Must be Used Officials Everywhere Instructed io Crush All Who Favor Liberal The following bill, entitled An Act to Amend the Weights and Measures Act, was passed by the parliament of Canada during the last session and will be in force on and after the 13th of Octo-ber next: COPY OF BILL.

His majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the senate and house of commons of Canada, enacts as follows: 1. The following section is enacted as section 16 of the Weights and Measures Act, chapter 104 of the Revised Statutes

"16. When milk is sold by the mea
