REPORT OF THE SESSION.

Once more the session has the privilege of presenting its report to the congregation. God has graciously blessed and led us through another year. Neither disaster nor disturbance has interrupted the regular work of the Church, which, we trust, has not been altogether fruitless. It must be humbly acknowledged, however, that the harvest is not what it might have been, and therefore, our desires are not satisfied. We are waiting for showers of blessing from the presence of the Lord.

In the early part of the year, there was some interruption and perplexity in connection with the service of praise, caused by Mr. Balfour's resignation. After hearing a number of candidates, the session decided to appoint Miss Lawson to the double position of organist and leader of the choir. We trust her diligence and faithfulness have been so far successful as to meet the approval of the congregation and justify the action of the session. We rejoice in the continued prosperity of the Sunday School. Its importance cannot be over estimated. In order that the work may be done

to the best possible advantage, the congregation is recommended to consider very carefully the proposal to provide increased accommodation.

It is satisfactory evidence of growing interest in the missions of the Church that the congregation since its last Annual Meeting, has undertaken to support two laborers in the Home and two in the Foreign Field. We are sure that the result will be increased blessings upon our own work. The work amongst the young people continues to prosper as their own report will indicate. No part of the Church's work has more hearty sympathy on the part of the session. In all the goodness of the past we rejoice and commend ourselves and our work to His abundant grace with whom is the residue of the spirit, and from whom every good gift comes.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

The Board of Managers in presenting this their Thirteenth Financial Report and Annual Statement, beg to congratulate the congregation on the financial prosperity which has this year crowned their efforts. Without any special pressure and leaving the congregation very much to the exercise of their own conscientious liberality, they have pleasure in reporting that the ordinary revenue of the congregation from envelopes and open collections amounted to \$5,798.39, an average of \$111.50 per Sabbath. In addition they understand that the congregation has contributed \$2,327.88 through the various organizations of the Church. The outstanding liabilities as far as known to the Board are three accounts amounting to \$132.60, and accrued interest to the 31st December, 1891, \$75.42, making a total of \$208.02, leaving an actual balance of \$94.45.

The Board desire to explain to the congregation that the loan on the church property amounting to \$24,000 matured on the sixteenth day of July last. In making application for a renewal of the loan to the Trustees of the J. G. Worts estate, the Board were informed by the Trustees that recent legislation would not permit them to advance more than one half the value of the property. The Trustees' Valuator reported the property worth \$42,800, and on this basis a new loan was negotiated for \$21,000 for ten years, at $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., payable half yearly, with the privilege of paying off any sum not less than \$500.00 at any time by paying a bonus of three months' interest on the part intended to be paid off. The Board also obtained a loan of \$2,000.00 which with cash on hand enabled them to discharge the old mortgages. They are pleased to report to the congregation that they have been able to reduce the indebtedness from the ordinary revenue and other sources, by \$1,000.00.

They would earnestly recommend all members and adherents of the congregation to reconsider their weekly offerings with a view to a general increase in order to pay off the floating debt. The Board desire the advice of the congregation in reference to the excavation requisite for the preservation of the church prop-

erty, they have also to explain that there is a loss of revenue from their inability to accommodate those applying for sittings. The number of applications for sittings lately have proved extremely embarrassing to the Pew Secretary, and if the prosperity of the congregation is to continue, pew-holders must assist the ushers in making room for strangers.

A detailed statement of receipts and expenditure is herewith submitted for the information of the congregation.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Another year has closed with its opportunities and privileges. Teachers and scholars alike have had facilities for studying the Word, which may never be within their reach again. Lessons from the Old Testament engaged our attention during the first six months of the year, while the Gospel of St. John furnished in each of its chapters, a succession of profitable lessons from the life and words of our Saviour, for the second half of the year. Can it be doubted that these lessons have supplied the good seed the sowing of which in faith, shall result in the salvation of souls in due succession.

The work in the school has been considerably hampered by the crowded condition of the school. More accommodation is very much needed in order that new classes can be formed and greater space allowed for existing ones.

Besides contributing to the ordinary schemes of the Church, further sums have been voted from the Sunday School moneys to aid in the support of both Home and Foreign Missionaries now in the field, thus applying the gifts of the scholars in specific directions.

It is our earnest hope and prayer that the blessing of God may be more manifest in our midst during the coming year, and the whole congregation may see, more than ever before, the necessity of helping forward a work which concerns so much the eternal welfare of the young of our Church.

It is with praise and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father, that we present our Sixth Annual Report, for this year has been one of singular blessing to the society, we believe the hallowed influence of the day of prayer at its beginning, has been a source of spiritual blessing, and a benediction on our work.

Meetings have been held regularly on the 2nd Wednesday of each month. Number of members on the roll, 41; members of General Society, 17; average attendance, 19 members and 9 visitors; 31 subscribe to the Letter Leaflet; and \$6.00 worth of literature has been donated, and distributed in the society by our representatives on the Board. We are pleased to have among our members, four mothers of missionaries, and we have had the pleasure of reading portions of their diaries in our meetings, and are much interested to hear how the Lord is leading and blessing them in their work.

In May an open meeting was held, when the report of the Delegate to the Annual Meeting at Kingston was read. The Pastor, Mr. Mackay, gave a sketch of the work of the Society among the Indians of the North-West, and a collection was taken up for their Clothing Fund. Sewing meetings were held weekly for two months. Nine large quilts and a number of warm skirts were made, some useful material and a large quantity of partly worn clothing was sent in. Total value of goods, \$145.00, and \$25 in cash was forwarded to Committee.

The Thank-Offering service was held in October, the leaflets and envelopes prepared by the Board were sent to all the ladies of the congregation, and many and hearty were the responses. The offering amounted to \$64.60, and a most delightful and blessed meeting was held.

The total receipts this year are \$258.97, being an increase of \$28.82 over last year. When we look back to our first report read in January, 1887, we find 30 members on the roll, and the amount contributed \$76.35, and while we regret the small increase in membership, we rejoice at the largely increased liberality shown by the financial report, proving the fact that we only need to have our hearts and minds opened to the degradation of our heathen sisters, without the Gospel light, and their claims upon us, to awaken our sympathy and liberality on their behalf, and we earnestly pray that many in the congregation will come and unite with us, in seeking to obey the last command of our Blessed Lord, that by our gifts and prayers we may be co-workers in winning the "World for Christ."

SPECIAL HOME MISSION.

(WINLAW)

On Wednesday evening, 22nd April, 1891, a meeting was held in the Bible class room for the purpose of considering the question of supporting a missionary to labour in Home mission work in the North-West Territories. The Rev. R. P. Mackay in the chair. It was moved, seconded, and carried, "That one missionary at least be maintained, and that the sum of Two hundred and fifty dollars be guaranteed for his support, and that John Douglas be appointed Secretary-Treasurer, for the purpose of receiving subscriptions and forwarding the missionary's stipend from time to time." It being mentioned when the vote was taken guaranteeing the support of the missionary that the same would be for a period of three years, and that the amount opposite each name indicated his or her subscription for each year unless the contrary was expressed.

The secretary immediately communicated the decision of the meeting to Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Presbyterian Missions for Manitoba and the North-West Territories, asking him to designate a mission for us and give us the name of the missionary who would labor there. Dr. Robertson assigned a mission, consisting of four or five preaching stations in South-Eastern Assinaboia, called "Winlaw," with an ordained missionary in charge, named John Cairns.

The congregation have responded liberally in this matter, thereby manifesting their active sympathy in supplying in some

measure to their kinsmen the privilege of worship according to the custom of their forefathers.
