Opinion in Official Quarters That Berlin's Latest Note Has Brought Relations Between the Two Countries Almost to Breaking Point - No Intention to Force Situation, But Likely Place Responsibility for Rupture on Germany.

Washington, July 11.—Formal study of the official text of Germany's reply to the American note on submarines warfare, as it affects neutral rights, strengthens the conviction of high officials that a most critical point in the relations between the two countries had been reached.

The picture shows barrier of building stone constructed by the Germ ans to delay the French advance in Neuville St. Vaast. The village, which recently fell to the French, is situated some four miles north of Arras. The fighting here, and a little further to the east, in "the Lahyrinth," has been of the most violent nature. Every device was resorted to by the Germans to hold up the French advance—houses were converted into miniature fortresses, mackine guns were posted in commanding positions to sweep whole streets, even cupolas, sheltering guns beneath them, were erected. 



THE flagpole reproduced here is the greatest in the British Empire. The stick is being shipped over the Canadian Pacific for the famous Kew Botanical Gardens, London, England. It was cut on Lot 917 adjoining the Gordon Pasha Lakes, 65 miles from Vancouver on the mainland coast, and is a fair sample of the delightful forests of firs of British Columbia. The tree was originally 228 feet long, with a diameter of 65 inches at the but and 18 inches at the top, but owing to a knot near the top it was reduced to 216 feet. After cutting, the pole was hauled out of the woods and loaded on a C. P. R. logging train and towed to False Creek, Vancouver, where it is now being dressed. This pole was cut and delivered to the British Columbia Government by Mossrs. Brooks, Scanlon & O'Brien Co., Ltd., Vancouver, at actual cost. Today the second longest flag pole stands in the square at Vancouver opposite the C. P. R. Hotel Vancouver and is 208 feet long, and was presented to the British Columbia Government.
