

Household Notes.

Lace veils may be washed in a strong lather of white soap and lukewarm water. Let them soak 20 minutes, then squeeze the dirt out of them, scrub, and rinse in several waters. The final one should have bluing and just a dash of boiled starch to stiffen the lace.

Country housekeepers can dye articles in beautiful shades of fast brown by drying and using the green and brown lichens from rocks, trees and fences. Boil the moss in water to more than cover it. Strain and put in the goods.

An excellent tea punch is made of a quart of freshly made tea and a cup of lemon juice, sweetened. Put this in a punch bowl with cracked ice and add tiny bits of pineapple, strawberries and slices of bananas, and serve.

To bleach handkerchiefs, add some slices of lemon to the water they are boiled in. Another method is to wash the handkerchiefs and then soak them over night in water with a little cream of tartar in it.

People who do their own butchering will find that the fawn-colored skin of a calf, properly tanned, will make a

very pretty rug with a strong resemblance to doeskin.

A tiny emergency oven may be made of a large size biscuit tin with an asbestos plate in the bottom to prevent burning. Set the tin over an ordinary oil stove.

In hanging up a washing, be sure to put clothespins in where they will not leave a mark. Shirtwaists should be hung from the bottom and skirts from the belt.

Cereals with fruit make very economical luncheon desserts. The cereal should be moulded and smothered in fruit—either fresh or stewed in a syrup.

Beeswax and salt will make rusty flatirons clear as glass. Rub the irons first with a wax rag; then scour with a paper or cloth sprinkled with salt.

Tulle veils that have become limp may be pressed with a warm iron, being careful to put a layer of thin muslin between the tulle and the iron.

Orange salad is made of the sections of the peeled oranges, mixed with sliced celery and broken nut meats. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.

Some people like their potatoes to have the additional flavor given by a pinch of sugar added (as well as salt) to the water-while boiling.

"Clean-Up" Day Abused.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I fully coincide in every particular with your short, concise and pointed article in last evening's issue about "Clean Up Day." The idea of such a day solely belongs to Councillor Coaker, for which thousands of citizens are grateful. But as in every new innovation there are some among us who take mean advantages and therefore abuse and totally destroy the main object. I believe the sole object of Councillor Coaker when introducing this idea was the cleanliness of the city, especially the congested districts, and to help those of our citizens who cannot help themselves in respect of hiring of horses and carts for the removal of all garbage remaining in backyards after the winter. But what do we find each season when "Clean-Up Day" comes around? Heaps of debris along the principal streets of our city opposite the residences of wealthy citizens. Professional men, M. H. A.'s, Legislative Councillors, and officials, who can well afford to pay to have such rubbish removed. Hence I say the promoter and his fellow councillors erred in making this grand innovation—"Clean Up Day"—general through the city. The idea, for example, of the wealthy residents of Cochrane Street, etc., putting themselves on a level with the poor class of tenants of Dammerill's Lane and Notre Dame Street, and expecting the Council's employees and horses to remove their heaps away is to my mind mean and contemptible in the extreme. To my mind Councillor Coaker should move a resolution at the next meeting, that in future "Clean-Up Day" would be "solely" devoted in the interest of all residents of congested districts such as the one above named; this will give the sanitary staff ample time to remove all rubbish from these places within two days, for as it now appears, judging from the immense piles along some of our principal streets and opposite palatial residences, the work of removal will take at least a week.

Hence, as your article suggests, the proverbial "germ" will be given full time to increase and multiply. Bad as it is the condition of our city today owing to "Clean Up Day," our sanitary inspectors should be more attentive to their duties especially for the next few days. I refer now particularly to Cochrane Street where I noticed a number of small boys on Tuesday morning removing from dumped garbage several articles of wearing apparel, such as old shirts, pants, stockings, hats, caps, besides floor canvas, empty bottles, jam crocks, tomato cans, and dirty old and offensive chocolate boxes. Inspectors should not allow children to remove such articles at any cost.

\$5,000,000 Damage
To Property in British Isles in Three Months by Suffragettes.

London, May 8.—The damage to property in the British Isles caused by the Militant Suffragettes during the past three months amounts to upwards of \$5,000,000, according to an estimate made by the authorities at police headquarters in Scotland Yard. To this sum must be added the increased cost of protecting lives and property.

Three detectives have been assigned to watch over each member of the cabinet at all times, while suspected persons are shadowed by plain clothes men and all public buildings have been placed under special guard.



We publish to-day a letter from Mr. Cody of Cambridge, U.S.A. which is more antipathetic to the Confederation of Newfoundland with Canada, than Dr. Grenfell's letter of yesterday was sympathetic with the idea. Mr. Cody suggests that we should get more in touch with the States. We do not know exactly what Mr. Cody means. If he means that we should learn more about the States and the political, social and other doings there, or that we should do our best to foster freer trade relations with the States, we are at one with him. But if the touch he refers to has a political tinge, we are at odds with him. We respect the Stars and Stripes, but our flag is the Union Jack, and our touch with that flag can only be that of a foreigner. We have no love for Confederation, but we would prefer it to Annexation to the States, for we should still be under the Union Jack and should still have King George reigning over us. But our ruling passion is that Newfoundland shall paddle her own canoe.

It is a singular spectacle to watch a most extravagant, visionary, and reckless Prime Minister posing as a Cassandra, and telling the country blue ruin will prevail if his opponents oust him. And this the economical administrator who has piled up the Public Debt by Seven Million Dollars. Dress Forms.

The dress form is an inanimate object which makes it easy for a woman to tell whether a new gown is going to fit in more than one place or not without sabbing a living model full of pin holes. Before the dress form was discovered a woman never knew whether her dress gaped in the back or sagged in front until she got to a meeting of the Priscilla sewing circle, when she was informed of it immediately after the reading of the minutes. Women who preferred to make their own clothes rather than wait until Thanksgiving day for a spring suit had to borrow one of the neighbours for a half day, and then circle around her with a mouthful of pins and a critical squint. There are two kinds of dress forms—wire and pneumatic. The wire form has no arms or legs, but is sound in all other respects. New Furness Boat Here.

At nine o'clock last night, the new Furness Line steamer Digby, which is scheduled for two more trips on the Liverpool-St. John's and Halifax route, carrying mails and passengers, steamed into port. The passage occupied seven days, seven hours. The ship left Liverpool at 2 p.m. Thursday, May 8th. Exceptionally good headway was made for about four days of the voyage, the ship making fourteen knots, but after that dense fog was met and consequently the ship was detained. At 3 p.m. yesterday she was eighty miles off this port. Conditions were then favorable and the Digby finished her maiden voyage in splendid style. The Digby brought 28 packages of mail matter, 500 tons of cargo, and as passengers—Dr. J. G. Duncan, Rev. H. Uphill, S. Dainis and J. Deatherby. The ship is about equal in point of accommodation to the Mongolian, though can steam faster as she is new. The Digby is fitted with modern conveniences, and will afford comfort to travellers. The most competent and experienced stewards are attached to the ship—Capt. Trilnick, who is in command of the Digby, is well known here, having been a former master of the Furness liner Shenandoah which used to run here. His Chief Officer is C. S. Emmett; Surgeon, Dr. H. Godden Cole, and Chief Steward, F. B. Webb, who came here several years in the Almeriana and Tobiasco.

On Tuesday night last an interesting concert was held on board the ship. Dr. Duncan presided, and Rev. H. Uphill contributed selections. The sum of £2 15s. 5d. was taken up for the Marine Disaster Fund. All monies collected are left to Chief Steward Webb for distribution to whatever purpose he sees merit the amount most. A reception will be held on board the Digby this afternoon, and she sails for Halifax tomorrow.

The New Troupe at Rossley's.

On Monday a new company opens an engagement at Rossley's Theatre. There will be enough variety to please every one, as there are both dramatic and vaudeville people included. Then Cook and Beall will present "Just Kido," with singing, dancing and talking. Jokes and stories, with splendid wardrobe. They left New York on the Stephano and will arrive in time to open Monday. Last night the Star was filled, not a vacant seat to be had, and the way the audience laughed at the sketch showed how thoroughly they enjoyed the show, with Jack Rossley in the leading role.

MINARD'S LINIMENT USED BY PHYSICIANS.

Report for Season 1912

We congratulate the League on closing its seventeenth season and beg to submit the following report therefor.

There was no change from the previous year in the clubs competing in the championship competition, and at the conclusion of the series of games the order stood:—Star, Collegians, C.E.I., B.I.S., St. Bonaventures, Felldians, and Casuals. It will be noted that the Stars for their eighth time since the inception of the League carried off the premier honours. This remarkable showing is not to be wondered at when the consistent hard work of the team is borne in mind. No other club has so continuously maintained a reputation for regular practice and attention to the game, and last season was no exception in this respect. A feature of their play during the past year was the presence on the team of a number of "veterans" who clearly demonstrated that they had not lost any of their old goal getting art.

The Champions of the year previous—the Collegians—relinquished their place only after a stiff fight. All through their games they gave an excellent display, and their loss of the championship trophy was not a matter of their own doing. The C.E.I. remained content with their position of the year previous, the B.I.S., St. Bon's, and Felldians improved slightly, whilst the Casuals moved in the reverse direction and headed the list at the wrong end for their first time. The games were fairly well contested throughout, and the leading teams particularly played to an average standard. This was accounted for by these clubs paying attention to the matter of practice, the corresponding poor display by the others being due to a lack of this very essential element to good football.

The Brigade Championship for the third successive season went to the Catholic Cadet Corps, who thus became the absolute winners of the first trophy symbolic of the inter-brigade football championship. The result was not unexpected after the opening games, because the team was decidedly superior to those opposing. The Methodist Guards, Highlanders and Church Lads Brigade followed in the order named. During the season a special game was arranged between a team representing the city and one from the members of the Diocesan Synod, at the time in session. Despite the fact that some of the latter had for several years been out of active service in the game, the clerical representatives made an excellent fight against their opponents, who, however, registered on the right side in the goal scoring. The proceeds of the game went to the fund in aid of those who suffered by the loss of the ill-fated "Ema", an object which besides being particularly worthy was peculiarly fitting in as much as amongst those who were on board that ship was one who had been for years prominent in League games. The financial side of the season was not equal to the previous year, the total receipts being \$1213.61 against \$1428.83 for 1911, and disbursements \$1160.94 compared with \$1413.00. The shortage in receipts is due to the fact that the weather was particularly unfavourable the greater number of the games being played under conditions which would be borne only by the genuine enthusiast amongst the on-lookers. But for this we feel sure that the season would have yielded unusually good results financially, an opinion based on the receipts of fine evenings. The total fund now to the League's credit is \$2831.43. To the members of the League generally we return thanks for kind assistance throughout the year. On behalf of the officers,

LONDON, May 15.

Although it is officially asserted that the proposed visit of Viscount Morley, to Berlin, is of a purely private nature, there is a strong belief that it may involve political possibilities, as did Lord Haldane's last visit, which was similarly described as private. Lord Morley presided over the Ambassadorial Conference, recently, in Earl Grey's absence, and it is suggested he may be entrusted with some mission in connection with the Balkan settlement, or with the task of arranging, if possible, an understanding with Germany. The Daily News is convinced Lord Morley has been entrusted with a political mission, the object of which is to arrange an entente with Germany. Referring to the reports of an agreement having been reached between Britain and Turkey, regarding the Bagdad railway, which will give Germany a foothold in the Persian Gulf, the Daily News believes this agreement will be published on the occasion of the wedding of Princess Victoria Louise, and that it can hardly have been concluded without a general Anglo-German understanding covering the rear, middle and possibly the Far East. Fur-

ther, the resignation of Sir Gerald Augustus Lowther, Ambassador to Turkey and the report that Sir Arthur Nicholson, the permanent head of the foreign office, is likely to be an advocate of German entente, all seem, according to the paper, to point to a separate mission.

Six militant suffragette leaders and male adherents of the cause, were committed to-day, by Henry Curtis Bennett, magistrate at Bow Street Court, to take their trial at the Old Bailey sessions, on charges of conspiracy under the Malignous Damage to Property Act. All of them pleaded "Not Guilty." Bail was allowed on the usual undertaking being given by the prisoners that they would refrain from all participation in militancy, pending trial.

Circular Letter—The Peace of the Church.—Jubilee.

Dear People—
 Our Holy Father—PIUS X.—has issued a Decree ordering a general Jubilee to be held this year in Celebration of the Sixteenth Hundredth Anniversary of the

"Edict of Toleration" published by the Emperor Constantine, in the year A.D. 313, by which an end was put to the terrible persecutions with which the Christians had been afflicted for three centuries, and peace proclaimed throughout the whole Christian world.

This great Jubilee of thanksgiving is announced to open on Low Sunday (Dominica in Albis) 30th March of the present year, 1913, and to continue until the Feast of the Immaculate Conception (8th December) next.

The conditions necessary for gaining the Plenary Indulgence of this Jubilee are the following:
 For all people in Rome, (or who may be able to go there) to visit twice daily the Basilican Churches of St. John Lateran, St. Peter's, Prince of the Apostles; and St. Paul's, outside the walls; and there, for a short time pour forth prayers to God for the prosperity and exaltation of the Apostolic See; for the extirpation of heresy; for the conversion of all those in error; for concord among Christian Princes, and for peace and unity of the whole Body of the Faithful; according to the mind of the Pope;—and once during the time of making these visits, to make a good Confession and receive the Holy Communion, and, also, to give, each one according to his capacity, some alms to the poor, or to assist some pious work.

For those not able to be present in Rome—the visits are to be made to the Church or Churches which may be designated by the Bishop. The graces and Indulgences of this Jubilee are, as usual applicable to the souls of the Faithful departed.

For the people of St. John's and its neighbourhood—We designate the Cathedral and the Churches of St. Patrick and St. Joseph. Six visits are to be paid in all, and they may be paid to either of these Churches. The nuns and religious who may not be able to visit these Churches may gain the Indulgences by making the visits in the Chapels or Choirs of the Convents.

In the Outports the Parish Priest shall arrange as to the Churches to be visited. The Indulgence may be gained at once by any persons who may wish to fulfil the conditions from henceforth.

By and by towards the Autumn time, the Jubilee visits will be performed in a more solemn and public manner in St. John's by the Schools and Religious Societies in public processions within the Church grounds.

His Grace would be glad to have the name of Newfoundland enrolled among the subscribers to this noble object. Persons wishing to distribute Jubilee alms for this object may send their subscriptions to any of the Priests. It may be well to remark that the erection of this Church is not merely an expression of religious sentiment. The Church will be used as the Parish Church for the large congregation which in these latter years has sprung up in this part of Rome.

To Select Head of Benedictines.

Rome, May 10.—Eighty abbots of the Benedictine Order, including several from the United States, assembled in Rome to-day in order to select a new abbot general who will have the direction of the affairs of the order throughout the world. The Benedictines form one of the oldest of religious associations. The order was founded early in the sixth century by St. Benedict, who introduced monastic life into western Europe. No religious order has been so remarkable for extent, wealth and men of note and learning as the Benedictines. The order is said to have had 40 Popes, 230 Cardinals and several thousand Archbishops and Bishops. Numerous emperors and kings of long ago also belonged to the order. The Benedictines have never taken a prominent part in politics, but have produced many literary works.

A Splendid Park.

It is undoubtedly a pleasure to take a walk through Victoria Park off Water Street West. The place exhibits the care and attention bestowed on it, and no wonder that it is a popular resort each evening for toll-worn citizens. The well ordered gravelled walks lead to seats which invite the loiterer to recline in them, and the beautifully kept flower plots and beds delight the senses with their pretty appearance and the inhalation of most sweet perfumes. The new central gate leading from Water St. is a much needed improvement. The band stand has been neatly painted and everything is spick and span for the summer. The caretaker, Mr. Jno. Ryan, is an artist in his profession as a gardener and cultivator of flowers, and is to be congratulated on the excellence of the park.

Attempted Rescue of Prisoner.

On Water Street, at the foot of Prince's Street, last night, Constable Blundon arrested a man who was under the influence and who violently resisted arrest. Civic Adornment.

Editor Evening Telegram. Sir.—Councillor Mullaly came out the other day and talked of the wanton destruction of public property by the boys of the city, and urged upon the teachers the necessity of inculcating in their pupils a respect for civic adornments. 'Tis nice and easy for Mr. Mullaly to preach this doctrine, but he should be consistent and practice what he preaches. If he takes such an interest in the rising generation, how is it that he allows the piles of rubbish that were put outside our doors on Clean-Up Day, on the Higher Levels, to remain there? As I write this there are piles of rubbish "adorning" Spencer Street and this filth has been there for the past thirty hours, notwithstanding the fact that hundreds of children have been playing in this locality all day. How many horses did he send up here to haul away the garbage? It is an easy matter to blow off gas about the shortcomings of our boys, but surely the Councillor in question cannot expect improvement along this line when he permits filth and dirt to remain under his eyes for two days. People who pose as purists should set a good example, for when they preach and fail to act up to the doctrine that they espouse, they only make themselves appear ridiculous in the eyes of sensible people. I notice also, that Mr. Mullaly advocated the shutting out of our band concerts in the Park, giving as his reason for so doing, that the Council should be giving the attention that such concerts called for, to the collecting business. This is very childish argument. Mr. Editor, for it is not the working people who owe the \$20,000, but rather those who drive mad through the town in snorting automobiles. Why, then, should the workman and his family be deprived of their little amusement at a Park concert? We are becoming tired of cheap-jack notoriety in this town, and the man who thinks he can pull our legs by advocating the lessening of expenses, by cutting out a band concert, must have a very meagre knowledge of the feelings of the people on matters of this nature. A Criticism of T.N.M. for the Public.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—As T.N.M. has been so very frank in telling his unpleasant thoughts, I think we may be equally frank in criticising them. Apparently his ideas of what is artistic, musical, refining, differs from that of by far the majority of people judging from the enthusiastic encores that greeted the rendition of almost every item of the performance of which he speaks. T.N.M. questions the musical talent of the performers. I cannot think that the writer has the pleasure of being acquainted with any of the ladies who were on the platform. If he had, he would know that the greater number of them are very musical. Everyone agrees that there is great talent to be found here, but unfortunately Newfoundland has driven away so many teachers of worth and gives no opportunities to the people of hearing the best. Still all who performed had either made use of what opportunities they have here, or had studied abroad for some years. It is plain that T.N.M. cannot appreciate what is dainty, pretty and light; he expects young girls in the early twenties to be prima donnas. Still I do not think he would appreciate those, from his criticism.

His artistic taste we certainly question, for he seems to have expected a nymph's dance or a ballet dance from gipsies. That would not have been artistic as it would not have been appropriate. The dance was a true gipsy dance, thoroughly appropriate and so artistic. But I wonder if T.N.M. could see art in any dancing? He reaches the climax when he speaks in unpraising terms of "The Queen's Messenger." A mind that can draw only evil from such a sound, standard play must be always lying in wait for such promptings. The story is so true to life. A young, frank, generous, fearless messenger, an admirer of grace and beauty as every person healthy in mind and body should be, ready for any adventure; a beautiful fascinating loyal woman, who for the love of her country and her fiancé has become a spy. He, the messenger, never forgets his duty to his Queen, but true to life, he becomes more and more attracted to his companion's fascinations, he forgets his own fiancée for the moment and wishes to make love to her. She repulses this; she is prompted only by thoughts of serving her country, and after making him smoke cigarettes that drug him, she steals his dispatches. Afterwards when she sees that having failed in his duty, he would take his life with the name of his fiancée on his lips, her womanliness conquers and for the sake of the girl he is engaged to she returns the dispatches and helps him to escape. This is the true plot of the play and we can only feel sorry for anyone who is unable to appreciate a standard play that has again and again been a favorite curtain-raiser at the best London theatres and has won the applause of thousands of what is known to be the most critical audience in the world, the London audience. We are certainly unaccustomed here to so good a play and such finished acting. Miss Hutton carried her listeners with her and made them feel the tragedy of the situation, living the character herself for the time being. This was Art, though T.N.M. does not seem to have recognized it. He speaks of "winning truth"; this tragedy was truth. This is life. It is unfortunate that the performance cannot be repeated so that another crowded audience might enjoy it, and give its verdict which I'm sure would endorse I.C.M.'s criticism of its being one of the most artistic, musical and refined performances ever given here.

As a return quotation we would ask T.N.M. to give up looking for evil where evil is not, and to try to tune his mind to find "sermons in stones and good in everything." We cannot help feeling what a very unpleasant mind his must be to live with. Is he a bachelor? Yours truly, AN OBSERVER.

The beautiful maidens of the land, the bold, aspiring youths, on platform flower-decked will stand, and hand us vital truths. But mark these women old and worn, who, at commencement time, gaze on the festival and mourn—their presence seems a crime! They found this life a harder road than e'er they dreamed it was, with more of whip and spur and goad than of the world's applause. There is a shadow on each brow, stilled is their buoyant song; their eyes are weak and faded now; they have wept so long. They're bent from bearing heavy weights, from tolling day and night; they once were sweet girl graduates, serene in snowy white. "Beyond the Alps," we heard them say, high purpose in their eyes, upon a bygone happy day, "the land of Italian lies!" Life leads through tangled wilderness, and not through bosky dells, but who'd discourage or distress the Blessed Damosels?

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, May 15. King George and Queen Mary are going to Berlin for the wedding of Princess Victoria Louise and Prince Ernest Augustus of Cumberland, which takes place May 24th. It is said their Majesties at the Emperor's request, will remain in Germany until June 25th.

TOKIO, May 15.

The Japanese foreign office is optimistic as to the outcome of the controversy with California. In reply to an enquiry it was stated this morning by a high official, that negotiations were progressing satisfactorily, and a friendly permanent solution was probable.

LONDON, May 15.

Henry Curtis Bennett, the Bow Street magistrate, trying the suffragette prisoners, is the latest public man for whose protection against outrage detectives have been assigned by Scotland Yard authorities. He is accompanied every day to and from the court by two officers in plain clothes, as a result of threats made.

HALIFAX, May 15.

H.M.S. Cumberland arrived in port about noon to-day, from Bermuda, with Naval Cadet Prince Albert on board. He will likely be the guest here of Lieut-Governor MacGregor. Up to to-day the city has not made any preparation for a reception, so H.R.H. does not visit Halifax in any official manner. At Sydney, however, a reception is planned.

OMAHA, May 15.

A tornado in the southern part of Seward county last night, took toll of 17 lives and injured 40 persons. Property valued at \$250,000, was destroyed. Three towns, Seward, Tomaro and McColge, suffered from the elements, the greatest destruction being at Seward, where 11 were killed and 30 injured. Greater destruction was averted by the fact that the tornado crossed only a comparatively small part of the town.

LONDON, May 15.

The Duke and Duchess of Westminster have signed a formal deed of separation. She is to receive £100,000 a year from him, and has taken a house in the suburbs. Their intimates say that the Duke tried hard to persuade his wife to divorce him, but she refused. Her mother, Mrs. Cornwallis West, strongly supported her in this determination. Moreover, she was notified that the King's Proctor would probably intervene on the ground of collusion.

SEWARD, Neb., May 15.

A tornado, which took a toll of ten lives, injured over thirty persons, and destroyed a third of the town, occurred at 8 last evening. Twenty-two houses, including several of the finest residences, were destroyed, and many more partially wrecked, but the business portion of the place did not greatly suffer. The tornado struck the western or residential portion of Seward and swept everything in its path. Those killed were mostly caught in the wreckage of their homes.

LONDON, May 15.

At a meeting of the Canadian immigration committee attention was called to the Privy Council order which had been put into operation by the Dominion Government, providing that no immigrant could land unless he came direct from his native country. There being no direct steamship service between India and Canada, the effect of the order is to prohibit further immigration from British East India. Sir Mancherjee Merwanjee Bhowanjee, who presided, said that by removing this prohibition, Canada would be contributing more to the unity of the Empire than by the gift of half a dozen dreadnoughts. A resolution urging the repeal of the order was unanimously carried.

LONDON, May 15.

The keys of Scutari were formally handed over to Naval commanders, representing the Powers, at noon, today, in a square opposite the military barracks, where Esad Pasha so recently surrendered to Crown Prince Danilo. The ceremonies were brief and simple. Vice-Admiral Cecil Burney was escorted into the city by a Montenegrin guard of honor. A touching feature was the presence around the imposing, well-fed naval brigades of several thousand semi-starved, gaunt men, women and children, inhabitants of Scutari, who lost all their possessions during the siege, and who are still destitute. Admiral Burney and Capt. Spizzi, of the Italian navy, delegated a force of officers and men to distribute food and clothing, transported from various European cities for the benefit of the sufferers. Immediately after the presentation of the keys, the last Montenegrin regiment withdrew from the city and retired to the camp of the Crown Prince.

LONDON, May 15.

Work at the dock is still rushing and the four cradles are continually occupied by as many schooners being fitted for the summer's work. At last night's meeting of the King Edward Branch of C. C. B. S., Mr. Arthur Rogers was selected to fill the office of President, left vacant by the resignation of Mr. James Parmiter, on the eve of his leaving for Buffalo.
