Hot Shot for Roosevelt From Despoiled Colombia

Calls Some Hard Names.

Appeals to American People to Resent Government's Treachery

Says the United States Has Violated Its Word and Compromised Honor of the Nation.

New York, Nov. 19. - In response to a request telegraphed to Bogota with a view to ascertaining the attitude of the press and people of Colombia concerning the isthmian situation, the following, delayed in transmission, has just been received: Bogota, Nov 16-The Colombian people protest and appeal to the American people against the conduct of the Government, presided over by Mr. Roosevelt. The United States is solemnly obliged by the treaty of 1846 to guarantee the rights of property and the sovereignty of Colombia

in Panama. Now the American Government has violated its word and hence has compromised the honor of the American people. Colombia has wished and wished that the United States shall open the canal through Colombian territory. The disapproval of the Hav-Herran treaty was due to constitutional obstructions, which can be legally removed by the Colombian people and which were made worse by the diplomatic courtesies of the department of state and its representatives here.

MODERN EXPLOSIVES. In the days of short guns—during the Dahlgren period—only black powder was used-a mechanical mixture that was practically the same as that used by Genghis Khan. When this powder burned it simply flashed and its pressure was developed instantly. As the introduction of long guns necessitated a change in powder, the Germans invented the brown or "cocoa" powder, the charcoal of which was made from carburized straw. This was made in hexagonal grains about an inch and a half in diameter and one inch in length, pierced with a longitudinal hole, it required three-quarters of a second for a grain to burn in open air, giving off large quantities of gas ducing a dense smoke cloud and leaving a large residue of carbonate of potash. The secret of brown powder ously guarded for a long time, but finally the great powder firm of the Duponts, after many trials, succeeded in turning out an article equal in every way to the German powder.

SMOKELESS POWDER.

But brown powder had a short life. 
