In half an hour the vessel was shifted considerably out of her precarious position—fifteen degrees, to be exact. But just as success seemed possible the two steel cables strung to the Sirius snapped apart under the heavy strain, and by the time they had been repaired the tide had dropped.

In live stock Alberta has three notable victories to her credit for 1912. These wins are all the more significant owing to the fact that every animal in these achievements was bred in the province and was consequently an Albertan product. George Lane of Calgary topped the Chicago market for grass-fed steers with a bunch from the Alberta range purchased from Ed. Mounsell of Macleod. Julian Sharman of Red Deer bred and raised a Jersey cow, Rosalind of Old Basing, that made 1,031 pounds of butter in one year, and in three years produced 2,504 pounds, and now holds the butter record in the British Empire. A Ceremontal Key.

A beautiful silver key was presented to Chairman J. L. Englehart of the T. & N. O. Railway on the occasion of driving the last spike in the Elk Lake on Feb. 4. The key, as completed, is eighteen inches in length and weighs 52 ounces of pure silver. The inscription on the reverse side reads, "Presented to J. L. Englehart, Esq., chairman of the T. & N. O. Railway Commission, on the completion of the Elk Lake branch, Feb. 4, 1913." It is one of the finest specimens of the silversmith's art ever seen in Canada, and the Citizens' Committee at Elk Lake were delighted with the work, It is understood Mr. Englehart contemplates placing it on exhibition in the Government museum in Toronto, so that the general public may have the opportunity of seeing it.

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CONSERVES THE WATER.

The Beaver Is the Best Friend the Rancher Has.
Old ranchmen in the Northwest tell how the busy little dam-builder served as a conservationist in the pioneer days of the cattle trail. The beaver was, indeed, so highly esteembed that, it is said, no rancher would have hesitated to give the best steer in his herd to save the life of a sin-

in his herd to save the life of a single beaver.

Everybody knows that the beavers build dams. These they construct to provide against hunger in the winter when everything green that serves them as food has lost its sap and nutritious qualities. The beaver subsists on the bark of cottonwood and willow and other succulent barks, and to be of service to him as food these barks must be kent fresh and

whitow and other succilent barks, and to be of service to him as food these barks must be kept fresh and full of life.

The beaver's instinct informs him that this can be done by keeping them submerged in water, and so he dams the shallow currents of streams so that the collected water above the dam will form a deep pool and overflow his store of shrubs and limbs, thus keeping them fresh and it stripy," they being driven into the soft bottom of the pond.
