NO GENERAL ELECTION THIS YEAR

PROMISES GOVERNMENT CANDIDATE HOTRUM AGAIN

Head of Saskatchewan Government Announces Reasons for Holding Provincial Election on July 9-Pledges Enforcement of Saskatchewan Temperance Act.

Regina, May 17.-The provincial election will be held in Saskatchewan July 9. This announcement was made yesterday by Premier Martin, in a statement in which the premier says that "the most important reason for the holding of an election at the present time is the desire of the Government that the business of Saskatchewan should be dealt with on its merits and not confused or affected by issues which affect the whole of Canada and questions which are of federal jurisdiction."

The Government pledges itself to many reforms if elected. In this connection, Premier Martin in his manifesto says: "It is our intention, as far as our constitutional and financial powers will permit, to cooperate with the farmers in any practical method of improving the system of marketing grain and farm products generally." PROMISES INVESTIGATION.

The Government, he says, will continue its fight against the high freight rates; will provide for an agriculture survey of the province, and the establishment of demonstration farms under the control of the college of agriculture in close touch with the people. The Government promises a thorough investigation into the treatment for tuberculosis, and will make provision for the necessary institutions for proper care for patients. The Government pledges itself for the continued vigorous enforcement of the Saskatchewan temperance act. In education and labor reforms it proposes to continue the various lines of progress already established. It plans to further develop highways and telephones; aid agriculture with all means in its power, and continue its efforts to secure the transfer of natural resources to the province. WRITS ARE ISSUED.

Writs for the election were issued today. Nominations will be held June 2. The election will terminate the fourth legislature of Saskatchewan after a life since June 26, 1917. As constituted now there are in the House of 62 members 51 supporters of the Martin Government, six Conservatives, three soldier members, and two independents.

At the last session of the House, a re-distribution bill was passed hich gave the three cities, Regina, Moose Jaw and Saskatoon, two representatives instead of one, and created a new constituency, Gravelburg. As the three soldiers' seats will disappear, the change merely

CROP CONDITIONS IN WEST GOOD, THOUGH SEASON LATE

Winnipeg, May 17.—Reports from 230 points in the Prairie Provinces indicate that crop conditions on the whole are very satisfactory though the season is generally rather later than last year, according to the first crop report of the Manitoba Free Press, which will be published this

The acreage in wheat is little, if any, less than last year, when the acreage seeded was a little over 16,000,000 By provinces, it would seem that Manitoba is practically unchanged. Saskatchewan slightly less and Alberta, with an increase sufficient to offset the shrinkage in Saskatchewan.

The winds, which were reported to be doing such havoc in Saskatchewan, have evidently been exaggerated, and the amount of re-seeding to be done is relatively small. The supply of moisture is abundant, only three or four points reporting that they would be the better for rain. Fully 95 per cent of the wheat crop is on good moist ground and

generally well cultivated. There is little sign of the dread grasshopper in any of the provinces, and the cold weather and frosts of the past few days, that retarded growth, have also retarded the hoppers.





"Any enumerator who makes public any information obtained in the homes is liable to a fine of \$300. or six months in jail," he declared. "On the other hand, all information must be given, and persons withholding it are liable to a similar penalty. The enumerators are to be trained so that they may enter a home, upon invitation, and in a very courteous manner obtain the infor-mation required, to fill out their forms. These forms will be checked over in my office, and if correct will be forwarded o Ottawa. This census is a routine one, taken every ten years, but it is eleven years since the last one. We wish the citizens to co-operate with us in our work in London, and to assist in giving all the information required by the law.

The account originally consisted of \$70,000, but part of it was paid out for the wrecking of the old high school building.

SOME YAMASKA HUMOR.

The Yamaska by-election has a comic side, as Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux showed in the House of Commons by Mr. A. A. Mondou to La Presse (Montreal) on July 8 of last year. Premier Meighen was the subject of Mr. Mondou's discourses at that time, and he described the new leader of the Government as a "narrow-minded man," said that his selection was the worst that could have been made, referred further to the premier as "a hangman and an autocrat," and concluded that "with a prime minister like Mr. Meighen the Province of Quebec can expect nothing."

In politics it is necessary sometimes to have a short nemory, and evidently that of the premier is most obliging, since he is giving his backing to the man who is quoted as having called him a "hangman." It must be a rather bitter pill to swallow, but Mr. Meighen has to swallow a good many bitter pills these days, and even Mondou may come easy after some of the others. Probably the premier would be quite as ready to accept Mr. Lavergne or Henri Bourassa, if they could deliver a safe seat, and, of course, he would have a good precedent, since Sir Robert Borden welcomed these Quebec Nationalists with wide-open arms when they came to his help in 1911.

The Tory party in Canada always likes to have Ontario think that it cares not at all how Quebec stands, but there is no party in Canadian political history that has made such obeisance to Quebec as has the Tory party whenever it needed support from the French-Canadian province. After the election of 1911 Mr. Armand Lavergne declared openly that he had been offered the naming of three or four ministers in the cabinet that was then being formed, as a recognition of his part in crowning the Conservative banners with victory. That story was not, as far as we are aware, ever denied, and, indeed, the Borden party would have been ungrateful if they had not given some such re ward to the Bourassa crowd, who did so much for them

The same abject attitude is in evidence today. Mr Mondou can call his leader ugly names one day, and be backed by the Government as its candidate the next day. The Yamaska man can have almost anything he wants if he will but win the by-election. We venture the prediction, however, that Mr. Mondou will be an "also ran" when this particular Quebec contest is over

THE ST. LAWRENCE PROJECT

The proposal to make the St. Lawrence River navigable, so that ocean-going vessels may have communication with the Great Lakes, is engaging widespread attention at the present time. If the vast engineering scheme which is being considered is brought to maturity ocean steamers will be able to carry cargoes, without rehandling, from any point on the Great Lakes to any American or European port, or, in fact, to any port in the world. The colossal nature of this scheme is calculated to take away the breath of those who have only in mind its cost, and are unable to correctly visualize its possibilities, for the sum required is estimated at approximately \$1,500,000,000, or four times the cost of the Panama Canal.

The main thing in all such world projects has been consideration of the advantages to be derived from their being successfully carried out, not the amount of dorsement from anti-neise enthusiasts the money or labor involved in their construction. It was in this spirit that the Suez Canal was constructed and it was with the idea of the immense importance attached to the creation of a short-cut to the Pacific and the elimination of the Cape Horn route which encouraged the projectors of the Panama Canal to go ahead in the face of the most appalling difficulties.

Then, of course, there arises the question of expedi ency. Is the proposed St. Lawrence waterway going to be a benefit to the many, or only to the few, for before embarking on any such gigantic plan it is a coognized law that the good of the majority must have the principal consideration. It is in this connection that those interested in the prosperity of the city of Montreal are mainly concerned, and the theory has been advanced that the trade of that port will be injured if ocean-going vessels are able to pass it by and land their cargoes at some point farther on which will be much more convenient for distribution. This is, in effect, what happened to Quebec, and Montreal fears the fate of that city. Undoubtedly Montreal has much at stake. This city now handles a greater volume in value of business than any port on the American continent, with the solitary exception of New York.

At the same time, if the prosperity of the Dominion as a whole is increased by the carrying out of the 8t. Lawrence project, Montreal, like other places, will participate in the general development. It must also be borne in mind that higher up the river and on the shores of the Great Lakes there are cities anxiously ewaiting for just such an opportunity of expansion as the construction of the new waterway would afford.


Like Twelve Blind Mice.

KNOLLWOOD PARK RESIDENTS OPPOSE **COLLECTION OF TAX**

judge. In event of the latter handing




