**Flour Regulations**  
 When in Canning on Saturday last the Editor of "Advertiser" heard some people violently discussing the work of the Food Board of Canada in its most necessary work of conserving food. The restrictions imposed upon people herein in the amount of purchase of flour and sugar and the necessity for purchasing substitutes with flour, was a wise measure and has been proved to have been beneficial and is saving hundreds of thousands of barrels of flour to feed our own soldiers and our starving Allies Overseas. Why people should complain at such trivial inconveniences is a matter of astonishment to others who hear them talk. If we were hard hearted we would wish such voluble declaimers a month or two in Austria or Germany that they might realize some of the privations which war brings, or in some of the Allied country under the control of the enemy that they might realize some of the atrocities and hardships from which the government of our Empire and our staunch British navy has saved us.

We do not infer that Canning is more garrulous and fault finding than many other places. But we do wish that our article may be read by a few middle some fault finders. No part of the Province has sacrificed so many of her noble young men as that part of our country. All who donned the Kings uniform have proved themselves men of noble blood and heroes and none of the Cornwallis lads as far as we know have disgraced their uniform or country. Some may have been considered shiftless and of little account before enlisting but when placed in the ranks they have played the game heroically, unselfishly and without constant growling as to their hardships, shall it be said that those of us who remain at home will have so share in hardships which war brings and will not inconvenience for the sake of maintaining our noble soldiers and helping to carry on the war.

### The Influenza Epidemic

The so called Spanish "Flu" has taken possession of our province in many places. The most cases are reported at Halifax, Sydney and Lockport. In order to check the epidemic the schools, churches and public places in the following towns have been closed, Wolfville, Canning, Bridgetown, Middleton, Digby, Annapolis, Yarmouth besides many other places which we have overlooked. In several of these places the epidemic has made no headway at all the steps taken being only precautionary measures.

In Kentville there are several cases of the prevailing colds or epidemic but the after effects seem no different from the colds of former years. While frequent discussions of the Health Board take place and precautionary measures taken the schools and churches have not yet been closed. If any alarming symptoms occur action will be taken to not only protect the people of the town but to prevent the spread to other places which have taken necessary to protect themselves.

### Recent Events Show Germans in Sift Retreat

The news from the seats of war have crowded thick and fast upon us in the last week. Everywhere the Allies are pressing forward victorious and the Germans are in headlong retreat. Quite a large part of Belgium, has been freed from the enemy and many important parts of France. It is expected that in another week over half of Belgium, will be redeemed and little of France left in the hands of the enemy.

The German's retreat on the western front is like a route nowhere can the line hold. The German people have lost confidence in their army and now fear German soil will soon be invaded.

The places captured, includes Roulers, Luon, LaFers, Lille and the German naval base in Belgium Ostend.

The Germans see route and ruin staring them in the face and are now ready to do anything to bring about a cessation of hostilities and arrangements for peace. They have ordered all commanders to cease destroying towns and cities unless under military necessity and all submarines have been ordered by wireless to return home and cease their work of destruction.

**Christmas Kits for Our Sailor Boys**  
The following communication which should appeal to our readers has been received by Mrs. H. L. Cole, Secretary-Treas. of the Kentville Branch of the Navy League, from Mr. Percy T. Strong, Secty-Treas. for Nova Scotia:

"As there are thousands of sailors in our port at Halifax at the Xmas season, it is the intention of the N. S. Div. of the Navy League of Canada to supply these brave boys with a Xmas Kit or parcel.

As we will require about four hundred kits, we are making a strong appeal to all divisions of the League and have had a hearty response from some of these.

Now we know very well that the ladies of your community, who are members of the Navy League, have asked what they can do to assist the sailors in this wonderful work. Kindly let them know what we are endeavoring to do and see if they can manage to supply some of these kits for the sailors, for we feel that Nova Scotia should do its share.

Only yesterday we had a special request from the Dockyard, asking if we could possibly supply them, during the next four or five weeks with some 700 sweaters, for ships that are expected in port within that period. At this time of the year, when the weather seems so bitterly cold on the sea, it appears almost impossible for us to supply the demand for thick sweaters and warm socks.

The attention of the ladies is drawn to the fact that the Boys in Blue of the British Navy receive far less than the Canadian Boys in Khaki—the boys of the former get about \$10.00 a month and the boys in the Canadian Navy approximately \$33.00 a month; our boys in khaki also \$33.00 a month.

This is just to show, that we should, particularly at Xmas, time think of the sailor of the British Navy, who has so little pay and given his all to protect our homes from the Hun.

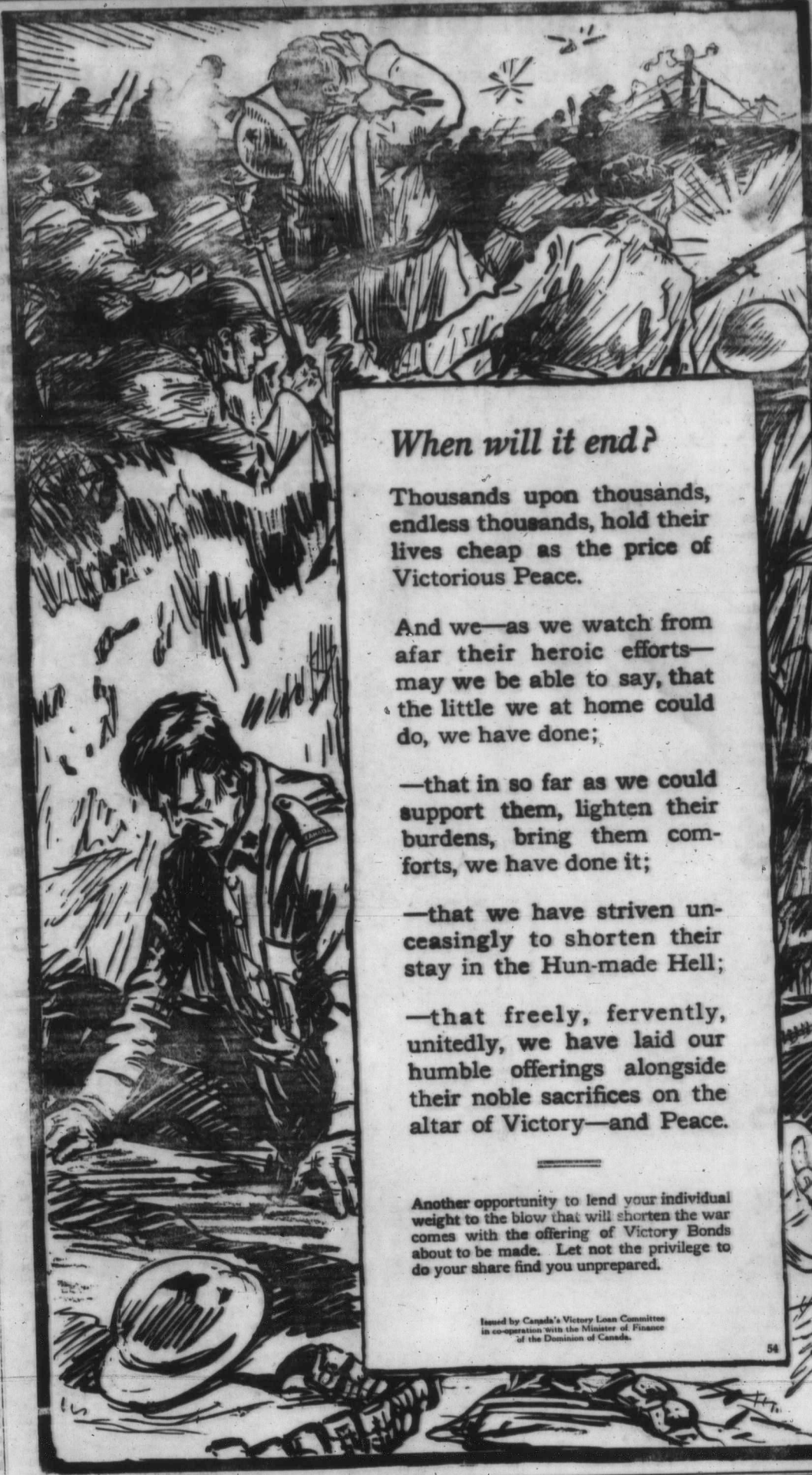
**Slackers' Draft Treaties Now in Force and Men of All Allied Countries Must do Their Bit**

Since compulsory military service was adopted by Canada and the United States went into war with conscription at the outset, a number of men of military age have changed their residence in an attempt to evade the draft law applicable in either country. Americans have come to Canada and Canadians have gone to the United States. In addition, it is said many after enlistment deserted and left their respective countries.

Those who find themselves under either of these classes are dealt with in a new convention which, through the usual diplomatic channels, is being negotiated between Canada and the United States and which has now almost become an existing reality. It is understood the arrangement will be duly promulgated and will provide for a mutual system of surrender. Canadian military evaders in the United States will be sent back here to be dealt with and American draft dodgers in this country will be sent back to their own land for dispositions.

It is understood the new arrangement will supply an effective drag net on each side of the boundary so that those liable for service will be rounded up in one country or the other. Those who volunteer will have the option of determining whether they will serve. The deserter will be forced to surrender.

It is also expected that in a few days the treaty will be executed for the enlistment of military age subjects of foreign Allied nations in Canada. An arrangement has been made with Belgium, Greece and Italy and with a final arrangement with France, now underway, subjects of these countries liable for military service, and they are said to number many thousands, will be given the opportunity of enlisting in Canada or going home to enlist in their own native army. It is clearly set forth they must do one thing or the other.

### Conservation Has Been Successful.

Conservation measures and voluntary saving in the homes have reduced Canadian consumption of flour from 800,000 to 600,000 barrels per month, as compared with per-war consumption. This means a saving at the rate of 2,400,000 barrels per year, or counting the saving by lengthened extraction of milling, of 2,640,000 barrels per year. This is equivalent to a saving of nearly 12,000,000 bushels of wheat.

### American Shipyards Produce 100 New Ships in September

Washington, Oct. 4—One hundred sea-going vessels, forty-six steel and fifty-four wood, aggregating 801,439 gross tons, were completed in American shipyards during September and officially numbered by the bureau of navigation. In addition, seventy non-sea going vessels of 7,037 gross tons, were built during the same period. This is a greater tonnage than was built the whole fiscal year of 1915. During the nine months ended September 30, the total of sea-going and non-sea going vessels, built was 1,357, of 1,722,730 gross tons.

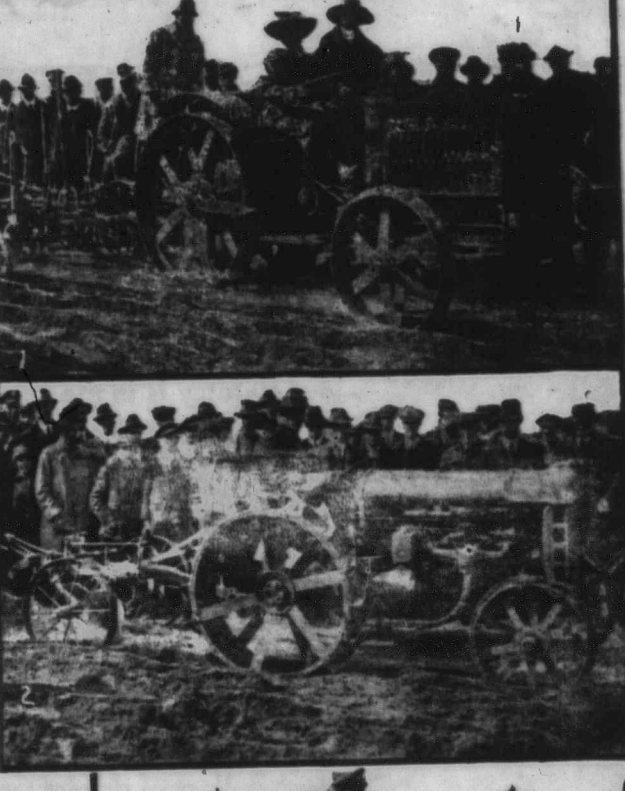
### City Renders Practical Help in Greater Production

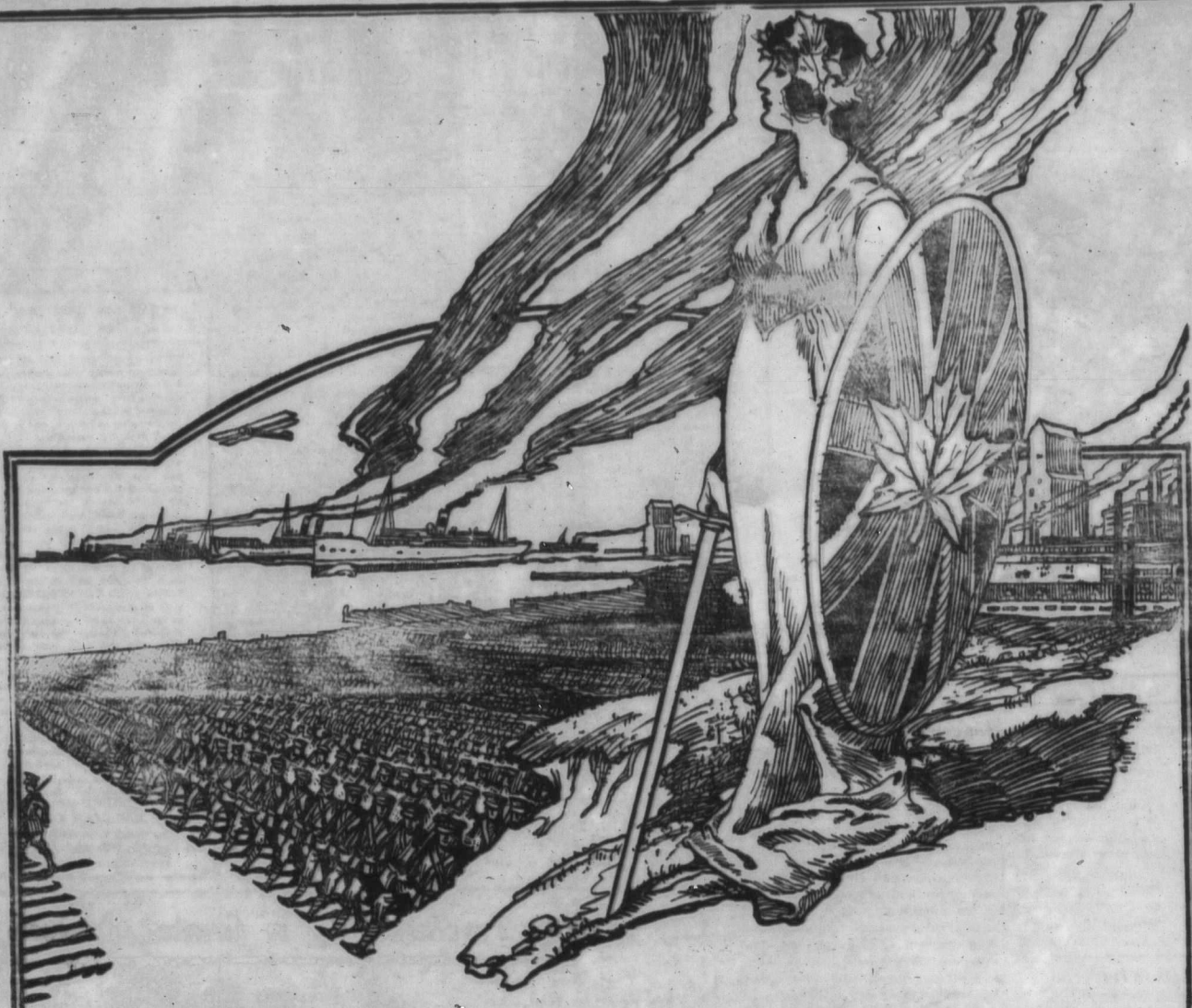
It is not often that the residents of a city have an opportunity of seeing farming operations on a large scale carried on right at their own doors. Even in Western Canada, where hundreds of thousands of acres of virgin land are being turned over and cultivated in order to raise increased crops of wheat and other food grains to supply the needs of the Allies, the spectacle witnessed by the citizens of Calgary, Alberta, recently was an unusual one. Not far from the centre of the city—about a mile from the city hall to be more exact—two hundred acres of vacant land were to be put under the plow. The use of the land had been granted to the city of Calgary through the courtesy of the Canadian Pacific & Railway Company, the owners.

But how was such a tract of land to be plowed when all available machinery was being used to the utmost capacity in the country; when the demand for all kinds of machinery is so great that it cannot be delivered to the farmers fast enough. That was the question asked by many of the city fathers. The implement companies came to the rescue. A day was set when the work should be begun. Telephone and telegraph wires were put into operation. And by the date set seventeen tractors and the requisite plows and other implements were got together. One large tractor rolled sixty miles over the country in order to participate in the event.

Seldom has such an array of farm machinery been concentrated on an area of two hundred acres. Never, perhaps, has such an area been broken and cultivated in shorter time. Although there was no competition all engaged were animated by the good they were doing in the cause of greater production. Furthermore, the machinery was wanted in the country, and it must not tarry in the city. Unfortunately rain prevented the work being completed in one day, an achievement which, if it had been accomplished, would no doubt have constituted a record not easily surpassed.

A crop of oats, potatoes and flax is now grown on the land and it is hoped that this will add considerably to the production now so earnestly desired. The illustrations show the workers on the land.

**TIDES OF THE BAY OF FUNDY**  
The Extreme tides of the Year.

The attention of the farmer is directed to the fact that the highest tides of the year are given in advance in the Tide Tables issued by the tidal and Current Survey in the Dominion Government service. If a storm should occur at the date of one of these unusually high tides, there may be flooding of the dyked marshes in one locality or another according to the direction which the storm may take. Farmers may therefore reduce the chances of damage by placing their crops in safety before the date of any such specially high tide in the autumn, in case it should happen to be a storm tide.

In the Bay of Fundy, the height of the tide is as much affected by the change in the moon's distance as by the change from Springs to Neaps. As a consequence of this, one of the Spring tides of the month is usually higher than the other; and accordingly it is only once in a month, during two or three days, that the tides reach their greatest height. Also, the Spring tides in the Bay of Fundy occur about noon or midnight. The exact time for each locality can be found from the Tide Tables; but here, it is merely indicated whether the highest tide occurs in the day time or in the middle of the night. The dates of the highest normal tides during the present year (1918) are as follows:—

Night tides, were the highest in March, April and May.

Day tides, September 21 to 23, and October 19 to 22.

Day tides November 18 to 20, and December 17 to 18.

Tide Levels — There is now a

system of continuous levels in the Maritime Provinces, by which Benchmarks have been established by two of the Government departments. With regard to the regions where dyked marshes occur, these levels extend from Moncton, through Sackville and Amherst to Macan, and throughout the region of Windsor, Grand Pre and Kentville. The reference marks are along the railways, which are not far from the shore.

The heights reached by extreme tides during storms in past years, have been observed and recorded by the Tidal Survey; and their level with reference to these Benchmarks can now be given for the guidance of farmers in deciding on the best height for their dykes. This information can be supplied by the Superintendent of Tidal Surveys, Naval Service Department, Ottawa.

The probability is that the next call will be issued this fall and will be for the 25,000 young men who have attained the age of twenty years since Class I is called.

**Estate of the Late Librarian of the Supreme Court of Canada Valued at \$38,000—Bequests to three Colleges, Acadia, Brandon, and McMaster**

OTTAWA.—The will of the late Harris H. Bligh, K. C. librarian of the Supreme Court of Canada, was recently probated here, the estate being valued at \$38,000, and the will which is dated June 20th, 1918, appointing N. G. Larmouth, of the legal firm of Bethune, Larmouth, and Dick, of Ottawa, and F. P. Bligh of this city executors. Mr. Larmouth, it will be remembered, married a daughter of W. N. Silver, of Halifax.

The testator orders the following disposition of the property:

His house and furniture, valued at \$8,000, he leaves to his wife absolutely.

To F. P. Bligh he leaves his law library, to Mr. Larmouth his general library, and to Major H. H. Bligh his gold watch, chain, and finger ring.

The remainder of the estate valued at \$30,000 is to go to his wife for life, and on her death it is to be divided into 100 equal shares, which are in turn to be divided into groups of 5 shares, which are to go to each of ten people.—Miss Margaret Bligh, of this city; Amelia, eldest daughter of a cousin Everett, in Manitoba; Margaret wife of the late C. R. Bill, of Ottawa; Mrs. Alice Goodenough, Jennie Braithwaite, Maud Crosby (nee Bligh), Clare, wife of W. M. Bligh, Harris, H. Bligh and Harris K. Bligh, son of Emerson Bligh of Manitoba.

Four shares are to go to each of the following eight persons: Margaret Boville wife of the deputy minister of finance; Elsie Larmouth wife of Mr. Larmouth, one of the executors; Blanche Ruggles (nee Smith of this city); Mrs. Oldright, a sister of Mrs. Bligh; Mrs. Henrietta Sweet, (nee Lamont) of Kings Co. Mrs. Charlotte Sackford, and the Rev. Dr. S. B. Kempton.

**Monthly Statistics—Sept 1918**

Experimental Station, Kentville, N. S.

Rain fell on thirteen days during September and aggregated 6.94 inches, which was unusually heavy. There were few drying winds and not the average sunshine. As a result harvesting was slow and much grain remained in the field much longer than it should have. In some cases the grain was darkened considerably and some loss has resulted. The crop of straw was unusually heavy, which greatly added to the difficulty of getting it dry enough to thresh or store, consequently harvesting has taken much more time than it usually does. All grains have yielded well, the growing period for these crops being ideal.

The weather was particularly unfavorable for harvesting the turnip seed crop. However, some 20 tons of turnip seed were secured in good

condition at this station.

The heavy September rains have caused much rotting in potatoes on heavy soils. The crop on light soils is fairly free from rot.

Unless October comes in dry, great difficulty will be experienced in digging potatoes, harvesting the root crops and doing fall plowing, for in many cases fields are so wet that they cannot be teamed over.

Frosts occurred in some places on the 12th, and 23rd, doing much damage to corn, beans, and potatoes.

The apple crop is developing well and will total about one half million barrels in the Annapolis and Cornwallis Valleys. Considerable apple scab developed late on the Gravensteins, which will reduce the quality but this fruit otherwise is large and well colored.

**Another Heavy Advance in Newsprint Paper.**

Although newsprint paper has about doubled since the commencement of the war the price has again been advanced at one leap of \$12.00 per ton. This with the present freight rate, also nearly double, has given the publishers another blow from which they cannot recover without placing the added cost direct upon the subscribers in increased cost of subscription.

The daily papers which formerly had a subscription price of from 3.00 to 5.00 have increased their rate to \$6.00 and \$7.00 per year and now with this added cost of paper, freight and other increase in materials, the rate has again taken an advance. The Halifax Herald announces an increase of subscription to \$9.00 per year and others are also increasing their price considerably.

Every increase now made in the cost of producing a paper will hereafter fall upon the reader as publishers no longer can pay the added expense without increasing the price subscription.

### Bulgarians Leave Serbia

Evacuation of the Country Has Begun—Views of Serb Leaders on Situation.

London, Oct. 2.—Serbia is being evacuated by the Bulgarian troops, who are returning to Bulgarian territory, according to the Serbian official statement of Tuesday night.

The Bulgarian Parliament Sofia, via Bazel, Oct. 2.—King Ferdinand's speech, which Premier Malinoff read to the Sobranje, announced that the National Assembly would be adjourned until Friday, in order that a complete statement of Bulgaria's situation might be laid before the representatives of the nation.

#### Panic In Vienna.

Amsterdam, Oct. 2.—Saturday's Vienna newspapers, which have reached here, describe the tremendous sensation caused in the Austrian capital by the Bulgarian collapse. Rumors spread with lightning-like rapidity that Turkey had followed suit, that King Ferdinand had

abdicated, that his palace had been blown up, and that a revolution had broken out in Bulgaria.

These rumors were promptly denied, but the impression remained that Bulgaria's secession had administered a grave blow to the Dual Monarchy. There was a panic on the Bourse, where the losses, according to the Neues Journal, ran up 190 points in some cases. The pandemonium on the Budapest Bourse was such that business had to be suspended.

#### Moving On

The big German command in its all wise movements has decided that Foch has made it too hot for safety in many parts of Belgium and northern France; so the evacuation of the region of Lille, Lens, and Douai, is contemplated, if it has not already begun.

The great Hindenburg Line between St. Quentin and the midway post to Cambrai, Te-Catelet, is completely destroyed; and between these two points, Cambrai and St. Quentin in the British with their advance lines threaten the enemy's rear.

The Bosches are retreating on a wide front north and south of La Basse. The Huns are stealing booty and removing it from the city of Lille; and the High command of Germany is using even wheel barrows to carry away the valuables they have stolen. What now do you think of such educated Vandals?

It looks as if the Hun was preparing to evacuate Belgium.

The Canadians at Cambrai were in the hottest part of the fight and in the most desperate engagement they have yet been in, but they made good again, God bless these noble boys, and hurled the enemy before them; and again broke their boasted impregnable Hindenburg Line.

Important developments are expected hourly from Turkey. Sit around, lads, wait till the Turkey is carved, and we'll all get a slice. The Bulgars are leaving Serbia as fast as war-weary legs can carry them.

It's all good. Hip hurrah!

#### There's A Warning in Trade Figures

Our Unstable Financial Position Indicated—Thrift Will Make Canada Secure.

For those who understand Canada's financial conditions there is a significant lesson in the trade figures recently issued from Ottawa.

For the first five months of the present fiscal year there was a decrease in Canada's foreign trade of \$270,000,000, or about 20 per cent. There was a great falling off alike in manufactures and agricultural products exported. The trade was \$875,000,000, compared with \$1,146,000,000 a year ago.

These figures tell in potent terms of the instability of present conditions. Our trade, though still large and healthy, is on an insecure and unenduring foundation. War conditions have created a fictitious prosperity. There may be no reason for alarm but there is reason for caution. The Government must watch and prepare, so should the individuals. Few Canadians but are affected in some way by the present. The wise ones will prepare by practising thrift now.

The Nation can be no stronger than its individual citizens.
