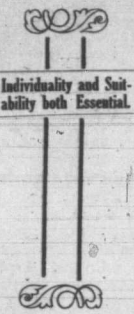

Ottawa, Mar. 3—King George has presented to the Canadian Government for remount breeding purposes the famous stallion Anmer. This is the horse that struck and killed the suffragist, Miss Davidson, who ran on to the track and clutched his bridle in the Derby three years ago. He is 6 years old. His sire, Florizel II, was a full brother to Persimmon and Diamond Jubilee, Derby and St. Leger, winners for the late King Edward. Anmer's dam, Guinea Hen, was a famous brood mare.

WESTERN EDITOR DEAD.

Vancouver, B.C., March 3—Dr. Frank Stuart Reynolds, former proprietor and editor of the Nanaimo Herald, Ladysmith Herald and Vancouver Daily Leader, is dead here aged 63.

ESTATE OF LATE WILEY SMITH

It is understood that the late Wiley Smith did not leave a will. His estate will probably amount to nearly one million dollars. Mr. Smith was the third largest shareholder in the Royal Bank of Canada and held the largest number of shares in the Acadia Sugar Refining Company and the wholesale grocery house in which he had the controlling interest, carries on as large a business as any other in the City. There being no will, administration will be taken out in the probate court. The Nova Scotia statute of distribution of estates, under these circumstances, provides that the widow shall have half of the realty and personalty. Mr. Smith had no children surviving so that the remaining half of the estate will likely be divided among the next of kin, who are two nephews—L. Mortimer Smith, of Halifax and Mr. Young of Shelburne. The succession duties will be estimated amount to about \$75,000.—Ex.

BRITISH ARE QUIETLY DOING THEIR SHARE

London, March 2—There has been much impatience in England the past few days because the British on the west front have been comparatively inactive, while the French have been engaged in desperate encounters, and it has been often asked by the men in the street why is not this the proper time for a great British offensive to deliver a smashing blow and relieve the pressure on the French side.

Some of the special despatches to the London morning papers from the British front endeavor to reply. The Times says:

"We are fretting because the British troops are not yet engaged in the fight. We need not fret. They are acting closely with the French and Belgian allies, and when the hour strikes they will take their part."

The Daily Sketch believes that the British may get a chance soon to take a hand by the use of their fleet, and quotes Lord Fisher as saying he is convinced that "a big Anglo-German fleet action may take place at any day or hour now."

The Chronicle's correspondent remarks: "The situation along the British front is normal and unexciting. The truth is, however, that we are waiting and watching for any sign that the enemy intends to take the offensive elsewhere than at Verdun, when all attention is directed on that point. Meanwhile, we are holding great German forces in lines which cannot be thinned because of our strength. By this means, we are helping our allies very effectively."

COOKING HINTS

If cookies are baked on the bottom of inverted dripping pans, they will keep from burning on the bottom and are more easily removed.

To keep yolks of eggs fresh, if only the white is needed, cover the yolk gently with a little cold water so as not to break it, and it will keep fresh for several days.

To make puree of pea soup, heat in its own liquor a can of peas, press through a sieve and add the pulp thus obtained to one quart of beef stock. Reheat and serve with cubes of toasted bread.

Apples cut in irregular blocks bake more quickly in a pie than in thin slices. When piled in a pie there is more chance for the heated air to circulate through the fruit than when it is packed in thin slices.

To prevent the drops of liquid that sometimes appear on a meringue, let the pie or pudding become slightly cooled before putting on meringue. Brown in a slow oven.

The secret of flaky pie crust is the use of hot water (not boiling) rather than cold in mixing dough. If this suggestion is followed the crust will always be flaky, tender and crisp.

Test potatoes by cutting in two and rubbing the cut surface together; then press the two parts together. If they stick the potatoes are good.

The addition of a little soda mixed with a teaspoonful of cornstarch to the cream before pouring it into the tomato mixture will prevent curdling soup.

No matter how much dripping is used, fish when fried is apt to stick to the pan's bottom. If a teaspoonful of dry salt is put into the pan and rubbed over it will be found satisfactory.

British Wrecks in February Numbered 69

London, March 2, 11.35 p.m.—An official communication issued tonight concerning marine losses says:

"British wrecks reported to the Board of Trade in February aggregated sixty-nine, involving a loss of 420 lives. Included in the wrecks were 42 steamships of a total tonnage of 56,856."

"Ten of these steamers were sunk by enemy warships, with a loss of 36 lives, five by mines, with a loss of 176 lives; one by a mine or submarine, with a loss of eight lives, and one by bombs from a Zeppelin, with a loss of 13 lives."

"Of twenty-seven sailing ships lost six were sunk by enemy warships."

London, March 2—A Bucharest despatch received by Reuters Telegram Company by way of Amsterdam says that the Queen Mother, Elizabeth of Roumania (Carmen Sylva) died this morning.

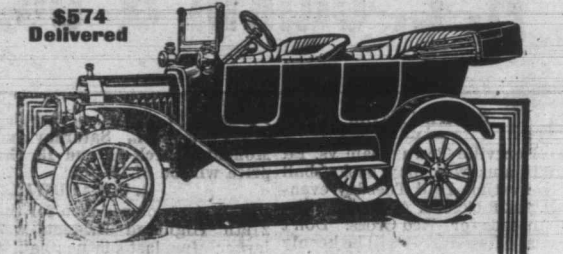



The Chief of Police, who is always alert and careful in his duties to protect the citizens and property of the Town, is still continuing in the same efficient manner.

Mr. Justice McKeown in his address before the Canadian Club, Halifax, Tuesday night said in part: "It was the example of such men as President Cutten and Principal Mackinnon that set on fire the youth of the land. It is for men in public life to rise up and lead our young men to battle. Then the patriotism that is smouldering in these Lower Provinces will burst into flame."

"When the years of this great conflict have passed into history," said Mr. Justice McKeown, "those who come after us will read how forty years of preparation were set at naught by a people trained in peace but invincible in war; they will learn how a people of Imperial race counted their lives not lost in the fulfilment of their plighted word."

Those who contributed to the Tobacco Fund for C Squadron, 6th C. M. R., will be interested in the following letter received from Major Lydiard from "Somewhere in France":

"The cigarettes arrived safely and it was a great pleasure for me to give them to the boys and to tell them they were sent from friends in Kentville. As is probably known the 6th. C. M. R., was broken up in transporting into infantry establishment and C Squadron now forms the 15th and 16th platoons of the C. M. R. Battalion. There are now about 100 members of the old C Squadron in these platoons and yesterday I had them remain after the others were dismissed from church parade when I gave them two packages of cigarettes apiece and told them from whom they came. The boys were going back to the trenches that night and were delighted to be remembered by the Kentville people. Kentville still holds a warm spot in their hearts and they often speak of the pleasant time spent there when the company was mobilized a year ago. On the r behalf I wish to thank all who contributed to this welcome gift."

Two hundred packages were sent across then and another consignment of the same number goes forward this week.

1700 Men Enlisted for Active Service in Nova Scotia Last Week

The splendid number of recruits enlisted for active service in Nova Scotia the past week shows that the fires of patriotism are burning brightly. Out of the number 1,556 were attached to the Highland Brigade. This shows the splendid response Nova Scotians gave to the call of Colonel Borden and the 85th Battalion. HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To fasten labels to tin cans, add one teaspoon of brown sugar to one quart of paste.

A heavy chalk mark laid a finger distance from your sugar box will keep ants away.

Water in which potatoes have been boiled is the best thing with which to sponge and revive a silk dress.

Put charcoal in bottom of pots for plants which are liable to become pot rooted, especially ferns.

Put a little soap into hot starch with the soap shaker. The iron will then seldom stick to the clothes while ironing.

Soak your lamp wicks in vinegar and dry before using; the light will be much more brilliant and this will also prevent their easily smoking.

Dampen fine sawdust with kerosene oil and you have a good dust bane. It is not colored, but that does not hinder it from gathering the dust when sweeping.

Clean enameled bath tubs and marble wash bowls with kerosene, then rinse thoroughly with strong soap suds to remove the odor of the kerosene.

Organdies, chambrays and fine cambrics may be washed without danger of fading if they be washed first in clear water in which a cupful of very coarse salt has been dissolved.

When making pastry if you melt the butter or lard, beat it to a cream before mixing with the flour, and very little salt, only half the usual quantity is required.

Put a lump of washing soda over the sink drain and pour hot water over it after each dish washing, in order to keep the pipes from clogging. This will save many a plumber's bill.

Apple Show in St. John Next Autumn.

Fredericton, N. B., March 1—At the annual meeting of New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association, which was held here this evening, it was decided by resolution to hold an apple show next autumn at St. John.

The provincial government will be asked at once to guarantee financial assistance for the project and it is expected that a show equally as successful as those held by provincial fruit growers previous to the war can be held next fall in St. John.

279 Returned Soldiers Given Employment in Civil Service

Ottawa, March 1—Some 279 returned soldiers have so far been given employment in the various branches of the civil service during the last fiscal year. Of these 260 have been employed in the militia department and 19 in other departments, it was stated in the House today.

ZEPPELIN RAID OVER ENGLAND

London, March 6—Twelve persons were killed in the air raid over England last night, and three Zeppelins took part in the attack. This information was received officially today. The statement follows:

"The number of Zeppelins which took part in last night's raid is now believed to have been three. After crossing the coast, the airships took various courses and from the devious nature of their flight apparently were uncertain as to their bearings. The area visited included Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, Rutland, Huntingdon, Cambridge, Norfolk, Essex and Kent.

"As far as is known, about 40 bombs were dropped altogether. The casualties, so far as ascertained amount to killed three men, four women and five children; injured, thirty-three. The material damage was two terrace houses practically destroyed, one public house, a cafe and several shops partly destroyed, and a block of aims-houses badly damaged."

PREMIER ASQUITH AND HOME PRODUCTS

A Remarkable Speech—Home Production Makes For National Conservation Resources

One of the strongest pleas for the support of home industry was made by Mr. Asquith recently in the House of Commons. During his speech he said:

"The intention and object with which these taxes are put forward is of a very different kind, and entirely without prejudice to the general question between free trade and what is called fiscal reform. The object—and a very important object—is, on the one hand, to diminish or discourage the consumption of superfluous or unnecessary commodities of a luxurious kind, but still more—and this to my mind, is the really important point—to discourage unnecessary importation. In the conditions under which we now live everything that comes into this country from abroad which is not absolutely needed for the sustenance or carrying on of the industry of our population, involving, as it does, a corresponding obligation on us to export, tends still further to disturb and depress the exchanges, and therefore to embarrass the conduct of the war and the provision of the financial resources which are absolutely necessary for its successful prosecution."

Canada has carried to a greater extreme than almost any other country the reckless habit of buying more abroad than she sells. It is true that we are remedying our fault in this direction and that our formerly adverse trade balance is being rapidly transformed into a favorable trade balance. Our imports are falling and our exports are rising, but our imports are still too large. Consumers in Canada should take Mr. Asquith's advice and determine to buy goods made in their own country rather than to send abroad huge sums of money which are sorely needed at home.

Those who have criticized the "Made-in-Canada" policy while it has been advocated in Canada during the past few years, would do well to ponder carefully over the remarks of the greatest Prime Minister Great Britain has ever had.

There was no loss except the damage to the freight train and the inconvenience to the passengers on the express who were held up for several hours.

London, March 2.—A resolution was adopted at a meeting for the re-organization of the British Consular Service with British-born consuls. One of the delegates asserted during the competition for trade between Britain and Germany preceding the war that 44 British Consuls were Germans.

A Brighton hairdresser and his son have given over 16000 shaves or hair-cuts free of charge to soldiers at the 2nd Eastern General Hospital, Brighton. They begin work every day at 5.45 a. m. and give up their early-closing half-holiday. It was stated recently that Nottingham hairdressers had given over 10,000 free shaves and hair-cuts to wounded soldiers.
