



Emmannel at Naples.

NAPLES, Oct. 26. King Victor Emmanuel arrived here to-day unannounced. His coming was not totally unexpected, his subjectes having learned that where ever widespread suffering exists His Majesty is sure to be found, sympathizing with the afflicted and directing the work of relief. The populace acclaimed the King with wild enthusiasm. To their welcome he replied "My heart was so touched by the sufferings of the people that I was unable to resist an impulse to share their misfortune, and so started on a visit to the devastated region." King Victor Emmanuel was accompanied by his first aide, General Bruaati, Admiral Carelli and Count Mattiolo Hasqualini, Minister of the Royal House hold. The authorities were able today to make more definite estimate of the fatalities caused by the cyclone the tidal wave and accompanying eruption from Mount Vesuvius and Mount Eponio. It appears that about 100 persons were killed, the greatest loss of life being at Cetera, on the north coast of the Gulf of Salerno Thousands are homeless, and the serious problem now is to provide these with shelter, food and water.

PORT AU PRINCE, Oct. 26. The Haytien gunboat Liberte has een lost at sea off Port de Paix, following an explosion on board. It is estimated that seventy persons have been either killed or drowned. Quebec Pulpwood.

Special to Evening Telegram.

The action of the Government of the rovince of Quebec prohibiting th exportation of pulpwood cut on its frown lands under lease from and after May, 1910, and on settlers' lands taken up from and after Sept 1910, will not have the effect of re ducing the quantity of pulpwood for export for three years to come, and perhaps never, according to Consui Gebhart Willrich of Quebec, who has made a report on the subject to the U. S. Government, Consul Willrich reported this conclusion after a careful study of the pulpwood situation is Quebec. The conclusion he said would not be justified if settlers' lands lo cated on prior to Sept., 1910, could have been made subject to the retriction, but that can't be done for legal and other reasons. To deprive such settlers of their lands, he says is not practicable, nor even contemplated. Referring to the idea ex pressed by many that the lands of the province which furnish most of the pulpwood will become exhausted Consul Willrich quotes the following from an authority writing in the Full and Paper Magazine of Canada: From every Conservative estimate there are over 2,000,000 acres in forest land on the seigneuries in Quebec, and about 300,000 acres of pat ented and located lands, none of which will be subject to the prohibi tion. This would approximately give 5,000,000 cords of pulpwood free to go to the U. S., which means can supply the U. S. market, taking as an average the greatest quantity already shipped in one year to the U.S., namely, 10,000,000 cords, for 50 years to come.

Advocates Conscription

London, Oct. 17 .- Among prominent Englishmen who have most recently actively advocated the enactment of universal compulsory military training of the male population of the United Kingdom is Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood. Affirming that ive. Moose, dear, grizzlies, mounhis country in times of national dan- about and both stories and illustrager, he contends that to do so effectively every man must be systematically trained as a soldier in times of peace. To this end, in so far as it may be obtained in existing circumstances, he has been foremost in urging the widespread establishment of miniature rifle ranges.

"It is now generally admitted," safa he, when he recently presided, at the invitation of Lady St. Helier, at the opening of such a practice range at Cold Ash, in Berkshire, "that however inadequate the training on a miniature range may be in comparison with that obtainable on an open range, yet nine-tenths of the difficulty of service shooting may be overcome on a miniature range.

Compulsory Service.

"For many years, both officially and privately, I have advocated compulsory service for home defence. believe the need of compulsory service is all the greater to-day. The difficulty of persuading the British public of this necessity is partly due to the immunity which they have enjoyed from the horrible sufferings inseparable from an invasion, successful or unsuccessful.

"If any of you here live to see our country invaded - and, humanly speaking, unless the whole male population is trained to arms, I believe some of you certainly will see that result-it is well that you should realize what would happen right here when, say, ten thousand men of an enemy's army reach Newbury.

"In the Franco-Prussian War one occasion the general, anxious to keep his soldiers in good heart, or dered double rations to be exacted from the inhabitants, and the clergyman of Froschweiler, in Alsace. a village I have frequently visited, tells in a published narative of the war a piteous story of the result to a couple of peasants with many children.
