When the late Pope died it was the expectation of many, the hope of all the agencies of the Catholic Church, that Italy would refuse to recognize any longer the independence of the Papacy even to the extent to which it had recognized it in the latter days of Pope Pius, and would prevent the election of a Pope or force him to live and act as merely the Bishop of Rome, the subject of the Italian King, and that all the other nations of Europe would finally break the links already worn thin which bound the Catholic Church within their boundaries and the Roman See. Germany appeared determined to make the Catholic Church in that country merely national, and Switzerland, eagerly following the example of Germany, Austria appeared to have sunk into indifference.
