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#### WENTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION:

BLOOMINGTON, ILLINOIS, May 26th, 1875.

#### Report of R. Worthy G. Templar.

BLOOMINGTON, ILL., May 25th, 1875.

Especially should we be grateful for the happiness and peace which are realized under the protection of our banner of "Faith, Hope and Charity." If we come not in faith, and come forgetting the responsibilities which rest upon us, as members and representatives, then to a great extent will our deliberations be fruitless, and the progress of our order be retarded. NEW GRAND LODGES.

#### NEW GRAND LODGES.

During the year of 1874, and up to the present time, more new Grand Lodges have been organized than during any previous year in the history of our order. I therefore take pleasure in calling your attention to the following list of Grand Lodges organized since our last annual convocation:

THE GRANE LODGE OF SOUTH APAGA organized on the 29th May, 1874, by Bro. J. F. Smith, D.D.R.W.G.T. The Hon. J. Geard, of Port Elizabeth, a man of prominence and influence, and a member of the Legislative Council of that country, was elected G. W. C. T.; Bro J. F. Smith, a realous and carnest worker, was elected G. W. S. The Order under their direction is spreading rapidly.

THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW SOUTH WALES was organised on the 25th May, 1674, by Bro. Joseph Wearne, D.D.R.W.G.T. The Grand Lodge is ably officered, and we have great confidence that the Order will rapidly spread under their direction.

THE GRAYD LODGE OF TARMANIA was organized on the same day (May 25th, 1874), by W. Fisher, D.R.W.G.T., who was elected G. W. C. T., and Bro. P. Facy, jr., elected G. W. S. I have confidence in these brethren, and from what I know of them by correspondence, I consider them well worthy of the high and honorable positions to which they have been called.

THE GRAND LODGE OF QUEERO WAS organized on the 1st day of July. 1874, by Bro. W. S. Williams, R. W. G. S., assisted by Bros. John Ormiston, of Her Majesty's Customs, G. W. C. T., of Canada, J. A. Fairbanks, Esq., G. W. C. T., of Nebraska, and T. W. Casey, G. W. S.,

of Canada. This Grand Lodge was organized with a membership of more than 5,000. The G. W. C. T., Rev. C. P. Mallory and Bro. D. Rose of Montreal, G. W. S., are both regarded as men of ability and great energy.

THE GRAND LODGE OF WALES (English) was organized on the 11th day of Aug., 1874, by Bro. John Lewis, S.R.R. W.G.T. and Bro. Joseph Malins, R. W. G. C., assisted by S. T. Hammond, of the Grand Lodge of England.

THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW ZELLAND (South of Cook's Strait) was organized on the 29th day of Sept., 1874, by Rev. B. I. Westbrocké, D. D. R. W. G. T., at Christ Church, Canterbury, New Zesland; S. P. Andrews, of Christ Church, was elected G. W. C. T., and W. T. C. Mills, of the same place, was elected G. W. S. Both of these brethren are noble workers in the cause.

THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW ZEALAND (North), was organized by our esteemed friend and Bro., Hon. S.D. Hastings, P.R.W.G.T., and special D. R. W. G. T., on the 25th day of January, 1875, at Auckland, New Zealand. Bro. Hastings had a fine representation present and the Grand Lodge is well officered.

THE GRAND LODGE OF MISSISSIPPI, at Grenada on the 5th day of May, 1875. I also organized

THE GRAND LODGE OF ARRANSAS, on the 8th of May, 1875. Both of these new Grand Lodges start under very favorable circumstances, with officers well worthy their positions, and the leaders of both are earnest temperance workers and true christian gentlemen.

It is with much pleasure that we report the organization of the above Grand Lodges, nine in number, since our last annual meeting. There are now but two States in the United States where we have not Grand Lodges, viz: Florida and Louisiana. I have about completed arrangements for the organization of the Grand Lodge in Florida, having organized by Deputites during the year sufficient lodges to enable them to organize a Grand Lodge; which they will do during the coming summer with upwards of two thousand members.

The political troubles in Louisians during the past year have retarded operations there and prevented the organization of the Grand Lodge. But in a short time the Order will be planted there, and at no distant day we expect to see the last American State added to the constellation of stars that already represents every nation of people that imhabit the earth; each one growing brighter and brighter, as the number increases,

In addition to the above. Bro. Yeo, D.D., R. W. G. T., a most zealous and earnest, worker, writes that in a short time he will organize the Grand Lodge of Japan; and Bro. Wm. Hannan, D.D.R.W.G.T., for Jamaica, writes that in a few weeks he will be ready to organize the

#### PROGRESS OF THE ORDER.

Notwithstanding the great depression of the times, the failure of the crops in many localities, and the terrible stringency of money matters in many others, much has been accomplished during the year just closed. Our order occupies a higher position to-day than ever before in its history. Men and women in high places, who once looked upon our Order as alone adapted to the necessities of those in the humbler walks of life, have thrown aside these false notions, and many of them are now heartily enlisted with us in the work. Ministers of the gospel, who once regarded our movement as an attempt to superseds the church, and thus make the Church of Christ secondary to the Order, have been convinced of their error, and thousands of them are now the chaplains of our lodges, and are constantly bearing our principles upon their prayers to the throne of the Most High. Legislators and high officials have felt the power of our organization, and now readily acknowledge its worth.—Public opinion is fast developing in our favor, and as this sentiment increases in opposition to the liquor traffic and its evils, it demands legislation for its overthrow. Until recently the Southern States of America were far behind some of our sister States in demanding of their law-makers stringent or prohibitory legislation. The order m the South, during the past twelve or eighteen months, has almost doubled its membership, and with the advance of the Order, the demand for laws to suppress the unholy traffic is to be found in the numerous petitions that

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have been presented during the past year to the several legislators of the South. I am quite happy to inform you that in several states these efforts have been successful, and restrictive license and local option laws have been passed in the States of Kentucky, Mississippi, Georgia, Tennessee and North Carolina. By the advantages thus gained, and the enforcement of the laws, terror has been stricken into the ranks of the enemy, and hundreds of these vile places have been closed. If you desire further evidence of advancement and the progress we are making, I refer you to the number of judges, legislators, physicians, ministers, and municipal and county officials, who are to be found in our ranks, wearing the badge of our order, and who are now the advocates and champions of our cause. Would you know of the good results of the year's labor, you can learn them from the lips of the reclaimed thousands, who now form a part of the grandest army of philanthropists and reformers the world ever saw. Would you know where our principles have been most firmly planted, and where the gleaming light from our star-spangled banner is hailed most heartily, then go to the homes which were once desolate, where the wife was paled by sorrow and pinched by poverty, and where the little innocent ones, chilled with the bitter frosts, cried for bread; here you will find those who now sing for gladness, and bless you as the author of their joy. Comrades, you have opened fountains whose water shall never cease to cheer and bless. You have awakened sweet music, whose chords shall charm and delight the human heart and ear while time shall last. Our order is stronger now than ever before. Our numbers have greatly increased during the past year, and on the roll-books of our International Order we have registered more than Saven Husdaed and Twanty-Five Thousand Names. What a grand army to do battle for the right! Heaven be praised for all that has been accomplished.

#### DECISIONS.

The following decisions on questions and appeals have been rendered during the year:

1st. A W.C.T. cannot grant a clearance card. It can only be granted by a vote of the Lodge, when a member applying for the same is square on the books, and there are no charges pending. Decisions of G. W. C. T.'s in conflict with the above decision are void and of no effect.

· 2nd. Is it a violation of a Good Templar's obligation to drink Ottawa beer, as it is claimed by the makers that it will not intoxicate?

Answer. I cannot see how it is possible to make beer which does not contain alcohol. It is not beer if there is no alcohol in it; therefore, as our obligation does not permit the drinking of beer (alcohol) I would consider the drinking of Ottawa beer a violation of our obligation.

3rd. If an officer elect is absent on installation night, and no new election is held on the spot, and another person is designated by and with the consent of the Lodge, and is installed in due form by the Lodge

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Deputy, is not such officer the legal one for that office for that term, unless he or she shall voluntarily resign at some future meeting of the Lodge?

Answer. If an officer elect is absent on installation night, some one else must be elected in his place, and all the officers duly installed. Or good reasons the installation of officers may be by vote of the Lodge postponed. No officer can be installed by proxy, and the Lodge could not designate a member to fill the place of an absent officer elect, without first declaring said office vacant, and proceeding in a legal way to elect an officer to fill the vacancy. The member installed, without having been duly elected, could have no claim on the office, and the Lodge Deputy was in error in installing such member.

4th. Has a Lodge Deputy any right to make an official decision, or interfere with the working of a Lodge, unless called upon by the W. C. T. or Lodge?

Answer. Yes. It is the duty of the L. D. to notice and correct any informality in the working of a Subordinate Lodge, whether called upon to do so or not; and if the Lodge is not satisfied with his decisions, an appeal can be taken to the G. W. C. T. A Lodge Deputy should be prudent and cautious, and not dictatorial, preserving harmony and peace in the Lodge, and not the prevoker of discord and strife.

5th. Has a L. D. a right to disobey the authority of the W. C. T., or refuse to obey the gavel.

Answer. A L. D. should obey the authority of the W. C. T., if that officer is in the proper discharge of his duties; and a L. D. is as much under the authority of the Lodge and W. C. T., as any other member, when not exercising his legal authority as Lodge Deputy.

6th. A member desiring to withdraw from the Lodge and Order, his application is dated prior to the beginning of a new quarter, but the application does not reach the Lodge, and is not received until first meeting night in the new quarter. Can his application for withdrawal be granted without his having paid dues for the new quarter?

Answer. If the application for withdrawal was read at the first meeting of the Lodge after its reception, and at the time of the reading of the application for withdrawal a new quarter had commenced, the withdrawal could not be granted without the payment of dues for the surrent quarter.

7th. A.G. W. C. T. having completed a term in his own jurisdiction removes into another jurisdiction, deposits his elearance eard and becomes a member of the Grand Lodge. The Grand Lodge of which he now becomes a member is a young one, and has only had one G. W.C.T., who still serves, can the G. W. C. T. who has removed into the jurisdiction claim the chair of P.G. W. C. T., and would he be eligible to be added to the Executive Committee under Article 4, Sec. 9, Grand Lodge Com-

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Answer. A.P. G. W. C. T. removing into another jurisdiction and depositing his card of clearance, carries the honors with him, but the knoors previously obtained by him in another jurisdiction would not give him the right to claim the chair of P. G. W. C. T., even if there was no P. G. W. G. T. under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of which he had recently become a member. A young Grand Lodge without a P. G. W. C. T., might, by vote of the Grand Lodge, call him to the chair of P. W. C. T., and add him to the Executive Committee, without doing violence to Article 4, Sec. 9, of Grand Lodge Constitution. He would have no more right in another jurisdiction than the one where he obtained his honors to claim the chair of P. G. W. C. T., and not there if more than one year had expired since he vacated the chair of G. W. C. T. In the absence of the Junior P.G. W. C. T., or the election of more than one year of his immediate successor in his own jurisdiction, he would be entitled to fill the chair of P. G. W. C. T.

8th. A Lodge Deputy cannot use the password unless obtained from the W. C. T. of his Lodge. His duty as L. D. is to communicate the password to the W. C. T., when installed, and he must receive it as a member of the Lodge from the W. C. T. before he can properly use the same, and he has no right as L. D. to communicate it to any one but the W. C. T. of his Lodge.

9th. Is the drinking of cider, sweet or hard, fermented or unfermented, as a beverage, a violation of our pledge?

Answer. Yes. The juice of the apple, fermented or unfermented, is cider, and the drinking of cider as a beverage is prohibited by our pledge

#### APPEALS.

and Order.

Appeal of Samuel Gould from the action of Ex. Committee, for failing to insert his name in a special Commission, as Deputy, to organize the Grand Lodge of New South Wales. Action of the Ex. Committee sustained, and the appeal dismissed. To decide otherwise would disorganize the Grand Lodge of New South Wales, and necessitate a new organization of the same. Appeal will be found in the package marked A.

2. Appeal from decizion of L. D., of Milwaukee Lodge, No. 159, viz: That a member violating article 2nd of Constitution, and re-obligated for the violation of the same, does not lose the honors of his office. The appeal is dismissed, and the decision of the Lodge Deputy confirmed. I give the the following reason for confirming the above decision, viz., that the violation of Article 2nd does not suspend or expal a member from the order (provided he is re-obligated); and if a member, after violating Art. 2nd, is re-obligated without suspension, he does not forfeit honors previously obtained. Several appeal cases taken direct to me could not be decided, because they were not in form, and consent was not obtained to

bring them before me in proper form. The following appeals are submitted to go before the Committee on Appeals, they having been taken direct to the R. W. G. L. :

#### JUVENILE TEMPLARS.

At the last session of the R. W. G. L. a new Ritual and work for the children was adopted, and our worthy and competent Sister O'Donnell was elected Chief Superintendent. This Juvenile Order was designed to take the place of other similar Orders, and thus bring all the children into one Order, under the fostering care of the R. W. G. L. Thirty-four Grand Lodges have adopted the Juvenile work, and I trust that before another session fill other Grand Lodges will have done the same. The training of the children and the work of instilling into their youthful minds the principles of total abstinence is an important—if not the most important—duty of this Grand body. These little ones are to be trained to fill our places, and to carry on the work when we shall have been called from labor to rest. Is it not important then that they shall be well schooled and disciplined for the grand work before them? The juvenile work should approximate as near as possible to the work and laws of our own Order, as they are to have charge of it soon. The future of our Order depends greatly upon the youth of our land. Train them properly, and when we have laid off our responsibilities, and they have assumed them, the good work will be carried on with great rapidity and effectiveness by these well trained soldiers of the cause. Then let us not falter in this work, for with these children in our possession, we can overthrow the strongest opposition, and finally plant our banner of prohibition upon the very citadel of the enemy's stronghold. B. O'Donnell, who has labored arduously and successfully during the year. Her whole soul seems to be enlisted in the work. She delights to fill the minds and hearts of these little buds of promise with the principles of total abstinence. It is true that this Order has not been self-sustaining thus far, and I presume no one expected that it would be the first year; however, the difference between the receipts and expenditures is of little importance, compared with the work accomplished, and by proper management during the coming year the Juvenile Order may become a source of revenue to us. I hope you will place no obstacles in the way of its success, but aid it all you can. I can say from my heart, God bless this Order, and God bless the children. By a law of Lycurgus, the famous law-giver, the children of Sparta were to be trained for the State, and those children were the men, numbering only six thousand, with the brave and gallant Leonidas, stood in the pass of Thermopyle, and drove back and conquered the famous Kerxes, with his two and a half millions of disciplined soldiers. Let the mothers of the land but train the children for the temperance cause, and at no distant day the liquor traffic, with all its attendant evils, will disappear before this advancing army of moralists, philanthropists and christians.

#### SUBORDINATE LODGES UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE R. W. GRAND LODGE.

There are Lodges in the following countries working under the jurisdiction of the R. W. G. L., viz: In France, Germany, Holland, Belgium, India, Singapore, China, Japan, Ceylon, Natal, West Indies, Honduras, British Guiana, Sandwich Islands; also Lodges in Florida, Louisiana, Dakota Territory, and on the "High Seas; also one Juvenile Temple in Peru. I have just commissioned our zealous and competent brother, A. D. Wood, Deputy for South America, and I feel quite confident that at an early day subordinate lodges will be instituted by Brother Wood.

For details and interesting information regarding the extension of the Order in the foreign countries named above, I refer you to the report of Bro. Malins, R. W. G. O. To him we are indebted, more than to any one else, for the introduction of the Order into the several countries named.

#### HON. S. D. HASTINGS, P. R. W. G. T.

During the past year the correspondence of this brother with the officials of the Order in New Zealand and Australia exhibited the fact that there were not only many irregularities in the workings of the Order there, but that considerable discord existed, which was tending greatly to retard not only the progress of the Order, but if not checked, to overthrow it in some localities. Those distant brethren requested that some one should be sent to them to correct these irregularities and restore harmony. Through the Executive Committee, propositions were made to, and

the same accepted by, the brethren, and our Past R. W. G. T. was-employed and commissioned to visit New Zealand and Australia, in the employed and commissioned to visit. New Zealand and Australia, in the interests of the Order. Brother Hastings sailed from San Francisco in December last, arriving in New Zealand in January, and, as has been stated, he instituted one of the Grand Lodges in New Zealand. The reception given to our distinguished brother was a compliment to our entire Order, as well as a merited tribute to a zealous and worthy brother. I have much pleasure in stating to you that all questions of difference have been seftled to the satisfaction of all parties, the irregularities in the work corrected, and many letters have been received from our health of the property brethren thanking us for sending him to them, and speaking in glowing: terms of the great good accomplished by his visit. I am also glad to inform you that the Executive Committee were enabled to make such arrangements with the Executives of New Zealand and Australia that the expense to this body was nominal, and has not taken any funds from our treasury, as the greater part of the expense to be borne by this body was to be collected from the Executives there, and the remainder was, by my direction, charged against me. For particulars of arrangement, I refer you to the report of the Executive. The good accomplished by the visit of Brother Hastings has more than repaid us already.

#### SOUTH AFRICA.

There are several Lodges in the western portion of South Africa which refuse to acknowledge the authority of the Grand Lodge of South Africa. They claim never to have joined in the petition for the Grand Lodge charter, and allege that the distance is so great that they never could have representation in the Grand Lodge, and they therefore ask to remain under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of England for the present. We may have made some mistake in granting the charter of South Africa to cover so much territory. I desire that you give special attention to the matters pertaining to the Order in South Africa.

#### FINANCES.

While we have not been able to collect as much of the indebtedness to the Right Worthy Grand Lodge as we could have liked (owing to the depression of the times and the stringency of money matters), yet recent collections give us, I think, sufficient for our present purposes. There is collections give us, I think, sufficient for our present purposes. There is still a large amount due this body from the several Grand Lodges. The Grand Secretaries have been repeatedly called upon for payment, but in many instances they have replied that it was impossible owing to the great scarcity of money. With the funds on hand, including the several amounts due, the Secretary will report quite as large, if not in excess of any previous session. Owing to the failure of the Grand Lodges to pay their indebtedness, we have been greasly crippled in our missionary efforts during the year. On this account the Executive Committee could not carry out fully the request of this body in reference to the employment of Bro. Russell, if the finances of the Order would

justify it. Bro. Russell was given employment for three months, and would have been continued in the field if there had been sufficient funds in the treasury to have paid him. Several months of the year we have been entirely without money in the treasury, and our R. W. G. S. has been compelled to use his own private funds and credit to meet the current expenses of the Order. We need greatly a missionary fund, and I trust that some plan will be inaugurated this session which will secure sufficient funds for missionary purposes. I am afraid we have thousands of members who do not appreciate our order because of its cheapness. Let us remember that our duty is to give according to our ability. If no Let us remember that our duty is to give according to our ability. If no better plan can be arranged for the procurement of a missionary fund, I would suggest that the plan of placing boxes in our subordinate Lodges be considered; their contents to be reported through the Secretaries and Grand Secretaries to the R. W. G. S., at the end of each month or quarter; and that a correct list of all Lodges and amounts be kept by the R. W. G.S. Also, that this body appoint one night in the year our which all subordinate Lodges be requested to hold a public missionary meeting, and the proceeds to be immediately forwarded through the G. W. S. to the R. W. G. S. If each subordinate Lodge would hold a meeting of this kind annually, and no more than one deligar was collected at ing of this kind annually, and no more than one dollar was collected at each meeting, it would give us more than ten thousand dollars for missionary work. I implore you to adopt some plan by which this fund may be raised.

#### J. K. VANDOORN, R. W. G. T.

While we have much to rejoice over, while we have fought many battles during the past year, and won for God and humanity many glorious victories, yet we must pause amidst our rejoicing and note that there is a vacant chair, and one whom we have been accostomed to meet is absent. With sorrow and deep regret I formally announce to you that the chilly messenger of death has entered the ranks of our Order, and robbed us of our believed friend and brother, J. K. Vandoorn, R. W. G. To, who departed this life on the 5th inst. While this announcement will create sadness and fill your hearts with sorrow, we must bow with submission to the will of Him who "doeth all things well;" and as our I rother died in the fath, we hope to meet him in our circle of swity in that "temple not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." I would suggest that a committee be appointed to draft suitable resolutions, and that the members of this body wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days. Dr. J. R. Nicholson, D. Dr. R. W. G. I had no personal acquaintance with Brother Nickolson, and only knew him from our official correspondence and letters of praise from others. I am quite sure that the order has lost a zealous worker, the cause an able advocate, and society an exemplary member. Thus you see, my brethren, our friends and loved ones are constantly passing away, leaving us behind them to carry on

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the grandest warfare that ever enlisted a brave soldier. Let us work and be faithful, and continually lean on the arm of One who is able to make us strong though we be weak; and one who will never suffer "the righteous to want, or his seed to beg for bread."

#### SUGGESTIONS.

There seems to be a settled conviction that the next session of this body should be called to meet in Philadelphia. I therefore deem it not premature to submit for your consideration the propriety of raising a voluntary fund from the Order (and when I say Order I do not confine myself to America, but to the whole world), for the purpose of erecting a Good Templar Fountain in the Centennial Building, which shall bear the coat of arms, or some other insignia, of every nation of people now enjoying the protection, not of the Stars and Stripes, or British flag, or other banners, but the protection of our banner of F. H. & C., supported by the heaven-born principles of our cosmopolitan order.

I regard, the suggestion as proper, since samples of all kinds of vile drinks from the distilleries, wine cellars and breweries, of not only this, but all other countries, will be there on exhibition.

I would also call your attention to the fact, that while we have many temperance papers and periodicals worthy of support, many of them are compelled to stop publication, because of starvation. No one can deny the power of the press, and we should feel it to be a part of our Templar duty to support it, when it becomes the advocate of our principles, and is continually delivering its silent but effective lectures in places where our public speakers can not be heard. I desire to return my thanks to Bro. J. N. Stearns and "The National Temperance Publishing House," for donations of valuable tracts and books, which have been distributed during the past year. It is not possible to measure the good which has been accomplished by the kind generosity of Bro Stearns, in the donation of these valuable documents.

#### THE FUTURE.

The addition of nine Stars to our banner during the past year, thus making the total number of Grand Lodges sixty, and the large gain in membership, gives us great cause for rejoicing. While the healthy public sentiment created, and the laws restricting the traffic enacted, give us grand hope for the future. Brethren, the battle has been raging with persistence all along the line. Our enemies are urged on by a desire for the spoils, utterly regardless of the blood that is to flow, the cries of the stricken, or the groans of the dying. While they have the governments of men to support them, and large resources with which to continue the battle for plunder, we have the law of the Lord on our side, and all that we "have and are" consecrated to the struggle. The enemy is continually making propositions of compromise; but we can not compromise truth and principle; we should be moral cowards, if we did. We have gone too far, and pressed the lines of the enemy too hard, to be satisfied with civil damage or restrictive license laws. We can not be content with lopping off the branches; we must destroy the tree, pluck it up by roots, and destroy it forever. Besides draining our treasuries, and making paupers of millions in our land, the intellectual night and moral bankruptcy, which drunkenness brings upon this and other countries, is a loss which can not be reckoned in money; for no nation has any security except in the morals of its people. Our struggle may be a long one, but we can not compromise. We are hopeful for the future, if we do not falter. Let us continue our labors, until the manufacture, importation and sale of alcoholic drinks, shall be interdicted by a LAW OF THE NATIONS, supported by a public sentiment which will enforce it.

#### PERSONAL AND CONCLUSION.

Through your kindness and partiality at the last session of this Grand Body, I was called to the highest position within the gift of the Order. I entered upon the duties of the office with, as I supposed, some faint conception of the responsibilities of the position. My connection with the Order as G. W. C. T. for three years, and R. W. G. C. for two, had given me some experience in the working of the Order. But I soon learned that the duties were more arduous, and the responsibilities far greater, than it was possible for me to have conceived when I decepted the position. To be G. W. C. T. of a State, with thousands of members to look after, was one thing; to be R. W. G. T. of the world, with the care of nearly a million members, was another. I at once endeavored,

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by a close study of the laws and usages of the Order, to prepare myself, so as to meet the demands of the position, and the expectation of the friends who had confided this sacred trust to my keeping.

But while I have endeavored to do my duty, the whole credit for what has been accomplished is not due to the efforts of any one individual. The assistance rendered me by P. R. W. G. T. Hastings and Bro. Joseph Malins, R. W. G. C., has indeed been valuable. I am also under obligations to Sister Mattie McClellan Brown, G. W. V. T., for kindness and assistance rendered. I have also received valuable assistance from Bro. W. S. Williams, R. W. G. S. My official relations with him have been exceedingly pleasant, and I have found him prompt and active in the discharge of the arduous duties of his office. The Order is certainly under obligations to Bro. Williams for the sacrifices made by him, and for the use of his private funds to meet the demands of the Order while our treasury was depleted.

I am also under great obligations to Sister O'Donnell, Superintendent of Juvenile Templars, and to Bro. S. B. Chase and John Russell, P. R. W. G. T's., for assistance rendered during the year. My relations, indeed, have been most pleasant with all with whom I have corresponded during the year.

The Grand Worthy Chief Templars and G. W. Secretaries of the Order have placed me under obligations to them by their uniform kindness and forbearance. During the year I have visited the Grand Lodges of Missouri, Wisconsin, Kentucky and Georgia; delivered one hundred and twenty-five public lectures; instituted many Subordinate Lodges and two Grand Lodges; and initiated about three thousand members. If we had had funds which we could have used for missionary work, we should have been able to have accomplished more. The result of the year's labor is before you. If, during my administration, I have wronged the humblest member of our Order, I assure you it was unintentional, and I here beg pardon. In the fear of God I have tried to do my which duty; and while I have acknowledged the obligations due to those who have kindly assisted me, I am fully aware of the deep debt of gratitude I owe to our Heavenly Father for his care and protection. He has, indeed,

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been a kind and loving parent, and I have endeavored to make Him the Man of my counsel, asking him to make me worthy, in every particular, of the high and honorable position which I am now about to surrender.

Brethren, let this be a harmonious and profitable session. Let the love we bear our Order silence all personal differences, and by so doing, perpeptuate the grandest Order that ever was established by human hands. Let us join hands and hearts, and make our "circle of unity" so strong, around our temple of virtue, that no enemies from within or without, shall ever descerate or deface it; and from its dome let our spotless banner wave in the pure winds of heaven, with its beaming galaxy of stars undimmed for ever. I love this banner, because under its shadow we have rent as under the cords that bound the aspiring wings of thought, and torn the manacles from the sturdy limbs of labor. Underits folds many battles have been fought, and gallant victories won, by our cold water army, as they have "swept over the land like the bright march of dawn," leaving peace and joy in their path. Under this banner, let us continue to fight, until the liquor traffic shall be utterly and for ever overthrown, and Prohibition be the written and realized law in every land.

I now return you this banner, with the nine additional stars. I need not repeat that I love it, for next to life itself, I hold it to be the honored emblem of all that is good and true in man—and all that is lovely and virtuous in women. While life lasts, and memory holds her place, I shall ever feel grateful for your confidence, and will cherish the position I have held as one of the most honorable ever bestowed upon man.

To the Right Worthy Grand Lodge:

WORTHY OFFICERS AND MEMBERS:—Before entering on the statement of facts—exclusively of a business character, and partaking of the dryness commonly attributed to statistics, it would be doing violence to my own feelings weep I to withhold the expression of extreme gratification afforded me off the occasion of meeting so many warm-hearted Brothers and Sisters, fellow-workers in the glorious cause of emancipation from the direct threadom which has, for long and weary centuries, enslaved our common humanity. The aspect of such a gathering is most cheering, whether we consider various nationalities represented, or the grand purpose contemplated by our organization. The highest interests of society, considered morally, socially or politically, are involved in our operations; human freedom and the truest forms of civilization are inseparable from our success. Heaven has smiled on our efforts and earth is reaping the fruit of our toils.

The passing year has witnessed marvellous successes, while even reverses have tended to the consolidation of our forces, or to the dissemination of our benevolent principles. The seal of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge, once prophetic of design and typical of hope, is now beautifully emblematical of the existing fact. "Our Field is the World." The faith, hope and charity which animate us, encirle the many nations of which it is composed, and if there remain any in the darkness of superstition, our movements are so decidedly progressive, that we shall, by God's help, encompass and penetrate the whole. Thus joyously and hopefully are we assembled undismayed by any ruffling of the waters, and encouraged by the inherent vitality of our doctrine and Constitution.

The official statements and statistical tables embodied in my report, now to be presented, will abundantly verify these general observations. The extending, various and responsible duties of this office have been discharged with impartiality and to the best of my judgment, although experience, so necessary in this department, has enabled me with some facility to respond to regular and unforesseen correspondence, yet it is possible that, contrary to my wish and purpose, some may have been

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apparently neglected. I shall, however, throw myself on the indulgence of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge, and herewith submit my report for the consideration and acceptance of its officers and members:

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#### NEW GRAND LODGES.

Never in the history of our Order have so many Grand Lodges been organized in one year. We with pleasure submit for your consideration the following:

SO TH AFRICA.—On the 29th day of April, 1874, the Grand Lodge of South Africa was organized by J. F. Smith, D. D. R. W. G. T. The Hon. J. Geard, of Port Elizabeth, member of the Legislative Council of that country, was elected G. W. C. T., and J. F. Smith, G.W.S. Both of these are gentlemen of much energy, and the work is progressing admirably.

2. New South Wales.—On the 25th Cay of May, 1874, the Grand Lodge of New South Wales was organized by Joseph Wearne, D. D. R. W. G. T. J. P. Ollis was elected G. W. S. A good report comes of him as a good worker and much may be expected from them.

8. TASMANIA.—On the same day, 25th day of May, 1874, this Grand Lodge was organized by W. Fisher, D. D. R. W. G. T. W. Fisher, G. W. O. T., and P. Faey, G. W. S., both rep ried as good men and doing a good work.

4. Quence.—On the 1st day of July, 1874, at the City of Montreal, I, assisted by John Ormiston, Esq., of Her Majesty's Customs, and G. W. C. Templar of Canada, J. A. Fairbanks, Esq., G. W. C. T. of Nebrasks, and T. W. Casey, Esq., G. W. S. of Canada, organized this Grand Lodge with a membership of over 5,000. Rev. C. P. Mallory, of Huntingville, G. W. C. T., and D. Rose, of Montreal, G. W. S., both energetic and true to the trusts reposed in them.

5. Wales, English.—On the 11th day of August, 1874, this Grand Lodge was organized by Joseph Malins, G. W. C. T., of England, and R. W. G. C., assisted by J. Lewis and S. T. Hammond, of the English Grand Lodge.

6. New Zealand, South of Cook's Strait.—This Grand Lodge was organized on the 29th day of Sept., 1874, by the Rev. B. J. Westbrooke, D. D. R. W. G. T., in the Foresters Hall, Christ's Church, Canterbury, New Zealand. S. P. Andrews, of Christ's Church, G. W. C. T. and W. T. C. Mills, of the same place, was elected G. W. S. Both are good men, and hard to work to extend Good Templarism throughout the country.

7. New Zealand, North.—Our respected friend and good Brother, the Hon S. D. Hastings, P. R. W. G. T., organized this Grand Lodge on the 25th of January, 1875., at Aukland, New Zealand. J. W. Spright, of Thames Aukland, G. W. C. T., and S. Brooking, of the same place, G. W. S. Bro. Hastings reports some 60 or 75 Representatives present,

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d Brother, d Lodge on 7. Spright, same place, es present, representing some 40 Lodges. Bro. Charles Aitkins was elected General Supt. Juvenile Temples. He reports the G. L. organized under the most favorable circumstances.

8. Mississippi.—On the 5th of May, 1875, at Grenada, Mississippi.
Bro. Col. J. J. Hickman, R. W. G. T., organized said Grand Lodge.

9. Arkansas.—On the 8th of May, 1975, Bro. Hickman organized the Grand Lodge of Arkansas.

These two Grand Lodges, Bro. Hickman reports in a fair way of becoming successful Grand Lodges.

In addition to the above we expect soon to organize a Grand Lodge in Japan. Bro. E. S. Yeo, of Imperial Naval College, Tokei, Japan, D. D. R. W. G. T., in a letter of recent date, writes, that they would organize in a few weeks, and he had no doubt but thousands would join our Order immediately. Bro. Yeo predicts a strong Grand Lodge for this country.

Wm. Hannan, of H. M. S. *Aboukir*, D. D. R. W. G. T., writes me that within a few weeks a Grand Lodge will be organized on the Island of Jamaica.

# TABLE

Showing the Account of each Grand Lodge with the Right Worthy Grand Lodge.

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The accounts with England, Ireland, Scotland and Walcs, are not complete, as they show none of the transactions of last year in consequence of the very serious illness of Bro. Joseph Brown, my Eastern agent. His return I am informed will be forwarded so soon as he sufficently recovers as to be able to make up his financial statement.

On the 5th day of December last, having confidence in the zeal, ability and honesty of our good brother, Joseph Malins, Grand Worthy Chief Templar of England, and Right Worthy Grand Counsellor, I commissioned him my assistant for the Grand Lodges of Great Britain and Ireland, and for all Lodges Grand and Subordinate, adjacent thereto, giving him full power to transact such business for the same as I might do were I personally present. The executive of the Grand body sanctioned my acts Bro. Malins soon thereafter took hold of this responsible position, and has rendered to me an elaborate statement of his transactions. His financial statements came to me too late for this report, but I have the same with me for your perusal, and will be published with the Minutes. He shows a net profit during his term of office from 1st January, 1875. of £496 19s 11d sterling, equal in round numbers in United States currency at the present rate of gold, say \$2800. Under his regime I expect a large income during this present year. The Grand Lodge of England has an account against us for supplies furnished to Grand and Subordinate Lodges, and for Juvenile Templars, which will reduce their indebtedness very considerably. Bro. Malins will settle with us ere his departure.

AUSTRALIA.

Finding it expensive in shipping supplies to Australia, and acting under the advice of this Grand Body and with the sanction of the Executive, I, in September last, appointed Bro. Fred. Palmer, G.W.S., of Victoria, Australia, my agent for that part of the world. In order that he might commence at once, upon his receiving my appointment, I shipped him about \$1000 worth of supplies. Bro. Palmer received these goods in good order and at once issued a circular informing those in need, of his appointment, and that he bad a quantity on hand. From what I could learn of Bro. Palmer I have every reason to believe him to be a good man, and will make an efficient officer for us.

The Order in that country has grown rapidly and under the arrangement greater facilities will be afforded them.

#### RITUAL TRANSLATION.

Many calls have been made for the work in the Scandinavian language and in response to these calls, the Executive Committee granted to Bro. Adolphus Peterson, of New York City, the sum of one hundred dollars towards this work. The Ritual and its accompaniments have been translated in said language and we now are in possession of one hundred full sets, and ready to supply Lodges whose members speak this language. I have had calls during the year from Wisconsin for the work in Welsh, and immediately requested the G. W. S. of Wales to send to Bro. Barker, the G. W. S. of Wisconsin, a few sets, which he did, and I am glad to inform you that in Wisconsin Welsh Lodges are in good working order. We will be prepared to furnish to any Subordinate L:dges, Welsh supplies from this date.

#### MILITARY LODGES.

By the action of this Grand Lodge, at its last session, the Military Lodges located in localities where Grand Lodges were in existence were transferred to said Grand Lodges, which accounts for the small number reported.

#### AID TO GRAND LODGES.

The sum of one hundred dollars was granted to assist the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick in the prosecution of their work. The Executive desired to assist them by sending a lecturer in their country; this they objected to, giving as a reason that they knew their wants better than a stranger did, and could do more with less money. We therefore paid to the G. W. O. T. the sum of one hundred dollars to be expended by him as he thought beat in the lecture work. And the sum of \$66.66 was paid to the G. L. of Prince Edward Island, which amount was appropriated under a resolution of the Executive of the last year, although not paid until this year. Many other Grand Lodges have had aid by extending the time of the psyment of the accounts due by them.

#### R. W. G. L. OFFICERS.

During the year much extra work has been done in consequence of the extension of our Order, all of which I have tried to do to the best of my

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ability. To my associates in office, viz: Col. Hickman, Bro. Malins and Sister Brown, I return my sincere thanks for their valuable assistance rendered to me whenever required. To Bro. Hickman, my Chief, with whom I have been brought in contact almost daily, I feel deeply indebted. I have always found him prompt, energetic, vigilant, forbearing, kind and courteous, and willing to do his share of the work, and anxious that I should do mine in a proper manner. Without his assistance I could not have done my work so satisfactory to myself or this Grand body. Bro. Malins has given me, during the year, many valuable suggestions, some of which I have acted upon and many others I should.

Our respected Brother and Friend, J. K. Van Doom, R. W. G. T., is no more. I cannot find words adequate to express my esteem for him, or the sadness I feel in seeing his place vacated. Always kind and courteous, and to me obliging, his assistance in the financial department cannot be over estimated. We trust he has gone to a Temple not made with hands.

Together we may meet no more, But there is yet a happier shore; And then released from toil and pain, May we for ever meet again.

OFFICERS AND MEMBERS,—The tabulated statements of numerical strength now furnished, together with the various evidences of progress, are altogether inadequate proofs of the influence which is being exerted necessary of the nations by means of Good Templarism; advancement has been rapid and visible, and these have awakened attention and interest in many circles not heretofore by any other form of temperance activity. The leading journals and magazines of England have been moved to give space for reports and arguments generally favorable to our principles. Churches, Chapels and Cathedrals, have echoed the brave words of Temperance Reforms. Bishops, Judges and Magistrates in both Hemispheres and in greatly increased numbers, have accepted our platform as sound and salutary. Ministerial and Medical Conferences have given decided opinions on the propriety of total abstinence, and the necessity for Prohibition. Without detracting from the value of other Temperance Institutions, we are pursuaded that the rapidly aggressive

movements of Good Templarism have been a prominent cause of revival in the great modern reformation, and stimulated older societies to greater zeal and enterprise. Jealousies and enmittes may have cropped out here and there, but the general and aggregate results have been decidedly gainful, and should occasion the deepest emotions of gratitude to the great Father and Friend of human kind, upon whom we must always feel our dependence for every good and perfect work.

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Amidst all our successful efforts, we have been frequently reminded of the increasing vigilance of our adversaries. They have been alarmed, for their craft is endangered. Revelling in the luxury of gains wrung from the blood and tears of hecatombs of the slain and myriads of living sufferers, they rebel against restrictive or prohibitive legislation. They humbly give you leave to use moral sussion, if only they retain their legalized privilege of sale. They know the evil proclivities of human nature and baffle the best efforts of Templars, while they legally expose the temptation to drink their accursed liquors. Thousands have fallen victims to their treacherous snares, and our wish is spoiled by the power of the law, which ought to be on the side of justice and humanity. The dreadful enormity of deriving vast sums of National and Municipal revenues from the liquor traffic is perpetuated. The insane and suicidal policy finds its advocates in the halls of legislation, while murder and crime, ruined homes and lacerated hearts cry aloud against the atrocious wrong. Great Britain and America, the two christian nations most distinguished as accelerating the colonization and civilization of the world; by their commerce in strong drink have most inconsistently contributed to the corruption of christianity and to the decimation of mankind. The islands of the sea-the great antipodal continent-the Asiatic and African sufferers through the traffic in strong drink are unitedly protesting against this modern mystery of iniquity.

REPORT OF THE

# Chief Supt. of Juvenile Templars.

WORTHY OFFICERS AND MEMBERS. -

Dear Brothers and Sisters.—In submitting to you my report as Chief Superintendent of Juvenile Templars, I shall give you, as briefly as may be, a summary of work done and expenses incurred.

Having adopted a new ritual and constitution, the R. W. G. L. placed the business of publishing the same in my hands, and by virtue of my office, the arduous task of securing its adoption by the different Grand Lodges became mine also. With a view to effect this object I immediately prepared a circular explaining, as far as might be, the work, and urging its importance and the necessity for immediate action. This circular, accompanied by a personal letter, was sent every G. W. C. T. and G. W. S. in the jurisdiction of the Order.

These necessary explanations regarding the new work entailed a large

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amount of personal correspondence in addition to the printed circulars. As a result partially of this labor, but more especially, I believe, because the times were ripe and auspicious for the movement, I am happy to-day to report that the new ritual has been adopted by the following Grand Lodges: Maine, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Delaware, Maryland, Ohio, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Colorado, Nebraska, Montana, Washington Territory, Texas, Kentucky, Alabama, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Missouri, Iowa, S. C., P. E. Island, Canada, New Brunswick, Bermuda, Wales, Nova Scotia, North and South New Zealand, North and South Australia, North and South Tasmania, and South Africa. These Grand Lodges have in accordance with this ritual elected their General Superintendent, secured supplies, and in many instances have made commendable progress in the work of organizing.

It is proper to state here that England and Scotland have not yet adopted the Ritual. I should acknowledge this fact with much deeper regret, did I not cherish a hope amounting almost to certainty that such legislative action will be taken at this session as shall harmonize the difficulties which have hitherto prevented its adoption. The importance of a uniform work and combined effort in this great reform cannot be over-estimated. The noble example England has given us, in the energy and enthusam with which she has pushed this work, and her grand achievements, must inspire us with ardent admiration, and an earnest desire to extend the same zeal over the entire world.

The leaders in England, while sincerely desiring uniformity of work, I believe are actuated only by the highest motives of regard for the interest of the cause in their own land in withholding its adoption. I trust such concessions may be made at this session as shall result in establishing a uniform work for the children throughout the world.

As in the history of all pioneer work, unavoidable delays have occurred. The printing of supplies, together with the stereotyping of the same, delayed the work so that but few supplies were sold before August 1st. The pictures that were to accompany the ritual, while they were to be similar to those used with the former ritual of Cold Water Temp-

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delays have otyping of the before August le they were Water Templars, were to be lithographed, and to our worthy and esteemed Brother Malins was given the supervision of this work, which was to be done in England. To Bro. Malins and myself were given the preparations of the new charter. The necessary labor on the pictures has delayed them up to the present time. Early in February I received information from Brother Malins to the effect that the charters were shipped to my address in the early part of January. Up to the present time I have heard nothing from them, though I have corresponded with agents at the several ports of New York. Their continued delay leads me to fear that they have been lost. In sending out supplies without the pictures and charters, I have instructed General Superintendents to push the work with such material as was at hand, saying that charters and pictures could be farnished at a future day. With commendable zeal Superintendents have entered upon the work, notwithstanding these discouraging circumstances. I had promised pictures and charters at an early day, fully expecting to be able to redeem my promise. The continued delay has nearly exhausted the kind forbearance of those who realize the importance of these supplies, and earnest petitions are coming up from all over the land "that charters and engravings be sent at once." The delay has been very discouraging and disheartening to myself. Here before us lies a large field white for the harvest, and such a glorious grain stands waiting to be garnered! the reapers, too, are here, eager and impatient to engage in the work,-but the sickles are not at hand, and lo! while we tarry the harvest is wasting, and energy baffled is being destroyed. I can censure no one for the delay. It has simply been unavoidable; yet the results are none the less deplorable. I have reason to hope that this great need will soon be supplied. Through the kindness of Brother Malins I have seen a rough proof of one of the series of pictures, and believe the Order will be pleased with them, and that they will subserve a useful purpose in impressing the beautiful lessons taught in our Temples.

In securing the manufacture of the medal adopted for this Order at our last session, I took especial pains to ascertain from different manufacturers the cost of its preparation, with a view to economy, and learned that the work could be done for a much less sum in England

than in this country. Laying this fact before the Executive Committee of this body, I was instructed by them to procure the medals from England, through Brother Malins, which I did. We now have a supply of medals beautiful in design and finish, and perfectly adapted to our Order.

In the printing of supplies I have carefully avoided all unnecessary expenses, and only published those for which there was a known demand. With all the abovementioned delays and discouragements, and the trials incident to the introduction of a new work, I take pleasure to-day in referring you to the table showing the expenses of the office and the receipts for sale of supplies.

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Looking at these facts and figures, it is easy to predict that with all needed supplies on hand, and the Order now thoroughly established, this work would not only sustain itself, but would furnish a revenue for the R. W. G. L.

Desiring to ascertain as nearly as possible the actual membership of the order, I prepared blanks for reporting the number of temples and the membership, and forwarded to each General Superintendent throughout the jurisdiction. Up to the present time I have failed to receive the reports necessary to enable me to give an accurate account of the membership. In many States, and indeed in nearly all, the work has but just commenced; but few received the necessary supplies to begin the work until late in the fall, and the long and extremely severe winter that followed has rendered advancement well nigh impossible. Now, as spring opens, most encouraging words come to me, words of earnest determination and enthusiasm, telling of resolves for an earnest battle.

#### SUPPLIES FOR FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Through the advice of those experienced, I have authorized Brother Hastings, who is now in Australia, to make such arrangements with the agent of the R. W. G. L. for those provinces to print the supplies, under the same restrictions as he is to perform other printing for this grand body.

From the provinces of Australia, Tasmania and New Zealand, we have most encouraging accounts. I am satisfied that our Worthy Brother Hastings will do much to increase their zeal in good works, and

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ealand, we ar Worthy works, and will much advance the cause of the juveniles. From South Africa, also, we have words of cheer, and the assurance that this Order meets a great need of that country.

There is something inspiring in the thought that the children of the entire world are bound as one with the beautiful chain of Truth, Love and Purity. That the isles of the sea are ringing with the same beautiful songs that fill our own hearts with high hopes and firm resolves, and that each and all is tending to lead the little ones for whom Christ died, home to the Father's house.

In taking a restrospective view of the labors of the past year, we are led to declare that the work just commenced has a grand future awaiting it. The Order is only just awakening to a realizing sense of the necessity of caring for the little ones, if they would accomplish the grand object of their mission and secure in the time to come the entire prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating drinks.

The labor devolving upon the C. S. J. T. for the past year has been arduous and the anxiety great. It is no easy matter "to bring order out of chaos," and at times the heart has almost failed and the hands dropped listlessly at the side; but God has not long left us in despondency, but has sent some messenger of good just at the moment when needed, and we have cheerfully taken again the burden, and gone prayerfully on our way, assured that though the night was dark we should have a glorious to-morrow, for, as the poet says,

"And who that leans on His right arm
Was ever yet forsaken?
What righteous cause can suffer harm
If He its part has taken?
Though wild and loud
And dark the cloud,
Behind its folds,
His hand upholds
The calm sky of to-morrow."

Our cause is surely that of our Father, and if we are faithful to this sacred trust we may expect that in the to-morrow the reward of our labor shall be given us by one whose promise never fails.

#### LITERATURE.

I cannot close my report without referring to what I consider an immediate need of the order of Juvenile Templars, and that is an organ especially devoted to the little ones, an organ having its head near the C. S. J. T., reaching into all parts of the world, entering every Temple, and binding in one great whole the army of youthful abstainers. The children engaged in this great work deserve a literature all their own, adapted to their order, and under their supervision and control. So, also, each Temple may have and should have a temperance library, and I would urge all interested in this movement to make in the organization of every Temple the securing of a library an object toward which every exertion should bend. In the prosecution of our glorious warfare we cannot afford to dispense with an agency fraught with so great and lasting good as a sound temperance literature for the young and tender minds.

Our Order should also have its own hymn and song book, one containing the odes set to music, also other choice pieces adapted to the work and the children. Singing should be a prominent feature of our Order, and in this, as in a temperance literature I would have something that should be in a peculiar sense the property of this Order, kept if you please with the supplies, and sent out as a part of the necessary work.

#### DECISIONS.

There have been questions presented to me for decision, some of which I deem of sufficient importance to come before this body:

1st. Who shall have the right to visit the Temples? Ans. The Executive Committee and Superintendent shall decide upon the admission of all visitors, the private work not to be exemplified during the presence of those not members.

2d. Is a Grand Lodge Officer entitled to visit a Temple by virtue of his office? Aus. No.

3d. Can a person who is profane or a user of tobacco institute a Temple? Ans. He cannot unless he take the pledge of the J. T.

To all with whom I have held official relations I am indebted for kindness and for generous forbearance. I return to each and all, my sincere thanks and shall ever cherish them in grateful remembrance. For myself I ask that Christian Charity that discovers in all mistakes and shortcomings "the error in the head and not in the heart," and beg to assure you that while I have felt my inability for the great trust given me, yet I have earnestly and prayerfully, trusting only in the Arm that never fails, "done what I could."

Resolved, That a Memorial page be set apart in the minutes of the current Session, and dedicated to the memory of the deceased; said memorial setting forth his career as an advocate for the overthrow of the rum power, and of the cause of reform for the sake of a common humanity everywhere.

Resolved, That the example of the deceased, in a long life devoted to enhancing the public weal, by laboring for the removal of vice, in whatever form, is worthy of imitation by every Good Templar in the jurisdiction of this world wide institution.

Resolved, That this Right Worthy Grand Lodge offers the united and hearty expression of its sympathy to Mrs. Van Doern, her children, and the many dear friends of the family, in this time of deep affiction, accompanied by the sincere prayer that the Father of mercies will be to the widow and her children an ever present help, a friend and comforter.

Resolved, That the Right Worthy Grand Secretary furnish a copy of these resolutions to Mrs. Van Doorn, that he insert them in the minutes of the current session, and furnish the same to the press for general publication.

The preamble and resolutions were adopted by a rising vote of all the members of the R. W. G. Lodge.

The report of the Committee on Memorials was presented by Rep. Underwood, and adopt d by a vote of 66 yeas to 28 nays on call of the roll.

The following is the report:

Your Committee to whom were referred the several Memorials relating to the establishment of Grand and Subordinate Lodges within jurisdictions already organized, would respectfully recommend as a final settlement of the questions and difficulties involved, the adoption of the amendment of the R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, at the bottom of page

112, of the "Twentieth Annual Session of the R. W. G. Lodge, held at Boston, Mass., U. S. A., 1874." which reads as follows and should be inserted after the first sentence of Art. 1, Sec. 8, of the R. W. G. Lodge Constitution: "Except the assent obtained or upon petition of any Grand Lodges, Charters for one or more Grand Lodges, or for one or more Subordinate Lodges, under the immediate jurisdiction of the R. W. G. Lodge may be granted, covering a part or the whole of the territory embraced by the Charter of such existing Grand Lodges."

Rep. Gladstone presented report of Committee on South Africa, as follows, and it was adopted:

From papers submitted, your Committee learn that a Grand Lodge Charter was granted under designation, for South Africa. Really the Charter was only for Cape Colony, other parts of South Africa being covered by other Charters.

The distances between the Subordinate Lodges in Cape Colony are very great. Those in the Western Province of Cape Colony, allege, first, "That they were not parties to the formation of the Grand Lodge of Cape Colony," and second, "That on account of the place chosen for formation of said Grand Lodge, they were practically shut out of representation." Your Committee whilst sympathizing with the difficulties under which those in the Western Province labor, cannot sympathize with their refusal to recognize the Grand Lodge formed under the Charter granted. The case is plain, those in Cape Colony must be regarded as under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Cape Colony, and cannot be regarded as a part of our Order, save as they recognize the authority of the Cape Colony Grand Lodge.

Your Committee trust that the Brethren in the Western Province of Cape Colony will see the propriety of heartily aiding our work in South Africa, and in seeking redress of grievances only in the legitimate method appointed by our Order.

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Province of ork in South nate method Your Committee recommend that the name of the Grand Lodge Charter of "South Africa," should be altered to "Grand Lodge of Cape Colony."

To the Officers and Members of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge:

Your Committee on Juvenile Templars, having learned through our R. W. G. Counsellor, Joseph Malins, that at a meeting of the United 1388

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Executives of Great Britain and Ireland, that a revised Juvenile Ritual prepared by Bro's. Dr. Lees, Revd. J. Yearns, and Revd. J. Compston, was submitted and referred to a Juvenile Ritual Committee, a draft of which was prepared for the purpose of presenting it to this body for action, but through circumstances unknown to the R. W. G. Counsellor, has not been received, and believing that in a matter of such vast importance, as this Juvenile work is, and that its success to a very great extent, depends upon its being universally adopted by the Grand Lodges, would therefore recommend the adoption of the following Resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee of five of whom the Chief Superintendent shall be one, shall be appointed by the R. W. G. Lodge, who shall be authorized to revise the Ritual and Constitution of the Juvenila Templars as soon as possible and publish the same for distribution, in order to secure the approval of all the Grand Lodges of this Order, their action being subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Your Committee would further report that in view of the arduous and efficient labors of our Chief Superintendent the past year, the following Resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this body are hereby tendered to our Chief Superintendent, Sister O'Donnell, for her energetic and successful efforts in behalf of the Juvenile Templars.

Report adopted. (See Appendix A. B. C. D. E. F. G. and H.

The Report of the Committee on the State of the Order, was presented by the Revd. P. M. Weddell, of Ohio, and referred back to the Committee.

The invitation to ride through Bloomington, and environs, from the Mayor of that City, being accepted, it was ordered that on Friday, May 28th, 1875, at 4.30, p. m., be the time appointed for the same.

The motion to amend the R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, Art. I, Section 6 and 7, by striking out the words "domestic and foreign," from each section, was, upon the call of the roll, passed by an unanimous vote.

The proposed change in Sec. I, of Art. 3, R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, was amended by a Resolution to add to the end of the Section, "The above officers, together with the Junior Past R. W. G. T. shall constitute the Executive Committee."

On the call of the roll it was adopted. Yeas, 90, Nays, 1.

The Motion to amend the R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, Art. 14, by striking out the word "May," and inserting the word "August," was on call of the Röll, laid on the table by unanimous vote.

# THIRD DAY.

AFTERNOON SESSION, BLOOMINGTON, ILL., May 27, 1875.

The R. W. G. Lodge was called to order at 2 p. m., by J. J. Hickman, R. W. G. T., and opened in due form.

Minutes of the preceding session read and approved.

The resolution of Bro. Van Cott to change terms of Ritual in certain cases, was referred to the Committee on Ceremonies.

Propositions to insert, in R. W. G. Lodge edition of the Sub. Lodge Constitution, at the head of Art. 8, the following note, was taken up and vote by call of roll taken. Each Grand Lodge is at liberty to substitute its own regulations for this article, and in doing so, should insert, at the head of such note, the following:

"The R. W. G. Lodge having at its session of 1872, relegated to each "Grand Lodge the supreme power to legislate upon conferring Degrees —provided the Ritual and nuwritten work be kept intact—this Grand "Lodge is permitted to substitute the following regulations (confirmed by the R. W. G. T.) as the law in this jurisdiction, in place of the rules and regulations of Subordinate Lodges working under the im-

"mediate jurisdiction of the R. W. G. L."
Unanimously adopted—92 votes.

The proposition to amend the R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, Art. 17, by striking out the present article and inserting the following, was taken up:

SEC. 1. The compensation for the services of the R. W. G. T. and R. W. G. S. shall be determined at the Annual Sessions.

SEC. 2. The expenses of the R. W. G. L. Executive Committee, in attending Executive and R. W. G. L. sessions, shall be defrayed from the treasury.

SEC. 3. The appropriations for mileage expenses of Representatives shall be made by vote of this R. W. G. L. The amount to Representatives of any Grand Lodge not to exceed the year's tax paid by such Grand Lodge. In the event of the above being adopted, we move to strike out, as unnecessary, the last sentence in R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, Art. 7, commencing "He shall receive."

On call of the roll the above was adopted. Yeas 83. Nays 1.

The proposition to amend R. W. G. L. By-Laws, Art. 18, Sec. 2, so as to recognize a distinctive Regalia for District or County Lodges was laid over until next session.

Rep. Buck was excused from further attendance at the present session.

Rep. Scott, from the Committee on Mileage made the following report and it was adopted:

The Finance Committee through Rep. Kandouse, of Wisconsin, presented a report, which was considered *seriatim*, and adopted, except that portion referring to Clearance Cards, which was referred back to the Committee.

To the Officers and Members of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge:

BROTHERS AND SISTERS,-

Your Finance Committee have carefully considered and examined the Reports, Books and Papers referred to them and fraternally submit their Report as follows:—

1st.—In regard to that portion of the Report of our Right Worthy Grand Templar, relating to the erection of a Centennial Fountain at Philadelphia, we are of the opinion that the recommendation of our R. W. G. Templar, was made in view of the probability that this body would hold its next annual session in the Great City of Philadelphia. That our decission in favor of the City of Louisville as the place of the next session, greatly lessens the appropriateness and desirability of the erection of the Fountain. We also think that the missionary spirit pervading the able report of our R. W. G. T. should arouse in our hearts, an earnest desire to do more for the waste places of our broad

field of labor. That the solicitation of funds among the Subordinate Lodges necessary to erect the fountain, would tend to decrease largely their contributions for nunecessary purposes. In view for the above and other reasons which might be urged, and which from the nature of our Body will be apparent to all, we respectfully recommend that the project for the erection of the Centennial Fountain be abandoned.

#### MISSIONARY FUND.

Your committee feel the necessity for an increase of the funds at the disposal of our Executive Committee for missionary purposes. In order to secure contributions to a fand for this purpose, we recommend that our Subordinate Lodges in the several Grand Lodge jurisdictions, be earnestly solicited, through the several G. W. C. Ts. and G. W. Secretaries, to set apart one or more evenings of the current year for the holding of a public Missionary Concert or Meeting, the object of which meeting shall be to raise money for our Missionary Fund. Our efficient R. W. G. Secretary, for the purpose of furnishing leverage upon the pockets of our membership and the people, to furnish each Grand Lodge a summary of our past, present and prospective missionary enterprises; the details for transmission of these amounts, collected at Missionary meetings to our R. W. G. Treasurer, to be arranged by the Executives of the several Grand Lodges.

### AGENCIES OF R. W. G. SECRETARY.

The system of Agencies established for the sale of supplies in distant jurisdictions is, in the opinion of your Committee a wise business plan.

We recommend that these agents be allowed a commission of ten per cent on trade done; that should an agent resign, he shall have a commission of five per cent on collections, on sales made by him prior to his resignation; that the agent shall receive five per cent on R. W. G. Lodge tax collected by him.

We recommend that the above terms be retro-active in favor of agents employed during the past or a portion of the past year.

These agents are securely bound unto our R. W. G. Secretary, in sums sufficient to secure this R. W. G. Lodge, or its officers, against loss which we recommend should be a pre-requisite to the acceptance of an agent.

#### JAY COOK & CO., BANKRUPTS.

The sum of Five Hundred and Twenty-three Dollars, (\$523,00) in the hands of this bankrupt concern, is subject to slight reduction by dividends, to be paid in various stocks, at present nearly as worthless as the Certificate of Deposit with the bankrupt firm.

We recommend that our R. W. G. Templar be given full power to

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act in this matter in connection with the advice of the Executive Committee.

#### BOOKS OF R. W. G. S.

We have carefully examined the books and accounts of our R. W. G. S. so far as time would permit, and find that they exhibit the business transactions of this officer in a satisfactory manner: that they agree with the report submitted to this body by the R. W. G. S. We find a balance of funds of this body in the hands of R. W. G. S. amounting to \$1235 55; a cash balance to the credit of our late lamented R. W. G. T. Bro. J. K. Van Doorn, in Bank of Quincy of \$2948 21, making total cash balance on hand of \$4184 06.

We also find that the books of our late R. W. G. T. are in accord with those of our R. W. G. Secretary.

The time allotted the Finance Committee for the examination of the books of the R. W. G. S. and R. W. G. T. being insufficient for a thorough discharge of the important duty, we recommend that after the election of Representatives for the next session of this body that the R. W. G. Templar appoint two of them auditors, who shall be practical for the next session, and that said auditors be required to meet in the city where the session is to be held, at least two days before the session. That R. W. G. S. and R. W. G. Treas. be required to have their books before the auditors at that time for examination, and that said auditors be allowed \$5.00 each per day for the days so employed, and that this policy shall be, and is hereby constituted a permanent rule of this body.

### C. S. OF J. T.

We find the affairs of this office to have been wisely administered under the hands of Sister M. B. O'Donnell. We recommend the continuance, in all respects, of the management of the department of Juvenile Templars, and the salary of the General Superintendent.

#### SALARIES OF OFFICERS.

We recommend that the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500) be appropriated to our R. W. G. T. in payment for his services as R. W. G. Templar for the past year. We recommend that the salary of the R. W. G. Secretary be fixed at fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500) for the ensuing year, and that an additional sum of three hundred dollars (\$900) be appropriated to the R. W. G. Secretary for clerk for him for the ensuing year.

Request of Executive of Grand Lodges of Great Britain and Ireland for reduction of price of Clearance Cards.

In view of the fact that the only source of revenue to this body is from

the sale of supplies, we recommend that the price list for supplies remain the same for the ensuing as for the past year.

### ARREARAGES OF GRAND LODGES.

It seems to your Committee that some plan should be adopted whereby the settlement of accounts, between the R. W. and the several Grand Lodges, should be compelled at least once a year.

The announcement that G.L's. are in debt to this body in sums aggregating \$10,000 is startling, in view of the necessity tor funds for current use, made prominent in the reports of the officers of this body.

We recommend that G. L's. whose accounts have run over six months and are not properly adjusted at the time of our annual meeting, shall not be allowed representation in this R. W. G. L.

We advise an appropriation of \$12.00 for services as Messenger, Assistant Secretaries, \$40.00

Rep. Malins moved, That the Executive Committee be authorized to consider the expediency of reducing the price of Clearance Cards, with power to act. Carried.

The report as a whole was then adopted.

Reps. Gibson and Tyler were excused from further attendance during the present session.

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Invitation was received, through Prof. Jaques, to visit the Wesleyan University of Bloomington, which was accepted.

W. G. Lodge, the cause of the same with a view to providing a remedy. Carried.

Rep. Evans, of Maryland, moved and it was *Resolved*, That the hour of 10, a. m., to-morrow, be set for the exemplification of the unwritten work of our Order and open in Grand Lodge Degree.

Rep. Monroe of Maryland, presented the Report of the Committee on the State of the Order, which was read and adopted as follows:

Your Committee upon the State of the Order, to whom was referred that part of the Report of the R. W. G. Templar, relating to the extension of the Order, and also other matters, beg leave to report That we have carefully considered all that has come before us and are convinced that this Grand Body has great reason to rejeice and to give thanks to Almighty God, for the wonderful success He has vouchsafed us in almost every part of our world wide field during the year that has just closed. The statistics which have been read in your hearing, show that nine Grand Lodges have been formed and about seventy thousand recruits added to our Grand army.

For the future, we have nothing to recommend, other than the faithful prosecution of the policy, which has governed the administration of our affairs in the past under the direction of our able executive officers. Let us all earnestly sustain them in the discharge of their duties and the success of the past will prove but the prelude to the greater and grander victories in the future.

With reference to Countries in which we have no Grand Lodges, but from which Subordinate Lodges were reported last year your Committee observe that the Order holds on its way in each of them except in Portugal. The Lodge in that country has ceased working, but the Grand Lodge of England expects shortly to resuscitate it.

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dges, but ommittee t in Porhe Grand We have pleasure in calling attention to the fact that the Island of Ceylon, in the Indian Ocean; the Presidency of Madras in Hindcostan; British Honduras in Central America; and British Guiana in South America, have been occupied during the year, and our Order successfully planted in these countries under commission from the G. W. C. Templar of England. During the same period the Order has also been planted in the Islands of St. Christopher, Harbour Island and Jamaica by and under direction of Bro. Hannan of H. M. Ship. "Aboukir," under commission granted by the R. W. G. Templar.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE R. W. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HELD AT CHICAGO, ILL., OCT. 1978, 1874.

BLOOMINGTON, ILL., May 27th, 1875.

The meeting convened at Brigg's Hotel, at 9 a. m., Right Worthy Templar, J. J. Hickman, presiding, with the full committee present, except R. W. Counsellor J. Malins.

The following motions were entertained and passed :-

1. That the R. W. G. Secretary shall urge the Grand Lodges which are indebted to the R. W. G. Lodge to an early payment of the claims.

 That Sister O'Donnell be instructed to purchase 500 medals from the Grand Lodge of England for the Juvenile Temples, which have been procured.

8. That forty sets of Juvenile Temple supplies be placed in the hands

of the R. W. G. Templar, to be used at his discretion for the good of the

- 4. That we contribute \$100 towards the publication of 100 sets of Ritual Service, I. O. G. T., in the Scandinavian language, provided the friends of the cause in New York contribute the balance necessary, as a tribute of reform amongst their brethren of that language. The provisions have been met, the work published, and the supplies are now in the hands of the R. W. G. Secretary.
- 5. That the R. W. G. Secretary be instructed to purchase 2000 copies of Membership Certificates from the G. W. Secretary of England. These Certificates are in the hands of the Secretary, and the Grand Lodges are arged to introduce them in their jurisdictions.
- 6. That R. W. G. Templar Hickman and R. W. G. Counsellor Malins be instructed to prepare an appendix to the pamphlet form of R. W. G. Lodge Constitution, ordered by the Boston Session. (Page 109 of Journal.) That this appendix shall embrace all the decisions now in force, passed by the R. W. G. L. or R. W. G. Templar, endorsed by the R. W. G. Lodge. The Constitution has been corrected, (verbally,) edited and indexed, and will soon be ready to be issued by the R. W. G. Secretary.
- 7. With reference to the resolution, passed over to the hands of the Executive Committee by the R. W. G. Lodge Session amboston, respecting the desired visit of the Hon. S. D. Hastings to Austrália, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, from repeated communications from the Grand Lodge officers and members in Australia, New Zealand and Tasmania, it is apparent to this Committee that the good of the Order in that locality imperatively demands that some competent person should visit them as soon as the funds of the R. W. G. Lodge will justify an appropriation in part for that object, and

Whereas the members in several of these localities have pledged themselves to defray the expenses of some one delegated to visit them, both while there and going and returning, therefore it is

Resolved, That we invite the Hon. S. D. Hastings to fill the mission desired, and that we appropriate the sum of \$750 for that effect, as soon as in the judgment of the R. W. G. Templar and R. W. G. Secretary, the funds of the R. W. G. Lodge will justify such expenditure.

Upon the authority of this resolution, the R. W. Templar engaged Brother Hastings, on the conditions that he should collect of moneys due to the R. W. G. Lodge from the Grand Lodges, and of Australia, to the amount of \$400, and the balance, \$350, was advanced by the R. W. G. Treasurer, and charged to the account of R. W. G. Templar Hick-

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of moneys ustralia, to the R. W. man personally. In evidence of the good results of this action, we extract the following from a letter from the Grand Lodge of Victoria:

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER;—"The Executive Council of this Grand Lodge desires to express its deep appreciation of the interest taken by yourself and colleagues in the welfare of this and the sister Grand Lodges, as evidenced in the visit of our Bro., the Hon. S. D. Hastings, P. R. W. G. T.

"The order here has already experienced much benefit from the kindly advice to Lodges, public addresses and charges to the members of the Grand Lodge.

"Respected previously, from report of his valued services to the Order, he is now loved and honored from personal acquaintance and a more full realization of his power and worth.

"Our people seem to have failed to grasp the full object of the Order, and, but for the timely visit, the organization was in danger of being perverted. We do not seem to have realized the need of prohibition, have been and probably would have continued in vain attempts to limit the traffic, and work on by moral suasion. From this we have been aroused, the full note of "Prohibition" has been boldly sounded, as it never has been here before. As stated, we have already been roused, but there is danger, if now left to ourselves, we shall fall back. To make the benefit of Bro. Hastings' visit more permanent it is the intention of the Executive, on the direction of the Grand Lodge session, to try to enter into an arrangement with Bro. Hastings to stay with us for a few months, after he has concluded his tour to the other colonies.

8. The prize G. L. Ritual, referred to us by the Boston Session, has been revised and approved and is in press. We recommend that upon their being issued at \$1.00 per copy to the Grand Lodges, each order shall be respected only when the order shall be accompanied by the

return of the old Ritual Service of such Grand Lodge to the R. W. G Secretary.

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A resolution was offered to provide Charters for County and District Lodges, that may be granted by the several Grand Lodges, under the jurisdiction of the R. W. G. Lodge. Lost.

The Committee appointed by this R. W. Grand Lodge, to arrange with the local committee a meeting for Wednesday evening last, to be addressed by Dr. Lees of England, beg leave to report, That such meeting was held, and that annexed hereto are the bills for the expenses of said meeting, amounting in all to the sum of \$19.25.

The Committee beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of this R. W. G. Lodge are eminently due, and are hereby cordially tendered to Dr. Lees, of England, for the very able and instructive address delivered by him on Wednesday evening, at the request of this Lodge, and we most earnestly commend him and his writings, to the friends of the Temperance Reform throughout the world, and that he furnish a copy of the lecture to the Executive Council for publication.

To amend R. W. G. L. Constitution, Art. XIV, Sec. 3, so that the per capita tax shall be paid Quarterly in advance, and to amend Art. XV, Sec. 3, by striking out the word "second" and inserting "third," in second line.

Rep. Thompson moved to postpone the consideration of the proposition for biennial sessions indefinitely. Carried.

The R. W. G. Templar appointed, as a Committee on Juvenile Templars, Sister O'Donnell, Bro. Malins, Sister Weichman, Bro. Wood and Bro. Foster.

The R. W. G. Templar appointed the following delegates to the National Convention, at Chicago:—Bros. Dr. Lees and Patton, Sisters Parker. of Scotland; M. McL. Brown, of Ohio; and Groff, of Pennsylvania

The petition of J. G. Thrower, G. W. C. T., of Georgia, presented by Committee on Memorials, to whom it was referred, recommend,

That it be returned with the statement that the same has been respectfully considered, but that the matters therein contained are not within the jurisdiction of this R. W. G. Lodge.

Adopted.

The following amendments were taken up and deposed of as follows:

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To strike out the word "Independent" wherever it occurs in the designation of the Order, and substituting therefor the word "International."

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To amend R. W. G. L. Constitution, Art. 14, Sec. 13, so that the percapita tax shall be paid quarterly in advance, and to amend Art. 15, Sec. 3, by striking out the word "second" and inserting "third," in second line, and to amend Art. 15, Sec. 13, by striking out the word "Annual" and inserting "Biennial,"

Postponed.

To amend Grand Lodge Constitution, Art 1, Sec. 4, by striking out the last sentence commencing "alternate" and substituting the following:—"Representatives take precedence in the order in which they are nominated, unless there be a contest, when they rank in accordance with the number of votes they receive—the Representative receiving the highest number of votes standing first. Alternative Representatives may be chosen to the same number as Regular Representatives, and in case of a vacancy by the absence of any of the Regular Representatives, the first Alternate present shall be entitled to the seat."

Referred to committee.

To amend G. L. Constitution, Art. 1, Sec. 5, by striking out the words to "Grand Lodge is held," inclusive, and substituting the following:—
"The regular election of representatives shall take place within three calendar months of the time fixed for holding the Annual Session. In the absence of any special regulations made by the Grand Lodge, the election shall take place on the first session of the official quarter in which the Grand Lodge meets. Written ballots, &c.

Adopted. Yeas, 64; nays, 1.

Or petition of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, and recommended by the Committee on Constitutions to lay over one year, the following:—

Resolved, That all part of Sec. 2, Art. 3, of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, beginning with the words "each officer shall be followed by the election of the same before the nomination of the next," and insert in lieu thereof the words, "Officers shall be followed by the election of the same."

Section 2 will then read as follows:—The regular election of Grand Officers shall be by ballot, on the second day of each Annual Session. The nomination of officers shall be followed by the election of the same, and a majority of all, &c., &c.

Indefinitely postponed.

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of Grand Session. the same, To insert in the 4th Article of Grand Lodge Constitution, after the words "and place in the hands of the Grand Treasurer," "and shall within five weeks from the end of each quarter, report the financial relation of each Subordinate Lodge to the Grand Lodge; reporting the amount of tax paid by each Lodge at the same time; and should the Secretary fail to report in accordance with the requirements of this Section, the G. W. C. Templar shall immediately suspend the G. W. Sec. and report to the Executive Committee for their action."

# Indefinitely postponed:

To amend the G. Lodge Constitution Art III, Sec. 1, by striking out the word "five" substituting the word "seven," to strike out the words "the sixth and seventh appointed by the Grand Worthy Chief Templar elect," and to insert after the words "the eighth and ninth," the word "appointed." The sentence will then commence thus:

"The first seven shall be elected by the Lodge, the eighth and ninth appointed by the Grand Worthy Vice Templar."

Gladstone's amendment adopted.

The following substitute was approved :-

"That Grand Lodges may, by majority vote, increase their G. L. Executive by the addition of the General Superintendent of Juvenile Lodges or Temples, the Grand Chaplain and Grand Marshal, or either of them, and in the event of their so resolving, the Grand Chaplain and Grand Marshal shall be etected officers. Art III, Sec. 1, and Art. IV, Sec. 9, of G. L. Constitution being verbally altered accordingly."

Rep. Kanouse moved, That the Executive Committee be recommended to engage Dr. F. R. Lees to lecture during his stay in the United States. Carried.

Rep. Wagner was excused from further attendance during the present session.

# FOURTH DAY

Evening Session, Bloomington Ill., May 28rh, 1875.

The R. W. G. Lodge was called to order by Bro. J. J. Hickman, R. W. G. Templar, and opened in due form.

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75. kman, The Minutes of the Afternoon Session were read and spproved.

Report of Committee on Appeals, was again taken up and discussed. It was finally adopted as tollows:

BLOOMINGTON, ILLINOIS, U.S.A., May 28th, 1875.

To the Officers and Members of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge:

Your Committee on Appeals to whom was referred sundry Appeals and Decisions, beg leave to Report as follows:

In the matter of Appeal of Joseph Brown, from the decision of the Grand Lodge of England, there are two points made, viz:—

First. The Lodge decided that a Worthy Chief Templar whose term of service has just expired, could be elected to another office.

Second. A Committee appointed to consider and Report upon certain matters and in their Report recommending that the matters or any of them, be laid upon the table.

The Motion to adopt such Report, or such paragraphs in the Report as relate to laying on the table.

The Motion to adopt such Report is not debatable.

The Committee recommend that the first decision of the Grand Lodge of England be sustained, that the second be not sustained.

a In the matter of appeal of William Monkhouse from the decision of the Grand Lodge in England.

The Grand Lodge decided that a motion prevailing to take a ballot vote on next place of meeting, deprived past representatives of a right to vote thereon.

Appeal on the ground that the decision is opposed to Art. 1, of Sec. 3 and 8 of Grand Lodge Constitution.

Appeal sustained.

In the appeal of Gen. Geo. P. Hawkes, G. W. C. T. of Mass., from the decision of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. Deciding that a member holding a clearance card can join a Lodge in another town, without the consent of the Lodge in the town in which he resides.

Appealed on the grounds

That it is in conflict with Art. 3, Sec. 1 and 5, of the Subordinate Corstitution of Massachusetts.

Appeal Sustained.

In the matter of appeal of Geo. H. Jackson from the decision of the Executive Committee of the Grand Lodge of Oregon.

This appeal is dismissed, for the reason that the appeal is not properly taken, and nothing to show what the facts are.

In the matter of appeal of Edward Hawley and John Edwards, from the decision of the Grand Lodge of Missouri, the appeal is dismissed for the following reasons: "Informality, and the appellants not having served upon the G. W. Secretary of Missouri, a copy of their grounds of appeal as required by the Rules of the R. W. G. Lodge."

In the case of appeal of James Massie, against the action of Revival Temple, No. 568, Canada, "Dismissed, not properly taken."

In the matter of appeal of Star of the Thames Lodge, No. 25, from the decision of John R. Nicholson, Dist. Dep. R. W. G. T. of New Zealand.

It appears that charges were brought against Thomas Campbell, for violation of Art II, in using brandy as a medicine without the prescription of a physician.

The Lodge sustained the charges, and ordered that the brother be reobligated. The brother appealed to the D. D. R. W. G. T., who reversed the decision of the Lodge, from which appeal is now made to the R. W. G. Lodge.

The appeal is sustained and the action of the Deputy is reversed.

In the appeal of Samuel Gould, from the action of the Ex. Committee, for failing to insert his name in a special commission as Deputy, to organize the Grand Lodge of New South Wales.

It appears that the R. W. G. Templar, gave instructions to the Executive Committee to insert the name of Samuel Gould in the Commission sent, unless for good and valid reasons, it should not be inserted.

The Committee did not insert the name but substituted another.

Whereupon the said Samuel Gould appealed to the R. W. G. Templar who sustained the Executive Committee.

The decision of the R. W. G. Templar is sustained by your Committee.

In the matter of appeal of J. M. Cunningham, from Grand Lodge of Scotland, in reference to action of said Grand Lodge in delegating power to the Executive Committee to elect Delegates to the R. W. Grand Lodge.

Dismissed for informality, but your Committee would recommend 1414

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that this Grand Body establishes as a fixed principle of law, that an Executive Committee of a Grand Lodge, may legally and constitutionally perform any duty delegated to it by its Grand Lodge.

In the matter of the appeal of Dr. Oronhyatekha, from the Grand Lodge of Canada. It appears that a member of Napanee Temple No. 540, sent in a written withdrawal from the Order. Under the By-laws of Canada, the withdrawal should remain over two weeks, under the uniform laws, one week. The W. C. Templar based his opinion upon decision of R. W. Templar Chase, and decided that it took immediate effect.

An appeal was taken up to John Ormiston, G. W. C. Templar of Canada, who reversed the decision of the W. C. Templar, and decided that it took effect after two weeks. At the Session of the Grand Lodge of Canada, the decision of the G. W. G. Templar was sustained, from which Brother Oronhyatekha appeals to the R. W. G. Lodge, on the grounds "That the laws of the R. W. G. Lodge are supreme; that whenever the laws of a Local Grand Lodge come in conflict with the laws of the R. W. G. Lodge, it is not only competent for the W. C. Templar of any Subordinate Lodge but his bounden duty to obey the laws of the R. W. G. Lodge, and under the laws of the R. W. G. Lodge, which apply to Canada, as found in Chase's Digest, a resignation from a Lodge takes immediate effect.

The decision of the Grand Lodge of Canada, is sustained and the appeal dismissed, for the reasons:—

First, The Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Canada, providing that notices of withdrawal must lay over two weeks, is not in conflict with the laws of the R. W. G. Lodge.

Second. It is not competent for the W. C. Templar of a Subordinate Lodge to set himself up as a Judge to decide what is and what is not in accord with the laws of the R. W. G. Lodge, where they appear to conflict with the decisions of their Grand Lodge, but should be governed by the decisions of the Grand Lodge.

Appeal No. 2 in R. W. G. Templar's report is replaced by the following:

Rep. Tim Needham offers the following:

Whereas our obligation is being too lightly regarded in many cases, and Whereas the decision of R. W. G. Templar Hickman and those of his predecessors, though consistent, seems to deal too lightly with such offenders, now therefore, be it Resolved, by this R. W. G. Lodge, that hereafter a violation of Art. II, Subordinate Lodge Constitution, confessed or proven, shall operate as a forfeiture of all honors and degrees previously acquired.

In the matter of an appeal of John Webster, from the decision of the

Grand Lodge of Washington Territory and British Columbia, made in reference to the following interrogatory formally submitted:

Question. Do the credentials of a Representative entitle him or her to the Grand Lodge Degree, unless they have passed the chair in a Subordinate Lodge.

Answer, They do.

Your Committee is of opinion the answer is in accordance with the uniform Constitution and is therefore sustained.

The decisions of the R. W. G. Templar referred to your Committee having been examined, we recommend with reference thereto, as follows: That decisions No's. 1, 2, and 3, be affirmed.

That decision No. 4, be amended by striking out the word "yes," at the commencement of the answer and add at the close the words "a Lodge Deputy can only make an official decision upon questions formally submitted to him."

That decision No. 5, be amended so as to read as follows: "A Lodge Deputy should obey the authority of the W. C. Templar, and a Lodge Deputy is as much under the authority of the Lodge and W. C. Templar as any other member.

That decisions No's. 6, 7, and 8, be affirmed.

That decision No. 9, be amended by striking out all after the word "ves."

'Answer to decision No. 6, in R. W. G. Templar's report amended to read as follows;

"If the application for withdrawal is not received prior to installation, the withdrawal could not be granted without the payment of dues of current quarter.

No. 9, in the question: Is the drinking of cider as a beverage a violation of our pledge?

Answer, Yes!

The Committee on Ceremonies presented their Report through Rep-1416 Tim N adopte

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Tim Needham. The Report was considered seriatim and finally adopted as follows:

Report of Committee on Ritual and Ceremonies,

To the Officers and Members of the R. W. Grand Lodge:

Your Committee on Ritual and Ceremony beg leave to report as follows:

I. We have carefully examined a manuscript "Ritual for the Right Worthy Grand Lodge," and take great pleasure in recommending its adoption and future use by this R. W. G. Lodge, provided, however, that the following changes in phraseology be made before its adoption:

1st. Change first paragraph of "Opening Ceremonies," to read "Worthy Associates, we are now about to open the Session of the Right Worthy Grand Lodge, if any present are not entitled to seats, or being entitled, have not yet taken the Right Worthy Grand Lodge Degree, they will please retire." (See page 2.)

2nd. Insert the word "Grand" after the word "Worthy," in the first line of the second paragraph, (same page,) and in every place in said Ritual where the same omission occurs in similar mention of any official titles.

3rd. Change the order of responses by the Officers in Opening Ceremony, by giving the P. R. W. G. Templar the place now assigned to the R. W. G. V. Templar, and vice versa, and change the then response of the R. W. G. V. Templar, to read as follows: "By building over them the superstructure of immutable justice," and also, change "Prayer and Praise," in R. W. G. Chaplain's response to "Faith and Prayer," (pages 4 and 5.)

4th. Strike out 3rd. line in third stauza of the opening ode, (page 6), and insert, "Resolved to know no Rivalry."

5th. Strike out the words "owe exalted," in second line of introduction of Candidates by the R. W. G. Marshal, and substitute the word "this."

6th. Insert just before "Prayer," on rage 15, the words \* R. W. G. Templar, the Chaptain will offer prayer."

7th. Change the response of P. R. W. G. Templar, (on page 16), to read as follows: "We aim to raise the fallon by social influences; we hope to save others from falling by moral forces, and we confidently expect to see the world redeemed from the curse of Intemperance, by the combined social, moral and political power of the friends of reform."

8th. Strike out the word "Exalted," in second line on page 17.

9th. Change charge of R. W. G. Templar, (on page 17), after second sentence to read as follows, "Legislators are to be taught that VIRTUE is both the basis and end of true freedom, and public sentiment is to be so revolutionized and social usages so regenerated as that the people will enforce reformatory legislation when enacted. To this end, let us labor, and for its speedy realization let us pray in the true spirit of our Motto, in Faith remembering that God will give victory."

10th. On page 27, third paragraph, second line, strike out "Ranks," and insert in lieu thereof "gift."

II. The attention of your Committee has been called to the fact that the Report of a similar Committee to our own, submitted at the last Session, and printed on pages 104 and 105, of Journal, was laid over, we therefore recommend that sections 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6, of said Committee's report be now adopted, and the consideration of the balance of report be indefinitely postponed.

The Committee on Rituals submitted the following as their report:

- 1. We recommend that Subordinate Lodge Rituals be amended by inserting, "Have you ever been a member of this Order?" as the first question to be asked the Candidates for initiation. (See Journal 1878, p. 45, Sec. 11.) See page 10 S. L. Ritual.
- That the opening ceremony be amended by adding to the instructions of the Marshal and Deputy the words; "They will also ascertain and report the names and lodges of unknown visitors present," (See Sub Lodge Ritual p 6.)
- 3. To amend Subordinate Lodge Ritual Opening Ceremony, by adding to the instructions on taking the Password, after the words, "all correct," the following: in the following form: "W. M. Worthy Chief Templar, all are correct on your left." "W. D. M., Worthy Chief Templar, all are correct on your right."

4. In place of Initiatory Ode commencing,
Hail! O Hail! all friends of right,

We recommend the following Ode to be substituted :

"Come, see where Temperance lifts
Her peaceful standard high,
And sheds abroad her gifts,
To thousands drawing nigh;
Hear the exulting throng
Who bursts the deadly chains,
They raise to God their song,
In sweet and graceful strains "

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dding cor-Chief Chief 6th. We recommend to amend Funeral Ceremony, p. 47, by striking out the words "the right," and "of each." The sentence will their read: "Around the grave, joining hands."

1st. Strike out of the obligation (page 14,) 4th line the word "not," and insert the word "never."

2nd. We recommend that the words "below the brute," in the W. V.  $T\epsilon$  mplar's charge, (page 20) be stricken out.

3rd. We cannot see any way out of the trouble complained of by the objectors to the phrase "God's only beverage," (page 25, bottom) except by a surrender of the scientific fact that "God never made alcohol," (which your committee will never consent to do) or else to so modify the phrase as to meet their objections and at the same time save the point in the expression. This we have found to be quite difficult, but appreciating the objection we submit the following change: "The only beverage God provides for man."

4th. We recommend the substitution of the following "Re-obligation Ceremony," for the one now in use, (page 44).

# RE-OBLIGATION CEREMONY.

To each applicant for Re-obligation in Subordinate Lodge, the Committee appointed by the W. C. Templar, shall put the following queries and report the answers to the Lodge:

1st. Have you violated your obligation?

2nd. Under what circumstances did such violation take place?

3rd. Do you regret having violated, and do you earnestly desire re-admission?

4. How often have you been re-obligated in this or in any other Lodge? Upon such report the Lodge shall proceed to ballot.

After the Committee has reported, and the Re-obligation been agreed to by a two-thirds ballot vote of the Lodge, the Candidate shall be introduced by the W. M.

- 4. Alternates will not be permitted to take seats as Representatives until after the second day of the Session, unless they present a Certificate signed by the regular Representative, or by the Grand Secretary, stating that said regular Representative will not be present to claim the seat during the Session.
- 5. An Alternate already seated as Representative, shall not be displaced by a Regular Representative arriving and presenting Credentials after the second day of the Session.
- 6. The places of Representatives absenting themselves during the Session of the R. W. G. Lodge, shall be filled only in case said Representative tender a written resignation to the R. W. G. Lodge, when the

Alternate regularly entitled to the seat, shall be admitted to membership.

We would further recommend that being governed by above report, the amendment to the proposed substitute for Art. X, Sec. 5, p. 111, be indefinitely postponed.

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# APPENDIX.

OFFICE OF THE R. W. G. COUNSELLOR,

BIRMINGHAM, ENGLAND, April 21st, 1875.

DEAR SIR AND BRO.—I have forwarded to Bro. Williams statistical information for his annual report, relating to the Foreign Lodges under my supervision, or instituted by English Deputies, and now have pleasure in sending you the following particulars for your information:

### EUROPE

France.—The two Lodges reported to last R. W. G. Lodge are still working against many difficulties, one having been helped by a visit from Bro Campbell, D. D. R. W. G. T., of East Kent, England.

PORTUGAL.—The Lodge at Portugal is not working, but I trust will be resuscitated shortly. The D. D. left the Order but has since rejoined one of our Naval Lodges stationed at Lisbon.

Belgium, Germany and Holland.—The Lodges in these Countries are, I believe, slowly working on, but I have no doubt you have received more definite information from them direct.

#### ASIA

India.—The Order in the Bengal Presidency was under the supervision of Bro. L. Hill, who planted the order there, but who has since had to resign the post of District Deputy. He deserves the hearty thanks of this R. W. G. L. for his efforts while in office. The Province is now being worked well by Bro. Rev. S. Knowles, your D. D. R. W. G. T., and indirectly I learn that there are thirteen Lodges under his supervision, and there is a want felt of a Grand Lodge. The No. 18 Lodge was instituted by Bro. W. Williams, Corporal 54th Regiment, who, upon his removal to India, I commissioned to act as Instituting Officer under the direction of the D. D. The Western side of India, the Bombay Presi-

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dency, is yet unworked, but I am daily expecting news from that quarter, having commissioned two brethren to open Lodges there.

SINCAPORE.—The Lodge at Singapore has been passing through difficulties, consequent upon differences arising out of the character of the entertainments conducted by the Lodge. I have given the members such advice, as, from the communications before me, I thought necessary. The Deputy and a number of others have withdrawn from the Order, but in spite of these drawbacks the Lodge is now making progress.

CHINA AND JAPAN.—I have received various letters of a cheering nature from Bros. Rev. J. S. Borrodale and E. S. Yeo, your District Deputies in these countries, but as you are in direct communication with these brethren, it is unnecessary for me to enlarge.

CEYLON.—This Island has been taken possession of by Sergeant W. Morrison, S. D. G. W. C. T., Army Hospital Corps, Colombo, he having instituted two Lodges there. Both of them under Bro. Morrisons' sup-activities are doing good work.

### AFRICA Covers tolerational and to occur

NATAL.—This Colony was placed under the supervision of the R. W. G. Lodge, and Bro. Ralph Stott commissioned as D. D. R. W. G. T.—The Lodges, however, objected to the transfer, as also did the D. D., who intimated his unwillingness to act as such if the transfer was made. Under these circumstances, I have given temporary instructions for them to continue under my supervision until they are prepared to form a Grand Lodge, which I trust they will shortly do. Two new Lodges have been gained since last session.

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West Indies.—The two Lodges at Barbadoes and Port of Spain are peaceable and progressive. Each of them now numbers considerably over a hundred members. The Deputy of the Trinidad Lodge, Bro. Stollenger is a gentleman of position and influence.

HONDURAS.—A Lodge has been opened under commission from myself at Belize, British Honduras, by the Rev. R. Fletcher, S. D. G. W. C. T., who recently left England, and the same brother contemplates shortly opening a Lodge amongst the Indians at Corosal.

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British Guiana.—I have commissioned an English Brother resident at Demerara, for work in British Guiana. He returned to England a short time since, when I gave him full instructions and a complete outfit for work. His stay here was but short, and on his return to Demerara, he at once commenced operations and has succeeded in opening two Lodges there. His name is Rev. W. Warder. I have frequent letters from him, all of which are of a hopeful and encouraging character, showing that there is a good field of labor and a rich harvest to be expected there.

ARGENTINE REPUBLIC.—I have just received a petition for Charter from Terro Carril, Central Argentine, Estacion de Rosario, and have commissioned Bro. I. Goodmary, late an English Deputy, to institute the Lodge.

PERU.—We have a Juvenile Temple at Calloa, and hope to plant a Lodge for adults there at an early date.

In furnishing these particulars I would say that the Sub. Lodges in some of the territories above named appear more accessible while under the Grand Lodge of England than they would be if they were at once transferred to the R. W. G. Lodge, under the sanction of which latter body this foreign missionary work is understood to be carried on. In some cases the population is so scarce and the difficulties of the language so great that the prospect of successfully maintaining a Grand Lodge is somewhat remote; but it is thought that the way for this may be prepared, by the Grand Lodge of England granting District Lodge Charters, such as are in use in England. Vessels from these English colonies are frequently sailing for the mother country, and there would thus be opportunity of their being represented in the English Grand Lodge, special provision for which could be made; of course, if the Grand Lodge of England granted Charters for District Lodges in such places, the right of such localities to petition the R. W. G. Lodge for a Grand Lodge Charter, when they were in a position to do so, must be indisputable; the Grand Lodge of England having no power to oppose the granting of such Charters. In any case the Grand Lodge will furnish, as heretofore, the necessary statistics respecting these Lodges, to the R. W. G. Lodge, until they have Grand Lodge Charters granted to them.

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In conclusion I may remark that we have many sea-faring brethren, some of whom hold positions in the navy and have good opportunities for foreign work. Several of these I have commissioned for general foreign work in places where there is no Grand Lodge or D. D. instructing them to co-operate with the latter when they have an opportunity of working in a part where there is a Grand Lodge or for which a D.D. is commissioned. I trust this course will conduce to the spread of the Order and meet with your approval.

## AMENDMENT TO SUBORDINATE LODGE CONSTITUTION.

Amend Article IX, as follows:

Strike out Section 1, " withdrawal from the Order, &c."

Szc. 2. "Clearance and travelling cards," by striking out the words, "A Clearance Card shall be valid for one year from its date," and insert in lieu thereof, "A Travelling Card shall be valid for the time for which payment of dues shall be made, &c."

The Article entire will then read as follows:

ARTICLE IX, CLEARANCE AND TRAVELLING CARDS. SEC. 1. CLEARANCE AND TRAVELLING CARDS of the form prescribed by the Right Worthy Grand Lodge, shall be granted to members applying for them if they are clear from all charges. A Travelling Card shall be valid for the time for which payment of dues shall be made in advance, not exceeding one year."

· Sec. 2. EFFECT OF CARDS. Members holding cards granted by this Lodge, are still members of the Order and subject to the jurisdiction of this Lodge.

# JOHN KENDALL VAN DOORN.

## Memorial Notes

FREDERICK D. DALTON, OF COAL CITY, ILLINOIS,
Past Grand Representative.

Died, at Quincey, Illinois, on Tuesday.
May 4th, 1875, JOHN KENDALL
VAN DOORN, aged Sixty Years.

THE Deceased was a native of Massachusetts; he settled in Quincey, Illinois, nearly forty years ago. No man in the jurisdiction of the Order has signalized a nobler life than the deceased. A humantarian in the highest sense, his faith in humanity was sublime. A true believer in God, he was a strong man, and in the struggles of a long and active, useful career, nobly "showed himself a man." From early manhood he was a devoted anti-slavery advocate, and labored so earnestly and so effectively, that "a price" was offered for his life. He was the drunkard's friend, and labored earnestly to crush the rum traffic, that all mankind might be free. How he toiled for the down-trodden of every class, is "written in letters of hiving light" in many hearts all through the great Northwest. He was a religious man, never pretending, ever doing, for the honor of God's blessed name. The Grand Lodge of Illinois elected him Grand Worthy Secretary seven successive years, the three last of which he also filled the position of Right Worthy Grand Treasurer, holding both offices at the time of his death. He died "with the harness on," and as his remains were laid to rest, "the sprig of cassia" was placed upon the remains of one who in life was the friend of the poor and afflicted, and passed away in death "the loyal servant of the Master."
