ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Directors present this the thirty-fourth Annual Report of their proceedings during the year.

The Income of the year compared with the year previous, was as follows:—

The total number of patients received and treated in the Hospital during the year was 384, and the number of outdoor patients, 180, as against 354 and 134 respectively, last year.

The number of days spent in the Hospital was 19,210, showing the average cost of each patient per day to be 46 cents.

The Building debt is now reduced to the instalments of \$720.25 each, payable 1st July next, and 1st January, 1886.

The amount expended for supplies of meat, bread, milk, vegetables, groceries, drugs, etc., during the year was \$8,843.36, and for the previous year, \$7,656.06.

The Income has not been for this year as large as usual, but owing to the reduction of Building debt the Board has been able to meet the demands made for monthly supplies.

The Medical staff have discharged their important duties with the same skill and faithfulness as heretofore, the directors hereby beg to tender them their sincere thanks.

The Directors desire to record their hearty thanks to the municipalities of the City of Ottawa, of the Counties of Carleton, Lanark, Leeds and Grenville, and the town of Perth, for the respective grants made by them.

And to the gentlemen in the city who have acted as the Collectors of Subscriptions in aid of the Hospital Funds, and also to those who undertook the work of soliciting subscriptions in the several towns in the vicinity of Ottawa.

The Directors would tender their thanks to the clergymen who have faithfully visited the sick and afflicted patients during the past year, also the Young Men's Christian Association for their unremitting attention to the patients.

To the members of the Ladies' Committee who have visited the hospital and performed so many kind acts.

To the Proprietors of the "Citizen" and "FREE PRESS" newspapers, for their valued use of their columns and donations of their respective papers for the use of the patients.

To Messrs. James Lindsay and T. W. Kenny, for their valuable services as auditors.

To Messrs. S. Rogers & Son, for their accustomed liberality in donating their account for undertaking.

In May last your Board appointed Dr. C. H. J. Chipman, a graduate of McGill College, as Resident House Surgeon, and his constant presence and attention have aided materially in the medical treatment of the patients.

In order to obtain proper authority to acquire bequests or donations of real estate and to dispose of such part thereof as may not be necessary for Hospital use, and also to permit the business year of the Hospital to run concurrent with that of the Government returns, it was found necessary to apply to the Legislature to obtain such amendments to the Charter as could give the power requisite in the premises, and the necessary steps have been taken to obtain this end.

The Matron and staff continue to give satisfaction in the performance of their relative duties.

The Old Hospital used for infectious diseases, has been efficiently managed under the care of Mrs. Goff.

The Directors in closing the report of another year, return thanks to a generous public in the city and neighborhood who have hitherto so well supported them in their efforts to carry on a large and arduous work, and although the receipts are somewhat smaller than they have been in the past, yet they have proved sufficient for the discharge of all demands made

on them during the year. They also anticipate with thankful hearts that in another year the Hospital will be free from mortgage debt, and pray that the Lord may enable His people to continue the good work which they have begun and maintained in earnestness and sympathy with the poor and afflicted.
