SUNDAY'S FRESHET

The prolonged and terrific rain storms of last week was the cause of the great damage done to dykes and other property throughout the two provinces. The low lands in this county were inundated and it was not long before the brooks became rivers.

The Cornwallis river and the brooks leading into it became choked, overflowing the streets and dykes. On Saturday evening the road leading to Coldbrook, about a mile and a half out was flooded, the water being up to the hubs of the wheels. The water as it came to the Cornwallis bridge passed under with a terrific force.

All day Sunday the water surrounded the Nova Scotia Carriage factory wetting the coal and lumber which was outside. Mr. Leslie Eaton lost a large number of logs which were carried over the two dams on the Mill Brook some were washed upon the banks of the Cornwallis and others carried away to the port.

The damage done in this county was nothing to that done in the other counties of the province and also in New Brunswick. In New Brunswick several of the rivers rose six or seven inches, bridges and pieces of the railroad were washed away thus delaying trains. Every day accounts of the different washouts are reported.

Evidently the disease of small pox has run its course in Kentville and by careful quarantine and vaccination it has been confined to the two cases. The members of Mr. More's family who were liable to catch the disease have not shown any signs of it and vaccination will probably prevent it hereafter.

Mr. Hardy's daughter is improving rapidly from her mild form of the disease. Careful inquiries from all over the town and the county show that no other cases of small pox exists. There seems to be no fear of anyone in town who was not in the quarantined quarters coming on with the disease as now over 13 days has elapsed since they were liable to catch it.

DEATH ROLL

Mrs. JAMES BURNS

The funeral services of Mrs. James Burns an old resident of Wolfville, were held on Tuesday from her late residence. Father Kennedy of Windsor officiated at the burial.

The deceased was 97 years of age and came to this county from Ireland when nineteen years of age. After being married at Windsor she with her husband took up their abode at Black River, where Mr. Burns made a farm for himself from unimproved lands. They had five sons, Patrick, John, Edward, Martin and James, and two daughters, Mrs. Bernard Farrell of Kentville and Mrs. Thomas Kelly of Wolfville, where Mrs. Burns spent the last twenty years of her life. Edward lives on the homestead and James is a prominent citizen of Danvers, Mass.

Mrs. JAMES G. PATRIQUIN

The residents of Wolfville, were greatly shocked on Monday on hearing the news of the death of Mrs. James Patriquin an old resident of Wolfville, which occurred at Halifax last Monday. The remains were forwarded to Wolfville, where burial took place on Wednesday.

The deceased was the daughter of the late Deacon William Pick, for a great many years a standard bearer in the Baptist church. She has been a widow for many years, and her children all survive her. They are Charles A., George H., Ella (Mrs. Blankhorn of Canning,) Bella and Grace.

A recent article published in the Wedge gives a wrong impression as to the condition of the back yard at the store of the late A. C. More. It conveyed the idea that the place was never cleaned. The health authorities in the town allows no places centrally located in the town to go for any length of time without being cleaned up. If the proprietor neglects to do so he is notified that it must be done. Mr. More was always very tidy about his premises as everyone knows who visited his store and his back yard never went longer than a month without being cleaned. Mr. Wm. Waters who did this work for Mr. More said in a conversation on Tuesday that it was usually cleaned about every three weeks and he performed the job about a week before Mr. More was taken sick and about the usual time elapsed when he cleaned it up last week. Instead of their being leads of filth and disease breeding germs, the stuff removed consisted of about a dozen good flour barrels, 20 or 30 grape baskets a table, a step-ladder, a \$20 ice cream freezer and part of another freezer and several other articles of value that had been stored there about the time Mr. More was taken sick. Only a very little was decaying or refuse matter that could be scraped up after the frost had left. Mrs. More regrets exceedingly that any one should get a wrong impression of the way Mr. More kept his premises and so we make this explanation in her behalf.

The Baptist Sabbath School at Lower Canard held a very successful Easter concert last Sunday night. The church was nicely decorated for the occasion and the readings, solos, duets and choruses were excellent. R. O. Chisholm is superintendent of the school and Mrs. Chisholm exercised great pains in the training of the scholars for the concert.

Clement B. Eaton, one of the oldest and best known residents of St. Stephens, N. B., died on Friday evening, March 29th. His wife died on Wednesday evening following, husband and wife thus passed away within a few days of each other. Mr. Eaton was a native of Cornwallis, N. S., and was 77 years of age.

CANNIBALISM

The Singapore correspondent of the Daily Express, London, on April 4th wires a ghastly story of cannibalism at sea brought to Singapore by two survivors of the Nova Scotia barque Anglea, wrecked six days sail from Manila October 23rd last. The correspondent says:

The survivors—Johnson, a Swede, and Marticornu, a Spaniard—assert that the Anglea struck a reef. Two rats were built. The smaller bearing five men, disappeared. The latter, with twelve, drifted for forty days. The sailors ate barnacles, seaweed and finally their boots.

On the twenty-fifth day two became insane and killed themselves. On the 26th a Frenchman quickly killed the mate with an axe, drank his blood and tried to eat his brains, but was prevented by others. Next day the Frenchman was killed while attempting to murder the captain. The survivors all of whom are now insane, ate the Frenchman's body.

Cannibalism continued until only Johnson and Marticornu remained. On the forty second day the raft stranded on Subi or Flat Island in the Natuna group (northwest of Borneo). Johnson and Marticornu were awfully emaciated. Friendly Malays sent them by junk to Singapore.

The only vessel corresponding to the above is the Windsor barque Angola, Captain Crocker, which left Manila October 13 for Newcastle and return to Manila. She registered 1,550 tons and was built in 1890 and owned by Wm. H. Mosher, of Newport.]

A FINE PROPERTY

Hantsport Advance We called on Mr J.H. Pullen, proprietor of the Oak Hill Dairy Farm, the other day. Mr. Pullen is a native of Maine, and moved to Hantsport about 20 years ago, engaging in the sale of the Opeleka remedies, of which he is owner. About two years ago moved to his present location and purchased two farms, 300 acres in all, 55 acres dyke land, making one of the most valuable properties in this or any other county.

On the farm is an orchard of some 1400 apple trees, yielding about 1000 barrels yearly. These are mostly of standard winter varieties, and the orchard is kept in good shape.

Mr. Pullen deals largely in cattle, carriages, and implements. He sometimes has 100 head of cattle, but his stock now numbers 31. Among his cows are four thoroughbred registered Ayrshires, and he also has some young stock of same breed. He keeps six horses. I noticed one fine four year old colt, sired by Provider, 2 221; a promising sister to the four year old is a yearling by Allie Clay, a good stock getter, well known to Kings County breeders. Mr. Pullen owned Allie Clay for a number of years. The yearling shows great speed. Both of these colts are bred from Mr. Pullen's Sherman mare.

The farm has a large flock of sheep, some of which are now fondling their young lambs, the little animals with legs the biggest part of them.

There was raised on the farm last year 1000 bushels of grain, some 600 bushels of potatoes, beside other root crops. Wm. McDonald is foreman and the right man for the place.

A Flourishing Institution

Over twenty-one years ago the Canadian Order of Foresters began doing business in the Province of Ontario, and in later years it has been enlarging its operations until now it has branches in every Province in the Dominion, having at the present time upwards of 40,000 members. During those years upwards of \$2,225,000 has been paid to the members and their dependents and at the end of January last it had over \$1,001,000 in a reserve fund in its insurance department. HANTSPORT TOWN COUNCIL

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held on the evening of April 2nd, in the Town Clerk's office. Mayor Whitman and Councillors Burgess, Dorman, Stevens, Mitchener and Davison were present.

Minutes of previous regular meeting and special meeting read and approved.

It was moved and seconded by Couns. Mitchener and Burgess that the revisors be paid \$5 each as usual. Passed.

Moved and seconded by Couns. Davison and Stevens that Stephen Pelton be Black Knight Inspector at the usual rate of pay.

Moved and seconded by Couns. Mitchener and Dorman that the clerk get the Revised Statutes.

Moved and seconded by Couns. Mitchener and Stevens that James L. Barker be appointed as Police Constable of the town for one year, to commence May 1st., his duties being the janitor work of the school and all other work necessary to be done for the town.

Moved and seconded by Couns. Stevens and Burgess that the clerk get advice from Mr. Christie, barrister, on the Emerald case.

A communication was read from the town medical officer in regard to general vaccination. It was resolved that the inhabitants of the town be strongly urged to be vaccinated, the teachers of the schools and the doctor to be notified to that effect.

Mr. Denson people are strongly agitating for the Dominion Atlantic Co. to build a station. Early this year, we believe, a petition, signed by every adult in that thriving village was sent to the railway authorities at Kentville. As no satisfactory answer was received (the officials thinking the petition was largely circulated in the interests of some private individuals,) a meeting was called on March 30th. It was unanimously resolved that a committee be appointed to prepare a letter to the D. A. R. officials, setting forth the extreme need of a station and freight house being built at Mt. Denson. At present there is only a platform. When the authorities fully realize the need of such conveniences, we feel they will be ready to comply with the request of the people.

Of late years the traffic at this point has largely increased, the Aberdeen Beach attraction being a great lodestone in that direction. There is also a large quantity of freight to be shipped if there was a siding provided.

Now it is said Quebec and Nova Scotia will shortly file claims for a share of the \$5,500,000 awarded to the Dominion by the Halifax Fishery Commission nearly thirty years ago.

The air at present is full of rumors of war. Russia may seize Manchuria; the Czar has warned France; Japan is preparing to fight Russia; Turkey threatens a holy war and China has refused to sign the Manchurian Convention.

The town authorities are considering the advisability of purchasing a piece of ground in the interest of the town and erecting thereon a suitable place with five or six apartments where anyone subject to an infectious disease may be taken and cared for without the trouble which is often necessary in quarantining a house near the centre of the town.

The Estimates were brought down April 1st. The estimated revenue for year ending Sept. 30, 1901, is \$1,034,906, with an estimated expenditure of \$1,026,965.89. The principal item of revenue estimated is \$460,000 royalties from mines.

At the last session of the Local Legislature Premier Murray introduced a bill in the House relating to cases pronounced incurable or convalescent in Victoria General Hospital and where there is a disinclination to leave the hospital.

The subject of roads is an important one now being considered by our Town Council and it cannot fail to come before the County Council also.

The matter of overdrafts will not solve the question at all; it only diminishes the amount to be received in the future.

The celebrated Delpit case has been brought to a close and judgment given in favor of the marriage being legal. The effect of the judgment in this case is to demonstrate the rights of persons to be married by any legalized authority, no matter what the creed of the contracting parties may be.

We have for nearly two years been enjoying a two cent postage. To help reduce the deficit that would like-

ly be met with in lowering the postage rates, the publishers of papers and periodicals have been obliged to pay postage on their publications sent outside of the county in which they are published. By so doing the deficit is not so large as it would be if the above had not been done.

The question of a new Court House and Jail with suitable county offices will come up before the Municipal Council in its session this month.

The most convenient place for the new Court House would be on the spot where the offices of the Registrar of Probate, Deeds and the late Judge of Probate now stands.

Col. Thomas ex-postmaster of Boston died at McLean Hospital last week and was buried on Sunday.

Rood Bros of Berwick intends erecting a canning factory in Berwick in the near future to put up all kinds of fruits etc.

Miss Mumford of Grand Pre spent Sunday with friends in Windsor.

PIETERSBURG CAPTURED

No news of any importance has been received from So. Africa for several days. The late despatches show that Gen. French is still pressing the Boers at Vryheid.

Pietersburg the terminus of the railway and since the evacuation of Pretoria has been the capital, has been captured by Plummer with very little difficulty.

General Kitchener reports that a detachment of a hundred men of the Fifth Lancers and Imperial Yeomanry were attacked by 400 Boers to the northward of Aberdeen, Cape Colony, and that after several hours fighting the British were surrounded and captured with the exception of 25, who succeeded in making their escape.

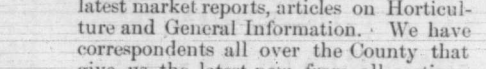

I beg to contradict the suggestion made in the Wedge, that my present quarantine at the house of Mr. Hardy was caused by professional jealousy. On the contrary I have received every courtesy and encouragement in my work from the physicians not only of this town but in the County generally. Whether nursing under their authority, or engaged in private cases of my own, I have always received kind encouragement and advice. On the other hand, I regret to remark that advice given by me to the laity on certain matters of sanitation have often been received with small thanks. Where ignorance is bliss, it is folly to be otherwise.

The small pox scare may be the means of making our citizens more careful and therefore avert worse dangers.

Mr. Hardy and his child both suffered from "modified small pox." Yet treated in the most careful manner on the latest and most scientific principles it was stopped in its course. I am in charge of the disinfection of Mr. Hardy's house and on hand in case of any immediate need. I think I can safely say that fear of any further developments of the disease is past.

Export Apple Trade

The total apple shipments to European ports for the week ending March 23, 1901, were 13,138 barrels, including 11,874 barrels to Liverpool, 2132 barrels to London and 1132 barrels to Glasgow. The exports include 2140 barrels from Boston, 1646 barrels from New York, 7860 barrels from Portland, 2825 barrels from Halifax and 667 barrels from St. John. For the same week last year the apple shipments were 26,311 barrels. The total apple shipments since the opening of the season have been 1,242,438 barrels; same time last year, 1,242,442 barrels. In detail, the shipments have been 406,232 barrels from Boston, 233,415 barrels from Portland, 246,221 barrels from Montreal, 196,736 barrels from Halifax, 20,801 barrels from Annapolis and 7939 barrels from St. John, N. B.

A cable despatch received on Monday last says: Steamer Commonwealth sailing, four thousand barrels sold. Demand is hampered by cold weather. Fancy Baldwins \$4.32 to \$5.28, mixed No. 1 and 2 \$3.36 to \$4.08, fancy Ben Davis \$4.56 to \$5.16, Ben Davis \$3.60 to \$4.32.

Shot in Cold Blood

Ottawa, April 9—Captain Charlie Ross, the famous Canadian scout who succeeded Maj. Gen. Howard, tells in a letter to Colonel Sherwood how Howard was killed. It is as follows: Derby, S. A., Feb. 18—Yesterday while the corps was out reconnoitering Major Howard accompanied by his orderly, was a couple of miles in advance of the corps and was ambushed by about sixty Boers, who immediately deprived them of their arms, ammunition and valuables and then brutally shot the two of them in cold blood. This happened on the borders of Switserland. Their remains were brought into camp today and were buried with due honors.

Place for the Ship-building Plant

Halifax, April 7—It is pretty well understood that the shipbuilding plant is to be located at the Northwest Arm. The Robb Engineering Company is to remove here from Amherst and conduct a marine engine works in connection with the enterprise.

General Botha has re-opened negotiations with the British for peace. As explained here this action was determined in part by General Botha's discovery, at a recent meeting, that General Dewet's intellect had weakened, and that his influence with his followers was diminishing and that a continuance of the campaign, in view of General Dewet's irresponsibility, rested with General Botha alone.
