Washington, June 24.—Capture of 45,000 prisoners, many cannon and enormous stores of war material by the Italians in their counter-offensive, which has driven the Austrians across the Piave, is announced in an official cablegram received today by the Italian embassy from

GERMANY MAY TAKE CLOTHES FROM DEAD

London, June 24 — (British Wireless Service).—Clothing in Germany has now become almost as scarce as food. Perhaps nothing could more graphically reveal the clothing plight of Germany than a proposal just put forward by Justizarat Otto Feig, a prominent Berlin lawyer, that the Government should forthwith enact a law making it compulsory for the executors of dead people or the administrators of the estate to turn over to the state all clothing left by the deceased persons.

DISASTER GRIPS AUSTRIAN ARMS AT DIAZ' HANDS

THE WAR SITUATION

Shattered on the rock of Italian resistance, the Austrian offensive has turned into a retreat, and from Montello to the sea the enemy is hurrying back across the Plave before the closely pursuing Italians.

Austria's defeat is being halled throughout Italy and allied countries, not so much because of the Italian victory, but because of the Austro-Cerman offensive. Holding the final barriers to the Venetian plain and Lombardy, the Italians by their steadfast resistance during eight days of heavy fighting, turned the great enemy onslaught into a disorderly repulse.

Huns May Not Escape.

Whether the several enemy divisions on the western bank of the Plave will be able to escape capture or destruction in attempting to cross the Plave to the opposite bank will be the next inversion of the next few hours.

The river is swollen, and Vienna, in

The river is swollen, and Vienna, in its latest communications, seems to be preparing the way for unwelcome news, it dilates at length on the burdens placed on the troops by the heavy rains and the torrential Plave, Most of the Austrian bridges are gone, and the Italian heavy artillery is still within range at points where the Austrians crossed and near the river bank where the Italian line has held fast.

Diaz in Hot Pursuit.

Undoubtedly Gen. Diaz's men realize the predicament of the enemy, and their pursuit of the fleeing Austrians will be pressed with ardor. In withdrawing from Montello, the enemy probably will meet with as much difficulty as in getting out of the rain-soaked towns and along the lower reachs of the Plave.

To add to the troubles of the Austrian command, their advances across the Plave have been on unconnected sectors, with the Italians holding the sectors.

Austrian Reports Faise.

Austrian official claims of the capture of 40,000 prisoners and on allied air losses are declared to be fabrications, in a semi-official note issued in Rome. It is asserted that the Italian losses in killed, wounded and missing aggregate 40,000. Austrian losses are placed at 180,000 by Italian newspapers.

Civil unrest in Austria-Hungary is still rampant, and there has been little alleviation of the food conditions. Failure of the Austrian offensive probably will have an appreclable effect on the situation in the Dual Monarchy. The Austrian cabinet is reported to have decided to present a collective resignation to the emperor.

Except for raids at night and in the early morning hours, there is no activity on the front in France and Flanders. The Germans show no intention of again taking up a forward movement, but the next effort, like previous ones, probably will begin unneraided, except by several hours of intense bombardment.

Grand Offensive Ends In Disorderly Retreat Of Karl's Forces In Which He Abandons All His Artillery West of Piave.

ITALIAN ARMIES PRESSING MERCILESSLY ON FLEEING FOE

General Diaz Assumes the Off ensive Along Greater Part of Line and Is Administering Terrific Beating to Routed Austrians.

Italian Army Headquarters, Sunday 23 .- (Night, by Associated Press).—The great retreat by the Austrians along the Piave front began under cover of darkness on Saturday night. The retreating troops left their cannon

Italian detachments are pursuing the enemy east of behind them.

OLD POSITIONS RETAKEN.

Rome, Sunday, June 23.—Italian troops have crossed the old channel of the Piave River, west of the main stream, and recaptured several of their old positions there, according to a semi-official announcement tonight. From Capo Sile other detachments are advancing toward the

main stream of the river. The Italians have thrown numerous bombing detachments across the main stream, where the artillery and air

craft are hammering the enemy. Austrian troops left to cover the retreat used their machine guns to set up a barrage fire.

PURSUIT PRESSES HARD.

When it was observed that the Austrians had begun a retrograde movement the Italians began to attack virtually all along the Piave line from Montello, on the north, well towards the mouth of the river. The attack was quickly pressed and became more insistent, accompanied by violent artillery fire.

The number of guns left behind by the Austrians they retreated has not been computed, but is said to be

The Italians began at dawn on Sunday. With the very great. Montello on the left flank, the attack was carried out all along the lines through Candelu to San Dona di Piave.

MANY THOUSANDS SURRENDER.

Italian Army Headquarters, Sunday, June 23.—The Austrian retreat, which began in an orderly manner, soon became wildly disorganized and confused. Many thousands of Austro-Hungarians surrendered at the first opportunity when overtaken by their pursuers.

An Italian staff officer arriving from the fighting zone on the Piave River, exclaimed as he ran into the Italian army headquarters tonight: "Victory is ours! We have put the enemy across the Piave all the way!"

ROME REJOICES.

Rome, June 23.—The news that the Austrians have retreated across the Piave, pursued by the Allies, caused the greatest enthusiasm here. Extra editions of newspapers were bought up as fast as they were issued. Flags were displayed and bands played the royal march, while crowds cheered the King, the army and Gen. Diaz. CITY REGISTRATION CARDS WILL BE BASIS OF CALL TO **VOLUNTEER FARM LABORERS**

Those Signed in London Being Checked Over To Get

MORE THAN 50,000 SIGN

City Returns Far Exceed the Original Estimates of Assessment Department.

Registration on Saturday was an easying, leisurely, pleasant social function sort of event, compared with the rush and squeezing of preceding days of the week. Instead of manifesting any desire week. 

At the time of the failure there were assets of \$2,371,050, of which \$690,470 has been dispersed in expenses and \$1,660,737 paid out to the shareholders and depositors, the more fortunate of whom received about 50 per cent of their claims. The sum of \$33,691 remains in unclaimed dividend checks, and this will be placed in the Bank of Commerce to await claimants.
