





MORE MILLIONS FROM ROCKEFELLER

of Chicago a New Year's Gift of \$2,191,000.

Chicago, Jan. 5.-John D. Rockefeller king's latest present to the Midway warships. school includes three separate sums amounting to \$2,191,000, and raises the figure of his total benefactions to the university to \$28,809,661.98.

The gift was announced the university officials in a letter from John D. chief item is \$2,000,000 in securities for endowment purposes, and another is \$155,000, the amount of the deficit in the school budget for the next fiscal year. The remaining \$36,000 is for special expenses asked by the university authorities.

The gift follows closely on the visit Heckman and Trevor Arnett of the

Instead of naming the amount of the ndowment fund in the precise figures of \$2,000,000 in his letter to Mr. Ryerson, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., stated that the gift consisted of "securities that will produce an annual income of \$80. 000 to the university." Dr. T. W Goodspeed, registrar of the university said that the capitalized figure would be \$2,000,000, however.

The present gift is next to the largest amount the university has ever received from the founder, the largest being that in December, 1906, when the amount was \$2,917,000. With the \$600, 000 recently given for the Harper memorial library fund, the gifts for the ast year total \$2,791,000.

The sum of \$155,000 which will go to the deficit is the least the university ever asked for. The deficit at one time reached \$275,000. The university N. uathorities believe that the school will become self-supporting in the near future. Less than three millions are now required in order to do away with the annual deficit altogether, according to Dr. Goodspeed.




