'According to the reports of eye-witnesses, the Russians silenced three of the Japanese batteries, after which the Japanese fire ceased."

Jap Guns Destroyed.

Mukden, July 26.—The latest reports received here are to the effect that the Russians, with about 100 guns in action in the Ta Tche Kiao engagement, inflicted serious losses on the Japanese, and destroyed many of their guns. The Japanese attack on the center of the Russian position was repuised, but the Russians were ordered to retire yesterday and occupy a village ten miles south of Ta Tche Kiao. This movement was carried out in good order.

Ottawa, July 25. — Supplementary estimates tabled by Hon. W. S. Fielding late this evening contain a large number of items of interest to Canadians generally. The total amount called for by this blue book is \$11,839,-270 72. The main estimates for 1904-5 submitted early in the session called for \$62,935,338 84. The total is, therefore, \$73,774,609 56. Of course, a considerable portion of both sums is made up of expenditures on capital account. As prophesied in yesterday's dispatch, there is a vote for the commencement of the Georgian Bay Canal. The item reads as follows: "Survey for waterway between Georgian Bay and Montreal, via French and Ottawa Rivers, \$250,000." Another item under the heading, "Transportation facilities," is \$55,-000 for the eastern breakwater at Port

HICKS PREDICTS

he Usual Storm Periods, Heat Cold and Earthquakes in August.

Rev. Irl R. Hicks, of St. Louis, has promulgated his "forecasts for August," from which the following extracts are taken:

The first six days of August are covered by the combined disturbances of Vulcan, Mercury and Mars. The regular Vulcan storm period is central on the 3rd. The culminating days of the period will be the 3rd, 4th and 5th. On and touching these dates general storm conditions will develop and pass from west to east across the country. Sections which have been visited by many electrical, rain and hail storms during much of July and August, will most likely have the same character of storms during this period. In the absence of the Mars influence the Mercury disturbance added to this regular storm period would greatly increase the chances of general, diffused rains during this period; but sections which have had little rain for weeks prior, we fear, will get more threatening storm clouds and bluster than rain during these disbluster than rain during these disturbances. The Mercury influence, blended with a regular storm period, as in the present instance, normally tends to copious and general rains; but the dominance of the Mars influence tends to fix and perpetuate local conditions which prevail at the beginning of this period. After heavy storm and bluster about the 3rd, 4th and 5th, look for rising barometer, westerly winds, and cooler. On and touching the 8th and 9th, under the influence of reactionary

storm forces, intensified by the moon's extreme north declination and conjunction with the sun, the temperature will visit many localities in their ings of the summer, the barometer will fall, and severe storms and bluster wil visit many localities in their sweep from west to east. This heated spell will not break down until after the new moon on the 11th, with strong probabilities that it will last into the regular storm period extending from the 12th to the 17th. The moon will be at new, or in

conjunction with earth and sun, on the 11th, in perigree, or nearest the sun, on the 12th, and on the celestial equator on the 14th, the central day of a regular storm period. This period is also embraced in the oncoming Venus disturbance, which is central on the 24th. The waning influence of the Mars disturbance will also combine with the causes named during this period. It is more than probable that equatorial disturbances will make their appearance in the gulf regions early in this period. The disturbances of this period, whether or not West India storms come up from the south, may be expected over most interior parts of the country from Saturday, the 13th, to Tuesday, the 16th, the culmination falling most likely on the 14th and 15th. Vicious thunderstorms and high gales will center about Sunday, the 14th. If equatorial hurricanes or cyclones should make their presence felt about our southern coasts at this time, the storms that

IT IS DEATH TO BACILLI

Scientists Say Proper Sanitation Means Health.

Washington, July 26. - Government pathologists and bacteriologists are following with great interest the genera boards of health of the larger cities to-ward securing better ventilation of street cars, churches, places of amusement, etc., and hope that much light can be thrown upon the possibility of infection through inhaling the respirations of diseased persons. In New York a special appropiration of \$10,000 will be used by the board of health for the study of pneumonia and acute respirat-ory diseases and the possibility of infection through inhalation. The mission which will have charge of this important investigation to New York will be composed of pathologists and bacteriologists of national reputation. In this connection Dr. Walter Wyman surgeon-general of the United States Marine Hospital Service, says:
"We have lately been compelled to modify some of our notions of the cause of contagious and infectious diseases After the brilliant discoveries by Pasteur and Koch, it was thought the presence of the pathogenic microbe or ganism was like the bite of a venomous snake, surely poisonous. But now we know there are other conditions necessary to produce disease. Many people go about carrying disease germs which do not develop and produce sickness. Why? Because their system is vigorous enough to prevent it, but put such a person under bad sanitary conditions or depress his vitality and

the microbes get to work, cause disease and death may follow.

"Many people live a long and active with typerals headly encycted in life with tubercle bacilli encysted in the apex of one lung. As long as they have plenty of fresh air and sunshine and good sanitary surroundings, they remain well. But give such a person poor food or bad sanitary surroundings and the cells die and the victorious ba cilli spread havoc through the lungs. We find that the conditions of health which result from such good sanitary conditions are after all among the very best preventives against infection."

Flying Machines at \$10 Each Sinking of Knight Commander Are Promised.

NEW YORK TO CHICAGO, ONE DAY HAD A MISCELLANEOUS CARGO

A Winged Nation Within Five Years American Liner Arabia Carried Big Is Holland's Prophecy-Safer Than the Bicycle.

New York, July 26. - John P. Holland, inventor of a submarine torpedo boat, announces that his flying machines will not cost more than \$10, and that within five years men will be flying from this city to Chicago in a day. His apparatus consists of four wings with bamboo frames, which will be attached to the arms and waist of the person using them. The apparatus will not weigh more than 25 pounds, and he declares any man will be able to use it on sight, and fly without any elabor-

ate preliminary training. Mr. Holland has been working on the problem for 34 years and has made four different types of flying machines only to discard them because the principle was wrong. In his fifth effort he has adopted the aeroplane principle after a long study of birds in flight. He is holding back the details of the construction of his flying machine until the Government grants him a patent. In discussing his apparatus Mr. Hol-

Those with which the first trials soon will be conducted will be in two sizes, one pair seven and the other ten feet long.
