upon the indictment that France brings against German officers in their treatment of French non-combatants in the occupied territory of their enemy.

The full story, with affidavits and other documentary proof, that have been presented to the public already, are so shocking in their inhumanity that it is difficult for the human mind to conjure up grosser departs from the law of nations and the dictates of sanity.

We can only submit a few instances of German brutality. They must speak for themselves without further comment.

In the Aisne Department a farmer who did not want to work was addressed and sent, almost naked, into the fields under rifle and shell fire, with his eyes bandaged and his hands bound. He was left there a day and then taken as a hostage to Germany.

Many witnesses declare that at different places, particularly in the Departments of the Aisne and Pas de Calais, the inhabitants were forced to work in the trenches.

A youth of 16 states that in October, 1914, he was forced, with some 20 comrades, to do trench work in the Fian of L... in the Pas de Calais, for six days. They were then taken to L... where the Germans used them as shields. Forty of them were killed. The witness was wounded by the splinter of a '75' shell.

This practice has been extended to Lille and the district, as is shown by the correspondence exchanged between the Governor and the Mayor of Lille.

Drowned

The body of Mr. Alex Bryden, agent for the Sun Life Insurance Co. at St. John's was found in Bay Bulls harbor on Monday morning. Mr. Bryden left St. John's, by the evening train on Saturday on a business trip to Bay Bulls, and put up at the Seaview Hotel there.

He had breakfast at the hotel on Sunday morning, and left there unaccompanied at 9.30 o'clock, it was thought to visit the large fish plant of the Nfld. American Fish Packing Co. now in course of erection at Bay Bulls. He was last seen, at noon Sunday, by one of the employees of the plant.

As Mr. Bryden did not return to the hotel for dinner or tea on Sunday, his friends became anxious about him and sought his whereabouts, but without avail. On Monday morning, however, about 9.30, a fisherman saw the form of a man lying in the landwash and reported the matter to Constable Fahey.

The constable, with Dr. Smith, Messrs. J. Clouston, W. J. Ellis and others, accompanied the fisherman to the seashore, and identified the body as that of Mr. Bryden.

The theory advanced is that the unfortunate victim while crossing the main bridge at the bottom of Bay Bulls harbor, fell over and was drowned early in the afternoon, and that the body was carried in on the beach by the tide.

The remains were taken to St. John's by Constable Fahey and placed in the morgue, at which place Doctors Scully and Mitchell held a post mortem examination on Monday evening and pronounced death due to accidental drowning.

Obituary

The late Mrs. Richard Finn, of Spaniards Bay, who passed away on Monday evening, Oct. 30, was the oldest as well as one of the most respected residents of this place. In a few months the deceased would have passed the ripe old age of 93 years, and was one of the few last relics of a day that is long since lost sight of in the mists and shadows of the past.

Her health was good, and her mind lost very little of its usual vigor to within a short time of her death. She was a woman of more than ordinary intelligence, possessing a rich fund of information on local subjects and topics of general interest, and she could tell of events that happened away back in the days of the early forties, and describe every detail as minutely as if they were incidents of only a few years past.

Her husband predeceased her 27 years ago. Of the family there are living one son, Edward, of the Reid Nfld. Co., and two daughters, Mrs. (Capt.) James Ryan, and Mrs. Anastasia Ryan. Seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren also survive her.

Death of Nider. in Sydney

The Sydney Record has the following:—The death of John Crowley, at the age of 83, occurred at the residence of his son, 18 Hugh Street, yesterday.

The deceased, who was a native of Bay Roberts, Newfoundland, leaves two sons and one daughter. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon; in the parlour at Hardwood Hill cemetery.

PROCLAMATION

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary, to appoint Terms or sessions for the holding of our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all our loving subjects in our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that at Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of our said Island, shall be open and holden—

At Brigus, on Friday, the Seventeenth, and Saturday, the Eighteenth days of November next;

At Harbor Grace, on Monday, the Twentieth, Tuesday, the Twenty-first, Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-fourth, and Saturday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do to be tried; and, if necessary, such of the said places for a term as may not exceed two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaol, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

All Honor to Him

Newfoundland should be proud to honor Surgeon-Major Cluny Macpherson, who returned to St. John's yesterday after 18 months active service with the Empire's forces.

But we hardly think that, notwithstanding the handicaps mentioned above, there is justification for the prices of the necessities of life being advanced to the high figures at present prevailing.

Business men now-a-days do not, as a rule, send to market to-day for a package of goods to sell on the morrow. They order in large quantities and car-loads, buying probably a year in advance or when the market price is low.

Why, therefore, in the face of this, should some of the common necessities of life, probably purchased last spring and since retailed at a reasonable profit, be advanced to the present exorbitant prices.

Surely there is room for a governmental enquiry into the existing conditions, in order to determine the real cause and take necessary steps to remedy the evil ere it is too late.

It is stated that the Canadian Government is to confer extensive authority on the various municipalities in the Dominion to enable them to deal with the problem of the high cost of living.

The returns from the Presidential election held in the United States on Tuesday last, have come in very slowly. While the first news given out seemed to indicate a landslide in favor of Hughes, the Republican nominee, later results showed that the race would be close, the Democratic President, Wilson, having been strongly supported in States that had heretofore not been Democratic.

Two sessions of the Sunday School Institute of the Methodist Church were held in Bay Roberts on Wednesday. The afternoon session, which began at 3 o'clock, was addressed by Rev. Mr. Hammon, of Gower St. Church, St. John's, and Mr. Albert Soper, also of St. John's.

The night session opened at 7.30 o'clock, and took the form of a general discussion on the subject of Sunday Schools. The meeting was conducted by the Rev. Norman Guy, of George St. Church, St. John's, Sunday School Secretary of the District.

Popular Official Dies

The death of Dr. Thos. Haursham, M. A., Litt. D., Supr. of Roman Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Harbor Grace, which occurred at his residence, Harvey St., Harbor Grace, on Tuesday morning last, removes from our public life one who was highly respected and deservedly popular amongst all classes in the sphere in which he labored and with the public generally.

Deceased had been in failing health for some time past, and a short time ago went to the hospital at St. John's for treatment. But the disease with which he was afflicted had made such headway that it was found impossible to do anything for him, and he returned home to await the end.

Dr. Hanrahan was born at King's Cove in 1862, and graduated from St. Bonaventure's College in 1878 with the highest teachers grade obtainable in this country. In 1899 he was appointed to the position which he held at the time of his death. He was also a member of the Council of Higher Education.

He leaves to mourn him, besides the three sons mentioned above, a widow and one daughter in Harbor Grace, and one son with the W. U. Cable Co. at Heart's Content, to whom the Guardian extends its sympathy.

Recruiting

The new recruiting campaign started in St. John's is meeting with success. Tuesday night a parade of volunteers and naval reservists, headed by the O. I. B. band, was held, and speeches were delivered by returned soldiers and others in the various coves along Water Street, with the result that 35 recruits offered their services for the army and navy.

Wednesday night, a similar parade was held, this time with the Salvation Army band in the lead, and different speakers, when 27 more, 14 for the army and 13 for the navy, came forward.

Last night's effort was along the same lines as the two preceding nights. The band of the Total Abstinence Society headed the parade, and the result was that 38 more recruits were gathered in.

Fire at Schoolroom

A fire broke out in the Methodist East schoolroom on Monday morning last, caused, it is thought, by an overheated stove pipe protruding through the roof. The blaze was first noticed by the teacher, Miss Jones, who gave the alarm. Mr. Thomas Parsons, who lives nearby, rushed to the scene, and assisted by the scholars, but with great difficulty, succeeded in extinguishing the blaze.

The obligation rests upon us to furnish reserves to fill the ranks, and our comparative immunity from the consequences of a state of war must not be allowed to blind us to the stern need of more men, not alone that victory may be secured but that Newfoundland's place in the Colonial Empire of Great Britain may be assured. It must not be said of us that the blood shed and the treasure expended has been in vain; but if the response which is anticipated be fully realized it will be blazoned to the remotest dependency of the Crown that the boast of this Colony has been well justified—most ancient and most loyal.
