

Canada's oldest official student publication

By TIMOTHY LETHBRIDGE The Brunswickan has been publishing for 118 years and is not in its 119 year. It is Canada's oldest official student publication, although it was not always called the Brunswickan.

For many years the paper was called the University Monthly and was published in the form of a booklet. At that time it contained a lot more in the way of creative writing.

In October 1922, the publishers felt the previous name was a little plain and so changed it to 'The Brunswickan'

In the late 1920's, the publication, which was still printing on a monthly basis, became a broadsheet paper, and on September 24th, 1931 it started publishing weekly. Then Lieutenant-Governor Hugh McLean said 'Such a paper will be an inspiration and assistance to students. The Bruns has had its ups and downs, but it has fulfilled that prediction and remains one of the premier student newspapers in Canada.

Students now are lucky. In 1930 they had to pay 10\$ per copy. By 1950 the price was down to 5\$ and for many years now it has been free, distributed to various points around campus for those who are ambitios enough to rise early on Friday mornings.

Many notable people have entered the Brunswickan's doors, become Editor-in-Chief and then departed to gain their fame. Once such notable was Dalton Camp.

On the entertainment scene, the Bruns is looking for people with a knowledge of rock and pop music, ballet, modern dance, classical music and any of the other fine arts to write in the Entertainment pages. We may also print short poems and fiction by student writers. THe mechanics of producing a newspaper requires people to design graphics, to typeset,

to prepare photographs for

printing on newsprint, to lay

out all the text and pictures on

the pages. This is a vital area which although unglamourous, leads to the healthy, cathartic pressure of facing the printing deadline, as we work Wednesday night and some Thursday mornings at the layout tables.

These sessions also lead to the unique, unpredictable, and fractious camaraderie we enjoy here in Room 35. Come join the fun
