WORST STORM IN HISTORY

There was never in the memory of man been such a stormy month as the February just ending. A week ago a furious gale completely tied up all traffic, and all trains were many hours late. Mails were delayed, and highways so blocked that practically all business has been at a standstill for a week. But the heaviest blow of all came yesterday afternoon and lasted all night. At time of going to press roads are drifting faster than they can be cleared out. There have been no trains from the south in 24 hours, the northbound express getting no further than Woodstock yesterday where also the southbound train was held. It is expected that these trains will attempt to reach their destinations today.

The conditions of this month recall a winter 34 years ago, which goes into history as "the winter of the deep snow." That winter set in early and during January there was the old-fashioned "thaw" and after freezing again there was ice everywhere, so that the young people went anywhere they wished on skates on the river, ponds, or through the fields. On Saturday, Feb. 18, heavy snow began to fall, and it continued to snow until Monday with a strong wind. It is said that the fall amounted to five feet. Every mode of travel was effectually tied up. The railway was blocked until the following Friday, there being no trains at all for just a week.

On April 10 of the same year there was still four feet of snow in the open fields. Then thawing came rapidly and the river rose to greater height than it had reached since 1887, so the records stated, and the Matheson Island was so inundated that a barn on its highest part floated away bodily.

PURE BRED BULLS

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, Makes Announcement

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, announces that definite arrangements have been made with the Dominion Live Stock Branch for a continuation of the policy of loaning Pure Bred Bulls free of charge to farmers that will organize in the form of an association. Ten members will constitute an association. Associations receiving bulls must make provision for proper care and treatment. Bulls will be delivered to nearest railway station.

Under this policy thirty-four Bulls were placed in New Brunswick last year and will make a marked improvement in the live stock of the province. There are still many sections that might well avail themselves of this opportunity of improving their stock. Deacon Carleton Turner

In the early morning of Jan. 30, 1920, there passed from this life a well known and highly respected citizen in the person of Deacon George Carleton Turner of Connel N. B.

Though in his 85th year, and his faculties dimmed to some extent for the last year or two, he was able to be around until about a month before his death, and therefore was spared any lengthy suffering.

He was a man of sterling character and high christian influence interested in every work for the advancement of humanity, but especially so in all that pertained to the upbuilding of his master's kingdom, having given the greatest part of his life to devoted service in his church of which he was Deacon for over 60 years and of which he was a charter member when organized and known as the Free Christian Baptist Church at mouth of the big Presque Isle. The progress of the church, both spiritually and financially was in a large measure due to his unflagging zeal and faith. In the early days when there could be no regular pastor, he often became the pastor and the evangelist, visiting and praying with the sick and aged, and as a result of his exhortations from time to time not a few were turned from the error of their ways.

It was a rare occasion that he missed a church service of any kind, making fires in the old church and later in the new, during the winter seasons, no matter how extreme the weather often with only a brother deacon to join him, Josiah Stickney who went to his reward several years ago.

They always had a little prayer meeting however, thus claiming the promise "Where two or three meet together in my name there will I be in the midst to own and bless."

The good deacon was also Superintendent of the Sunday School (probably organized by himself) during at least fifty years of its existence and with the help of his beloved wife (deceased some six years ago) and other faithful teachers he made the school a thriving one for many years. He was ever zealous that the Kingdom of Christ should be established in the hearts of the children, many of whom now Christian men and women claim to have received in that school their greatest impetus for good, and will cherish with reverence the memory of their devoted leader.

Though his environment was that of a country community, who can say how far reaching was his influence? How many directly or indirectly, have been blessed by his teaching and unselfish example?

He loved all ministers of the gospel and they ever found a welcome in his home. During his long life, he had his share of discouragements, sorrows, and financial losses, but nevertheless was often heard to say Surely goodness and mercy hath followed me all the days of my life.

He delighted to sing the good old fashioned hymns and in his declining years his voice remained surprisingly strong. In his partially unconscious moments a few days before his death, it is said that he sang all the verses of the hymn, "Will Jesus find us watching." Almost the last he was able to speak. There is no doubt but that he was found watching when the summons came. He might have said with the Apostle of old "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." Henceforth is laid up for me a crown of Righteousness which the Lord, the Righteous Judge shall give me in that day.

The deceased was the son of W. M. F. Turner, a school master of early times, and was grandson of W. M. Turner, an officer last







THEIR LIMITATIONS

The Fredericton Gleaner a few days ago said:

"Two members of the provincial government, who were at their offices here this week for two days, one hour and forty minutes, were reported yesterday to have safely returned to home and mama."

Undoubtedly the members of the government are not giving due consideration to the feelings of the Gleaner. If they would remain longer at the capital, and devise some method of raising funds which would enable them to contribute even so small a sum as \$10,000 to the Gleaner, as a return for its stern and uncompromising championship of the cause of provincial economy and of purity in politics, that journal would be encouraged to say less about their movements and more about economy and purity. For though virtue is its own reward, there is also virtue in \$10,000. Moreover, the government, if it attended more closely to its duties might discover some contractor who has a weakness for his friends; and the Gleaner itself testifies that the lumber operators are again growing rich because of low stumpage. They might therefore lend an attentive ear to an emissary of the government who wanted to raise a little fund of \$100,000 or thereabouts. There are also large quantities of potatoes in the province, and the Cuban market is just where it was before. Obviously the Foster government has its limitations. There are several killings it might make if its members were less fond of the home fireside, more anxious to earn their munificent stipend of \$2,100, and more willing to sit at the feet of the Cleaner.

Steel and Bronze Bells.

The Bochum Verein, the well-known German steel works which specializes in the manufacture of bells, has taken exception to a statement by one Prof. Dethlefsen that steel bells were merely a "war substitute" for bells of bronze and that their disadvantages outweighed the advantages. This assertion, the Bochum Verein states, is nothing but a repetition of old statements which have already been disproved.

So far from the use of steel for bell founding being a "war substitute" industry the Bochum Verein has made steel bells for sixty years, and before the war had made over 7,500 church bells. In Berlin alone there are more than sixty peals of steel bells. They are more durable than bronze bells, and with an equal volume of sound can be heard at a greater distance. Under normal conditions, with steel about one-third the price of bronze, steel bells are at least 50 per cent. cheaper than good bronze bells.

Exception also is taken to his statement that the cost of maintenance of steel bells is greater than that of bronze bells owing to their being so much heavier. Up to one ton apiece weight steel bells are not heavier than bronze, and above that weight they are considerably lighter; hence it is incorrect to say that they require specially constructed belfries or an increased staff of ringers. The bronze bells in the Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church at Berlin, which weigh thirty and a half tons, would only weigh twenty-four and three-quarters tons if they were made of steel.



Valley R. R. to Grand Falls

Nobody can blame the people of Victoria County for wanting the Valley Railway extended to Grand Falls. They were promised the extension years ago, but owing to C. P. R. influence with the old government and other causes, the project was never carried out. A Federal subsidy was voted in aid of the work, but a Tory government permitted it to elapse. As a result of the slack methods of the old government, that portion of the proceeds of the bonds allotted to this section of the road are now tied up in British Columbia real estate and will likely remain tied up for some time to come. The old government did not want the road extended to Grand Falls and so manipulated things that its successors have not been able thus far to carry out the project.
