FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

Your Executive Committee have the honour of submitting the following report. In the providence of God, the Association has arrived at the end of the fourth year of its operations.

A year ago (Feburary 1864,) the condition of our schools were as follows:—

which is an increase of 3 Teachers over the previous year, and a decrease of 59 Scholars below the numbers of the previous year.

The number of Schools remains the same.

As regards their condition, the greatest absolute progress has been in St. Joseph Street School, which shows an increase in the average attendance of Scholars of 20 in the year, the attendance having steadily improved from month to month.

The greatest decline has been in the Mile End School, which shows a falling off in the average attendance of 25 Scholars. The falling off in the Mile End School, is doubtless owing to the establishment of the Schools of other denominations in the locality. In the Quebec Suburbs School, there is also a falling off of 17 in the average attendance of the Scholars; and in St. Gabriel Street, a falling off of 3. Cotè Street School has been stationary, while Petite Cote shows an increase of 6; Lagauchetiére Street of 4, and Griffintown of 3.

The attention of the Association was last year called to the most important subject of the improvement of the Libraries, by which an incalulable amount of good, spiritual as well as intellectual, may be done to the young.

Your Committee would remind the Association of a special effort made during the year to supply books to the four mission schools, viz: Griffintown, Mile End, Petite Cote, and Quebec Suburbs, which resulted in an addition of 730 books to their libraries, at a cost of \$169,97. Additional outlays for books were made in the following Schools, viz: St. Joseph Street, \$52; Petite Cote \$28; Lagauchetière St. \$100; Cotè St. \$100. The expenditure on libraries amounted in all to \$350,47 during the year for the 8 schools. Your Committee would respectfully press upon the members the importance of making new efforts during the coming year, to place the libraries of the Church Schools in a still more efficient condition.

GATHERINGS OF THE CHILDREN OF THE ASSOCIATION.

In the month of May last it was proposed to assemble the children together on a Sabbath, when they might be addressed by friends on such religious topics as would be attractive and also of value to them. A most interesting meeting was accordingly held on the last Sabbath of May, when the 8 Schools assembled, with the exception of the St. Joseph Street, and Petite Cote Schools, which were prevented by the distance from taking a part. The result of the meeting, which was a mere experiment, was so gratifying, that it is respectfully suggested that a similar gathering in May would be highly desirable.

St. Joseph Street Church merits a special notice in more ways than one. During the summer large additions have been made to it, doubling the accommodation, both for hearers in the Church, and scholars in the School.

The School has made very encouraging progress during the past year, the number of teachers and scholars having increased, their attendance improved, and contributions been more liberal. During the past year this School has supported itself and required no assistance from the Association. We trust this prosperity

may continue, and that through the blessing of the Lord, much good may be done in that neighbourhood.

FINANCES.

The financial statement for the year ending the 31st January, 1865, is appended to the Report of your Committee. From this, it appears that the expenditure for the year amounted to \$216,14, against \$352,65 of the previous year, being a falling off of \$136.51. But in this expenditure no account is taken of the special effort by which \$152.47 was contributed by the liberality of friends towards the Mission School Libraries, and the \$28.50 raised by Petite Côte for the same purpose, amounting in all to \$180.97. The greatest expenditure was in Quebec Suburbs School, which amounted to \$63.95.

SCHEME OF LESSONS.

The Scheme for the present year is the third series of the "Selected Scripture Lessons" of the Rev. William Arnot, D.D., late of Glasgow, now of Edinburgh, Scotland. This is a departure from the Scheme of the last year, which was supplied by the Edinburgh Sabbath School Union. The change was necessitated by the failure to obtain from Scotland the Union Scheme before the end of the year. Your Committee think that the Scheme furnished by Dr. Arnot is harmonious and logical, supplying a connected series of topics, and observing a proper chronological order. It may be well to use the Scheme of the "Union" issued for the present year in our schools next year, and carefully to secure the issue of a Scheme as early as the month of October.

SINGING.

The matter of singing has not been overlooked during the past year. Some progress, it is believed, has been made by teachers and scholars in these delightful vocal exercises, by which praise is given to God. Bateman's Hymns are still in use.

VISITATION OF SCHOOLS.

In last year's Report, favourable mention was made of the gratifying results arising from the visitation of the schools, and the reports made thereon at the quarterly meetings of the Association by the visitors. We regret to say that this profitable work has been neglected during the year, to the detriment, we believe, of the best interests of teachers and scholars.—" To provoke unto love and good works,"—Heb. x. 24, is a blessed and scriptural precept, which can be most faithfully observed by the comparisons and observations of zealous visitors, and their periodical reports of their visitorial labours.

QUARTERLY ADDRESSES.

We have had a second year's experience of our Quarterly Addresses, and have no reason to regret the institution of the custom. It is to be hoped that the practice will be continued with greater emulation among the members, for the honour of being selected as the speakers of the evening. The following addresses were delivered during the year:—

In May, "Senior Classes," by Mr. Robin.

In August, "The End of all Knowledge, especially Religious Knowledge," by Mr. Williamson.

In November, "Encouragements with which our work as Sabbath School Teachers are attended," by Rev. Dr. Taylor.

In February, 1865, "The Sabbath School Teacher's Work" by Mr. Robin.

SOCIAL MEETINGS.

It was thought advisable to try the experiment of a Social Meeting and Soiree at our last quarterly meeting, a fortnight ago. The company assembled spent a very pleasant evening together, but the enjoyment was diminished by the absence of many of our members, who should have exhibited their deep interest in the noble work in which they are engaged, and their

sympathy with their fellow teachers in that work, by cheerfully giving their countenance and contributing the aid of their conversational and social resources to the company that assembled on that occasion; "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." We are assured that the glorious work of our blessed Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, is subserved and prospered by such "assembling of yourselves together." The meetings are peculiarly those of the godly and believing, and by such associations, greater opportunities are afforded of advancing that cause so dear to every believer's heart: the kingdom of our Saviour on this earth.

Before closing we would draw your attention to the want of teachers, which is frequently experienced in many schools. The good work might be much furthered and more efficiently carried on, were there more labourers.
