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A Boy Marvel.

London Times: At the Tsar'sko Selo Palace, St. Petersburg, on the afternoon of Feb. 1, the Czar, the Czaritch, the imperial daughters and other members of the imperial family were present at a 'command' performance given by the Italian conductor, Willie Ferrero, 7 1/2 years old, who conducted the Imperial orchestra of over 80 musicians. The Czar chose the following program: The overture Tannhauser, the 'Danse of Aultra' from Greig, and the 'Paradole' of Bizet. His Majesty subsequently asked to hear a piece which Ferrero had not rehearsed with the orchestra, and the 'Boccherini' Minuet was selected. After the first few bars the young conductor stopped the orchestra and insisted on greater contrast between the 'forte' and 'pianissimo' passages. He even sang it as he desired it to be played. At the end of the concert the Czar introduced Ferrero to the Czaritch, and the two boys shook hands.

The Czar's family asked Ferrero his opinion of the orchestra and the boy replied: 'I think it is splendid. Sir, if a Majesty was greatly amused.'

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Good Roads Again.

DEAR MR. EDITOR:—No man is better qualified than a doctor to write on the subject of roads. When a physician's services to a community cover a period of forty-five years it means that hundreds of thousands of miles of roads in all conditions have rolled beneath his wheels. Dr. G. E. DeWitt need make no apology for his interesting letter in your issue of April 3.

I happen to be secretary of the Good Roads Association of Kings county, but it is not in that capacity that I wish to say a few words regarding Dr. DeWitt's letter.

First, I would express the wish that more citizens of the county would show the active interest in the good roads movement that is shown by Dr. D. W. As a resident of the county, however, not fortunate enough to live within one of the incorporated towns, my viewpoint of the road question differs in some ways from the viewpoint of the doctor.

A resident of an incorporated town is not so apt to become enthusiastic over the use of the split-log drag. He wants surfaced, permanent streets and if the cost happens to be \$100,000 per mile that cost can be distributed over a good number of taxpayers. Out in the smaller villages and the sparsely settled country districts there is a different problem. Splendid, indeed, would it be if we could have the country roads surfaced, but when we consider that Kings county has over a thousand miles of country roads not only is the financial part troublesome but the choosing of a starting point would arouse local disturbances.

The doctor suggests that a town ship might bond itself for, say, \$50,000, get that supplemented with \$50,000 from the government and spend the total on permanent roads. I believe it would be a good investment, but my believing so would have little influence on the vote in that township and in these days of the high cost of living and the great scarcity of money I do not believe a bond issue would carry. At any rate the carry out of such a plan would involve much bitter controversy.

In the meantime we have our thousands of miles of earth roads capable of being improved at least fifty per cent. by the judicious use of the machinery we have. We need a little more local pride stirred up. We need that every surveyor should be impressed with the fact that drainage is the first great essential in good road making. We need an effort put forth in every section to have the road work done earlier, in April if possible. We need a thousand split log drags in the county and an arrangement made whereby, even under our present faulty law, these drags can be used after every rain. Surely here is a great work for a Good Roads Association.

As the Good Roads Association grows stronger it can branch out and try for such roads as the doctor suggests. We need them. We ought to have them, and what is more, we are becoming really aroused in the matter. Our first great work, however, should be to systematically arouse interest in the improving of our earth roads.

At the outset I said this letter was not official. I have a personal suggestion. If we had surfaced roads all over the county we would be in a better position to haul around our cans, mobilize our fighting forces, haul in commissary supplies, etc. Therefore, why not let us ask the who rule us to close up Aldersho Camp for a few years and take the \$150,000 it costs each year to run the camp to expend on the kind of road Dr. DeWitt suggests? A few years of closed camp would do the trick. I don't believe one of us would lose a wink of sleep if we had to do without the militia protection for a few years honestly. I believe that is a better proposition than asking our townships to take on a bonded debt.

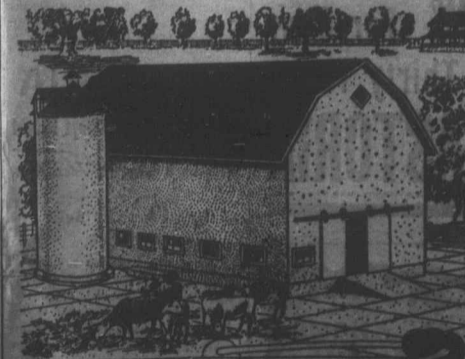

Acadia Collegiate & Business Academy

Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy is the oldest of the three Acadia institutions located in Wolfville. Under the former name Horton Collegiate Academy, it was founded in 1828, by the Baptist Education Society of Nova Scotia. Mr. Asahel Chaplin, of Amherst College, Mass., the first principal, began instruction to the first ACADIA CLASS of young men in March, 1829, a little more than 85 years ago.

Rev. John Pryor, a graduate of Kings College and Newton Theological Institution, became principal in 1830. Mr. Pryor threw the whole force of his splendid Christian manhood into the undertaking with such effect that the Academy was rapidly filled with pupils.

In 1831, the Academy Hall was built and the house of William Johnson Esq., was rented as a boarding house. Later another large building was constructed under the supervision of a Boston Architect, which was enlarged at a later date and is known as the College Building which was destroyed by fire in 1877.

A number of worthy men have been connected with the early history of this institution, among whom may be mentioned: C. D. Randall, M. A.; J. Hart, Rev. T. A. Higgins, D. D. In 1874, Dr. J. F. Tufts became Principal, and great advances were made under his leadership, chief of which was the erection of the present Academy residence. Prof. Tufts was succeeded in 1889 by I. B. Oakes Esq., M. A., who successfully carried on the work for 11 years being succeeded by H. L. Brittain in 1900. Dr. E. W. Sawyer followed Mr. Brittain and was succeeded in 1906 by C. J. Mersereau, M. A., who, in turn was succeeded by Mr. E. W. Robinson, B. A., in 1908, who retired in 1910 to become Inspector of schools for Kings and Hants Counties. Rev. W. L. Archibald, M. A., Ph. D., became Principal in 1910, under his leadership the Academy is now prospering. The number of students is increasing every year, the total enrolment for the present year being 188.

In 1912 the name of the Academy was changed from Horton Academy to Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy, by which name it is known at present.

All through its history Acadia Academy has held a high place in athletics. Formerly the College and Academy were associated in one athletic society, but in Sept. 1909, the Academy organized a separate association.

On May 25th., 1909, the first provincial inter-scholastic field and track meet was held, including Acadia, Halifax, Truro, and Pictou Academies, King Collegiate School of Windsor and Acadia Villa. At this meet Acadia Academy far exceeded her opponents and won the Cragg Cup.

In 1912, Mr. J. T. Bulmer, of Winnipeg, presented a cup to Acadia for competition in an eight mile relay race between the College classes and the Academy. This cup has been won both in 1912 and in 1913 by the Academy team.

This year the Academy has made a splendid showing in Athletics, defeating Kings Collegiate Academy in football with a score 14-0, and The Halifax Business College in hockey 11-0, besides winning the inter-class hockey league.

The standard of scholarship has been raised in the last few years till today this institution stands in the front rank of residential schools for boys in Canada, both in point of equipment and the character of the work accomplished. The graduates of the Academy are prepared for admission to Canadian Universities, Technical Colleges, and other Professional schools. The Business department is becoming increasingly popular, and the attendance is taxing the capacity of the classroom. Graduates holding the Business Diploma are filling many important positions of trust in the commercial world to-day.

As a Residential school, Acadia Academy offers many advantages to young men, that are not found in the ordinary high schools. The Monitor system guarantees supervision during the study periods as well as during the hours of recreation. The discipline of the Academy Residence develops habits of punctuality, and provides a time for work, and suitable time for recreation.

The moral and religious surroundings at Acadia Collegiate Academy have been of a high type throughout its history. Usually a majority of the students are boys of sincere religious purpose.

The Y. M. C. A. which holds its meetings weekly exercises a great influence for good. Throughout a long and honorable record of nearly eighty-six years Acadia Academy has ever stood for the highest and best values in the education of boys and young men.

The Presbyterian Church

The old Presbyterian church was burned last year at the close of the day on Aug. 14th., many people have already forgotten about it for it was not an imposing structure nor could it claim a place in the department of the beautiful. Nevertheless inside, it was all that could be desired and the loss was by no means a light one to the people who worshipped there. To the Presbyterian it was a real church home and is still a place around which the memories love to linger.

It took a little while to recover from the loss and become adjusted to new conditions, but before winter closed in, plans for a new church were beginning to take shape. It was decided to move the manse to Sea View Avenue as being a more desirable residential quarter, and at the same time leaving a splendid place for a church building at the corner of Main St. and Sea View Avenue.

The manse has already been moved and the way cleared for the new church.

It was not without careful consideration that the building ma-

terial was chosen, but it was finally decided that it should be of rough stone of such quality as is found in large quantities at White Rock and other places. Mr. Andrew Cobb was employed as architect, and the contract has been awarded to Mr. Charles Wright, so well and favourably known in Wolfville. It is not necessary to say much more about it for when these two men are associated in the work, good results are to be expected.

The size including the vestry is about 90 ft. x 40 ft. with the main entrance on Main St. Free stone will be used for trimming and the interior finished in native oak. The design is simple and the material is of the best.

The total cost will be about \$20,000, three quarters of which will be paid off at the end of three years. This means real sacrifice to a good many, but it is assumed willingly and all look forward hopefully to the time when we shall meet for worship in our own Church on the old familiar ground. The work is to begin at once. The Corner stone will probably be laid in June and the building will be completed by the middle of November.

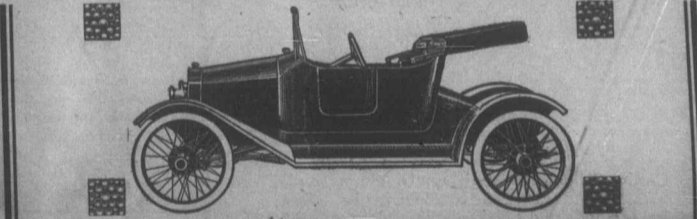

Acadia Ladies' Seminary

If as Froebel says, "women are the educators of the human race," then to educate the educators is the largest and noblest task committed to any people.

To the Baptists of New Brunswick belongs the honor of establishing for the first time in Canada, a school where young women and young men were placed upon the same educational level. This was in the year 1833. The place was Fredericton, and the first Principal was the Rev. Frederick W. Miles. Nothing similar to this was attempted in Nova Scotia for many years. But ultimately the establishment of the Grand Pre Seminary, in what is now Wolfville, in 1859, continued a work which New Brunswick ought not to have permitted to lapse. The last class was graduated from the Grand Pre Seminary in the year 1873. Between 1873 and 1879 the educational work for girls was carried on in connection with the classes of Horton Collegiate Academy. In 1879 Acadia Ladies Seminary was organized as an independent school. That portion of the building which is now known as the West Wing, was erected in this year, while the East Wing, now the main structure, was erected in 1892. Since 1879 more than 400 girls have been graduated from the school in the several departments.

The educational work of the Seminary is organized in three departments; The Academic, The Conservatory of Music and Fine Arts, and the Department of Practical Arts. The Academic Department teaches the time in whole or part, of twelve teachers, and provides instruction which parallels and supplements the grades of the high school, up to and exceeding Grade XII. Pupils are prepared for admission to the Freshman and Sophomore Classes of the Universities of the Maritime Provinces, and a much larger number complete the Collegiate and Sophomore Matriculation Courses than in the case in any similar school in Eastern Canada.

The Conservatory of Music and Fine Arts provides for instruction in Pianoforte, Pipe Organ, Voice, Violin, Theoretical Branches of Music, the various branches usually included in the term, Art, and in Oratory. In this department eleven teachers are employed, all of them finely qualified by natural gifts, training and experience, for their work. The equipment of this department is not adequate for present needs, and the growth especially in the Department of Music this year makes immediate enlargement imperative.

In the Department of Practical Arts, we find instruction provided by six teachers, who give all or part of their time to work in Household Science (both in the Home Maker's and the Teacher's Normal Course) in Business, in Stenography and Typewriting. In the Normal Teacher's Course in Household Science, a graduate is entitled to teach in the Domestic Science Departments of the schools of Nova Scotia, and in the schools of New Brunswick. The work of the Business Department is affiliated with the Acadia Business College.

One thing which impresses the visitor and interested inquirer is the reasonable cost of a year's work in any of these courses. It has been demonstrated more than once that what costs \$750 in or near some large city can be procured for one-third the amount in Wolfville. On this account and because of the excellence of the work, the superb surroundings, the pupils have been received in recent years, from Japan, British Columbia, Alberta, California, New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, Maine,

Quebec, and all parts of the Maritime Provinces.

Until recently, the buildings already constructed provided ample accommodation, both in the way of dormitories and class rooms for all the pupils who sought for admission. But with the constantly increasing attendance, and with the consequent multiplying and the broadening of courses to meet the demands of the age, the accommodations at present provided are taxed beyond their limits. As already indicated, the expenditure we hope this year, of \$40,000, will remedy this defect.

The plant at present provides, besides the cosy and comfortable furnished rooms for the girls, a commodious Assembly Hall, large, well-lighted and ventilated Class Rooms, a Laboratory, Domestic Science Kitchen, Art Studio, Gymnasium, Museum, Library, with 2,500 well selected books, adapted to the needs of the School, a Hospital, and ample Bath room accommodation. Music Hall completed in 1899, provides Music Studios and Practice Rooms, which are furnished with the best makes of Canadian pianos and American Grand pianos. All the buildings are heated throughout with hot water, and lighted by electricity.

In respect of situation, grounds, equipment, and every appliance necessary for the physical, mental and moral life and development of girls, it is hard to conceive of a school which combines so many attractive features. This accounts for the fact that the attendance has more than doubled within the last nine years. In 1900-1901 the attendance was 119. This year 1912-1914 the attendance will exceed 325.

The graduates of Acadia Seminary and her former pupils, are found in Japan, China, India, Africa, Europe, in all parts of the world, where as students seeking larger equipment as missionaries, as teachers, as mothers and home makers, their influence for good through gracious womanhood and truly feminine usefulness, cannot be estimated.

The Fox Breeding Industry

The selection of Wolfville for the location of their fox-yards by the McConnell Co., says a great deal for conditions here in connection with that growing industry; fox breeding. It has always been known that our Maritime Provinces are particularly well adapted to the development of a very high quality of fox, but that also the effect of the moist sea air upon the life of the fox tends to the development of a hardy stock of animals peculiar to our country. Our foxes are renowned the world over, and their value at the present stage of the fox industry, for breeding purposes alone, is a matter of continual change. The prices are soaring higher and higher, and it is estimated that the pups of 1914 will be selling for \$9,000 apiece before autumn.

The Bout Island Fox Co., Ltd., when fully organized, and the McConnell Co., also established here, will, with the capital they represent, be but the commencement of an enterprise that in a few years will reach large figures. It can be seen that this will tend to make the center of an industry the limits of which can scarcely be measured or estimated. With the world clamoring for the pelt for foxes, and the yearly supply limited, the possibilities of the business are enormous and the profits correspondingly great. Large fortunes have already been made, and this town has already invested large sums in the fox industry. There is no reason why the profits should not come here from the success of a sound local concern, as from the investments made elsewhere.
