The City of Brantford.

BRANTFORD is one of the most prosperous and flourishing cities in the province, with a population of some 16,000 persons. Although it does not aspire to be a metropolitan centre, it enjoys all the conveniences and advantages of the modern city, while it is free from those calls upon the purse of the citizen of average income, and the discomforts incident to large centres of population. It has attained its present position by a steady and healthy growth from the day of small things, until it has become an important commercial, manufacturing and educational centre. There is everything in the history of its municipal life as well as in its location, to provide the best of surroundings, morally, socially, and physically, for the average resident. It nestles picturesquely on the bluff overlooking the valley of the Grand River, and is surrounded by one of the finest farming districts in this western peninsula, which has so aptly been described as the Garden of Ontario.

The appearance of the city itself strikes the eye attractively. The houses are substantial and well built, being largely owned by their occupants, while the residence streets are of good width, generally boulevarded, with granolithic walls, and well adorned with shade trees. The parks are nicely kept in lawn, and walk, and flower bed, protected by abundance of forest trees, and providing restful and healthful spots for rest and recreation. In one of these, Victoria Park, opposite the Court House, stands the handsome bronze memorial of "Thayendenegea," Capt. Joseph Brant, and a marble fountain, with its never-ceasing flow of sparkling water, the recent gift of a citizen. Much taste is also



displayed by many private owners, both in the style and architectural beauty of the residences, as in the well trimmed lawns and gardens which surround them. The public buildings are also of the most substantial character, and commodious enough to meet all requirements. Among these may be noted the Institution for the Education of the Blind, the John H. Stratford Hospital, with an excellent staff, equipped and conducted on the most modern methods ; the New England Institution for the Instruction of Indian children in knowledge and the handicrafts ; the Young Ladies' College, in connection with the Presbyterian church in Canada ; the Free Library and Reading Room ; the Young Men's Christian Association Building, with its lecture hall, parlors and reading room ; Opera House, Athletic Club, Widows' Home, Orphans' Home, and County House of Refuge. These, with its handsome and well-appointed Central School, and five ward schools, Collegiate Institute, and a score of substantial and comfortable churches, attached to the different denominations, indicates that while Brantford has prospered in a business sense, its citizens have not been slow to appreciate the benefit of a complete educational outfit, as well as the necessity for those charitable institutions which go to the amelioration of the condition of the sick, the distressed and the unfortunate.

A small, but most efficient, police force keeps well the peace, and banishes lawlessness from our midst, while a well-drilled fire brigade, furnished with all the most approved appliances for this purpose, affords ample protection from fire. So thorough is the supervision in these respects, that both conflagrations and breaches of the peace have been reduced to a minimum.

In the matter of health, the record surpasses that of any of the Canadian cities. The Water Works, combining fire protection with an abundant supply of pure water for culinary and drinking purposes, are equal to every want of the city for many

Gas and two electric companies compete for public and private lighting and afford motive power, with the result that first-class light can be had as cheap as anywhere in Canada. The Bell Telephone Company have also a most serviceable system in operation. Brantford, indeed, is known as the home of the telephone, being where the experiments which led to the discovery of this useful invention were made by Prof. A. Graham Bell, some fifteen years ago.

Brantford is a cheap place in which to live, while its hundred factories afford good and remunerative employment in many branches for the young of both sexes. The market is one of the best in the west, especially upon Saturday, the leading market day. All kinds of farm produce bring good prices, while its retail establishments rival in variety and completeness the leading firms of the larger places. The rate of taxation, 17 mills, including school rates, is comparatively low, having due regard to the numerous public schemes for the benefit of the citizens, which have recently been undertaken and carried out by the corporation. In fact, Brantford, from its location, stability and enterprise, furnishes special advantages to manufacturers, business men and residents, from its central position, being well adapted for the carrying on of business through the west, while from its surroundings and wholesome prosperity, no spot is better suited for the home, or for the rearing, the education, or the securing of a pleasant walk in life for the younger members of the family.

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The

Points of Interest.

THE neighborhood of Brantford affords ample opportunity for beautiful drives, there being so many points from which wide and attractive views of the Valley of the Grand River may be obtained.

Around Tutela Heights; on the road to Bow Park; on the river road to Paris; to Mt. Pleasant; in fact in almost every direction the diversified scenery and rolling landscape are all that can be desired. To the stranger, among points worthy of a visit are:

The Blind Institute, to the west of the city, at the terminus of the electric car service.

The John H. Stratford Hospital, in close proximity, on the neighboring eminence.

The Young Ladies' College, Brant Avenue. Either the Market street or Brant avenue cars take one to the grounds.

The Young Men's Christian Association Building, Market square.

The Mohawk Institute, established in 1828, by the New England Company, for civilizing and advancing the Christian religion among the Indians. About half a mile from the city, on the Mohawk road.

The old Mohawk church, a short distance further on, the oldest church in Upper Canada. In the church yard lie the remains and tomb of Capt. Joseph Brant, of the Six Nations.

The Brant Memorial, on Victoria square.

Bow Park, about five miles from the city. A stock farm of about 1000 acres, almost surrounded by the Grand River, originally established by the Hon. Geo. Brown, possessing the finest herd of Shorthorns in America, and a most complete farm in every respect.

The County House of Refuge, on the Mt. Pleasant road.



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

CARRIAGES will be in waiting at Zion Church on SATURDAY, JUNE 17TH, at 2 p. m., to convey the Commissioners round the city, and enable them to visit the following places of interest—proceeding first to the

" NEW ENGLAND INDIAN INSTITUTE."

This is conducted by the "New England Society," and is under the superintendence of the Rev. Robert Ashton. Indian pupils are here from all parts of Canada, and receive a Christian as well as a secular education. A number of interesting relics are here preserved: the Bible presented by Queen Anne in 1712 to the Mohawk chiefs who visited Britain in that year, bears the date 1701, and was printed in the reign of William III. The signatures of the Prince of Wales, Prince Arthur, Lord Dufferin, Sir John A. Macdonald and others appear on the first page. The service of Communion plate is composed of massive vessels of solid silver, bearing the English Hall mark of 1711, and an inscription stating that it was presented by Anne, Sovereign of Britain, to her faithful subjects, the Indians of North America. A number of the earliest translations of the Scriptures into Mohawk, by Joseph Brant, are also in possession of Mr. Ashton. Leaving the Institute,

THE HISTORICAL MOHAWK CHURCH,

"Her Majesty's Chapel Royal of Canada," (for the Royal Arms are still displayed upon the wall), next claims our attention. The church was built in 1783, and is probably the oldest in Canada. In it, along with other interesting relics, is preserved the old bell brought from England in 1785 by Chief Brant; and in the graveyard adjoining the church is the tomb of that noted Indian warrior. Turning from these reminders of the Revolutionary times, we next call at

BOW PARK,

the former summer residence of the Hon. George Brown, and established by him as one of the leading stock farms of America. It is now the property of the Nelsons, of Edinburgh, and is under the able management of Mr. John Hope.

Returning to Brantford by the pretty river road leading from the Park and passing

" TUTELA HEIGHTS."

many years ago the home of the Tutela tribe of Indians. From this point is obtainable a magnificent view of the city, the neighboring villages, and the lovely valley of the Grand River, spoken of by Prof. Goldwin Smith as bearing a striking resemblance to the valley of the Trent in England.

The former home of Prof. A. Graham Bell, of Telephone fame, is here situated, and from these heights to the city the first telephone line was constructed. From this point a pleasant drive of three miles brings us to Brantford at 6 p. m., in time for the
