Bridge between the 2nd and 3rd Concessions of  
the Township of East Oxford, one mile south of  
limits of Woodstock. Abutments to be 10 feet  
long, 8 feet high and 2 1/2 feet thick at bottom,  
tapering to 2 feet thick at top with four wings  
each ten feet long, of same height and thickness  
as abutments, to be built of best Portland cement
