Tokio, Oct. 30— The Russian Embassy here announces that Turkey has opened war on Russia.

Theodosia, Crimea, via Petrograd, Oct. 30— From 9.30 o'clock to 10.30 yesterday morning, a Turkish cruiser with three funnels bombarded the cathedral, the Greek Church, a pier and some sheds. One soldier was wounded, A branch of the Russian Bank of Foreign Commerce caught fire. At the conclusion of the bombardment the cruiser left in a southwesterly direction.

Theodosia (formerly Kaffa) is a Russian seaport on the southeart coast of Crimea, about a hundred miles northeast of Sebastopol, by which it is connected by rail.

Novorossysk is on the northeast coast of the Black Sea. It s almost directly opposite Theodosia at a distance of about 120 miles.


