Nazimova is Supreme On Screen and Stage

Nazimova, supreme star of stage, has achieved an added triumph in her latest screen production, "Out of the Fog" which will be shown at the Happy Hour theatre on Wednesday. This play is an adaptation for the screen from her great stage success "Ception Shoals," a play which created great comment both here and abroad and which was noted for the intensity of its dramatic situations.

Madame Nazimova is an actress of unique and original talent, she is known as the woman of a thousand moods and her act is as great in light fantastic or whimsical moments as it is in the heavy emotional drama for which she is internationally famed. She was born in the Russia Crimea, in a little town on the shores of the Black Sea, but was educated in Geneva, where she decided on the career of a violinist and studied accordingly. She made her first public appearance at the age of twelve at a concert in her native town but it was not long after his that she gave up music for the drama. She studied under the great Stanislawsky who considered her an artist of great ability even at an early age. As leading woman in a Russian stock company she played more than two hundred parts.

Since coming to America Nazimova has played in both Russian and English and is known for her great characterizations in the leading roles of "The Doll's House," "Hedda Gabler," and "Little Eyolf." Like other noted artists she has grown to prefer the screen to the stage and devotes most of her time to the splendid work for which her name has become famous here and abroad. Her work in "Revelation," "Toys of Fate," and "Eye for Eye," has set a higher plane for motion picture achievement than has hitherto been reached by any other screen star, and "Out of the Fog" shows that her art is infinite.

Albert Capellan, the distinguished Frenchman who directed this picture also made the screen adaptation from H. Austin Adams' "Ception Shoals," with the collaboration of June Mathis.



The Function of the Agricultural College

The services that may be performed by the agricultural colleges in Canada in the upbuilding of a sound rural spirit, as viewed by the presidents of these institutions, are graphically outlined in the January number of the Agricultural Gazette of Canada, published by the Department of Agriculture, at Ottawa.

Principal Cumming, of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, observe that whereas other professions have been in the forefront of the world's councils for centuries, it has remained for the twentieth century to witness at least the beginning of a movement in which farmers will take their place among the leaders in the seats of the mighty. The situation is claimed by Dr. Cumming to put a new responsibility on the agricultural college of the country, which have heretofore been teachers mainly of the science of production.

Professor Cummings calls upon the new farm leaders to see that the agricultural colleges are advanced and that agricultural education receives more attention in the schools.





clerk, Chatham, and account of J. L. Stewart, printing, \$15.60; P. J. McIntyre, \$25.50; J. F. Benson, printing, \$2.10; Ernest Harper, district clerk, \$16; list of parish officers for Chatham. Carried.

Coun. Vanderbeck moved return of Everett Allison, col. rates, Derby do, road account; parish clerk \$6; list of parish officers. Passed.

Coun. Somers moved that bill of Wm. Matthews for a sheep killed by dogs, \$10, be paid. Carried.

Coun. O'Donnell moved that Ludlow default list be sent to a constable or collecting justice. Carried.

Coun. Sinclair said the payment of unsworn bills for sheep killed by dogs was opening a wider door. If one such bill were paid all should be paid.

Coun. Harriman presented bill of George Loggie, sworn to, for six sheep killed by dogs, and moved that it be paid. Referred.

Coun. Allan moved to pay account of Jas. Loggie, district clerk, Alnwick, \$10; account of Jas. Morrison, \$8; account of J. Muzzerall, \$8; account of W. J. Simpson, rent of buildings for election \$6; do parish clerk, \$6. Carried.

Dr. Desmond appeared on behalf of the Board of Health, with regard to the Public Health Act. It was not a matter of Board of Health alone, but medical inspection of schools and general sanitary matters. The assessment was only \$1 per family. It was hoped to have complete returns of births, deaths and marriages. The law was imperative, and authorized the Lieut. Governor in Council to take any action necessary to secure the money.

In reply to Coun. Brasfield Dr. Desmond said he would refer to the legal adviser of the Council the question of liability.

Coun. Brasfield said the Council would get clear of the liability if it could.

Dr. Desmond said the Government appointed the white board last year because the Council refused to act.

Coun. Brasfield said it was a foolish thing to pay salaries to men whether they did any work or not.

Dr. Desmond said medical inspectors were required to visit every school, examine the pupils and the sanitary conditions of the building, twice a year, and perform vaccinations free. One examiner had found 50 per cent of defectives in a town school. What must be the state in some country schools? In case of epidemic you have to pay a man \$4 or \$5 a day, while under this act the officials have to act without extra pay.

Some Councillors said they didn't know who were the inspectors in their parishes.

Dr. Desmond said they had drawn no salary as yet. Medical inspectors had not been secured for some parishes, none being available or willing to accept for the salary. The \$6000 asked for was for the coming year.

Coun. L. Doyle spoke of epidemics that had been suppressed without cost to the county.

Dr. Desmond said there would be refund of 33 1/2 p. c. on influenza and smallpox expenditures. Don't expect perfection the first or second year.

Councillor—Or any year. (Laughter)

W. B. Snowball, who was invited to address the Council on the matter of the public health, spoke of what the Conservation Commission had done in this line. He had been asked by Hon. Dr. Roberts to assist Dr. Desmond in presenting this matter to the Council. What was the good of conserving the material resources of the country and neglecting its future manhood? The brain, as well as the health, of school children had been developed as the result of medical inspection in schools. The man who does his duties earns the salary of \$150 a year. The mere fact that there is such an official in a community causes people to be more cleanly in regard to the keeping of their premises in a sanitary state. Vaccination would prevent smallpox. Look after the health of the children and we would have a healthy population. (Applause).

P. E. Neale appeared on behalf of the East Northumberland Soldiers' Memorial. The county had distinguished itself in the war, doing as much as any other place in Canada. But 500 boys did not come back, and it was for a memorial to these heroes that he was speaking. The county had been divided up in war work, into East and West, and Newcastle as well as Chatham proposed to erect a memorial. After the splendid record we had made we should not say that is the end of it. Chatham proposed a Memorial Hall to house war trophies and records and the museum of the M. N. H. Association, the best museum in the province.

A monument was all right when erected for one man, but it was not so suitable for a number of persons. The county of Colchester, N. S. had voted \$25,000 for a memorial. The proposed memorial building in Chatham would be largely paid for by private subscriptions.

W. B. Snowball felt it was unnecessary to make a plea for the erection of memorials to these brave boys. As Canadians, as men of Northumberland, we were proud of our boys. Should we not commemorate their deeds? As a tax payer he could not complain of any appropriation that might be needed for this purpose in Newcastle or Chatham. Canada was richer in men, money and nobility for having been in the war. He asked the Council not to be niggardly in the matter, not to vote small, mean sums, but liberal amounts.

Coun. L. Doyle—What will the building cost?

Mr. Neale—About \$25,000.

Ald. Tweedie said the results of the war were so great that memorials should be erected. It was felt that the best memorial would be a building in which records and pictures of the men could be kept for inspection for all time. The building will be looked after by the Natural History Society. Every citizen of the county must feel that these records of the men should be kept green in memory.

Mayor Gaynor said the Natural History Society belonged to the whole county and should have been handed by the Council. This building would be of service in preserving records and memorials, and the great educational specimens in the museum. He left that something should be voted to assist in erecting this

building.

J. R. Lawlor, as one of the Newcastle delegates, would outline what the town proposed to do. The county had worked in two organizations, the East and West, during the war. The Newcastle Soldier Reception Committee had \$2,000 on hand for a memorial. He will leave it all in the hands of the Council to say what it would do. (Applause)

Mayor Gaynor moved that a committee of five be appointed to consider on the memorial matter and report to the Council. He suggested a serial bond issue for any amount that might be voted.

Thos. Parker moved that the Council sit this evening.

Mayor Gaynor moved that the bill be laid on the table till the Petitions Committee report on Mr. Troy's petition.

On the petition of Wm. P. Troy—that the pay be the same as allowed in the jail.

Mayor Gaynor said this would reduce the allowance below the 17 cents he has been paid. The Town of Chatham pays 20 cents a meal. He moved that the prayer of the petition be granted.

Coun. Watling didn't see where the increases would end.

Coun. L. Doyle said a resolution fixed the price of meals at 17 cents. What right had he to overrule the resolution on the books?

Coun. Harriman said the scale might be raised in jail to 25 cents.

Coun. Doyle said the Jail Committee might not allow Mr. Irving more than he gets at present.

Coun. Gill said it had been passed by the Council to pay the jailer 50 cents a day.



MUSICAL TALKS

By C. C. Laughler, Mus. Bac.
Bowmanville.

No. IV.—The Pipe Organ

The Pipe Organ is without doubt the noblest of all instruments—the wonderful evolution of the centuries. This instrument is invested with such a dignity yet possessing such massive tones that no other instrument approaches.

The Pipe Organ originated in ancient Greece from the "Pan Pipes" which consisted of a series of whistles fastened together and blown by the mouth. These same pipes were afterwards placed on a wind box and supplied with air through a bellows. The number of pipes were increased and required more wind than the hand bellows could produce, so a series of bellows were arranged and persons were engaged to walk upon them, forcing in the aid with their weight. Then a water system or hydraulic pressure was introduced then pneumatic and now electricity which is more powerful and enables quicker action, etc.

Now about the playing of these instruments. In the earlier days, there being no keyboard, the fingers were placed over the pipes to stop the tone, afterward a slider was attached and these were pulled to admit the air. Following this a key was devised, it being found easier to depress the key with a blow than to pull the slider which had great resistance.

The first keyboard had sixteen keys, each key 40 inches long and 3 inches wide. The performers were called organ beaters or smiters, having to strike the key with the fist. Space will not allow to explain fully the gradual advancement and growth of the Pipe Organ, but it is most interesting.

The tone of the organ in its earlier stage was much more lusty than the present day organ. It is recorded that the pipe voices were so loud and strong that listeners could not venture near with uncovered ears.

The modern pipe organ is known to all but its parts and working method may not be so generally known. The kind of pipes are of the whistle or flute type, also beating and free reeds. These are made to imitate orchestra instruments. The modern organ is capable of producing from the softest tone to the great power of a huge band.

The keyboard is known as the manual, and in one large organ, 5 smaller organs independent of each other may be combined, each smaller organ having a separate keyboard to itself, making a bank of keyboards one above the other ranged before the player. The organist's hands are completely occupied and besides this he must be an expert in performing upon the pedals with his feet, the pedals compass being 30 notes.

All pipes are made of wood and metal (tin lead, and zinc) all the pipes are built in shape of huge whistles.

The modern keyboard has 5 complete octaves, the principal keyboard is called the "Great," the one above is the "Swell," the one below, the "Choir," while the "Solo" is above the swell and the "Echo" is above that.

It is good for the music student when visiting a city to take every opportunity to hear good music of this kind, as an organ recital by a competent organist should create much interest.

Some people pride themselves upon hearing great organists and do not forget to boast about it, but listen to this: A visitor of pompous character going up to one of the attendants in Westminster Abbey said, "Will you please tell me who that is at the organ, I cannot tell by the touch if it is Sir Walter Parratt or Sir Frederick Bridge." The attendant answered, "I beg your pardon, sir, that it is not either of them, it's the vacuum clean or over in the corner."

San Francisco possesses one of the largest and finest organs in the world the organist is Frederic Lemare, the eminent English Organist, whose salary is \$10,000. Compare this with the Great Beethoven who was appointed second court organist at 150 florins (\$63)

The organ is the most interesting part of a church property as judged from the standpoint of public interest. You may have stained glass windows, libraries and carved furniture in the church investments, but leave out the organ and what is the result—an immediate lack of interest. A good sincere, eloquent, devout pastor, a good choir, and a good organ means a prosperous church.


