BULLET ENDS KETCHEL'S LIFE

World's Champion Middleweight Shot Dead in Missouri Town--Assailant Captured.

Springhill, Mo., Oct. 16.—Walter A. Hurtz, who shot and killed Stanley Ketchel, world's middleweight champion, yesterday was captured today at the home of Thomas Haggard, one mile from Nianguas (Mo.). Hurtz was taken to the Webster county jail at Marshfield, where he is being closely guarded. After being placed in his cell, the prisoner made a statement in which he said he said he shot Ketchel in self-defence. He says he ordered the prize fighter to throw up his hands and fired when he did not obey him.

Hurtz, in describing the killing, asserts Ketchel made insulting remarks to Goldie Smith, a cook employed on the farm. He says words passed between Ketchel and him and he ordered the prize fighter to throw up his hands. When the champion refused to do this, he said, he was so frightened, knowing Ketchel carried a revolver, that he fired, and without hardly realizing what he had done, fled.

ROBERT VENNING HAS BEEN FOUND

Located at Hague Hotel--Loss of Memory Prevented Him From Communicating With Home.

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—Robert Venning, superintendent of fisheries for Canada, has been located in Brussels. Mr. Venning went to the Hague, as expert adviser to Hon. A. B. Aylesworth in the fishery arbitration before the Hague. He disappeared about the first of September and his absence has caused great anxiety to his many friends at Ottawa, and to the marine and fisheries department, of which he was one of the most valued officials.

Wm. Hutchinson was in charge of Canada's exhibit at the Belgian exhibition and cables that Mr. Venning was found in a hotel in Brussels, where he has been for the past six weeks suffering from amnesia, which involved complete loss of memory. He is recovering from his illness and will start for Canada within a short time.

ROY MOFFAT HAD CLOSE CALL

Auto Exploded and was Entirely Wrecked--Party Had Only Time to Tumble Out.

Roy Moffat and a party of friends consisting of W. A. Mott, K. C. Peter Shannon, G. Brown and Jack Kerr had a narrow escape from death last Saturday, when Mr. Moffat's Packard auto exploded near Dalhousie.

The party left Dalhousie en route for Campbellton. Previous to starting Mr. Moffat had taken in an extra supply of gasoline, as he intended going to Gespe. When about a mile above Dalhousie the occupants noticed the auto on fire and jumped to save their lives just as an explosion took place which destroyed the auto and some of the baggage.

GONE INTO LIQUIDATION

The Graphic learns on reliable information that the Fraserville Navigation Co., has gone into liquidation. This is the company which has operated the S. S. Canada on the Bay Chaleur route between Campbellton and Gespe. The Canada will complete the season's run.

PORTUGUESE REPUBLIC IS NOW A FACT

Country is Quiet and the New Government has Been Recognized by Brazil and Switzerland--British Recognition Expected Soon.

Lisbon, Oct. 14.—The Portuguese Republic, proclaimed on the 4th instant and established after a few days fighting in which less than 150 persons are said to have been killed, appears to be an accomplished fact.

All religious orders, except the establishment of the Irish Dominicans, over whose convent the British flag floats, have been expelled from Portugal.

The provisional government has received a telegram from President Comtesse of Switzerland, announcing that government's recognition of the Portuguese republic. Brazil also, has formally recognized the new republic. The German minister has been instructed to enter into semi-official relations with the provisional government. The British minister, Sir Francis H. Villiers, handed the premier a note stating that Great Britain would recognize the republic as soon as it was convinced that the revolution was absolutely ended, and affairs in Portugal were in a normal state.

The government has issued a decree granting general amnesty to all military and naval offenders. The patriarch of Lisbon, Mgr. Tonti, it is announced, has signified his allegiance to the new regime. Senhor Teixeira Sousa, leader of the Regenerator party, is organizing a new party which will accept republic institutions.

The huge iron safes containing the treasure of Quelhas convent, which reverts to the government, have been placed in the Bank of Portugal. A commission composed of officials of the ministry of finance has been appointed to make an inventory of the royal palaces and decide what property belongs to the king personally. This commission will also investigate the outstanding debts of the members of the royal family. Joao Chagas, a well known writer, has been appointed minister to Brazil.

Jose Reivas, the new minister of finance, said in an interview that one of the first acts of the government would be to impose obligatory secular education. At the same time the Republicans would fully recognize liberty of conscience. They did not desire to destroy religious sentiment but only would obligate the priests to confine themselves to spiritual matters. Speaking with reference to financial conditions, the minister said that the government intended to readjust taxation and make the colonies bear their own administrative charges. This, he added, would meet a third of the existing deficit without injuring the colonies, the preservation and development of which would be of supreme interest in Portugal's policy.

There is an unconscious revelation of the manner of the man who is now at the head of national affairs in the brief autobiography of President Braga written a few weeks ago at the request of the Paris newspapers. At the age of three he lost his mother. At Coimbra his life was an obscure struggle for lack of means of existence. He bore up in this struggle with unconquerable pride. In 1872 he presented himself as a candidate for the professorship of modern European literature at the higher Lisbon classes. All the conservative elements were opposed to him, Catholics, monarchists, meta-physicians, ultra-romanticists and journalists in the government pay, but the public acclaimed him and forced the ministry to appoint him.

It is only by his fees as a professor that Braga lives, devoting his existence entirely to his intellectual work.

CAMERON LOST AGAIN TO WOOD

But This Time the Distance is Only Four Yards--The Time was Fast. 63.6--Time at Five Miles Was Given as 25.31.

St. John, October 16.—The twelve mile race between Abbie Wood, of Montreal, and Fred Cameron, Amherst, on the Every Day Club grounds on Saturday afternoon, was won by Wood in the fast time of one hour, three minutes and six seconds.

Cameron set the pace and led for the whole distance, Wood winning on the spurt in the last lap.

The only exciting incident during the progress of the race was a brush near the end of the fifth mile. Wood made an effort to pass but Cameron held his distance.

The relative positions continued the same until within 150 yards of the finish when Wood drew up level and in the last twenty yards spurred ahead, winning by four yards while looking backward at his competitor.

The time at five miles was given as 25.31 and at ten miles 53.15 secs.

KNOTTY PROBLEM AT CAMPBELLTON

Relief Committee Dread the Job Ahead of Them This Winter.

Three months after the fire, which swept away all they owned in the world, some of the people here so dispirited that they are talking of moving away. They are mostly all old people who had comfortable homes, and who still have means. The thing that has discouraged them is the thought of the winter and the suffering which seems inevitable to many.

There are hundreds of people who are absolutely helpless, the relief committee is now trying to provide homes for these, but their means are totally inadequate. The depression grows with the passage of the days and as one man put it: "I cannot bear to see the look on the faces of these people, the thing gets on my nerves."

G. G. McKenzie, chairman of the relief committee, says there were numberless cases where they could do nothing to aid and where help could not be more worthily bestowed. He mentioned the case of a man, a merchant, and one of the most respected residents, who had lived all his life in Campbellton. He had \$1,750 insurance on his property but there was a mortgage of just that amount, which he paid.

As his place of business was in the main street and he had no means to build of brick he was forced to erect a small wooden shack on the rear of his lot and try to sell some groceries.

FOUR HUNDRED BUILDINGS GOING UP.

It has been estimated that there are now in process of erection here about 400 buildings. When it is remembered, however, that 1,000 were destroyed by the fire it will be seen how inadequate this is. Moreover it is largely a question of the continuance of fine weather, if these are all finished. It seems to be the opinion of a good many that all of them cannot possibly be done.

Besides the various charitable uses to which the relief committee have put their money there have been several charges which they don't think they ought to have been asked to meet. They have had to pay the guards employed after the fire, and also the cost of temporary sanitary arrangements. They have been obliged to make money grants in thirty cases. All these were to people from sixty to eighty years of age. The grants are pitifully small, averaging from \$2 to \$2.50 a week.

Your representative, accompanied by F. F. Matheson, police magistrate, and a member of the poor committee, drove to the place where the houses have been erected by the building committee of the town. These are erected in a ten-acre field owned by Mr. Matheson. At the time it was decided to build the committee enquired about lots the best offer they could get for the lease of 50 by 100 feet was \$25 a year. The members of the committee were in a quandary, as this was far behind what they could afford to give. It was then that Mr. Matheson offered the present site for \$10 per lot of the same size.

It is on the south side of the town, about ten minutes' walk from the post office, and is pleasantly and well situated. The tenants are under the nominal rent of \$2 a month with the option of purchase in six months at \$250. If any of the tenants take advantage of this option the purchase money will go back into the relief fund. The erection of these houses was in all cases put up to tender and Messrs. Harquail were successful, in every case being lowest. Forty are now finished or nearly so and Mr. Harquail says that the building committee have many more applications for houses, and more will have to be erected.

The tenants seem to take a great interest in their new homes and in one instance have begun to paint them. It is the intention to lay out streets where these houses are and Mr. Matheson intends to donate a piece of land with some trees on it for a park.

WHERE THE MONEY WENT.

In many instances the building committee has assisted people to start erection of homes with small grants of money. Of the 399 applications four have been granted \$50; 137, \$100; eight, \$150 and 113, \$200. The committee has a balance on hand of \$12,400.

The poor committee has already spent \$6,000 of the \$30,000 appropriated to it. It is pointed out that the time when they will have to spend is the winter and that the balance will not be nearly sufficient for their needs. The guard bill, which was charged to the relief committee and which they paid, was \$591, while the temporary sanitary arrangements cost \$851.41.

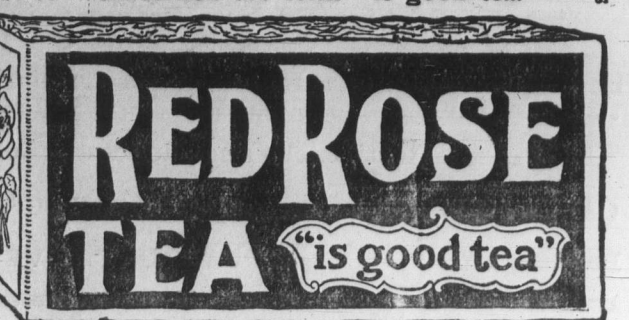
NEW CHIEF OF POLICE

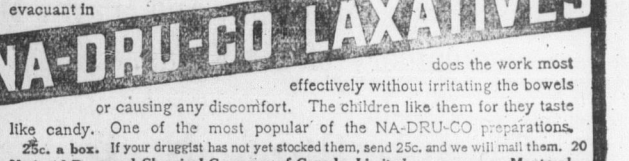

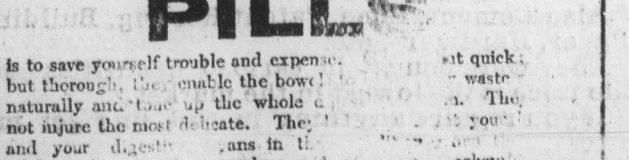

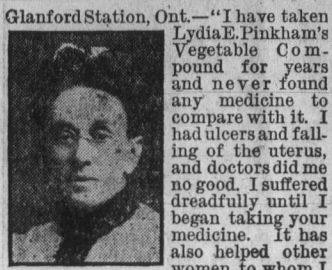

FAVORABLE REPORT OF AUDITOR

(Memorandum of the Committee of the Executive Council upon the report of the Auditor General on conditions existing at Campbellton, N. B.)

The Relief Committee of the Town of Campbellton, appointed by the citizens of that town immediately after the disastrous fire of July 11th last for the purpose of receiving and distributing relief to the inhabitants who were rendered homeless and destitute thereby, having submitted to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor in Council the names and duties of the said Committee, and the manner in which the same had been carried out, the Auditor General was appointed to go to Campbellton and investigate the existing conditions and requirements and to report the results to Council, which he has done.

The Auditor General reports, among other things that "On the 19th of September, at Campbellton I met the Chairman of the Relief Committee, and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, as well as other officers, who explained the methods under which the several committees were working. These methods I found to be entirely satisfactory and would judge that every safeguard is being used for the equitable distribution of the funds and supplies."

All cash received for relief purposes is deposited in the three local banks in the joint names of the three members of the Finance Committee, consequently no monies can be drawn unless the checks bear the signatures of the three members of that committee.

The total amount of cash received by the Relief Committee to the 17th

of September inclusive was \$98,206.23; total expenditure to same date was \$10,392.96; leaving a balance on hand of \$87,813.37; \$52,000.00 was appropriate to the building committee to give aid to the needy in rebuilding their home, and also to pay for thirty small houses now in course of erection at a cost of \$300 each. The committee are in hopes that the tents, now in use as living quarters, may be entirely dispensed with by the middle of October next.

To enable the committee to provide the poor with food and fuel during the winter months, they estimate that \$25,000.00 more will be required and are depending upon the good people of Canada to forward that amount.

The said report also gives a statement of the bonded debt of the said town which at the time of the fire amounted to \$300,400.00 the annual interest charge upon which was \$12,920.00.

The amount required in the immediate future to provide for the usual town services, such as Electric Light Plant, Water & Sewerage Plant, Fire Protection Plant &c., and for which it is proposed to make a new issue of debentures is estimated at \$136,919.00, which sum is reduced by insurance from old school building and Electric Plant to \$113,119.00.

After a reference to the industries that are being rebuilt, and the epidemic of typhoid fever and its causes, the report concludes with the statement that "considering the great individual losses the people suffered by the fire, they appeared cheerful and have strong faith in the future prosperity of the new Campbellton."

Upon consideration of the said report the Council is of opinion that the measures adopted by the Relief Committee of the town of Campbellton to meet the requirements of the unfortunate situation in which the inhabitants of that town were placed in consequence of the almost total destruction of their homes and effects have been in the best interest of the afflicted people, and that the distribution of the relief placed at their disposal has been made with due care, honesty and impartiality, and that their strenuous labours merit commendation and the committee of Council therefore recommend that upon His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, approving this Minute that a copy thereof be furnished the said Relief Committee.
