### The Function of the Agricultural College

The services that may be perform ed by the agricultural colleges in Canada in the upbuilding of a sound rural spirit, as viewed by the presidents of these institutions, are graphically outlined in the January number of the Agricultural Gazette of Canada, published by the Department of Agriculture, at Ottawa.

The situation is claimed by Dr. Cumming to put a new responsibility on the agricultural college: of the country, which have heretofe: e been teachers mainly of the science of production Professor Cummings calls upon the new farm leaders to see that agricultural colleges are advanced and that agricultural education receives more attention in the schools






