Now she will be about the same area as Ontario and only about half the size of Quebec. The new provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan are computed at 251,000 and 2482,000 square miles. The adoption of the annexation measure was the occasion of a love feast in the frequently acrimonious Quebec chamber.
