SLAYS OFFICER WITH HIS OWN REVOLVER: THEN MAKES ESCAPE

Michigan Crook Kills Inspector Near Windsor.

POLICE DRAGNET IS OUT

Border Cities Co-operate in Search For Cold-Blooded Murderer.

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 25 .- Provincial officers and the police of Windsor, Walkerville and Sandwich, co-operating with Detroit authorities, have thrown out a dragnet which they say James Steward, alias Stewart, alias George Gordon, professor early this morning, cannot successfully break through.

Inspector Jackson was bringing Steward from Winnipeg to Detroit, where he was going to hand him over to the officers of Calhoun County, Mich., to stand trial for the robbery of a safe in Battle Creek on the night of March 15, 1916.

When the train slackened speed at Lakeshore Junction for the run into Windsor Michigan Central yards. Steward, who is a notorious and skillful pickpocket, juggled the revolver from the immigration inspector's pocket. This move was not noticed by Jackson, and when Steward rose suddenly Jackson also started to his feet. Steward then drew the inspector's revolver and, without uttering a word, aimed it at Jackson and fired. The Winnipeg man collapsed with a bullet through his abdomen. Pointing to Steward he gasped: "Stop that man!" and fell back on the seat unconscious. He died within five minutes.

Still flourishing the revolver Steward backed to the rear door and jumped from the moving train. All trace of the murderer from that moment has been lost.

Paris, Jan. 25.—An attack upon the political censorship was made in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday by Alexandre Blanc, a Socialist deputy. Replying to Deputy Blanc Premier Briand declared that a country where the liberty of the press was suppressed would be a country without liberty.

"But, we are at war," he continued. "and some sacrifices must be accepted even in the domain of thought. A censorship is necessary. Assuredly there are risks of abuse, but this comes about through the complexity of the organization of this institution."

Deputy Blanc's request to the Chamber for leave to continue the discussion was rejected by a vote of 324 to 141.
