

IMPORTANT MOVEMENT.

Pursuant to a proclamation a meeting of the friends of Law Reform, was held at Howard's Hotel, Niagara, on Friday evening last. The assembly was most respectable, being composed of Grand and Petit Jurors, County Councillors and Magistrates.

Walter Elliott, Esq., was called to the Chair, and James A. Davidson, appointed secretary. The Chairman opened the meeting with a very pointed and appropriate speech, showing the necessity that existed for some antidote to the law epidemic, which is raging throughout the land; and urged upon the people the advantages that would result to the producing part of the community, viz: the farmers and mechanics, by the formation of arbitration societies for the settlement of matters of dispute among themselves instead of the present expensive and sometimes ruinous system.

Whereas, the evils resulting from the complicated and expensive system of litigation as practiced in our ordinary Courts of Law, having risen to an alarming height, and in their effects will be defeating the attainment of Justice, and bringing ruin both upon plaintiff and defendant through the protractedness and chicanery allowed by our rules of practice.

That they, being Members of this Association, will neither sue nor be sued one another, in any Civil Causes of Action, which may be brought before the ordinary Courts of Law or Equity of this Province; but, as to all disputes and differences, which may arise among themselves to an Arbitration, to be chosen as hereafter agreed upon, and they will abide an award made by such Judgment as may be pronounced by a Committee or Board of Arbitration, properly constituted according to the Laws of this Society.

And Whereas the complaints of all parties brought into our Courts being unmanageable as to the protractedness, expense and difficulty of obtaining Justice, incident to their present mode of practice, the Subscribers further pledge themselves to use their best endeavors to obtain a thorough revision and reform of our Laws, to the end that Justice may be secured to every man, by cheap and simple formulas of proceedings, by extending the jurisdiction of our inferior Courts, without increasing their costs, and by codifying their Statutes.

And although we are very little value on the talking department, yet we can easily see that a minority of talking Lawyers would contrive to occupy the time of the House to the very serious hindrance of the public business.

We have also given a lengthened address on this subject, drawn up by a committee appointed by the meeting. Angry notes continue to be exchanged between Russia, Austria and Germany, and affairs seem to be quite as much complicated as ever. There is a rumour at Vienna that Lord Palmerston has called on the King of Prussia to insist upon the Hoplanders laying down their arms, and that he has offered an English fleet for the blockade of Kiel.

NEWS OF SIR JOHN FRANKLIN.—Despatches have been received from Sir John Ross that, from information received from some Esquimaux Indians, it is found that Sir John Franklin and party had all been killed in 1846.—The American ships Adonias and Resaca had perished as far as any question; but as the departure of the last advices the Adonias had got aground, but no serious injury was apprehended.

FRANCE.—A large lottery has been got up by the Government to aid the emigration to California. Trade in Paris and throughout the country generally continues very brisk. The funds closed very heavily on Wednesday, in consequence, it is said, of some misunderstanding between the President and General Changarnier.

From the Canadian Free Press. THE ANTI-LAWYER LEAGUE. No. 1. TO THE ELECTORS OF CANADA.

The time has fully arrived when the Farmers, Manufacturers, Mechanics and Merchants of Canada should in justice to themselves and posterity, stand forth and speak, and act on the liberal soil of Canada, and under the fostering care of Britain.

As all of us are anxious for Reform and wish to reap its advantages, it is the earnest desire of this Committee that this voice of feeling may be heard in the House of Assembly at the next General Election, and we would then see Reform in reality, which is nothing more or less than improvement.

It is evident that whiskey and drunkenness should disgrace us, when the men who in every county in Canada West have kept their principles in abeyance and made them subject to party politics. Let the Teetotallers nail their colors to the mast and deliver their opinions as they will use their legal influence to put forward men, and sustain them, for Parliamentary honors, whose sobriety is beyond suspicion.

When this is done, and not till then, will we see a change in our public men, as also for Lawyers, at the least. We do not believe in making our moral principles subservient any longer to party politics, as has been the practice too long. CAPTURED SLAVES.

By a letter just received from her Majesty's screw-sloop Cuttle, dated July 18, 1850, off the river Congo, the vessel captured a fine brigantine, called the Volusia, an American colored, fully equipped for the slave trade, and about 150 tons burden. On the 7th the Rattler captured a Brazilian Brigantine, called L'Emeralda, 275 tons, fully equipped. She was taken 150 miles from the land; she mounted six guns, which were thrown aboard during the chase; she had a crew of 34 men and 6 officers, and had every appearance of being a man-of-war, with a large looking party on board. The Gladiator, steam-frigate, captured a slaver, and burnt her. On coming up she was taken 312 passengers, and the Phoenix smelted, with the intention of dragging the paddles, she believing her to be a paddle wheel steamer. The Flying Fish had taken another fine prize on the 11th of July, a brigantine of 180 tons.
