In the class open to cheese of American or Canadian manufacture, the Canadian cheese carried off all the prizes which were offered. The society's gold medal and first prize went to a Canadian cheese of September make exhibited by a local shopkeeper in Liverpool.

The society's silver medal and second prize went to a lot of cheese from Messrs.

L. C. Tilley & Son, of New Brunswick.

The third prize was awarded to cheese of the "Empress" brand, from Messrs. A. A. Ayer & Co., Montreal.

"Very highly commended" was the ticket placed upon the exhibit from the Palace road cheese factory, exhibited by Mr. J. Grow, Napanee, Oat. Another lot from the dairy station at Perth, Ont., was awarded the ticket "commended." One of the results of this exhibition has been to call additional attention in the English markets to the uniform excellence of cheese of Canadian make.

Additional particulars regarding the establishment of a binder twine factory in Brantford by local capitalists, with a stock of \$200,000, is published in the Brantford Expositor. The projectors of this scheme are extremely reticent as to their intentions, and to a certain extent have succeeded in maturing their plans without publicity. The gentlemen who are forming the company are Messrs. Stratford, Chalcraft, Hope, Hewitt and Brooks. In common with the whole agricultural community, they have recognized the enormous profits made out of the farmers of the country by the combine on twine. This combine spreads itself all over Canada, and the United States as well, and can demand prices far beyond the value of the article. The local capitalists referred to are of opinion that the formation of a huge co-operative company, embracing all the Patrons of Industry in the Province, and especially devoted to binder twine, would confer a great boon. They propose to form a company under the style and title of the Patrons' Cordage and Implement Company (limited), with a subscribed stock of \$200,000, in 40,000 shares at \$5 per share. When a certain portion of the stock is subscribed several monied men will, it is stated, put enough money in the concern to go on with the building of the works and the purchase of the necessary machinery. No site has yet been fixed for the works, but it is likely a location will be got just outside or just inside the city limits to the westward. The plans are so immature just yet that they cannot be spoken about with any degree of certainty. It is the intention of the promoters to enlist the sympathy of the Patrons of Industry to the fullest extent, and wherever they are agreeable it will be made the distributing point for the sale of goods, thus at once adopting the cooperative mode of manufacture and dispensing with the middle-man and his profits in the sale. The provisional directors will have a meeting soon to further develop the patrons of Indus

Three of them out of every five were afflicted with the most rabid and fatal form of brain disease—paresis, which is swiftly progressive and inevitably kills. Stageplayers are especially liable to brain troubles. Their manner of life subjects them to much nervons exhaustion, and they troubles. Their manner of the subjects them to much nervous exhaustion, and they are apt to be dissipated. Five actors and actresses are at present confined in Bloomingdale Asylum. Bartley Campbell, John McCullough and Tony Hart all died of

paresis.
One of the most productive causes of One of the most productive causes of insanity is drinking of the regular and "moderate" kind, the sort of indulgence habitual with men who are never known to be perceptibly under the influence of liquor. They attend to their business properly, but, from the morning cocktail to the nightcap before going to bed, they are continually taking doses of alcohol. The process is actually a species of slow poisoning. Depending to a great extent upon the constitution of the individual, it may require few or many years to produce effects in the shape of disease of the body or mind; but sooner or later, if the person lives long eneugh, it is certain to attack the brain. The complaint thus caused is termed "alcoholic dementia," and it is absolutely incurable, owing to the fact that organic changes in the brain cells have been brought about.



DISTINCUISHED VISITORS.

Commandant and Mrs. Herbert Booth in the City

The Ealvation Army Gives Them a Royal Wolcome—Short Electhes of Their Lives—Officers Present From Other Districts.

Herbert Howard Booth, son of the renowned General Booth, is in the city in the interests of the Salvation Army. He is accompanied by his wife, a charming little Dutch lady. He has never been in London before, and naturally the local corps are delighted to receive him. He is commandant of all the forces in the United Kingdom. Some personal particulars regarding the two distinguished guests will be of interest in this connection.

COMMADANT BOOTH.

Herbert Howard, General and Mrs. Booth's third son was born at Penzauce, Cornwall, in August, 1862. His parents were just then in the midst of the wonderful Cornish revival which made their names household words in that part of England long before the Salvation Army, as a whole, was in existence. Although comparatively young in years, Mr. Booth is old in the wook of the army, having commenced active duty when only 18 years of age, his first position being that of doorkeeper in Paris, where the campaign was conducted by La Mareschale Catharine Booth, his sister, whose wonderful heroism in fearlessly confronting the ignorant fantism and brutality of the Parisian moble won her immense respect and admiration, and finally resulted in the army making Booth, his sister, whose wonderful heroism in fearlessly confronting the ignorant fanaticism and brutality of the Parisian mob won her immense respect and admiration, and finally resulted in the army making hundreds of converts among its flercest opponents. Among these stirring and turbulent scenes young Booth's life in the army commenced. His marked ability for organization and command soon won the young soldier promotion, and two years later he was removed to London, where he assumed the entire control and direction of the various trade departments in the army, a position of great responsibility and anxiety, involving as it does the superintendency of all the supplies for the entire organization in England. His next promotion was to take charge of the great training home at Clapton, where all the cadets are given a special training prepartory to receiving commissions as officers. In 1888 Mr. Booth made a tour round the world, visiting South Africa, New Zealand, Tasmania, Australia, the United States and Canada, everywhere being received with the greatest enthusiasm and respect. On returning to England Herbert Booth was appointed to the sole charge of the army in the United Kingdom, which includes 1,255 corps, 145 outposts, 4,500 officers and 150,000 trained soldiers, besides an enormous number of converts who are not enrolled as soldiers. Over this great body Mr. Booth has had the sole charge only relinquishing it to come to Canada to direct and forward the work.

MRS. HERBERT BOOTH.

In 1890 Mr. Herbert Booth was married to Miss Carry Schoch, daughter of Staff-Capt. Schoch, chief sceretary of the army in Belgium, and formerly an officer in the royal army of Holland. Mrs. Booth is a distinguished linguist, speaking fluently in English, German and French as well as her native tongue. She possesses a voice poculiarly sweet and tender, and many a death-bed in her native town has been soothed and comforted with its melody. Commandant and Mrs. Booth were given a royal welcome by the local corps of the Salvation Army last evening. From 7:15 until 8 o'clock there was an open-air meeting on the Market Square, where hundreds of people had assembled to see the disappointed, for the commandant was there, and he let them know it. When the time arrived they marched, headed by their brass band and a number of army lassies, bedecked in red and playing tamborines, to the barracks in the Mechanies' Institute block. Hog Cholera in Western Ontario. Incg Cholora in Western Ontario.

Mr. Carling has telegraphed that he will meet the hog breeders of Western Ontario at London on Thursday next to discuss methods for suppressing hog cholera. The law, as it now stands, compels hog owners to report at once to the district inspectors any outbreak of the disease. The inspector is then placed in charge and whatever deaths occur after that date the owner is allowed one-third value by the Dominion Government. This insadecuate compensaallowed one-third value by the Dominion Government. This inadequate compensa-tion is looked upon by hog breeders as en-couraging the spread of the disease rather than promoting its suppression. The breeders want this law amended so that breeders want this law amended so that Government inspectors will have authority to at once destroy, not only all hogs infected with cholera, but also those exposed to the infection and pay the owner the full value of the animals. Then, they claim, there would be no incentive for delay in reporting an outbreak and the disease would be promptly stamped out.

He had done a hero's work, and as the light went out of his eyes yesterday, there wasn't a woman in the town who didn't creep silently back to her household with a sigh on her lips and the best of prayers at her heart. Witt's story is briefly enough told. While passing up the street he had heard a woman's shrieks. WONDERS OF MARS.

Remarkable Observations by a Harvard Expert in Peru.

Changes on the Face of the Planet

During the Past Month.

New York, Aug. 10.—Prof. Wm. H. Pickering, director of the Harvard College annex observatory at Arequipa, Peru, telegraphs to the Herald as follows: "In my observations of Mars I have seen two large areas near the equator which are permanently blue. Near the edges they appear light blue. The light is sightly polarized. The total size of the area is about 500,000 square miles, one-half the size of the Mediterrancan Sea. On June 23 a small dark spot appeared in the southern snow cap. Later this spot lengthened rapidly, and early in July it was 1,000 miles long, dividing the snow in half. Sixteen hundred thousand square miles of snow have melted within the last 30 days. The melter snow has apparently been transferred be seas across the lands. Small dark area surrounded by snow appeared on July II and two days later I first saw a dark lim on the fork of a "Y" shaped mark in the direction of the seas. The line became more conspicuous on July 14 and on the 16th a dark area about the size of the lake appeared on the northern side of the stem of the "Y," which was connected with the northern sea. The next day there appeared a large dark gray area near the northern sea. This had grown much smaller by July 23, and a new area appeared to the south of the southern sea, concealing its outline. The line in the fork of the "Y" had extended. On July 24 a large dark area, apparently either a lake or sea, appeared near the melting snow, and on July 25 the southern branch of the "Y" hecame very narrow, the outlines of the northern seas were seen again, a narrow white line stretching north from the snow. Many other changes were noted. Rapidly changing faint withis areas were seen. Green areas near the poles have not been seen for many weeks, but traces were recently discovered, and a bright green area was distinctly seen near the north pole last night.
