SECOND CONTINGENT NOW RECRUITING

Local Men Have Received Com-
missions in the Second Batch
of Volunteers

The instructions from the British
War Office as to the composition of the
second contingent were received by the
Dominion Government at Ottawa on
Monday.
An emergency meeting of the mil-
itia council, presided over by Hon. J.
D. Hazen, and attended by General
M. Watkin, Chief of the Staff, Col.
Septimus Denison, acting Adjutant Gen-
eral, and other staff officers, was at once
called. Later Hon. Mr. Hazen drove
to Rideau Hall, where he had a long
consultation with the Duke of Con-
naught.

It is believed that the instructions
were given largely on the supposition
that the second contingent will com-
prise a full army division, which con-
sists of 22,000 men. The 16,000 men
now being enlisted will form part of
this contingent.
Immediately the memorandum is
passed on by the privy council, orders
for recruiting of cavalry and artillery
will be issued. Reports at headquar-
ters are that recruiting has been going
on very smoothly all over the coun-
try and that there has been no trou-
ble enlisting the second contingent.

Col. Maltby has been appointed Re-
cruiting officer for the counties of
Gloucester and Northumberland, and
Capt. A. E. G. McKenzie for Camp-
bellton and vicinity. Capt. McKen-
zie, Lieut. Lockhart and Lieut. Mowat
have been accepted for this second
expeditionary force, and Lieut. H. W.
Ferguson's application is also before
the proper authorities. Lieut. Fergu-
son's name was sent in later than the
others, which accounts for the delay in
not receiving the acceptance at the
same time as the others.

Recruiting will commence here at
once and as the new men come in, will
be drafted to St. John in batches of ten
or twelve. A recruiting office will be
opened at the town buildings from 10
to 12, from 2 to 4 p.m., and at 8 p.m.
for the purposes of recruiting vol-
unteers.
Col. Maltby will be in Bathurst on
Saturday for the purposes of recruit-
ing volunteers from that section. Al-
ready a large number had expressed
a desire to enlist, but so far only two
had signed the rolls. It is understood
that a number of the men who were on
service at Newcastle will volunteer,
and a number from this district, which
will make up as many as the first
contingent from here.

GERMAN CRUISERS SINK BRITISH

Serious Action in Pacific Where
Five German Ships Defeats
Three British

Valparaiso, Chile, Nov. 4.—The
naval engagement between the Ger-
man fleet under Admiral Von Spee,
consisting of the armored cruisers
Scharnhorst and Gneissau and the
light cruisers Nürnberg, Leipzig and
Bremen, and the British squadron
made up of the cruisers Monmouth,
Good Hope and Glasgow, and the
transport Otranto, commanded by
Rear Admiral Cradock, continues the
sensational of the hour here.

That the Germans were able to sink
or scatter the British squadron with
only minor damage to their own ships
and a casualty list of only two wound-
ed, is a subject of wonder.
The Monmouth is known to have
been lost with practically all of her
crew, as a result of the first big naval
fight of the war; the Good Hope was
severely damaged and on fire when
she escaped, under cover of darkness,
and it is believed here that she went
to the bottom, while the Glasgow and
the Otranto took refuge in a Chilean
port.

At the time of the battle, a hurri-
cane was raging, and no boats could
be lowered to pick up survivors.
"The British fought gamely," said
the German officers, "but their ships
were outclassed. The Monmouth, Good
Hope and Glasgow were all set on fire
by our shells."

Details of the fight, picked up from
informal conversations with German
officers who came ashore from the
warships, show that the Germans, ow-
ing to the superior range of the guns
on the armored cruisers Scharnhorst
and Gneissau, opened fire when six
miles away. As the ships closed and
the range was down to a distance of
four miles, the British ships were
able to reply, but by that time they
were already seriously damaged. The
Germans declare that the British
fought heroically, but that their ar-
tillery was ineffective against the su-
perior weight of metal that the Ger-
mans were able to pour from the
more modern guns of the armored
cruisers.

GOOD HOPE NOT LOST

SAYS U. S. CONSUL
Washington, Nov. 4.—American
Minister Fletcher at Santiago, Chile,
today reported the naval engagement
off Coronel, Chile, and the arrival
of three German warships at Valparaiso.
The damaged Good Hope is reported
as having escaped with the Glasgow
and Otranto.

London, Nov. 5.—A strong British
fleet is still in the south Pacific. The
admiralty tells of German victory
there. The German cruiser, York
struck a mine and sank. She was of
3550 tons burden and carried 638 men.
The German withdrawal from the
Coast becomes more marked, but at-
tacks on British in Tyne are becom-
ing fiercer, and at one point in France
the allies are hard pressed. The Rus-
sians make sweeping victories. Tur-
key already taking defeat at hands of
Russia.

mans. Commanders of Goeben and
Breslau wireless to Constantinople,
that they had been attacked by a su-
perior Russian naval force. Cabinet
then ordered defensive measures, and
Germans on Goeben and Breslau im-
mediately started on the raid which
has culminated in war.

London, Nov. 5.—Egypt today an-
nounced that she has annexed Cyprus
in the Mediterranean. This island
has been nominally owned by Turkey.

TURKEY BEGINS WAR ON RUSSIA

Turkish Cruiser Bombarbs City
of Theodosia.—Balkan Coun-
tries May Be Drawn in

Tokio, Oct. 30.—The Russian Em-
bassy here announces that Turkey has
opened war on Russia.

Theodosia, Crimea, via Petrograd,
Oct. 30.—From 9.30 o'clock to 10.30
yesterday morning, a Turkish cruiser
with three funnels bombarded the
cathedral, the Greek Church, a pier
and some sheds. One soldier was
wounded. A branch of the Russian
Bank of Foreign Commerce caught
fire. At the conclusion of the bom-
bardment the cruiser left in a south-
westerly direction.

Theodosia (formerly Kaffa) is a
Russian seaport on the southeast coast
of Crimea, about a hundred miles
northeast of Sebastopol, by which it is
connected by rail.

Novorossysk is on the northeast
coast of the Black Sea, and is the
capital of the territory of the Black
Sea. It is almost directly opposite
Theodosia at a distance of about 120
miles.

By instructions of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the coming winter and spring to Canadian farmers. The samples for white oats (about 4 lbs.) barley (about 5 lbs.), and field peas (about 5 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free by mail.

Applicants must give particulars in regard to the soil on their farms, and and some account their experience with such kinds of grain (or potatoes) as they have grown, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be selected.

Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample of grain and one of potatoes can be sent to each farm. If both samples are asked for in the same letter only one will be sent. Applications on any kind of printed form cannot be accepted.

As the supply of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early; but the applications will not necessarily be filled in the exact order in which they are received. Preference will always be given to the most thoughtful and explicit requests. Applications received after the end of January will probably be too late.

All applications for grain (and applications from the provinces of Ontario and Quebec for potatoes) should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealists, Central Experimental Farm Ottawa. Such Applications require no postage. If otherwise addressed delay and disappointment may occur.

GREAT INTEREST CENTRES IN NEWS OF NAVAL BATTLE

British Public Seeking Further Details—Anxiety Felt as to Fate of Rear Admiral Craddock. German Naval Loss

(Special to the Graphic)

London, Nov. 5.—Naval news looms large in London today. The British public is seeking further details of action on Sunday off the Coast of Chile, but no continued efforts are being made to minimize disaster. Great anxiety is felt concerning the fate of Rear-Admiral Sir Christopher Craddock, which probably will not be known until it has been definitely determined what has become of his flagship, the Cruiser Good Hope. The British public however, is not left without some comfort, as Berlin officially admits the loss of the cruiser York, blown up by a mine near Jade, one of the outlying defences of Wilhelmshaven, while in shipping circles in London, it is declared that the career of the German cruiser Koenigs-

berg in the Indian ocean has been ended. Sir Percy Scott, England's greatest gunnery expert and champion of the use of submarines as against dreadnoughts, has rejoined the admiralty. As he has been known in the past as a supporter of Baron Fisher, it is said he will uphold the new policies already inaugurated by the first sea lord of admiralty.

Paris, Nov. 5.—French official announcement this afternoon says: On left wing allied forces have made slight progress to east of Neuport, on right bank of Yser. From Dinant to Lys, German attacks were renewed yesterday, but at a number of points with lessened energy, particularly

with regard to action of their infantry. France-British lines have at no point been drawn back, and our troops have undertaken offensive, and have made notable progress in several directions. Between region of La Bassée and Somme the day was notable particularly for an artillery contest. In region of Roye we have maintained our occupation of Le Quesnoy and advanced perceptibly in direction of Andechy. On the centre, between Oise and Moselle, there has been recrudescence of activity of Germans, manifested particularly by their artillery fire. Summing up, it may be said that attacks of enemy at various points on our front have been repulsed in some instances; after an engagement which lasted all day long. On our right wing there is nothing new to report.

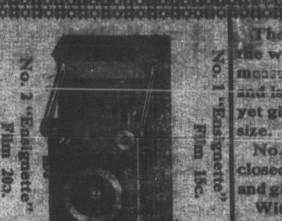

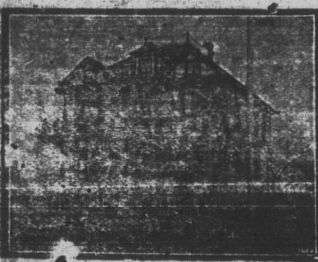

The Red Cross Society is holding a concert in the parish hall Wednesday, and we trust will be well patronized.

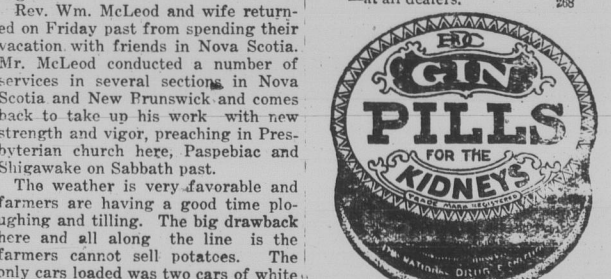
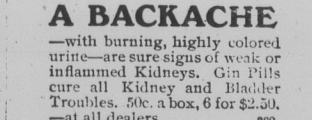

A distressing shooting accident occurred last Friday afternoon, in consequence of which Mrs. Chas. Delaney of Matapedia is now in the Hotel Dieu Hospital. From information gathered, it appears that Mr. Delaney had been out with his gun last Friday at Falls Brooks Sheds, where he is working, and on returning to the house, emptied the magazine of the rifle and cleaned it. Whether from the wet or a defective spring, one cartridge remained in the barrel, and when he snapped back the bolt, the charge exploded. The bullet found its mark in Mrs. Delaney's left leg, entering a little below the knee and shattering the bone. The injured lady suffered severe pain, and medical aid was summoned, Dr. Pinault going up from town. On his arrival, he ordered her removal to the hospital, where the injured member was amputated from the knee on Saturday morning. Latest reports say Mrs. Delaney is resting comfortably and making good progress toward recovery.

BUSINESS AS USUAL

SHORTENS MAIL ROUTE TO NORTH PACIFIC COAST BY MORE THAN TWO DAYS

Residents in the busy little city of Prince Rupert British Columbia, are enjoying this week, for the first time, the benefits of a direct-mail service with the East. Postal service over the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway between Edmonton and Prince Rupert has just been inaugurated and a great saving of time is being effected. Hitherto the mails have been taken from Prince Rupert and other coast points to Vancouver by steamship and then sent east by rail. Under the new arrangement of direct service over the G. T. P. there will be a clear saving of two, and possibly three days time. A letter posted in Montreal or New York should be in Prince Rupert within five days. Via Vancouver it would have taken at the very least seven days.

Prince Rupert is destined to be an important stopping place on the shortest route around the world, for any scheme that has for its ultimate object the swift circling of the Globe must reckon the city on its right of way. The distance from Liverpool to Yokohama by this route to 10085 miles as against 10858 via New York and San Francisco. Moreover, ships sailing from Prince Rupert, pass, with a few strokes from the landlocked harbor to the high seas, and begin their journey across the Pacific 500 miles nearer the East than a ship would by sailing at the same time from any other Pacific port.
